Nehru Assails **U.S.** Attitude **On Far East**

NEW DELHI, India - (AP) Prime Minister Nehru of India. in a broadcast bristling with criticism of the United States' policy in Asia, called tonight for a conference of major powers to discuss world problems, "instead of talking at each other across thousands of miles."

"It is clear that enough has been said on both sides for negotiation in a conference to be the next fruitful step," Nehru said.

The Indian leader contended the American proposal to name Communist China an aggressor in Korea - A policy backed by both houses of the U.S. Con-- "cannot lead to peace. gress He said:

"It can only lead to intensification of conflicts and might perhaps close the door to any attempt at solution by negotiation. It is a tremendous responsibility for any person to take such a step. At no time should this door be closed, for if we close it, we also close the door to a civilized approach to any problem.'

Nehru's broadcast marked his return from the London meeting of Prime Ministers of the British Commonwealth of Nations. Great Britain also is opposing any plans to impose UN penal-ties against the Red Chinese as aggressors.

In reference to American opposition to the seating of Red China in the United Nations, Nehru said:



INSIDE YOUR CONGRESS By RALPH W. GWINN* Distinguished Member of Congress, Lecturer and Author

LET'S GET RIGHT WITH OURSELVES Unless we get right internally, it will be impossible, it is impossible, it is imposible now, to be right in our relations with other

nations. We do not trust our own government that buys votes openly and offers bribes. It offers houses and low rents, and robs some small groups in favor of others. It subsi-

dizes one group whose votes are needed at the expense of others whose votes are not needed. It offers jobs and security and health and education for the votes of still other organized groups. At last, the people become unable to bear the burden and to take care of themselves.

Neither will other nations trust such an administration of government. It will, of course, employ the same tactics in attempting to buy from other nations friends and votes and promises to fight on our

Indeed, our Administration has financed not our friends abroad but our enemies, who are in control of the governments of the world. Our friends are oppressed and thrown out of office. China was once, possibly, our best friend. Now she is massed against us. We financed and encouraged the Communist forces. We forced our friends to dissolve 29 armed divisions and stop fighting our real

enemies. This corrupting, compromising, appeasing foreign policy was presented to the American people as a means of defeating Communism. But where have we defeated it? It can take over anywhere in Europe at any time it wants to march. This is true even though your dollars have helped to make Europe

more productive than in World War I or II. And Europe has more manpower than ever before. But she does not want to fight Communism-that's what money and dependence do to people. Europe says, "Let the Americans fight our battles for us.'

With such an uncertain foreign policy, built on the power and corruption of money, the President keeps repeating, "Give me more powers and appropriate me more money." We have no idea what he will do with it. He thinks the mere power of money will win wars. Mere money does not tell us where the enemy intends to strike or how to paralyze him behind his own

Even with all this time being wasted day in and day out and hour in and hour out we were instructed to charge on a "progress report" 8 hours each day as having been spent on certain work designated by a given "project number." When I inquired as to the use being made of these reports, I was told that "it was thought" that they had something to do with the preparation of the budget. When told this, I refused to sign the reports and was then told that if I did not fill them in showing 8 hours spent on a certain assignment (whether I had worked on it or not) that it would reduce my next efficiency rating accordingly. I was further advised that if I went to anyone in a higher position in the Department regarding these instructions, my rating would be further reduced. Af that time I made two efforts to see the head of statistical services who refused to talk with me on both occasions. About half of the departments in pur government, with about a million employees, were born in the iniquity of offering corruption to the voters in return for their

They are a part of the bought vote that keeps the administration in power." They should be eliminated. That is a part of the moral regeneration we must have to survive.

Without that regeneration, how can our government penetrate the Iron Curtain of the Soviet Government with the truth-that liberty is worth fighting for? Can out government show the Russians, as General Bonnar Fellars so well recommends, why the Russian people should throw off their government? It is impossible if our own government, itself, is committing the same wrongs!
