



Air Freight

It is encouraging that leaders in the aviation industry are taking the initiative about correcting some popular fallacies concerning post-war-aviation prob-

The amazing efficiency of airplanes as both fighting and transport weapons has made the American people air-minded. The layman gets a kick out of envisioning the day, soon to come, when every fam ily will have its flivver plane; when workers and white collar men can send their families to winter havens in Florida California or Arizona, and visit them week-ends by commercial airlines; when a great deal more express and freight and mail will travel by air

Some of this imagining is sound, sane and reason able within limits Undoubtedly there will be flivver planes in much more common use than before the war. There is no reason why heliocopters with aucomobile bodies should not be built to sell cheaply More mail, more express, more freight will travel by

But let's be reasonable. Let's not ask for everything all at once. Let's consider the facts

Notably, let's remember that the post-war development in aviation, whatever it may be, will not rest to any great extent upon the use of leftover military planes. It will require the production of a new generation of aircraft, differing substantially from the scores of thousands that will be dumped onto the market when peace returns

The bulk of the transport planes now in use are of a type which seemed marvelous in 1940, but already these planes are outmoded. Neither passengers nor freight nor express hauled in them could compete on a dollars-and-cents basis with railroad and bus and truck rates.

The scores of thousands of big, fast, competent bombers, made and making, are the best things of their sort ever produced. But they were designed for wasteful war, not for competitive peace

The military plane is made to fly efficiently at an altitude for which there is no commercial justification; at a speed which seldom would be essential commercially. It is powered without any slightest consideration for expense of operation.

Out of the lessons we are learning in this war we shall profit in the air age that undoubtedly lies just around the corner. The important thing, the thing bout which aviation experts now are warning, is that we must recognize that wartime progress is only the raw material out of which peacetime aviation can be constructed, in course of time

GOOD WAGES. IN SPITE OF LABOR UNIONS

A soldier inquires whether the present good vages, decent working hours, relative safe and humane working conditions, anti-child labor laws, etc., just came about through the kindness and generosity of big business? He further implies that men, many proud to be known as unioneers.

have fought-yes, and died, for these conditions. But he gives no evidence that union labor is the cause of these conditions. If union labor can cause shorter hours, without increase in capital, more knowledge and better tools, then they have been derelict in their duty. If they can shorten hours and make things safer, as they claim, why do they not put in twice as many safety devices as we have? Why do they not cut hours in two, or in fourths?

The simple fact is that labor unions have prevented hours being shortened, safety devices being installed, because they have prevented the accumulation of capital that makes these real social gains possible

It is absurd for any one to give labor unions credit for improving the lot of the working man as a whole. Because labor unions have temporarily improved the lot of a favored few admitted into the unions by raising the price excluded workers have to pay for things and thus lowering their real wages, certainly is not proof or even evidence that labor unions should be given credit for better wage levels. This is true because they produce no extra wealth, but have prevented billions upon billions of dollars worth of wealth from being created that would of necessity, under the competitive system, been passed on to the workers as a whole in the form of higher wages or lower costs of consumable goods.

It is irrational to think that any good as a whole can come from any group of men conspiring to keep people from using the talents that God intended them to use, as labor unions all do.

Let the defender of labor unions show one single labor union that is not based on curtailment of production of one form or another. And since all improvement comes from more production with less work as a result of better tools and knowledge, it is absurd to give labor unions credit for any improvement whatsoever in the well-being of mankind as a whole. All the improvements came in spite of them.

No, the improvement was not the result of the generosity or the bigness of heart of the employers. out it was due to the better tools and the competition of employers to get the workmen to operate these better tools. Had it not been for the better tools, we would not have had shorter hours, safety devices or higher wages, no matter how thoroughly and completely every man in the land was organized in labor unions. This is true because we cannot increase without adding to And the labor unions' policy is one of restriction rather than increased production.

The two speakers had a good deal to say about supply and demand but rather more about the demand than the supply. This was to be expected. Mr. Davis could talk in the grand manner and the secretary of agriculture could talk like Mortimer about the increased demands of our troops. our allies' armies, their civilian populations, and the people freed in recently occupied countries. Demand has undoubtedly increased, altho the nation may be permitted to doubt whether it has increased to an extent to make rationing neces-sary. And the indefinite figure cited by Messrs. Davis and Wickard did nothing to establish that necessity. They asserted without proving.

But while they were stressing the increased demand they were careful to soft pedal the criminal negligence and stupidity with which Mr. Wickard and his associates in the New Deal administration have been stifling proper increases in our food supply-the obstructive price systems that have sent lightweight, low grade cattle to market because it is unprofitable for middle western farmers to turn them into heavyweight, high grade beef-the reckless dissipation of trained man power from the farms thru the draft and uncontroled industrial wages, a created man power famine reflected in thousands of dispersal auctions of farm stock and equipment-and the refusal of the Union square farmer, Joe Weiner, to approve the manufacture of a sufficient amount of machinery with which farmers might in part replace the hands they have lost.

None of these did the two government apologists mention. Mortimer did say that if the weather is bad next year we may have to tighten our belts, further. He failed to confess the truth, namely, that we would not have to tighten them at all except for the man-made shortages that he and the rest of the crackpots of the New Deal have been planning in Washington for the last 10 years.

The one thing, Mr. Wickard said, that we can assured of is plenty of cereals. He apparently is unaware that it is sometimes difficult to buy wheat bread in some stores right now. We have the greatest surplus of wheat that any nation has held at any time in human history, but we may lack bread because Mr. Henderson has so red his price schedules that it is becoming inprofitable to grind the wheat into flour.

In the last war the restriction of the use of scarce food products was accomplished without ration cards. No attempt has been made to try voluntary restriction in this war. An adminis tration that in a decade has never made an honest or a nonpolitical move on its own part simply cannot impute honest motives to the people.

The very foods that it has proposed to ration first, canned and dried fruits and vegetables, cast serious doubts on the assertions made to the nation by Messrs. Davis and Wickard. They sought to create the impression that a very large part of the foods of which the American public is being deprived thru rationing are going to our own troops and a very small part to lend-lease purposes. During the last world war, when we were engaged principally in feeding our own and allied troops, our exports of meat and other proteins increased rapidly, but our exports of fruits and vegetables in 1918 were less than they were in 1916. It was in 1919, when we started feeding the civilian populations of Europe, that we started sending fruits and vegetables abroad. Yet it is fruits and vegetables that Mr. Davis and Mr. Wickard tell us we will have to do without immediately.

The nation's disgust with Hendersonism sulted in the repudiation of the Democrats in the November election. Mr. Henderson himself was fired. 




