Nehru Assails U.S. Attitude On Far East

NEW DELHI, India — (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru of India, in a broadcast bristling with criticism of the United States' policy in Asia, called tonight for a conference of major powers to discuss world problems, "instead of talking at each other across thousands of miles."

"It is clear that enough has been said on both sides for negotiation in a conference to be the next fruitful step," Nehru said.

The Indian leader contended the American proposal to name Communist China an aggressor in Korea — a policy backed by both houses of the U. S. Congress — "cannot lead to peace."

He said:

"It can only lead to intensification of conflicts and might perhaps close the door to any attempt at solution by negotiation. It is a tremendous responsibility for any person to take such a step. At no time should this door be closed, for if we close it, we also close the door to a civilized approach to any problem."

Nehru's broadcast marked his return from the London meeting of Prime Ministers of the British Commonwealth of Nations. Great Britain also is opposing any plans to impose UN penalties against the Red Chinese as aggressors.

In reference to American opposition to the seating of Red China in the United Nations, Nehru said:

"For the past year or more we have persistently urged China should be given a place in the councils of the world at Lake Success. Yet this has not been done and most people realize now that the fate of the world might well have been different if that obvious fact had been recognized."

"There has been a reluctance and hesitation to accept the great change that has come over Asia. There still is an attempt sometimes to treat the great nations of Asia in the old way."

DiSalle Urges Adoption Of General Freeze On Prices

2,964 Now Eligible Voters

Poll tax payments hit an approximate 2,164 as the exemptions went to 800 by 10:15 a.m. today.

Jan. 31 is the deadline for paying the poll tax or securing the exemption that makes a citizen eligible to vote in the various elections due to come up this year.

At the meantime, County Attorney Bill Waters answered queries by ex-servicemen, still in the reserves, as to whether they must or must not hold a poll tax receipt or exemption in order to vote.

Waters said reservists, active or inactive, do not need to pay a poll tax or secure an exemption certificate, but must sign an affidavit at the polls that they are in the reserves, or National Guard. This is provided for in the amendment to the state Constitution which allows them to vote without poll tax or exemption while the country is at war. The nation is still technically at war with Germany and Japan.

Irrespective of what may be done along peace treaty lines this year with the two conquered nations, these reservists, in any still vote without poll tax or exemptions because they held that status 18 months prior to any election held this year.

However, the Constitution states further, that any member registered by the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines, etc., is not eligible to vote regardless of his holding a poll tax receipt or exemption.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Price Stabilizer Michael DiSalle said today he has given Economic Stabilizer Eric Johnston recommendations for a general price freeze.

He made the statement before the joint Senate-House economic committee.

DiSalle did not make public details of his recommendations but said that an announcement probably will be made within a couple of days.

His testimony followed word from other officials that a price rollback may be expected tomorrow, possibly to be followed by a wage freeze Friday.

An overall price ceiling at levels of Jan. 3 was reported by informed government sources to be in the works.

The wage action, it was understood, will put a lid on wages as of the day announced.

Johnston, long time president of the United States Chamber of Commerce and lately the president of the Motion Picture Assn., is understood to be planning a radio and television broadcast tomorrow evening, at which time he will tell the public of his plans.

He took the oath of office from Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson in a brief ceremony in President Truman's news conference room in the old State Department building.

An order was due shortly from Johnston giving autonomous power over prices to Price Stabilizer Director Michael V. DiSalle and over wages to the nine-member Wage Stabilization Board headed by Cyrus S. Ching.

Alan Valentine, who resigned Friday, DiSalle enjoyed only limited authority and the wage board had received no delegation of power — it was merely an advisory body to Valentine.

Johnston has told a congressional committee he will have broad supervisory power over not only wages and prices, but also over all economic phases of mobilization including credit control. (See DISALLE, Page 2)

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The government today banned the use of nickel in automobile trim and nearly 400 other civilian products.

The purpose is to conserve the short nickel supply for defense and essential civilian uses.

One of the most important defense uses of nickel is to make jet airplane engines resistant to great heat and corrosion.

The National Production Authority (NPA) made public a long list of products for civilians in which nickel silver or nickel plate may not be used in new manufacturing on March 1 and thereafter.

It issued another long list of civilian products in which nickel-bearing stainless steel or high content nickel alloys may not be used, beginning April 1.

However, the NPA allowed manufacturers two months to complete articles started before the effective dates.

Among the items in which nickel bearing stainless steel was banned after April 1 are automobile bumpers, grills, hubcaps, trim, wheel rings and wheel covers.

Nickel plating may not be used after March 1 in automobile accessories, dash panels, gasoline caps, grills, interior trim, lamp housing, ornamental trim around windows, radiator trim, wheel discs or window levers.

Nimitz Heads New Board On U.S. Security

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman has created a commission to report on how to protect the nation's internal security without imperiling traditional freedoms.

His move drew a mixed reaction today from senators who have had leading roles in Capitol Hill disputes over Communist curbs.

Mr. Truman set up the nine-member, non-partisan commission late yesterday, and named retired Admiral Chester W. Nimitz to head it. He said he would appoint eight other "distinguished citizens" later.

The President announced the commission would consider "the question of how this nation can best deal with the problem of protecting its internal security and at the same time maintaining the freedoms of its citizens."

One of the commission's major tasks, the President said in a statement, will be to consider the operation of the federal employee loyalty and security programs. "These have come in for hot congressional criticism in the past."

But Mr. Truman did not limit the commission to that. He assigned it to study the whole field, including activities of state and local governments, "private groups of all kinds and citizens in their daily work and in their homes."

The commission "will consider the harm that comes from the wrong kind of action as well as the good that comes from the right kind of action," the President added.

Americans Keep Up Victories In Air

TOKYO — (AP) — Allied troops slashed more than 10 miles beyond Wonju on the central Korean front today and to the southeast recaptured the key mountain town of Yongwol.

A heavily-armed patrol with tanks blazed through Hoengsong, 10 miles north of Wonju, and pushed on to within 33 miles of the 38th Parallel before withdrawing, a field dispatch said.

It was the farthest northward advance since Seoul, the Korean capital, was abandoned. On the way back the task force was engaged by a company of enemy troops. The Reds retreated with heavy casualties.

The Han River town of Yongwol southeast of Wonju fell to allied attack after an air and artillery bombardment.

The capturing force was not identified. However, the U.S. Seventh Division, only American force to breach the Manchurian border in the Korean war, has been operating south of the tungsten mining town.

Civilian Fliers Said Pampa's Best Chance

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. Walter Rogers (D-Tex.) said today Tuesday the best chance for reopening of the Pampa Air Force Base lies in its possible operation under private contract to fliers.

With Manager E. C. Wedgeworth of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, he talked with Maj. General Kenneth McNaughton of the Air Force pilot training section.

"The Air Force hasn't determined exactly how many of the old air fields will be opened," Rogers told a reporter later.

"With the development of faster and heavier aircraft, however, it appears that some of the old fields, such as that at Pampa, cannot again be used for advanced flight training without large expenditures on improvements."

They were told, Rogers added, that the Pampa field might fit into the program under private contract operation for training of airmen who are just getting their wings.

Rogers said he and Wedgeworth will check with private flying concerns to see whether any are interested in negotiating a contract with the government.

Budget Board Submits Bills

AUSTIN — (AP) — Major money bills cutting state expenses by 10 million dollars were introduced in the Senate today.

Senator Howard Carney of Atlanta, chairman of Senate Finance Committee, offered the bills while a subcommittee stuck by its rigid policy of giving state departments just 15 minutes each to appeal if they think the cuts were too deep.

In an hour and 15 minutes, the subcommittee heard seventy-five departments.

The appropriations measures covering vital state services were drafted by the legislative budget board.

The Budget Board created by the legislature two years ago to help plan state spending, proposed biennial outlays of \$53,764,218 for colleges and universities, \$46,886,520 for state departments, \$39,963,210 for hospitals and special schools, \$5,985,702 for courts and \$4,191,000 for junior colleges. This adds up to \$133,490,650.

The proposed 10 million dollar saving would reduce the estimated amount of new revenue needed by the state government for the next two years to \$100,000,000.

act with the enemy now showing a reluctance to fight.

Gen. George E. Stratemeyer, commander of the Far East Air Force, issued the statement.

Six other enemy jet planes were probably destroyed and damaged, he said.

The attack struck at noon (10 p.m. EST Tuesday) with about 20 B-29s hitting the transport center for 25 minutes.

Most of them have been taken care of to date, although there's still some railroad union bosses to be reckoned with. With the administration itching to lower the boom, the rail men may try Mr. Truman's patience too far. He seems to be a little irked with that particular crowd, anyway.



NEW YORK - I agree with President Truman that this war of his is going to cost so much that everybody will have to make sacrifices. I am quite willing to pay my share, whatever it may be. But Harry S. Truman is not paying his fair share and I resent his special privilege and demand that Congress revoke the law granting him an outright graft of \$50,000 a year in the guise of expense money, subject to neither accounting nor taxation. This is the most arrogant assertion of special privilege ever pulled off by a political gang, who have come to regard themselves not as agents and servants of the American people but as our rulers. It is corrupt practice.

Inasmuch as Mr. Truman hasn't got the decency to repudiate the graft and the corrupt intention of Congress in passing the law, public opinion should compel Congress to repeal it. The invitation to make a handsome gesture of honor lapsed when he failed to veto a bill that was rushed through the Congress just before his inauguration. This rush-act was an obvious trick because the Constitution provides that the President's compensation "shall neither be increased nor diminished during the term for which he shall have been elected." The present term to which he was "elected" began on Jan. 20, 1949. This was his Congress, the 81st, which had returned Truman's party to power after his abusive campaign against the Republican 80th Congress.

It can be strongly argued that the \$50,000 graft never has been legal because Truman was "elected" for the term in which the raise was put through. That is to say, he was elected vice president with a constitutional proviso that he should become president in case of Roosevelt's death. The \$50,000 raise was put through in the last hours of the term for which he was elected, a rather explicit forbiddance against this crooked device wherein it says further that the president "shall not receive any other emolument..." during his term of office.

That word "other" shows that the founding fathers held emolument and compensation meant the same thing. The title of the act which is now being used to justify the raise is "The Act to Increase the Compensation of the President of the United States." It is a simple and obvious process of basing the dollar on a firm foundation instead of forcing it to sit perched on nothing more substantial than government whims.

But this would have played hob with the administration's ability not only to stay in power but to keep on acquiring more power. A sound economy would have knocked the props from under the New Deal, just as the operation of the law of supply and demand and a live-and-let-live policy toward private enterprise would have done.



NEA Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON - (NEA) - Crux of the big gab fest on foreign policy is whether the President has the power to send U. S. troops to Europe under the North Atlantic Treaty, and whether the President had such power to send U. S. troops to Korea under the United Nations resolution. President Truman thinks he has that power. Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio thinks the President does not have that power.

Both can cite the Constitution as their authority. Senator Taft cites Article I, section 8, paragraph 8: "The Congress shall have power... to declare war..." That means that the President doesn't have the power to declare war. But the circumstances in today's situation are that the President has not declared war against the North Koreans nor against the Chinese Communist

nor the Russians. And no declaration of war is involved in sending additional U. S. divisions to Europe. The two divisions in Europe now are there as Army of Occupation, because peace with Germany has not been concluded. The President's asserted power to send more divisions to Europe stems from Article II, section 2, paragraph 1 of the Constitution. The President shall be commander-in-chief of the Army and Navy of the United States. The President also has the authority to conduct foreign relations. The Constitution gives the authority to make treaties and send ambassadors abroad, subject to confirmation by the Senate. Both the United Nations Charter and the North Atlantic Treaty were so ratified by the Senate.

TWO MAIN ARGUMENTS But in this connection, Senator Taft makes two points: 1—There is no legal obligation for the United States to send troops to Europe. Article 8 of the North Atlantic Treaty merely provides that the United States is obligated to go to war against any country that attacks one of the Atlantic Pact nations. The United States is left free to decide how it will fight that war, how much and what kind of aid it will give the European countries.

2—The Act passed by Congress to implement the United Nations Charter provided for the commitment of troops only after a special military agreement to set up an international police force had been made by the Security Council. This agreement specifically to be made subject to later ratification by Congress. The Russians having prevented the making of this agreement by the Security Council, it was never submitted to the Congress for ratification. International lawyers, especially

lational lawyers, senators and everybody else, can and probably will argue interminably on the legal points that Senator Taft has raised. Unquestionably, the senator has a case, from a legal standpoint. The other side of the argument is that the President as commander-in-chief has control over the armed forces of the United States to carry out his foreign policy. The power to send these forces outside the country is not dependent on Congress and has been exercised in the past. It has been approved by Congress many times.

SINCE ORDERED TROOPS Since the Revolution, the United States has been in only five wars declared by Congress: The War of 1812 against England, Mexican and Spanish Wars, World Wars I and II. But 85 instances are recorded in which the President has ordered U. S. land and sea forces into action against unprovoked aggressors without prior approval of Congress. The first instance was in 1812 when President Monroe sent troops against freebooters from Buenos Aires and Venezuela, from Buenos Aires and Venezuela, against Florida.

There are 25 instances of U.S. action to protect American lives and property in China. Most famous was the Boxer rebellion of 1900. There are three actions against Japan and three against Korea. There are 35 actions in Latin America. Most recent were the 1914 landing at Vera Cruz, the 1916 pursuit of Pancho Villa below the Rio Grande and the 1919 action against attackers of Juarez. These actions have been considered entirely constitutional and legal by such jurists as the late ex-President William Howard Taft, father of the senator, and by Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes. Sen. Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin and ex-Sen. Warren Austin of Vermont have both stated

Marshall Says Athletes In 4-F May Be Drafted

Professional and amateur athletes got implicit notice today from Defense Secretary George Marshall that 4-F's probably will find themselves drafted in the present emergency if they successfully demand.

If inducted, Marshall said, the men could be used in non-combat duty, thus relieving more of the physically fit for the fighting front.

The question arose at a session of the House Armed Services Committee in Washington yesterday when it was recalled that many athletes who failed to pass selective service physical examinations were deferred in the last war.

A new bill proposing to draft 18-year-olds and establishing a universal military service and training system now is under discussion.

Although it was not specified, Pentagon officials later made it plain that it was decided to draft the athletes, not only athletes, but men for small walks of life would be affected.

Officials of major league baseball and football immediately gave full support to the proposal, many of them pointing out that the athletes, mostly athletes, would prefer such service.

Actually, unless the international situation requires drastic changes in mobilization requirements, such sports as major league baseball and football will feel little effect under present regulations.

The present draft applies only to men from 19 through 25 years of age, and exempts veterans of World War II and married men with dependants. Rosters of most of the professional clubs are stocked with men who are in service in the last war, are 26 or over, or are married.
