Throughout the northeast in particular, families are shivering in their homes and still have not managed to save enough fuel oil to assure them against icute suffering. The time-and-a-half over 35 hours provision has forced the OPA to authorize a price increase. The wage rise, if bulled through, will shove up the cost of coal again.

These are merely hit-and-miss, passing commentaries upon reasons why there is an increasing criticism of organized labor by persons who hitherto have not indulged. It may be significant that these blasts often come from men who have recently seen at first-hand what the \$50-a-month men in uniform are suffering while fellow-Americans demand their pounds of flesh at home.

Smart labor leaders will begin looking ahead to that day whenever it may be, that a few millions of men are mustered out of uniform and get back where they can go to the polls on election day. -BUY VICTORY BONDS

The grievance of the miners is admitted Their rebellion against the leaders who are bleeding them is understandable. Their appeal for an increased wage may command general support. But the outstanding fact in the entire story is the complete powerlessness of government and society to check a movement that meant real suffering in the storm-ridden and winter ridden states of the east

By government orders thousands of easterners had substituted coal burners for oil burners. And then when winter cold was at its deadliest the coal supply was diminished tragically by an unauthorized and illegal strike. There was nothing the government could do about it. There was nothing society could do about it. And there was nothing the union officials could do about it. Nowhere in the republic was there an agency of any character that possessed the power to stay a strike whose inevitable consequence was widespread suffering. Nowhere in America was there a power that could protect the essential fuel supply of many thousands of sufferers.

course the striking miners failed to win relief from the increased dues auginst which they were protesting. Neither did they win the increased wage they were demanding. They lost everything they were fighting for. All that they succeeded in accomplishing was an augmenta-tion of the suffering of thousands of helpless people. CORRING WITHOUT KNOWLEDGE

We have become so confused as to what man's ights and obligations are that we as individuals are often guilty of collectively robbing without even knowing that we are guilty of it. The result is just as damaging to the person robbed as f the robber knew what he was doing. Of course, the robber who does not know he is robbing, does not have the sting of a pricking conscience.

We often materially rob without doing it egally. In fact some of our laws make robbery absolutely legal. Robbery is taking by force or by cunning either as an individual or collectively the fruits of other people's labor without their conse

Or when people are not willing to pay their proportionate share of government expense on some universal rule, where all people pay in the same ratio or the same proportion, then they also are guilty of robbing those they compel to pay more than their proportionate share.

And this form of robbery we adopted some 30 years ago this year. We made it legal to collectively compel the more successful producers to pay a higher fraction of their income than the groups with the most votes. This is immoral and because the state sanctions it does not in any way make it moral. One of the causes of our unemployment has been this form of robbery. It reduced the initiative and the growth of people with venturesome capital. This form of coercion, taking from the few, is what is known as man made commandment or law as contrasted to the law that more nearly operated in the United States for 126 years prior to 1913.

It seems that man made commandments are not as practical as God's commandments.

Yes, many people can rob without knowing it It has come on to them gradually. The big problem is to get people to realize when they are robbing. Churches, schools, colleges, and newspaper columnists, public officeholders and every citizen should use their best effort to help people realize what human relations are robbery. They should make every effort to make people know when they are robbing. Probably nine out of ten would deny that discriminatory taxes are robbery but those men can write no impersonal rule for taxation. Their only norm of not robbing is their own man made commandments or rules.

But most of those people who make these man made commandments only express their opinions where they are protected from having their man made commandments analyzed. They are a very l'angerous class of people.

NEW DEAL LITTLE RESPECT FOR HONESTY OF PEOPLE

In spite of the claims of the New Dealers have ing faith in the common man, the facts of the matter are that they have little faith in his intelligence and honesty. This is proven by the fact that they will not trust him. They insist on making laws to prevent him from using his conscience and his judgment. They think they will be dishonest and consume too much if we do not have ration cards. And ration cards are based on the erroneous philosophy that 'the politicians are more honest and more patriotic than the people; that the politicians have to ration things in order to keep things from being too scarce But look at Mrs cause she is the wife of the President.

If all politicians really had faith in the common man and in democracy, as they profess, we would repudiate all of the laws that interfere with man's right to work, produce and exchange the fruits of his labor and consume or save or invest

as he saw fit. When we followed this program, we made much more progress than we have made during the last 30 years when the politicians and the people themselves have lost faith in the honesty and sincerity of the individual

ousy fighting. The explanation was not too persuasive. Mr. Stalin is commander-in-chief, but as such has a large and competent staff to assist him. It is mprobable that his absence from Moscow for a ew days would have altered the tempo of the Russian advance. In any event, he never would have been out of touch with the home office and could have returned there within a few hours if presence had been required.

Maybe Mr. Stalin doesn't like to ride in airplanes. Maybe he doesn't like to travel in any fashion; he never has been outside Russia. Against ooth of these suppositions must be laid the fact that the conference was to deal with the strategy of 1943, a matter of the utmost concern to Stalin and one upon which he must have very strong opinions. It seems probable that his decision not to join Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Churchill was reached deliberately and was based upon reasons which were not trivial.

The most obvious explanation of his absence was a determination not to be bound directly or by implication to go along with his western allies any farther than he is already committed preferred not to discuss the part Russia will or will not play in a joint attack upon Japan. He preferred not to engage with his allies in the popular game of planning the peace. He has his own plans and he does not wish to compromise them. He knows that America and Britain are already too deeply involved in the European war to back out short of victory, and that is all he cares about. In what happens afterward, he wants a free hand.

There are those in this country-some of them great admirers of Stalin and communism and many other admirers of everything Britishwho make much use of the phrase, "the united nations." Their purpose is transparent. They wish Americans to become so used to the expression that they will readily join in a scheme to place the power and wealth of this country permanently at the service of Russia or Britain or both.

It would be interesting to know how such people explain Mr. Stalin's absence from the conference. Obviously he is no passionate believer in perpetual cooperation with his allies. He has his alliance with Britain and his working arrangements with America for the duration of the war, and that is all he wants. He wasn't so enamored of the idea of the united nations that he felt obliged to go to the meeting. And the Chinese weren't even invited.

Benes Broadcast **Brings Denial**

LONDON, Feb. 15 (P)-Dr. Edu ard Benes, president of the Czecho-Slovak government in exile, said in a talk Saturday that the German army was facing "ultimate catas-trophe," and his speech brought immediate reprisals in his Nazi-held homeland.

Apparently indicative that the broadcast reached its intended listeners, the German radio announced Saturday that several Czech intellectuals who formerly belonged to Benes' intimate circle of friends were being sent to a concentration

camp as a result of the speech.



If you are single, but head of a family, you get the same personal exemption as a married couple— 1,200. In order to qualify as the head of a family, you must actually support and live in the home with one or more individuals who are closely related to you by blood or marriage relationship or by adop-tion. You must also have the right to exercise family control, based on legal or moral obligations, over such individuals.

In addition to your personal exemption, entered on line 20 of form 1040, you are entitled to credit for dependents. A dependent must be inder 18 years of age or incapat of supporting himself because he is mentally or physically defective. CHANGING STATUS

You are entitled to a credit of \$350 for each person (other than usband or wife) dependent on you and receiving chief support from you. If you are head of a family wever, you are entitled to a credit of \$350 for each dependent minus -since for one of your dependents you are receiving a personal exemption as head of fam-



About this time every year, it is customary for Santa Fe to report on the condition of this railroad to its owners, the stockholders of

This year, Santa Fe feels the need of making an additional reportnot only to the stockholders, but also to the people who have helped us accomplish the biggest job we have ever had.

These are the people who ride on a railroad, who ship on a railroad, and who work on a railroad.

Santa Fe salutes them and thanks them.

Without their cheerful cooperation, this difficult year would certainly have been harder to pull through, if not completely impossible. This report is built around good, old-fashioned American sports-

During 1942, Santa Fe moved 79 per cent more passenger miles . . . and 122 per cent more freight ton-miles . . . than in 1918,

during World War I. And all this was done with 26 per cent fewer locomotives than we had in 1918. These figures indicate the greatest vol-

ume of business we have ever handled. They also indicate why you may have experienced some difficulties and inconniences in traveling or shipping by train during the past year.

Crowded Trains

If you had difficulty obtaining reservations, or had to stand for a portion of your trip we were just as concerned as you were over any inconvenience it may have caused you. And we mean it!

Our passenger traffic volume was up 102 per cent last year as compared with 1941. Gasoline rationing, in our territory, will increase that volume even more this year.

The Santa Fe must handle this additional load with its present passenger cars, as no new cars will be built during

Late Trains

We hate late trains, too! . . . and we are sorry if they have caused you to miss a connection or an important meeting.

In these days of unprecedented passen ger volume it is not always possible to maintain schedules with on-time regu-larity . . . and since military trains have the right-of-way over everything else, they often cause our regular passenger

trains to be delayed. At many stations along the line, mail and express are heavier than in normal times-and take longer to load. This is another reason why trains are delayed.

Dining Car Service

We regret if you had to stand in line for a seat in the diner-and we honestly wish we could correct this situation.

Five and more settings per meal are frequently required in our dining cars in these days of limited equipment and crowded trains, whereas two settings used to be enough.

Car Shortage

Mobilizing cars necessary for troop move ments has caused a shortage of cars at some points on the line. Special troop trains are becoming al-

ost routine on the Santa Fe. In just one case, we moved an entire division from one camp—and it took 55 complete trains to handle the men and equipment. We must also keep our passenger cars in constant service to handle the increased traffic all over the line. For this

reason, we cannot always concentrate extra cars at any one point.

Due to the submarine menace and the di-version of freighters to other services, almost all of the intercoastal freight ton-

nage formerly handled by ships through the Panama Canal was hauled by the

railroads in 1942. Export freight moving to Pacific ports from eastern United States over the Santa Fe in 1942 increased 374% over 1941!

All this brought about an unusually heavy demand for Santa Fe freight cars ... increased considerably the average length of haul . . . and occasionally caused delays in delivering empty cars at loading points. It also indicates

Santa Fe has many busy months ahead. Keep 'Em Rollin'!

Please remember there's only one thing we want to do more than keep trains on time and supply cars as pron that's keep troops and war freight on their wartime schedule. And we know that's the way you want it!
