Getting In Wrong Throughout the northeast in particular, families are shivering in their homes and still have not managed to save enough fuel oil to assure them against acute suffering.

So what happens? First there is a strike over increased dues to John L. Lewis' union. It is settled by Presidential intervention. Meanwhile there has been a loss of approximately one-third, temporarily, in the mines' potential output.

Now John L. Lewis is demanding a pay rise for coal miners. This is on top of the fact that, by holding onto the 5-day, 35-hour week, as a pay basis, when national emergency demands 6-day work, his constituents are getting time-and-a-half for hours for which most war workers have to be satisfied with straight time rates.

These are merely hit-and-miss, passing commentaries upon reasons why there is an increasing criticism of organized labor by persons who hitherto have not indulged. It may be significant that these blasts often come from men who have recently seen at first-hand what the \$50-a-month men in uniform are suffering while fellow-Americans demand their pounds of flesh at home.

Every model is clothed in a different uniform, and there you have in one line what the well-dressed soldier of the U. S. Army wears to this man's war, not counting the uniforms for the WAAC or the aviators.

At the other extreme is the Arctic parka, which is something extra. Outside, it is a reversible poplin wind-proof and weather-proof fabric. One side is white to blend with snow and ice, the other side of the new shade of olive green to blend with woods andundra. For extreme temperatures, below this pants-and-parka are two suits of half-inch thick, high-pile undergarments made of alpaca and mohair, warmer than fur, and worn hung from special suspenders.

Blue jeans, more properly known as blue denims, may disappear from use as overalls and work clothes as one result of this war for the Army has developed a new material for fatigue uniforms, a herringbone twill in the new Army olive green. It's much stronger than denim, and just about the same in price.

CHAMELEON CLOTHES New Army camouflage suits for jungle fighting are reversible, enabling the soldiers to change their spots like a chameleon by simply turning their garments inside out. Today's War Analysis

By GLENN BAIRD Associated Press Writer By the capture of Rostov the Red army has won a victory second only to that of Stalingrad. A city twice lost to the invader has been rewon for the second time. The southern anchor of the whole German line has been shaken loose and it is difficult to see how it can be firmly fixed again much short of Odessa and the mouth of the Dnieper.

With Rostov lost all the gains of Hitler's 1942 campaign have been wiped out, except that grinding patch around Novorossiisk, where the remnants of the German armies of the Caucasus face annihilation of a hazardous attempt at escape by sea. The fate of the Caucasus forces remains a question. Most of the recent fighting there has appeared to be rearguard action. The Russians have made no claims of strategy did not. The Germans have been into territory the invaders have held for 15 months or longer. It is no longer a question for the German of holding their recent gains but of averting disaster that would stem them reeling out of Russia altogether. This has been obvious to the cold-eyed realists of the German general staff for nearly three months now and there is little doubt that they have long since taken dispositions to meet the peril.

What they need now is a new offensive from which they can reform a fighting front; it would be too late to expect them to choose the shortest path between strong points at which they could lock the elements of manpower would be to dictate such a choice even if they did not. The Germans are fortunate if they escape this winter's campaign with less than 1,000,000.

The logical short line would be that of the Dvina and Dniester, to Riga or Odessa, that would mean abandonment of the Leningrad area, all of Estonia and half Latvia, the eastern halves of White Russia and the Ukraine and Crimea.

It is not certain, of course, if the Red army could be halted or worse. Lochner, author of the following story, was chief of the Associated Press bureau in Berlin for 14 years and probably knew Adolf Hitler and the Nazi hierarchy better than any other American reporter. Interned after the German declaration of war in December, 1941, Lochner was released and repatriated last summer. He is also the author of "What About Germany?")

Is Adolf Hitler dead as hinted at in various dispatches since Jan. 30, the tenth anniversary of the fuhrer's accession to power? The question has often been asked whether Hitler has a double. During the 10 or 11 years during which I have had an opportunity to observe him at close range I have seen no evidence of a double.

Benes Broadcast Brings Denial

LONDON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Dr. Eduard Benes, president of the Czech-Slovak government in exile, said in a talk Saturday that the German army was facing "ultimate catastrophe," and his speech brought immediate reprisals in his Nazi-held homeland.

Apparently indicative that the broadcast reached its intended listeners, the German radio announced Saturday that several Czech intellectuals who formerly belonged to Benes' intimate circle of friends were being sent to a concentration camp as a result of the speech.

The broadcast, recorded here by The Associated Press, quoted a DNB dispatch in which the deputy protector of Bohemia and Moravia announced the arrests and said more would follow if the "inciting speeches continue."

(In New York, the Federal Communications Commission said it recorded a broadcast to the people of Czechoslovakia from the Nazi-directed Prague radio, which transmitted an announcement of the arrests under the name of Karl Hermann Frank, puppet under-secretary of state.)

In his speech, broadcast by the British Broadcasting corporation, Benes told his people that Hitler already had informed his allies that the Germans must fall back to a defense line far behind the present Russian front.

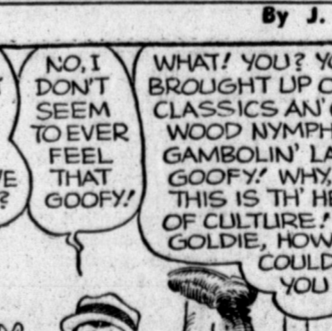

Prices on Uncontrolled Foods Show Advances

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The labor department reported today that prices of foods under OPA control increased 0.6 per cent between January 15 and December 12 while prices for foods not under the program decreased 2.3 per cent.

The situation resulted, Secretary Perkins said, from "continued moderate advances in prices of meats, dairy products and other foods which are under OPA control" and sharp declines for fresh fruits and vegetables not under OPA regulation.

The decline in uncontrolled food prices, she said, was the first since May and "resulted partly because of normal seasonal declines and partly from contraction reactions from previous high peaks."

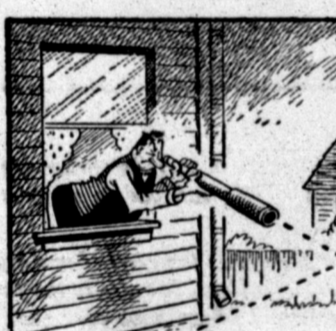

### New Labor Fight Opens Tomorrow

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The first round in the labor fight of the 78th Congress comes up before the house rules committee tomorrow when it starts public hearings on the Hobbs "anti-racketeering" bill.

Opposed by organized labor as a move to deprive it of a peace-time gain and the right to strike, the bill is an outgrowth of a supreme court decision in a New York case involving alleged interference with truckers by members of a local union.

The government prosecuted the union and 26 individuals under the 1934 anti-racketeering act, claiming they interfered with interstate commerce by forcing, or attempting to force, truck operators to employ union helpers while in New York City. The supreme court upheld a circuit court of appeals judgment reversing convictions obtained under the 1934 act.

The Hobbs bill, introduced in the last Congress by Representative Charles McNary (D-Ala.) and reintroduced this year, would leave no doubt, the house judiciary committee contended in approving it, of the legality of prosecution under the 1934 act.

tack suggested that Gen. Jurgen von Arnim's forces had been reinforced by men from Marshal Rommel's African corps.

Faid is some 65 miles inland from the port of Sfax.

(The Berlin radio broadcast a transoceanic dispatch which said the Germans had captured Sfax, 100 miles southwest of Faid Pass, which the Germans captured earlier from French forces and then held against American counterattacks.)

The Allied communiques said "our fighters were active in support of our troops throughout the day, carrying out attacks on enemy vehicles and other ground targets."

Light bombers battered enemy tanks and transport columns and targets in the vicinity of Sened and Maknassy, south of the Faid battle area.

"Fighter convoy for one light bomber raid intercepted and drove off enemy fighter bombers," the communique said. "They broke up their formation and forced them to jettison their bombs."

One enemy fighter was shot down, and Allied losses for the day's operations were placed at two planes.

### Pharmacist's Mate Operates on Sailor

PEARL HARBOR, Feb. 15 (AP)—Far below the ocean surface, not far from Tokyo, a U. S. submarine cruised about just enough speed to maintain steerageway.

A white-shrouded figure lay on a table in the ward room mess. He was Fireman George W. Platter, 21, of Buena Vista. He was operated on with appendicitis, and an operation was in progress.

Senseness lined the faces of the men clustered about the table and occasionally one raised questioning eyes to the young man who was performing the surgical instruments. He was not a surgeon but a chief pharmacist's mate, Thomas A. Moore of China Valley, Ariz., and he never had performed a surgical operation.

For more than five hours he worked, and finally extracted the badly inflamed appendix. Platter was seven up and taken to sick bay. A few minutes later the submarine surfaced to recharge its batteries but instead sighted and fired a torpedo into an enemy ship and then submerged again under a heavy depth charge attack.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The lady Marines are going to wear that touch of scarlet which made the masculine Marines so irresistible.

The Marines of the Women's Reserve will have a scarlet muffler and scarlet chinstrap.

most powerful battleships and the transfer to the United States conclusively ends the one-time fear of Washington and London that she might fall into Axis hands.

Armor plating of the Richelieu is strong enough to withstand a direct hit by a 16-inch shell directly above one of her magazines. Her main batteries are eight 15-inch guns, measuring 818 feet from stem to stern, she is equipped to carry 20 planes and has a normal complement of 1,400 men. The battleship can attain a top speed of 32 knots.

The Richelieu, completed in 1937, is one of six cruisers of La Galissoniere class. She is equipped to carry four aircraft, launched by catapult. Her normal complement is 540.

The Richelieu came to the United States under terms of the broad agreement enacted between the French and her allies last December 8 at Algiers. Her pierced hull, useless propeller shaft and damaged guns will be repaired and she will be completely overhauled and refitted. On return to battle a few months hence, able to make full use of her tremendous striking power and her heavy armor, she will take a place among the world's greatest battleships.

The voyage began January 30, after a single trial run outside Dakar's harbor. The ship stole away quietly at dusk, apparently headed for Casablanca where, by carefully circulated reports, she was to obtain parts for her sister ship, the Jean Bart. But we moved steadily westward past the Cape Verde islands instead, then set a course directly for the United States.

### EXPERT EXPLAINS PERSONAL EXEMPTION ITEMS

This is No. 11 of a series of 14 articles prepared by a tax expert to aid readers of this newspaper in preparing Federal income tax returns. Clip and save the articles for a complete reference when making out your tax form.

Having arrived at your net income on line 19 of U. S. Individual Income Tax Return Form 1040, you still are entitled to certain exemptions before figuring how much tax, if any, you must pay.

Every individual is allowed certain personal exemptions to be entered on line 20. If you are single, you are entitled to \$500 exemption. Married persons who do not live with their spouses are considered single.

For a married couple living together throughout the entire year, the total personal exemption is \$1,200. If you and your wife file separate returns, you may split this \$1,200 any way you like. The advantages and disadvantages of filing separate returns will be discussed in a later article.

**HEAD OF FAMILY**

If you did not reside with your husband or wife throughout the entire year, the answer to the question whether or not you were living together depends upon the character of the separation. If your wife is only temporarily away on a visit or you are away on business, and you maintain a joint home, you are entitled to the additional exemption. The same is true where your husband or wife is unavoidably away at a hospital or asylum because of sickness.

If you are single, but head of a family, you get the same personal exemption as a married couple—\$1,200. In order to qualify as the head of a family, you must actually support and live in the home with one or more individuals who are closely related to you by blood or marriage relationship or by adoption. You must also have the right to exercise family control, based on legal or moral obligations, over such individuals.

In addition to your personal exemption, entered on line 20 of form 1040, you are entitled to credit for dependents. A dependent must be under 18 years of age, or a student of supporting himself because he is mentally or physically defective.

**CHANGING STATUS**

You are entitled to a credit of \$350 for each person (other than husband or wife) dependent on you and receiving a larger amount of supporting himself because he is mentally or physically defective.

If your status changes during the taxable year, you receive personal exemption and credit for dependents proportionate to the number of months you were in each status. More than half a month is considered a full month and less than half is disregarded. For instance, if you have a child born in the second half of March, you are entitled to nine-twelfths of \$350, since the child was a dependent for nine of the year's 12 months.

The personal exemption is apportioned in the same manner according to the number of months which you live together with your husband or wife did not live together throughout the entire year.

The personal exemption thus apportioned is (as pointed out in the first of these articles) the basis for determining whether or not a return must be filed. If your gross income exceeds the personal exemption, a return must be filed, you subtract their total from your net income (line 20) and enter the balance on line 23. There are two Federal taxes—a "normal" tax and a "surtax." You will pay the surtax on the balance shown on line 23. However, you may not have to pay the normal tax on this entire amount.

There are two further deductions which you must make before arriving at your net income—the normal tax. Certain government bonds are subject only to the Federal surtax, so these may be deducted at item 24. You have already figured the amount of this money at item 5 (a) under income, so the figure is merely brought down.

Line 25 of form 1040 calls for "earned income credit." This credit is based on the theory that a man should not be required to pay as great a tax on money he earns through his own work as money he receives through investments. The rule for figuring earned income credit is very clear.

**"EARNED" ONLY \$14,000**

All income under \$3,000 is considered earned. If your net income (line 19) is less than \$3,000, therefore, you are entitled to 10 per cent of that income (line 19) as earned income credit.

If your income is over \$3,000, you are entitled to at least \$300 credit (10 per cent of \$3,000). You are entitled to more than \$300 if your actual income (line 19) is more than \$3,000. You are entitled to \$1,400 if your net income is over \$14,000. No income over \$14,000 is considered earned, so even if your income on line 1 is over \$14,000, you're only entitled to \$1,400 as earned income credit.

If you are carrying on your own business either individually or through a partnership and have reported your profit on line 9 or 10, you are entitled to a reasonable al-

On walls before which were piled hundreds of German corpses the Russians said they found German posters advising: "Do not believe rumors. We will not leave Rostov."

With Kharkov, the strongest remaining link in the old German defense line of the winter of 1942, apparently about to fall the Germans were reported in Moscow to be throwing in elite divisions hastily transported from France in an effort to stave off further disaster.

But the Russians were reported going ahead and Moscow dispatches said "great events may be expected shortly."
