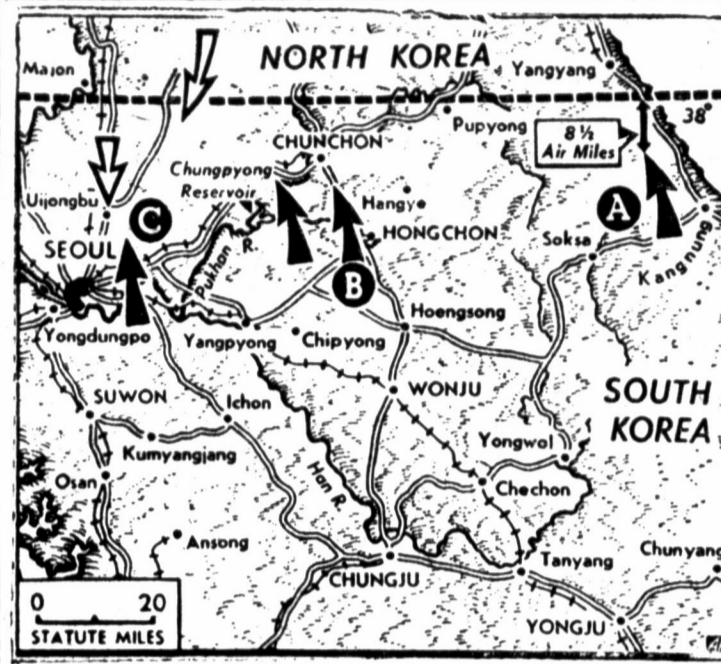

## Judge Resets Date For Custody Trial

Judge Lewis M. Goodrich shortly before noon Wednesday in 51st District Court sustained a motion for continuance by attorneys in a child custody case resetting the trial date for May 7 before a jury.

The case, officially styled as John F. Studer, for Gray County, vs Irma Alice Moore, involves the custody of a child that has previously been declared neglected and dependent. Atty. Ross Buzzard representing some of the plaintiffs argued for the continuance on grounds that he wanted time to secure proper depositions. Attorneys for Mrs. Moore objected but were overruled by the court.

The jury, recalled at 1:30 p. m. was dismissed.

Earlier a damage suit brought against A. F. Johnston by Joe A. Reed was postponed when the plaintiffs asked leave to amend and change the styling of the case, naming Johnston as an agent of the defendant and not as a defendant.

"But if he fails to appear," Whiteside said, "I think we can get Gov. Warren of California to agree to extradition — assuming that Gov. Shivers (of Texas) will go along with us."

The Texas attorney General's office informed the committee that its orders could be backed up in court. Others wittingly failing to appear when ordered to do so could be fined \$100 to \$1,000 and imprisoned 30 days to 12 months.

## Rotarians Hear Fort Worth AA Educational Director

Alcoholism is a disease, and here is hope for the victim to recover his (or her) health under proper understanding, help and guidance.

That was the essence of a discussion Wednesday noon at the Pampa Rotary Club's weekly meeting by the educational director of Alcoholics Anonymous from Fort Worth, himself a former addict to alcohol.

The speaker related his personal experience for alcohol. His family, his position in his community, as a high school principal, as a member of the board of stewards at his church, his self respect, and his health.

He emphasized, strongly, that alcohol, to the alcoholic, is a medicine and a poison — it breeds consumption of it to keep alive yet a poison that can, and any time does result in death because "some people cannot drink safely due to the chemical makeup of their body."

"It is good business for us to rehabilitate these people (alcoholics) because it brings them back to health and gives them a chance to become more useful."

striking unions, are asking high pay. The unions maintain the cost of living has soared 14 percent since last summer. The government estimates the rise as 10 percent.

The workers force strike call directly affected 65,000 of the nation's 430,000 rail employees. However 300,000 members of the communist-dominated General Confederation of Labor (CGT) were expected to follow. The rank of some 65,000 members of the Christian Workers Union was in doubt.

The strike of Paris subway and bus employees went into its seventh day today. Workers in the metal working, construction and hotel restaurant industries threatened a walk-out. They also want more pay.

Paris also has been hit by 4-hour stoppages by utility, water works and funeral parlor employees.

Even before the rail strike call was issued, rail traffic was snarled and slowed in many sections by fuel walkouts. Stoppages have seriously affected Marseille, Lyon, Le Havre, Rennes and the trunk lines through Paris. Many trains still ran, but were hours late.

The unions are demanding an immediate cost of living bonus ranging from 3,000 to 5,000 francs (\$5.00 to \$17). On a permanent basis they are asking increases across the board based on a new national minimum. The CGT is asking a straight 15 percent increase.

Essential food supplies were expected to reach their destination. The workers force in its all urged employees to maintain equipment and to see that perishable goods went through. The government likewise ordered prefects to see that such items were not delayed.

Moran had denied at the Senate hearing that he ever received money from Crane.

Crane said he passed \$55,000 in cash to Moran, then first deputy fire commissioner, so he'd be on "our side."

Crane said the money to Moran, in installments of \$35,000 in 1947 and \$20,000 in 1949, was intended to promote legislation relating to the welfare of New York City firemen.

Later yesterday, Mayor Vincent R. Impellitteri sent a telegram to Moran demanding he resign by noon today or face immediate suspension pending ouster proceedings.

Moran declined to comment.

The 38-year-old Crane testified he also laid out the following UFA contributions:

- \$3,500 to Brooklyn Republican leader John R. Crews for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's 1948 presidential primary campaign in Oregon.
- \$4,000 to the New York State Democratic Committee.
- \$60,000 in expenses to help push state laws which would benefit firemen.
- \$1,500 in payments to former Fire Commissioner Frank J. Quayle.

But Quayle, Crane emphasized, was always concerned about firemen and was not interested in the union's money.

The Kansas City induction center said there was a slight deformity of Ward's elbow, but not enough to disqualify him for army service.

Paul Pettit, the 19-year-old, \$100,000 bonus pitcher of the Pittsburgh Pirates, received no-

vice yesterday to report to Los Angeles March 30 for his physical examination.

On Tuesday Erv Palica, Brooklyn's right-handed pitcher who sparked the Dodgers' late-season drive last summer, was ordered to report for induction on March 30.

Ward's induction makes a total of 23 National Leaguers in the service. The American League has 21.

Of the 16 major league clubs only the Philadelphia Athletics and Washington Senators have not lost any players. Most of their players are over the draft age.

## Spring Training Camp Shots

 Of course it's too early to get excited about indifferent performances, but the sluggish play of the New York Yankees is causing a ripple of hope among American League pennant contenders.

The Yankees, basically an aging group of veterans, are, no doubt, taking their training chores in stride. But three straight ex-

The Hollywood Stars of the Pacific Coast League exploded three home runs yesterday to edge the Yankees, 4 to 3.

The Yankees' spring training mark now is 6-4.

The Red Sox had their game with the St. Louis Cardinals cancelled because of rain. Detroit wasn't scheduled but the Tigers camp hummed when it was announced that pitcher Vergil Trucks would be given his first start Sunday against the Philadelphia Phillies.

The strong-armed righthander, who can make the Tigers a strong threat in the impending season, was sidelined most of last season with a sore arm.

In other games, the Phillies beat Brooklyn, 5-3; the Chicago White Sox thumped Pittsburgh, 12-4 and Toronto nipped the Philadelphia Athletics, 6-5.

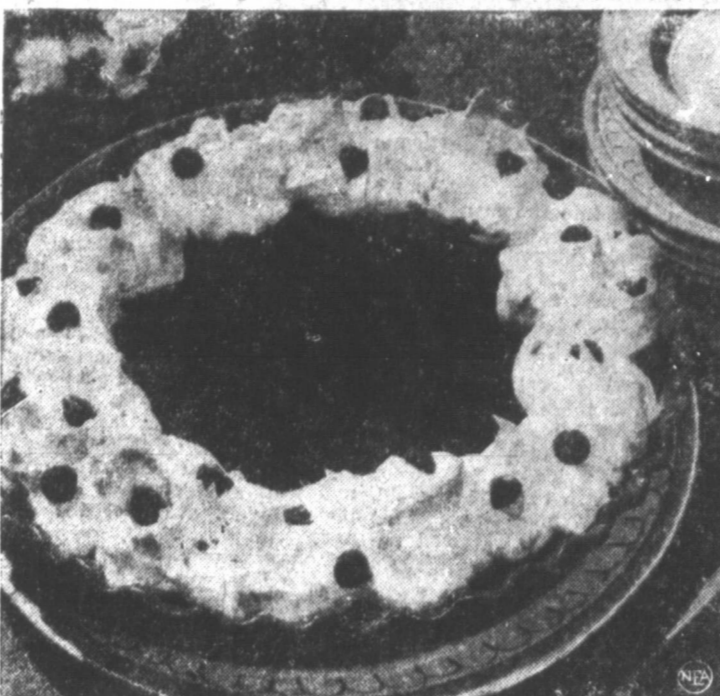

**April Fool's Surprise Pudding**

Leftover bread, little chocolate morsels, eggs (economical now), milk and meringue — combine these into a really wonderful April Fool's surprise dessert.

Chocolate Bread Pudding (6 servings)

One and one-quarter cups soft bread crumbs, 1 package semi-sweet chocolate, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 cups milk, 2 eggs, separated, 2 tablespoons butter, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla.

Combine bread crumbs, 2-3 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels, 1-4 cup sugar and 1-2 cups milk in top of double boiler. Cook over hot water until mixture is smooth.

Beat egg yolks slightly, add remaining 1-2 cup milk, butter and salt. Add to chocolate mixture and continue cooking about 3 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Turn into shallow baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven (350 Deg. F.) 10 minutes.

While pudding is baking, beat egg whites until stiff; gradually add remaining 1-4 cup sugar and vanilla; continue beating until very stiff. Fold on half the remaining chocolate. Drop by tablespoons on top of the pudding. Sprinkle meringue with remaining chocolate. Return to oven and bake 10 minutes longer.

Mock Apple Sauce Layer Cake (6 to 8 servings)

No. 2 can sweetened apple sauce, 1-2 cup molasses, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 8 slices white bread.

Mix first three ingredients. Trim crust from bread; place two slices, end to end, on plate and cover with apple sauce mixture. Repeat until all bread and apple sauce have been used, having apple sauce on top layer. Chill.

When ready to serve, cut in 1-inch slices. Serve plain or with whipped cream.

# Hazelwood Forced To Lose To Enlarge

State Senator Grady Hazelwood had to literally lose ground to gain more legislative strength for West Texas.

This came about with the new legislative redistricting shrinking the 31st State Senatorial District from 26 to 16 counties. The neighboring 30th district fared almost as well in losing ground to gain strength. It was cut from 24 to 15 counties.

Through the change the 31st district now covers Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, and Randall Counties. Eliminated from the 31st district and incorporated with the revamped 30th district are: Deaf Smith, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Hall, and Childress Counties.

From an overall picture, West Texas has gained three state senators, jumping its upper house representation from 12 to 15.

Currently, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, and 31st are considered in West Texas. Under the new set-up the West Texas districts will comprise the 10th, 12th, 16th, 19th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th, 28th, 29th, 30th and 31st districts.

# British Officer Finds Happy Results In Rommel Biography

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Brigadier Desmond Young of the British Army thought he would write a biography of German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel. But he never suspected he would find himself the center of a best-selling book, a big-budget movie and a hot controversy.

The brigadier is a ruddy, good-humored man who appears to be enjoying all three results. He added fire to the controversy by admitting that Rommel will probably be a sympathetic figure in the movie.

"I believe the picture will be entirely factual," he remarked. "Therefore I imagine that Rommel will end up being sympathetic. I think the audience will be with him at the end when the Nazis force him to commit suicide."

"This is not intended to be any glorification of Rommel. It will show him as a professional soldier doing what he was ordered."

The brigadier's book was born on the North African desert, where he had been captured with his troops. A column of British prisoners was being shelled by their own guns and a German officer asked Young to call a halt to the firing. He refused. A dispute followed and it was carried up to Rommel, the German commander in North Africa. Through an intermediary, Rommel replied: "If you won't stop the firing, I can't compel you to."

That was his only contact with Rommel, but he learned more about the German from other prisoners.

The book has also sold 50,000 copies in Germany, he added. He has given proceeds from that sale (and part of the movie rights) to Rommel's widow and son, who is 21. The movie is being made by 20th Century-Fox and will star James Mason as Rommel.

### AAA Urging Congress Reject Boosting Tax On Gas, Autos

WASHINGTON — Charging that motorists already are being taxed "to the hilt," the Automobile Association is urging Congress to reject the treasury department's proposed tax increase on gasoline and new car sales.

Charles C. Collins, general counsel of the A.A.A., told the tax-writing House ways and means committee that car owners now bear a total tax burden of four billion dollars, which the treasury proposal would boost to \$5,600,000,000.

In testifying before the committee, he said the motorist "has been singled out as target 'A' in the excise program and is being asked to carry more than 46 percent of the entire proposed tax increase. The treasury has asked Congress to raise the federal gasoline tax from 1 1/2 cents to 3 cents a gallon and the tax on new automobiles from seven percent to 20 percent.

The A.A.A. spokesman declared the treasury's plan had classified automobiles with luxury and non-essential items, but he insisted they are standard and necessary equipment to the majority of American families. He said:

"During World War II, 77 percent of all automobile trips were for essential purposes. But the essentiality of the passenger car has greatly increased since then.

In the past five years, car ownership has risen from 25,700,000 to 40,000,000. The great population growth of the last decade has been primarily in suburban areas. This, with the accompanying decentralization of industry — particularly defense industry — has created extreme dependence on passenger cars as a medium of transportation.

"We are also convinced the burden of the excise would be borne by low-income groups; for, according to the Federal Reserve Board, 59 percent of all passenger cars are owned by families or individuals, earning less than \$4,000 annually, while only nine percent are owned by those earning over \$7,500."

Enactment of the treasury-sponsored increase, he said, "would all but preclude the raising of additional badly needed highway funds by the states, which now get about \$2,100,000,000 in road user taxes — as compared with the \$2,800,000,000 which the Federal Government would get under this proposal."

DES MOINES, Iowa — (AP) — How many miles does a farmer walk doing chores? Ross Childs, farming north of Manchester, found that he traveled 491 miles a year while taking care of 13 cows plus young stock. The study was made by Herb Howell, extension farm management specialist.

Since then, Childs has remodeled the barn which was a conventional stallion-type. Now he has a loafing area — milking parlor structure. With the new setup he is walking 319 miles annually and taking care of 20 cows and additional calves.

Although principally a western insect, the spruce budworm occasionally invades the eastern and lake states.

### Oil Men Watch Desert Operations

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. — Western oil men are keeping an eye on drilling operations on the vast Mojave desert across the mountains.

While no one has struck oil there yet in commercial quantities, some experts believe it's there to be found. In several areas derricks now point skyward among the yucca and Joshua trees. Test wells are being drilled near Barstow, Victorville, Oro Grande, Helendale and Harvard.

### McGrath To Speak At Bar Meeting

WASHINGTON — (AP) — U. S. Attorney General J. Howard McGrath will speak at a bar meeting in Tyler, Tex., April 7 commemorating the 100 anniversary of a coincidental meeting of Texas' top two courts.

On that day in 1851, the Texas Supreme Court and the Federal Court of Texas (the state was then a single district) were in session in Tyler, purely by chance. A similar concurrent session hasn't occurred since.

### California Works Feverishly On Arms

(Editor's note: Here is another in the series of stories by Associated Press writers telling how the rearmament program is affecting various parts of the country. Today's story tells how California fits into the big mobilization picture.)

SAN FRANCISCO — Out here on the West Coast they're itching to get on with the job of mobilization.

In typical western fashion, manufacturers are champing at the bit over delays in receiving defense contracts.

This is especially true of smaller manufacturers. They're afraid of being crushed in the materials squeeze if they don't get defense work.

There are few million-dollar contracts so far, received by the aircraft industry. That industry alone can talk of rearmament in really big terms.

Real weapons of war are coming from the factories, such as the H-26 Sabre Jets that are being shipped into the Russian MIG jets in Korean skies.

But most defense contracts so far are for such unexciting things as petroleum, rubber products, food and chemicals, radio tubes, paper and allied products, electrical machinery, films and lighters, safety razors, sandbags, coffee urns, pipe, scrapers, valves, tools, aircraft and tractor parts, air coolers, electric generator sets and lumber.

The largest single non-aviation contract is that received by the Food Machinery & Chemical Corporation of San Jose. This company, in the heart of the picturesque Santa Clara Valley, has a \$177,000,000 order to produce an unannounced type of land tank vehicle. Retooling is to cost \$42,000,000 additional. About \$3,000,000 is being spent on a new plant for the job.

The West Coast has a vastly expanded manufacturing capacity, a greatly increased steel industry and a larger manpower pool compared with 1940.

California is the hub of this industrial expansion. Since V-J day private capital has invested more than \$1,500,000,000 in 8,624 new or enlarged plants.

Counting government funds, more than \$3,000,000,000 has been poured into industrial expansion in this state since 1940.

And the expansion continues. More money was spent or projected in January 1951, for instance, than in January 1950.

A steel industry worthy of the name gives solid backing to far-western manufacturing. Current steel capacity is placed at 4,700,000 tons of steel ingots annually. It will be 5,000,000 tons within a year. This compares with 2,552,000 tons at the end of 1945.

U.S. Steel has a huge plant at Geneva, Utah, and subsidiaries in the Los Angeles and San Francisco areas. Kaiser steel has a mammoth works at Fontana, near Los Angeles. Bethlehem Pacific plants are in the Los Angeles and San Francisco areas.

The aircraft industry has been hard at rearmament for months. Plants have been expanding and

men have been added to payrolls at the rate of 200 daily. Employment totaled 120,000 in January.

North American Aviation, maker of the F86 Sabre Jet, has a backlog of \$625,000,000 double last fall and is employing 22,000. It doesn't expect to hit full stride for another year.

Lockheed Aircraft Corp., turning out various planes including the F80 Shooting Star jets, has a backlog of \$625,000,000. A year ago it was \$447,000,000. It employs 18,000 and expects to have 30,000 workers by the year's end. It employed 85,000 at the World War II peak.

Douglas Aircraft has a backlog of \$600,000,000 more than double a year ago. Its working force of 28,000 — to be expanded by another 10,000 — is rolling out such planes as the B47 Stratofortress bombers and big transports.

Douglas has reopened its Tulsa, Okla., plant and is enlarging facilities at Santa Monica and El Segundo.

Northrop, maker of the Air Force's twin jet F89 Scorpion interceptor, has a backlog of \$195,000,000, tripled in a year. It employs 9,000 and expects to pass its wartime peak of 10,000.

From San Diego, where the sprawling Consolidated Vultee Corp. works in modernizing huge F36 bombers, important news came recently — they're going to mass produce guided missiles, first such production in the country. A new plant to occupy 200,000 square feet, with 1,500 employees, will turn out these weapons at first for the Navy.

Aviation employment has doubled in San Diego in six months. About 27,000 are at work compared with the war peak of 10,000.

Defense work is going on under ground, too. The mining and oil industries are meeting the rearmament challenge with renewed activity.

Crude oil is pouring from the ground at an average daily flow of more than 960,000 barrels. That equals the record established in 1948.

Exploration and drilling for oil are getting feverish again. Standard Oil Company of California has announced it will spend \$16,000,000 in exploration in seven western states in the first half of 1951.

In response to a government request for more benzene production, the company is putting \$10,000,000 into a new benzene plant in southern California. This product is used in the synthetic rubber industry.

The mining industry has increased its efforts to develop new sources of strategic minerals and its boost production. The activity centers largely on tungsten, manganese, quick silver, sulphur and asbestos.

So far, state employment authorities say, only pinpoint shortages in manpower have popped up — mostly in the engineering field. Most communities report a surplus of unskilled or untrained labor. The unemployed were estimated at 259,000 in January, lowest for that month in recent years.

 WASHINGTON — (AP) — Flypaper is as slick as a skating rink compared with what the English language can do to the Senate — sometimes. This is one of the times.

For sheer confusion, nothing can beat the present predicament of the lawmakers. Twenty-four of them took weeks to decide what they wanted to say on the troops-for-Europe issue.

And when they finally said it they got so tangled in the language that now no one, including them, can say for sure what they had in mind. Before looking at the jam they're in, here's a short background.

There were cries of protest, particularly from Republicans, and most particularly from Senators Taft of Ohio and Wherry of Nebraska, when President Truman made it known that he wanted to send four divisions to Europe to help build up our allies' army there, under the terms of the North Atlantic pact, which we approved, and in which Article 3 pledged the partners to "mutual aid."

Taft and Wherry protested that the President had no constitutional right to send troops abroad without first getting Congress' approval. Mr. Truman said that as commander-in-chief he had the right.

Two of the most powerful Senate committees — Foreign Relations and Armed Services — sat down jointly to hold hearings on this and tell the Senate what they thought. Last week they okayed a "resolution" which approved sending the four divisions but, in Section 4, said: "It is the sense of the Senate that, in the interests of sound constitutional processes... congressional approval should be obtained" before any more troops were sent. All 24 members of the two committees who considered the resolution signed it. But what does it mean?

It says Mr. Truman "should" get approval before sending more troops. Does that mean he "must"? and what meaning does a "resolution" have anyway since senators themselves admit Mr. Truman doesn't have to abide by it but can ignore it?

And just what does "approval" mean? How would the approval be given? By some later "resolution"? And how many troops? For instance, would it be all right for the President to send four more divisions without congressional approval, but not six, or should he get approval if he wanted to send only one more man?

And further, what's that phrase — "constitutional processes" — doing in there since

nothing in the Constitution says the President has to get such approval?

These are all questions being asked by senators themselves since this resolution was submitted to the full Senate for approval by the 24 committee members, all of whom approved it. Listen to them:

Senator Smith, New Jersey, Republican who wrote the congressional Section 4, said he didn't think the President would need approval to send two or more divisions but would if he wanted to send 50.

But Smith admitted he was unable to "give a line of demarcation" showing just where approval should be obtained.

Senator McClellan, Arkansas Democrat, decided there seemed to be "98 different interpretations." (There are 96 senators.)

Senator Saltonstall, Massachusetts Republican and one of the committeemen, agreed the resolution was not in perfect form.

Senator Wiley, Wisconsin Republican and another committeeman, said the resolution would be only "advice to the President, and not legally binding."

But Senator Taft said the whole thing should be rephrased to say the President "must" get approval instead of the present "should" get it.

Senator McMahon, Connecticut Democrat, expressed the feeling that "I shall be pleased if, through some intellectual process, I can be convinced that it does not mean what I think it means."

Senator Ferguson, Michigan Republican, demanded to know what that business about "constitutional processes" was doing in there.

And Senator Ives, New York Republican, told his colleagues: "there may be a few other folks in the United States who like myself, may be a bit stupid. We have to have these things spelled out so we may understand them."

This could go on and on, and will.

## Prohibitionists Due At Capitol

AUSTIN — (AP) — Prohibitionists will march on the capitol March 28.

"There's going to be so many people here the capitol won't hold them," said Rep. Milton Wilkinson of Patroon.

On Wednesday, March 28, at 2:30 p.m., the prohibition amendment will be given a public hearing before the House Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

Wilkinson, a small, black-haired man who is active in the First Baptist Church of Center, is author of the amendment.

"We may not get it out of committee this year," Wilkinson said. "But if we don't succeed this year, we'll do just that much better the next time."

"I was a fighter in the army, and I'm used to fighting."

"I was Army bantamweight champion of the Southwest in 1938 and 1939." Wilkinson was a lieutenant in the Air Force. He is 32 years old.

He said that church groups and prohibitionists from all over the state had written him they were coming to the hearing. He added that Dr. W. R. White, president of Baylor University and president of the United Texas Drys; Dr. Walter McKenzie, Dallas executive secretary of the United Texas Drys; and state officials of the Women's Christian Temperance Union had said they would be here.

Wilkinson's measure calls for a statewide prohibition vote at the general election in November, 1952.

Statewide prohibition was re-

pealed in 1935. Since then counties and precincts have voted wet or dry in local option elections.

The corporation court charge? Drunkenness.

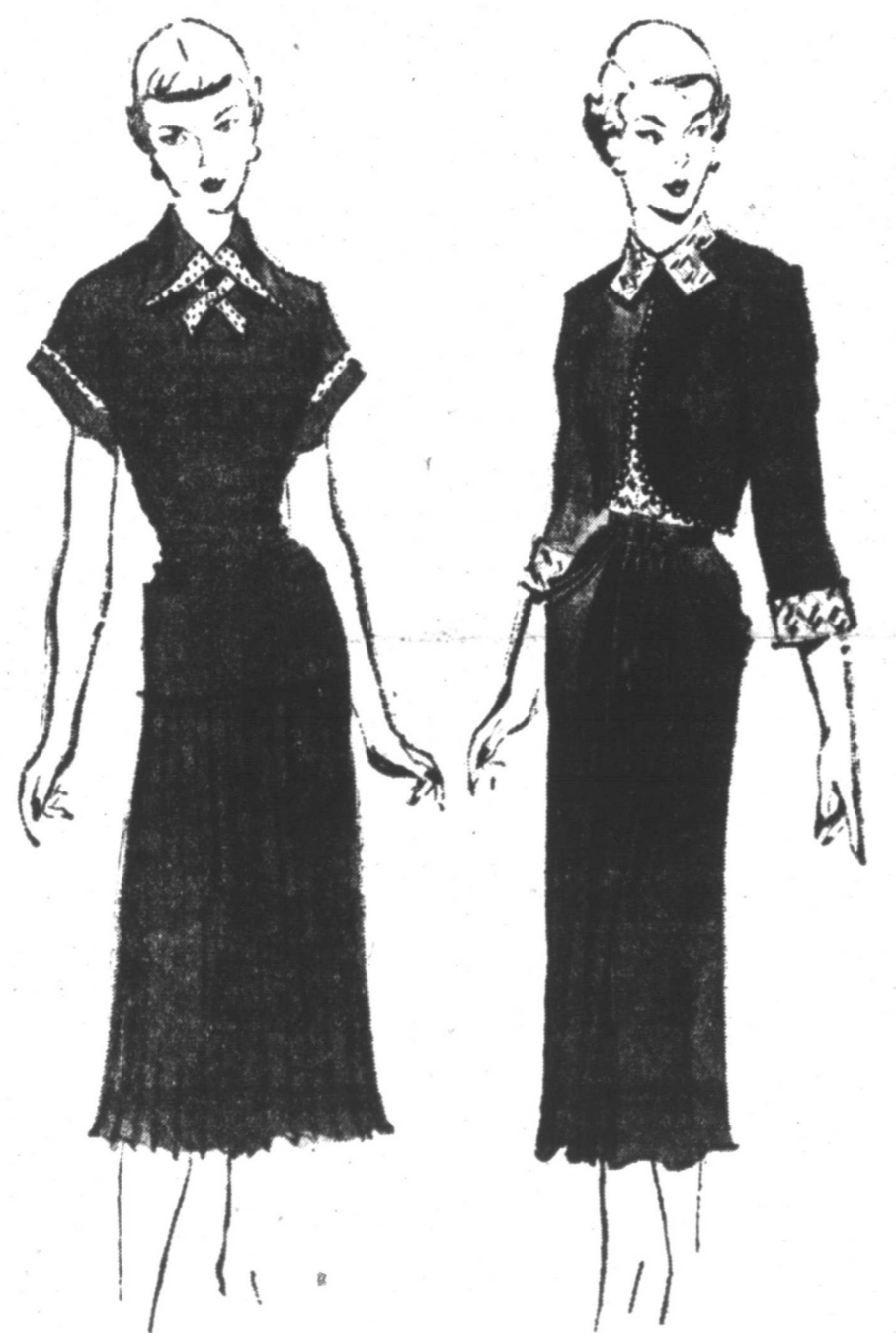
## Iron, Steel Wages Jump In February

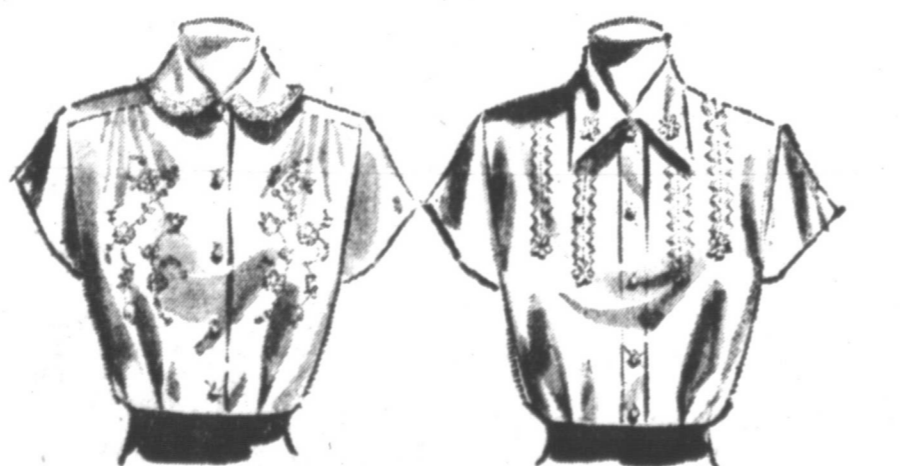

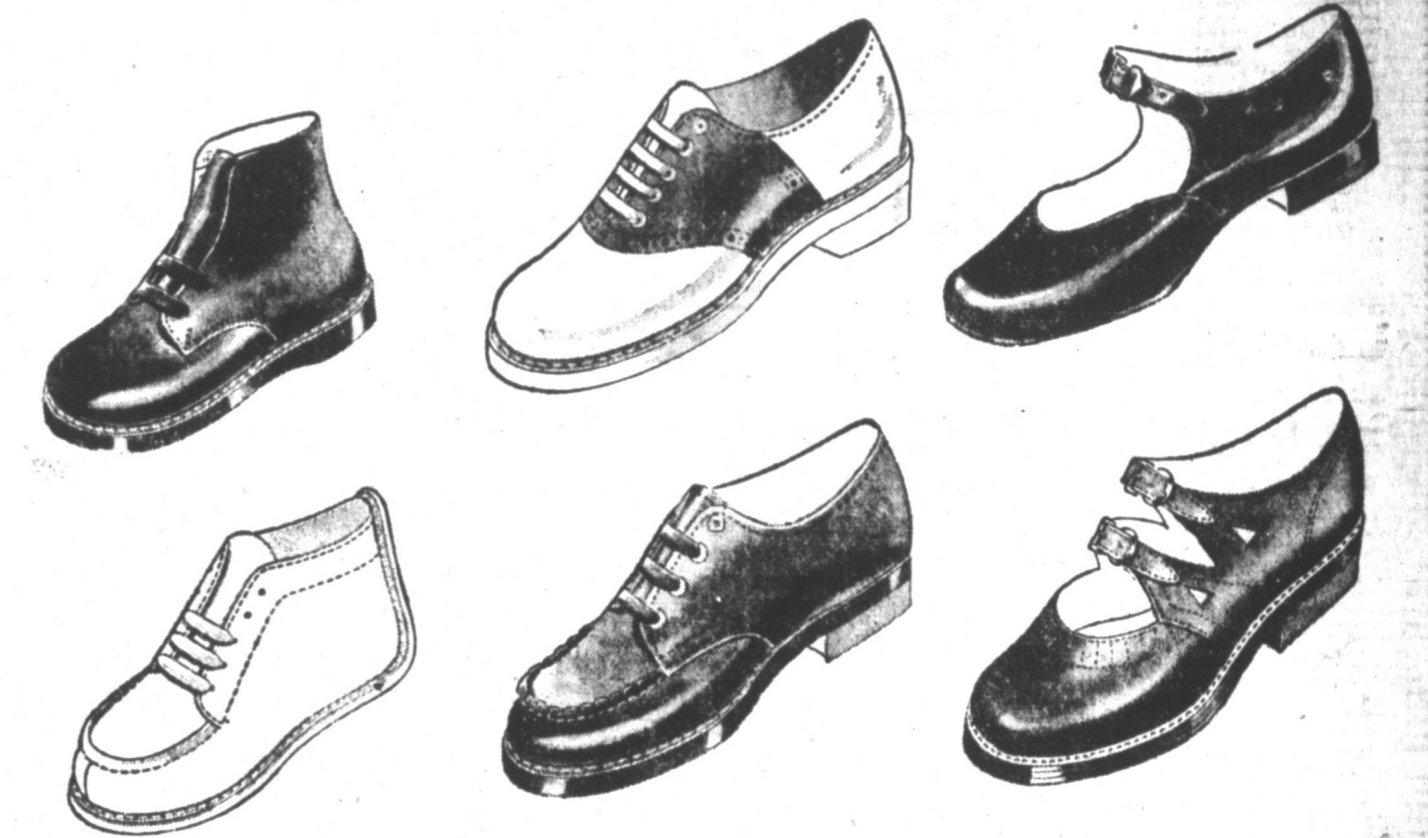

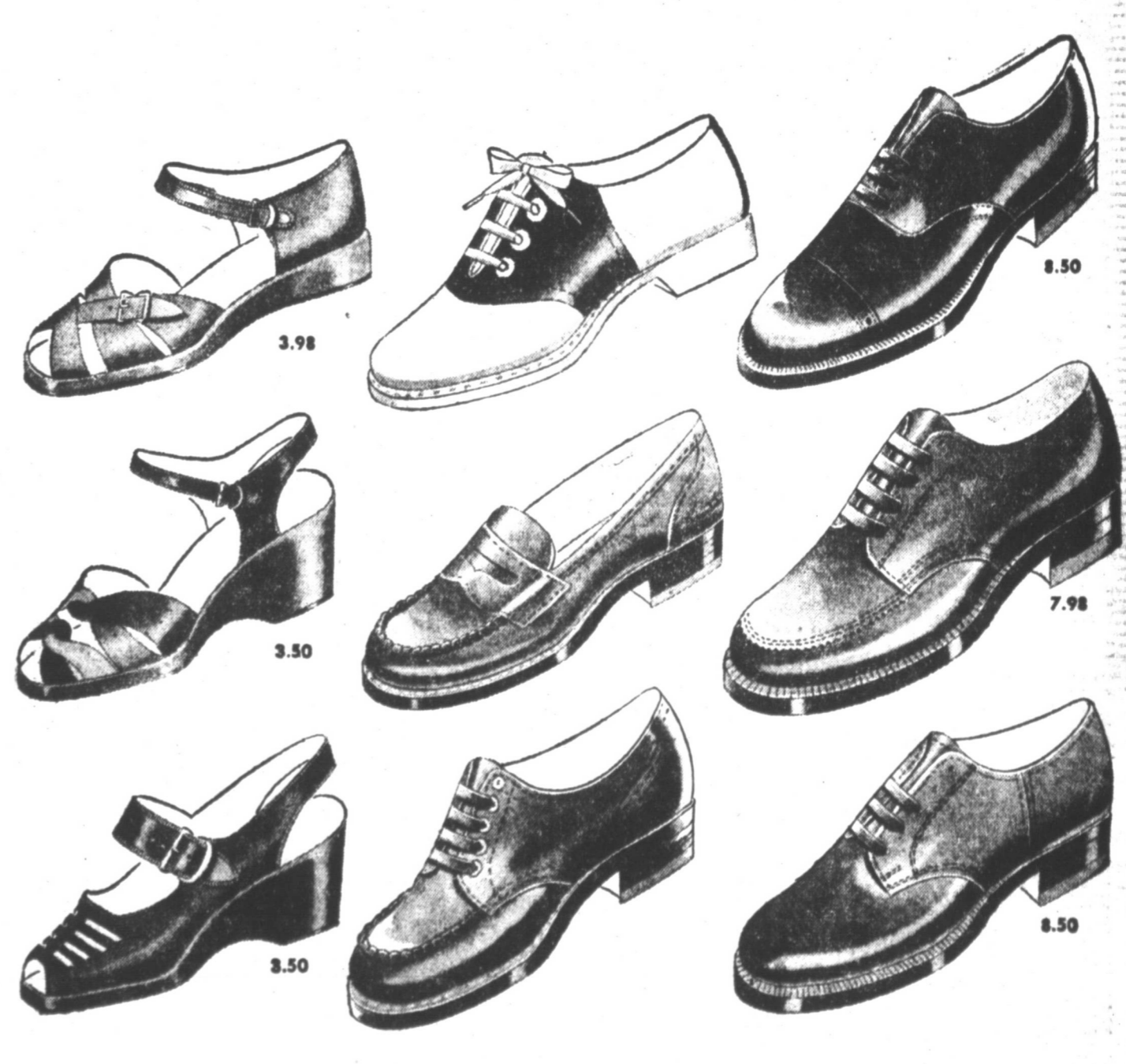

## Your Personality Will Follow You

NEW YORK — (AP) — "You leave your personality behind you when you leave a room," says Frank Allen, arson expert of the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

It may be invisible to the average person, but not to detectives.

## Air Pictures Aid Archaeology

LONDON — (AP) — New light is being thrown on to Dark Ages in Britain by aerial photography. Sites of a 2,000-year-old Roman camp in south west Scotland have been revealed for the first time by the photographs. Previously, no one knew that the Romans had been there.

Dr. J. K. S. St. Joseph, curator in aerial photography Cambridge University, explained to the Royal Society of Arts that differences in color and growth of vegetation shown in low altitude air photographs enabled ancient sites to be discovered and their character and period established.

He showed aerial archaeological photographs of Roman and earlier sites in Britain.

## Commie Strategy Indicates Reds May Dig In At Parallel

TOKYO — (AP) — Communist strategy indicates now the Reds may be planning to dig in north of Korea's 38th Parallel for the time being.

Militarily, this could mean one of two things: an attempt to create a passive stalemate, or an effort to win time for rebuilding their forces in advance of another southward thrust.

A stalemate based on diminished action, and reduced Red losses could lead to political overtures for a peace, dividing the war-shattered country.

If Red China follows usual Oriental diplomatic tactics, it will seek that sort of a deal the first time it is ready to talk terms. This approach, it is felt here, might gain ground among some of the western powers.

United Nations military commanders long have privately warned against a compromise

peace that would give the Chinese what they regard as a stranglehold on Korea. The South Korean government has taken a similar position repeatedly in official statements which have included a formal request for permission to bomb Manchuria.

This is the military view.

The Chinese proved by their stealthy crossing of the Yalu River last October that they had no respect for formal political boundaries. They could be trusted even less to respect the 38th Parallel or a similar subdivision. The parallel has meant far less to combat men of both sides, anyway, than apparently it has to diplomats.

By controlling a substantial slice of Korean soil, the Chinese would be in a position to build up power for an attack any time they chose. This, in effect, would merely move the Yalu southward and might even give the Communists a strategic base in their newly-won part of Korea that they have had in Manchuria.

# Threat Of Government Control Lies Behind Plea To Bankers

NEW YORK (AP) — Back of today's plea to bankers and other lenders to police their loans lies a threat.

He contends this shows that the nation's financial structure is in no danger from the volume of money that Americans owe on the gadgets they are using. Their income is sufficient to justify it.

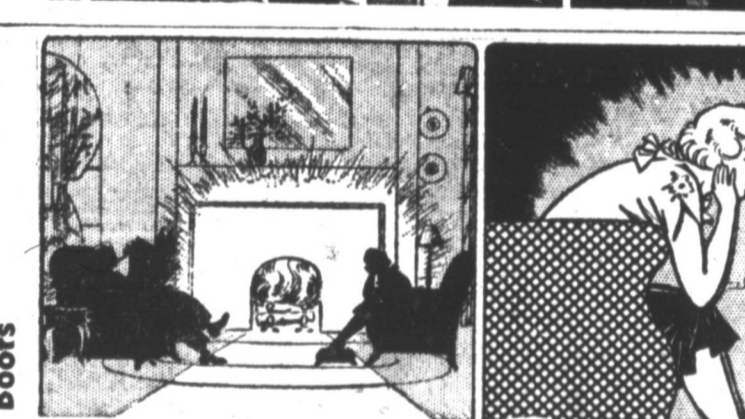

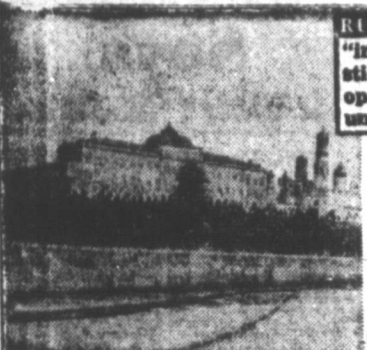

### Corporal's Drawing Shows GI Conception Of Korea War

NEW YORK — (AP) — Recently in my mail there came a cartoon drawn by a young corporal in Korea. The cartoon showed two elderly natives watching an American soldier cross the 38th Parallel. The American soldier was bent with age and had a beard halfway to his knees. "How did it all start?" asks one native. "I don't remember," the second replies. "I was just a kid when they first crossed it." This wry cartoon today probably reflects the feeling of the average American soldier toward crossing the 38th Parallel again. It is with small sense of adventure that he now approaches that artificial border dividing North and South Korea. His attitude is more like "this is where I came in." That attitude is best summed up by the joking answer many veterans there give when young replacements ask them how long they've been in Korea: "Nobody'll tell me." It is likely that patrol forays north of the 38th Parallel have already been made again by the United Nations forces. But it is doubtful if the Eighth Army will press onward very far of very fast. In two months it wrested the initiative from the enemy and pushed them back to the fateful border where the war started last June 25. It has been a cautious offensive whose object was less to gain real estate than to kill as many Chinese and North Korean Reds as possible. But from now on every mile the Reds are backed up tends to bring the two forces nearer equilibrium. The stalemate envisioned by General MacArthur appears to be approaching. The reason is simple. Up till now the enemy supply lines have been strung out and given allied airpower fine targets. And the fighting has been concentrated in the narrow waist of the Korean peninsula where the outnumbered United Nations troops could mass their firepower. But now the enemy is getting closer to his supply bases beyond the Manchurian border. And as the peninsula widens out

the allied line will have to become thinner and thinner — dangerously thinner. The same allied forces that held a battle-line of 125 miles cannot possibly hold a line of 500 to 700 miles — yet that is the line it would have to hold if it drove to the Manchurian-Siberian border. The two previous efforts to reach that border brought disaster. Only its superior mobility kept the Eighth Army from being destroyed. The hard lesson taught both times by those abortive drives was that the United Nations simply doesn't have enough troops in Korea to conquer the entire peninsula. Two things might change the picture: 1. A decision to permit allied airplanes to attack Chinese troops and supply concentrations in Manchuria. 2. The sending of hundreds of thousands more allied troops to Korea. There is no sign that either will be done. Either might precipitate a third world war. So, as matters stand now, the Reds and the allied forces are slowly approaching a situation of military balance — and the campaign is becoming more a more like an ulcer that won't be healed. Only a diplomatic agreement can halt the losses in a struggle where the soldiers on both sides are beginning to feel they aren't fighting a war so much as they are playing a stubborn game of bloody yo-yo.

### Graduates Offered Special Training

High school graduates now have a chance to enlist in the Army for specific schooling in any one of several phases, according to a release from the Amarillo station of the recruiting service through Sgt. D. A. Brown, of the Pampa office. Courses in engineering, transportation corps, quartermaster training, signal corps, ordnance, medical, and adjutant general training are being offered to qualified high school graduates. Trainees would take whatever courses they qualified for in one of the following replacement training centers: Fort Belvoir, Va., engineering; Fort Eustis, Va., transportation; Fort Lee, Va., quartermaster; Camp Gordon, Ga., signal corps; Aberdeen, Md., ordnance; Fort Sam Houston, medical; and Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind., adjutant general. In a memorandum from Fourth Army headquarters, Fort Sam Houston, a schedule of classes for instruction at Army field forces schools and technical and administrative services schools is given. Included in the descriptions of the different types of courses which high school graduates may take include basic military police enlisted; associate ordnance officer basis; judge advocate general instruction; compressor operation; dental technician procedure; an automotive fuel and electrical system repairman; associate quartermaster company officer, and numerous other quartermaster position courses; chaplain's basic for officers and assistant for enlisted men; different types of courses for officers and enlisted men in the army finance school; such courses as chemical defense and radiological defense in the chemical corps school; several different types of courses in military government and industrial security in the provost marshal's school, and many others too

Speaking in an interview, he declared: "You don't get dangerous inflation until there is a lack of production, and so far, we've had plenty of production." "In fact," he added, "in making trips to various parts of the country in the past few weeks, economists and businessmen have warned me of the possibility of deflation." Asked if he thought it would be good or bad to have some deflation in our economy, he declared, "I think it would not be unhealthy. It would increase the value of the dollar, and it might take a little hot air out of the price structure."

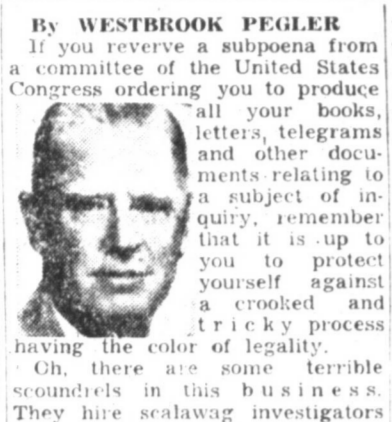

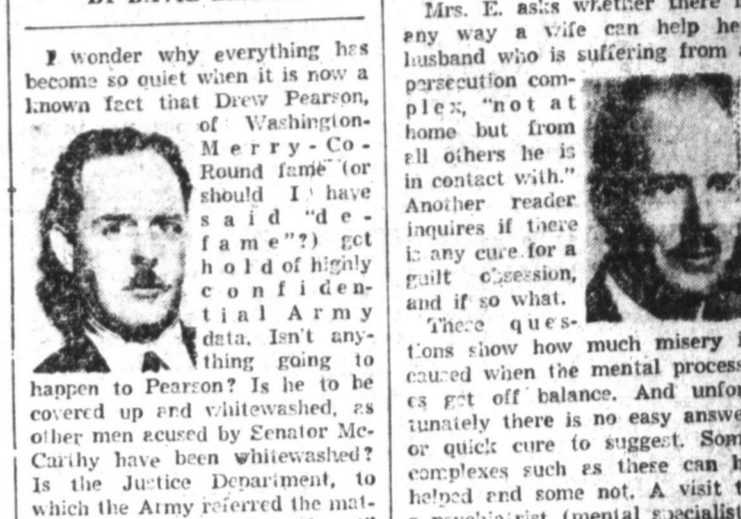
He pointed to a street car that was taking on passengers across the street.

## McCarthy And Pearson

I wonder why everything has become so quiet when it is now known that Drew Pearson, of Washington, Merry-Com-Round fame (or should I have said 'd'-'e-'f-a-m'e?') got a hold of highly confidential Army data. Isn't anything going to happen to Pearson? Is he to be covered up and whitewashed, as other men accused by Senator McCarthy have been whitewashed? Is the Justice Department, to which the Army referred the matter, to conveniently 'forget' Pearson? Why is it that this man can seemingly get away with almost anything while other citizens are tugged on the shoulder for even checking their tongues at certain laws and measures?

There is little doubt in my mind that Pearson is one of the slickest propagandists in the country, posing as a "columnist." He would seem to have powerful backing and protection somewhere and I can't understand why a congressional committee doesn't get him down here in Washington and investigate him as they do other people. Not another whitewash investigation, as was the Tydings committee's manner, but a real, all-out one.

Senator McCarthy recently pointed out that the go-between, the man through whom he says Pearson gets his orders from the Communist Party, is David Karr. Now this isn't a "smeary." It's a legitimate charge, for Karr, in spite of Pearson's defense of him, has a record like no one's record in a congressional speech but it seems not to have been reported in many newspapers. I should like to quote from the Congressional Record, Senator McCarthy speaking:

"Mr. Karr applied for a job as senior liaison officer, CAF-12, \$2000 a year, in the Office for Emergency Management. I read from the payroll that he had worked for the Fuller Brush Company in and around New York (in 1938) David Karr formed a close association with the Communist Party, joining it before he was hired by the Communist organ, the Daily Worker. Mr. Karr admitted to several FBI agents and informants that he was doing rewrite work for the party organizer."

"The Party Organizer is the most confidential of all publications of the Communist Party. Anyone doing rewrite work for the Party Organizer was of necessity a trusted and powerful member of the Communist Party. Mr. Karr had intimate contact with the high authorities of the Communist Party."

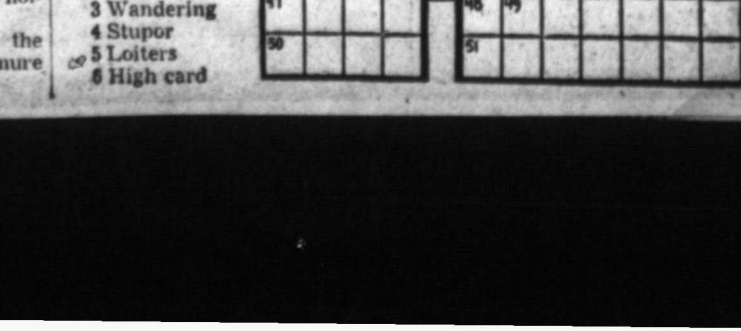
The report is quite lengthy but it goes on to say that Karr did other work for publications controlled by Communists, that he urged American entrance into the last war to help Russia, that he wrote attacks upon congressional committee investigating un-American activities, that he made contacts through the Newspaper Guild and was hired by Lowell Wakefield, a Communist writer of the Daily Worker to write articles, among them one on Martin Dies, chairman of the congressional committee investigating subversives. He was a lecturer for the League for Peace and Democracy, which so many World Federalist leaders have belonged to.

He was at that time working on one of the New York non-Communist papers and he had to show me his party card to get these assignments. ## Commie Military Strategy More Puzzling Day By Day

CENTRAL FRONT, Korea — (AP) — The big enigma of the Korean war — what goes on in the Chinese Communist military mind — grows more puzzling by the day.

One school of allied front line thought holds that the Reds are in full-scale retreat — bordering on confusion as the United Nations push nears the 38th Parallel.

Another group says the Reds have something up their sleeve and are withdrawing for a purpose, leaving small pockets of resistance at vital points to fight delaying actions.

Those who go along with the disorganized withdrawal theory point to the number of Chinese who have surrendered lately. They recount prisoners' tales of Chinese hardships — shortages of food, medical supplies and ammunition. They cite the seizure of Red arms and equipment.

And they say no further proof is needed than the intricate system of defenses the Chinese have been giving up without a serious fight.

Some of these entrenchments are regarded by veteran allied officers as the best they have seen — capable of holding out for an indefinite time.

Those who think the Red pull-back is leading up to something don't put so much stock in the Reds' abandonment of prepared defenses. They insist the Communist battle plan was changed after the bunkers and foxholes were finished.

They also discount the Chinese prisoners' stories as deliberate plans to deceive the allies or as reports from soldiers who don't know what they're talking about.

A certain credence can be given this last argument. The Chinese have employed in the past second-rate troops in the front line. Behind them are superior troops ready to take advantage of any break through made by the scrub team.

The threat of a full-scale spring offensive by the Chinese has been hanging over United Nations armies for two weeks. It remains.

Coupled with this has been the added menace of air and artillery attack. The air threat has not materialized to any degree. But the Reds have been using larger artillery again all along the front.

Amid the maze of contradictions these two facts stand out:

## DOG NOTES by PETER BOGGS

### HIS DOG AND HIS INCOME TAX

A few weeks ago a friend of mine in New York City was filling out his state income tax blank. After carefully reading over the blank and instruction sheet he decided to claim a \$400 exemption because of his dog. He claimed he could do this because of a clause which allows a taxpayer to deduct \$400 for each member of his household under a certain age who is wholly dependent on him.

My friend said he could prove that his dog was well under the prescribed age limit and was entirely dependent on him, was unable to earn its own living, and on top of that, the animal's upkeep cost him fully \$400 per year.

Undoubtedly the claim will not be allowed. Yet, according to the exemption clause on the blank you might agree with my friend that a housedog comes under the "dependent" heading. If, and he says he will, he goes to court about it, there seems to be a bare possibility of the case going to the Supreme Court. Then I am sure the state would have to make a change in that clause—an alteration which would exclude all non-human members of a household.

I questioned my friend about what would happen if all of us started claiming exemptions for each cat, chicken or other animal owned and supported. He said that was all wrong. He was basing his claim that a dog was the only non-human which is taxed, so therefore it is a valid exemption. Now don't on the strength of the above, claim an exemption for your dog, or dogs on your Federal Income Tax form next month. Hundreds have tried it in the past and it doesn't work.

**THE TEETHING PERIOD**  
I don't think you would hit or kick or scold your human baby for gnawing at a rubber teething ring. I am sure you wouldn't for you would know the youngsters was trying instinctively to ease the discomfort of his half-teeth. Yet when a teething puppy chews a slipper or rug, you punish him. Why? The pup is in precisely the same condition as your teething human child, except he has



42 teeth to cut instead of the baby's 20. The aching and itching gums incessantly tease the pup. He gnaws at anything to ease this discomfort.

Instead of beating or scolding him, get him some harmless thing to chew on. An old shoe of your own, from which all the metal has been removed, is one of the best dog "teething rings."

Incidentally, the shoe will further imprint on his mind the scent of your tread and make him familiar with it. He will use this in later days when he wants to track you.

### WHERE DOG SHOULDN'T LIE

Winter time is rheumatism time in the dog world. More dogs become infected with life-long rheumatism during these months than during all the rest of the year. However, it is not the cold weather that gives it to them. Dry cold is an enemy of rheumatism and many other diseases.

It is the chilly dampness that works havoc on dogs—the dampness that is so prevalent in winter in many sections of our country. Dogs running or walking on wet surfaces are not harmed, as a general rule. But, if they lie down on sodden ground and perhaps go to sleep there, then the trouble is likely to start.

It is also true when a dog's legs, stomach and coat are drenched from the soggy winter weather and he spends the night in this condition, though in a dry kennel or indoors. It is as if you should go to bed, dressed

in wet clammy clothes, letting them dry slowly on your body. Another cause of winter rheumatism comes from permitting your dog to sleep in the cellar or on a stone or concrete floor in house or garage.

Keep him out of the cellar. If he sleeps in the garage, or on any other mineral flooring, rig up a platform of wood, several inches high, with air space between it and the floor and put his bed on all that. All these are simple precautions. They will prolong your dog's life.

### WHY IT IS BEST TO FEED DOG ONCE A DAY

Perhaps you have often been told that a dog should be fed only once a day. Such advice is all right for a grown dog — puppies are fed at least four times a day. And, such advice refers to a dog's main meal — it is perfectly safe to feed him lightly at other times. Here is the reasoning behind such advice:

It is based on the way the animal's digestive system operates. Unlike a human being food passes quickly through a dog's stomach into the intestines where the digestion actually takes place. About 18 hours are required for this digestive process. By feeding only one main meal a day it does not permit the system to become over-filled. DON'T OVERFEED PUPPY.

After discussing the feeding of one meal a day to a grown dog perhaps some mention should be given the feeding of puppies. I'll admit it is fun to feed a young puppy, but don't overdo it. Always feed when given the opportunity, will eat and eat until he is nothing but a deformed round ball of fur.

There are many reasons why a pup shouldn't be overfed. One is that if they are allowed to overload their stomachs at a meal, the chances are the soft bone structure of their legs will become malformed by being forced to support the extra-heavy weight.

Feed a pup little but often. Five times a day is not excessive until they are ten weeks old, four times until the fourth month of age and then three times a day until the pup is about nine months old.

### THE QUESTION BOX

Question: Does my dog have to wear his license tag at all times?

Answer: I don't know the legal answer to this, but common sense tells me that he should wear it always. For one thing if he should be lost, the tag will be a means of his being returned to you.

Question: How many dogs are there in the average litter?

Answer: The average number of pups in a litter is 5.

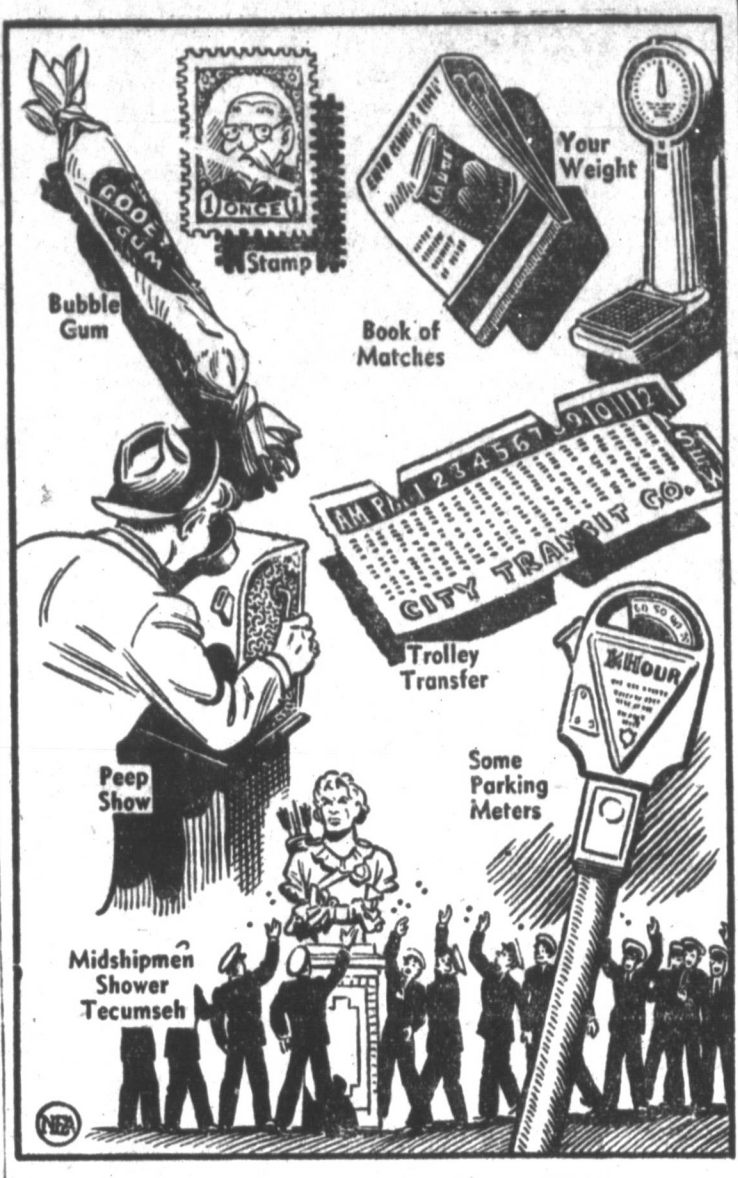

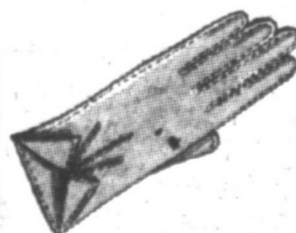
