The Borden County School Board met in regular session on May 19, 1980 at 8:00 p.m.
The meeting was called to order by Ralph Miller, Board President. The minutes of the last meeting were reviewed and approved. There were no visitors present.
Each board member received a copy of the May bills three (3) days in advance of the meeting. There being no questions, the Board moved to pay the bills.

## Mosquito Control

Increased emphasis on mosquito control this year has resulted from a continued epidemic of dengue fever in southern Mexico and the apparent northward spread of the disease. Dengue fever is a virus that is transmitted from man to man by mosquitoes, typically the Aedes aggypti mosquito. In the western hemisphere, dengue outbreaks have been characterized as mild illnesses manifest as fever, severe headache, myalgia, and often a rash.
Due to the possibility that this disease could spread to Texas this year, advanced planning for effective prevention and control will

have a significant impact on minimizing the possibility of disease transmission. The most effective way of controlling the disease is to control the mosquito and to eliminate the containers where the mosquito breeds.

The mosquito vector, Aedes aegypti, is not established west of a line from Wichita Falls to Del Rio; therefore, it is highly improbable that dengue will be a problem in that area of Texas. However, due to other mosquito borne diseases, mosquito control by source reduction or container elimination is always important.

Remember, mosquitoes develop only in water-and water standing only a few days can produce a crop of mosquitoes. So look around your home to see if there are any places where water collects. Get rid of old tires, tin cans, bottles, jars, buckets, drums and other containers, or keep them empty. Change water and scrub vases holding flowers or cuttings twice each week, or grow cuttings in sand. Scrub and change the empty watering pans of pets and chickens daily. You should repair leaky pipes and outside faucets, move house cooler drain hoses frequently, and empty outdoor wading pools regularly. Fill in the holes in trees with sand or mortar, or drain and spray them. Ornamental ponds can be stocked with fish which eat mosquito larvae, and roof gutters should be cleaned periodically

"Thank you for the piece of Job's and mine cookware." The names and circumstances have been altered in order to avoid embarassment--why, I don't know. They should be embarassed. Where were these young ladies when grammar was taught? Or do not the schools attempt to teach grammar any longer? The latter would not surprise me, what with the current fad of teaching everything but the proper use of the English language.
The I-me syndrome is easier for me to understand that the my-mine (that is really a new one on me). The misuse of me is flagrant--not just among bride types, but grooms, bachelors and maidens as well. But even so, it rankles. My mother's image flashes before me each time I hear it. Should sister or I slip, she

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would say, "Who is going to town?--me is going to town?" Me never goes to town anymore but I go all the time.
Not only is the grammar bad in most thank you notes these days, but the construction and content is pretty pitiful. Very rarely do I get a note that tells me more than the 2nd grade response of "thank you for the very nice present". When I receive a well thought out, informative note which makes me believe the sender is writing just to me, I am elated. It is nice to feel that the recipient realizes the thought that goes into the selection and sending of a gift.
All of this sounds rather sexist since it is traditonal that the female write the thank you notes. I was heartened the other day when I received a note from a young groom. After all, he was the home town boy and he was writing those he knew better than his young bride. That is a renovative idea and one that should become as traditional as graduations and weddings. CERTIFICATION OF SMALL GRAIN ACREAGE
The final date to certify small grain acreage either certified or not certified for grazing or cover must make a special effort to see that the acreage is utilized for this purpose. Acreage being grazed must be grazed out to the point no seed will be produced und acreage for cover must be plowed or clipped before it reaches the seed forming state as the definition for small grain has been changed to: Acreage planted to a small grain that reaches the dough stage or is not disposed of by the disposal date as applicable. (The disposal date for Borden County is May 15th.)

If any other use is made of the acreage other than that certified or you have acreage that was intended for grazing or cover that might be harvested then you need to come by the office to discuss the effect of such action as a false certification or the absence of a certification could result in the loss of all program benefits on the farm.
For disaster coverage, on acreage that will not be harvested, you must file form ASCS-574, Application For Disaster Credit, before putting the land to any other use in order that the acreage can be appraised. For acreage harvested, the filing deadline is 15 days from the date harvest is complete, while evidence of the crop is still apparent.
FINAL PLANTING DATES
In Borden County the final planting date for cotton has been established as June 15th, with the final planting date for grain sorghum set at June 20 th.

These dates do not restrict you from planting at a later date and will not necessarily eliminate you from any eligibility for low yield disaster coverage if you do get the crops planted after the normal planting dates.
Any producer who intended to plant cotton or grain sorghum, but was unable to do so because of adverse weather conditions, may file for prevented planting credit. Applications must be filed within 5 days after the end of the normal planting period for the intended crop.
(June 20th for cotton and June 25 th for grain sorghum.)
That area that has been prevented must have been handled in a workmanlike manner and properly prepared for the planting of the crop in question. In addition, the acreage is limited to the smaller of the 1979 plantings or the acreage intended for the crop.

TEXAS CROP AND LIVESTOCK REPORTING

Farmers and ranchers will be receiving a crop and livestock questionnaire within the next few weeks.
