The session of the board, which was set up to advise Mobilization Director Wilson, was given over almost entirely to the stabilization problem, it was learned.

There was no word as to whether there had been discussion of new legislation to be requested of Congress to strengthen the Defense Production Act; due to expire June 30. Johnston was scheduled to forward his recommendations in the stabilization field to Wilson today.

HOLLYWOOD -- (AP) -- The n ovie industry has heard a firsthand report of what policemen think of cops-and-robbers films. The comment is perhaps best expressed by a Bronx cheer.

The man delivering this opinion, although in more genteel terms, was John Shilling, detective on the New York police force for 20 years. He retired four years ago and moved with his family to California, Now he engages in private investigation and is presently employed to check facts on the new film "Detective Story.

Shilling is a plain-spoken man who wouldn't sweet-talk a producer even though he is working as technical advisor. So I asked him what policemen think about how they are portrayed in the

"I'll tell you this," he rerlied, "most policemen would like to hit the producers of those pictures over the head."

A good many crime pictures show the private eves outsmarting the detectives on the police force, who are usually portrayed as dull-witted.

Shilling protested against this. "You don't find a dope in the detective division," he remarked. "When a man is promoted to detective, he's got to produce reults or else He's got to be walking encyclopedia. He's got to know everything, including how to deliver a baby, if necessary. And it has happened.'

Shilling, who trailed Charles "Lucky" Luciano for two years as part of his detective duties, declared that no movie has been entirely accurate on police matters, "even the pictures that Mark Hellinger made." But he thought Hellinger's nims were the best of the lot, especially "The Naked City."

"I am troubled with exce dandruff and itching scalp, little bumps come from scratching. I wear my hair short and shampoo it once a week. My hair is thick but I'm wondering if this condition won't thin it. Is dandruff transmittable?" This note from H.J.H. is typical of the difficulty caused by dandruff, one of the most common ailments of present-day society.

Yes, unfortunately, if the dandruff continues it probably will cause the hair to get thinner. Yes to the second question also. Dandruff is probably picked up from combs or hair brushes which have come in contact with a scalp troubled with it. This has led to the belief that the cause is some infection, but so far it has not been possible to agree on any single germ as the cause.

There is so much dandruff that it is almost impossible to avoid it. Nearly everyone has at one time or another developed dandruff, and once established it is difficult to get rid of entirely. You think it is gone and then if some illness develops or you get overtired there it is back again worse than before. Care in avoiding the use of

combs and brushes used by others is about all that can be done to try to prevent dandruff. So far as treatment is concerned there are many thing which can be done. The general health should be kept up. Iron is advisable if there is anemia; cod liver oil or other

vitamin-containing foods may help. Fresh air and exercise, tonics, nutritious foods and anything else which contributes to the general well-being may not cure dandruff but often help to keep it under control. There there is local treatment of the scalp itself. The aim is to keep the scalp free of the small

greasy scales which clog up the skin. These can be removed by shampooing, but it is often helpful to soak them first with some oily preparation which softens the scales and makes them easier to remove. Sometimes a good deal of hair comes out with the shampoo. MAY COME BACK The washing is often followed by the use of lotions or ointments containing stimulating chemicals

(it is best not to mention any of these by name because some people are sensitive to some of them). Treatment of the scalp for dandruff usually has to be kept up for months at a time or it will come back. Too, here are some other skin diseases such as sebor-

The most formidable levy that faces the Russian muzjik is a "turn-over tax" on consumer goods that runs as high as 75 percent on wheat and rye and percent on sugar.

Secretary of the Treasury Snyder described the Russian tax system to the House Appropriations Committee by request of Rep. Canfield (R-NJ). Snyder said the turnover tax,

which amounts to a sales tax, furnishes roughly 60 percent of the Soviet government's budget receipts. It is levied almost entirely on consumer goods.

Since the Bolshevik bureauc racy keeps store as well as col-

lects taxes, this turnover tax is a real ruble raiser. For example, the government buys a quantity of grain for 100 rubles. The selling price is 400 rubles — including a tax of 300 rubles.
