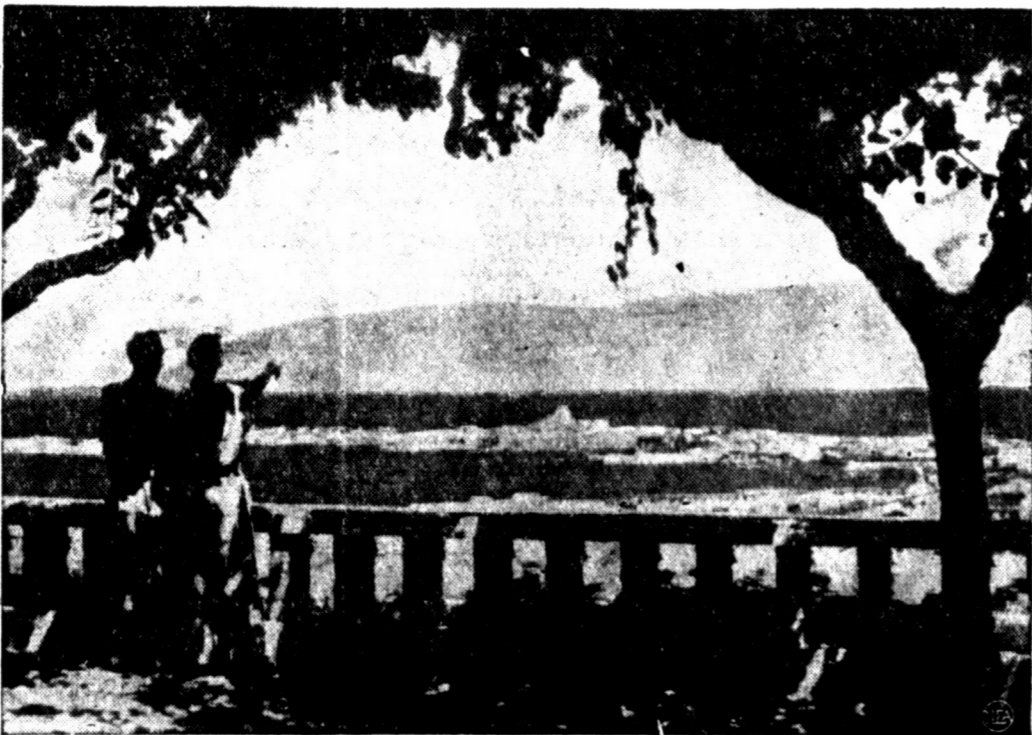
Signs of Fresh Danish Crisis Are Indicated

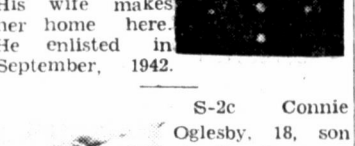
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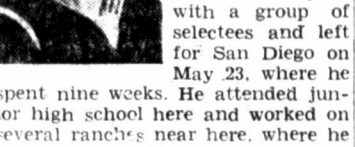
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Market Briefs

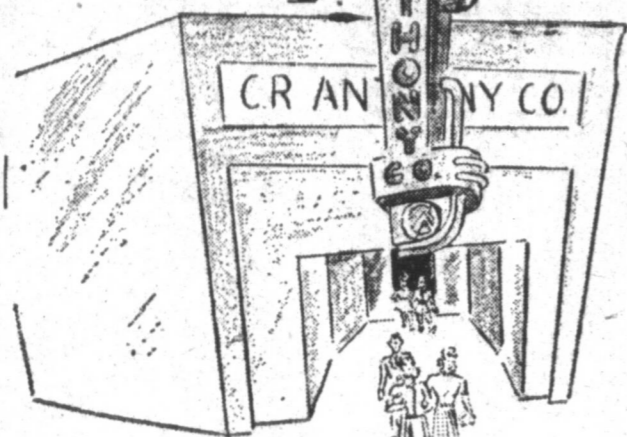

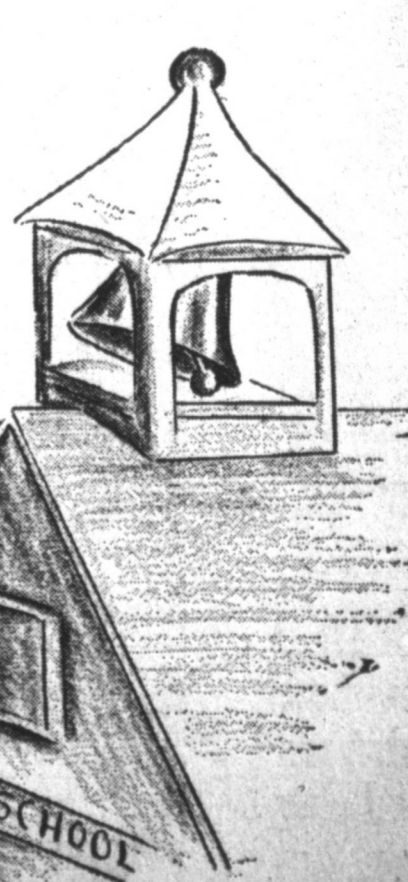

Cincinnati Reds Slice Full-Game from St. Louis Cardinals Lead

Gumbert Being Prepared to Hurl Third Game of Series for Cards

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 28.—(AP)—In the making today might be the answer to an oft-repeated question of late: "Who will the St. Louis Cardinals pitch in the third game of the World Series?"

Answer: Maybe the ailing veteran Harry Gumbert.

Baseball observers generally have conceded the world champions will

start Mort Cooper and Southpaw Max Lanier—or vice versa—but the third moundman was a stumper.

Dr. Robert Hyland, club physician, conceded candidly today Gumbert is undergoing treatment to prepare him for the World Series.

Hyland said the 30-year-old right hander was suffering from a spasmodic circulation impediment in his contract arm.

"It is nothing serious," the physician explained. "Circulation is impeded, causing the arm and hand to become cold. Gumbert is not to touch a baseball for at least two weeks."

The ailment has been with the lean, taciturn hurler most of the season. He missed a month of duty during late July and most of August after a successful winning streak.

Notification of the conference action came to him from Dr. J. C. Dolley, of the University of Texas, who is president of the conference.

The Cardinals filled the bases in the sixth and scored two men on Whitey Kurovski's single. They tied the count and chased Starr in the eighth.

In the eleventh with one out, Ray Mueller tripled to the score board; Estel Crabtree, batting for Shoun, and Lonnie Frey were purposely walked, and Max Marshall smashed the game-winning single past second base.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—(AP)—George Metkovich, rookie outfielder for the Boston Red Sox, made an impressive New York debut today by sparking the Sox to a 2 to 1 10-inning victory over the first place Yankees as they opened a long home stand.

Metkovich singled home Roy Parlee in the seventh to tie the score at 1-1, then led off in the tenth with another one-baser. He was sacrificed to second and scored the winning run on Bobby Doerr's single to left.

Heber Newsome backed up this timely hitting with a five-hit pitching performance. The Yanks bunched two of them with a sacrifice and a base on balls to score their only run in the fourth. Bud Methery, who had singled off Newsome's glove, and moved up on a sacrifice, crossed the plate on Bill Dickey's ground single over second base.

Newsome was in trouble in the seventh when Joe Gordon walked and Elmer Valton pitched to Frank Crosetti's grounder. But Newsome bore down and retired the next 12 batters in a row to chalk up his sixth win against 10 defeats.

Boston also muffed a chance in the seventh after Metkovich drove in the tying run, Bill Zuber, who went the distance for the Yankees, walked Tony Lupien to fill the bases, but then got Doerr to hit into a force play at second.

He said the church meeting places were kept well ventilated and clean and felt that it was up to the parents whether their children should attend Sunday school and church. His subject at the morning service will be "My Philosophy of Life" and "In the Other Man's Place" at the evening service. Meanwhile, the state health department, in an Associated Press dispatch from Austin, urged continuing cleanup campaigns to reduce the population of certain flies, mosquitoes, flea and ticks as multiple-legged saboteurs. Health officials blamed the common house fly for the spread of food poisoning, typhoid, diarrhea and infantile paralysis, the flea for typhus, the blue tick for relapsing fever, the lone star or speck-back tick for spotted fever, and the mosquitoes for malaria and dengue.

Andre Francois-Poncet, former French ambassador to Berlin and later to Rome before the war, also was arrested at Laronche, the dispatch reported.

ling upon Bulgarians to "stand still firmer around the throne of the King."

The proclamation added that the ministerial council will take over administration of Bulgaria until a settlement of the problem of the monarchy. The Germans said Boris had died of sudden heart disease coupled with lung troubles after a five-day illness. Berlin vigorously denied that this illness had stemmed from a violent quarrel with Hitler at his headquarters, when Boris reportedly refused to send Bulgarian troops to fight Russia.

Unconfirmed reports received in Ankara said Boris might have been shot in the stomach by an assassin. Boris, one of the foremost diplomats in Europe, had been king 25 years and absolute master of his country's political life for 15 years. It was doubted whether any member of the Bulgarian royal family would be able to hold the nation together.

COFFEE SUBSIDY CUT WASHINGTON, Aug. 28—(AP)—The war food administration announced today the discontinuance of commodity credit corporation subsidy payments to cover excess ocean and trans-shipment costs of coffee imported into the United States.

Grew Says Japs Must Be Disarmed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28—(AP)—Joseph C. Grew, the last American ambassador to Japan, asserted tonight that at the end of the war Japan must be disarmed, denied certain strategic islands and forced to give up conquered lands.

Her military leaders and "those guilty of the hideous and utterly barbaric cruelties practiced alike upon prisoners and wounded and upon non-combatant civilians of the United Nations" must be punished, said Grew in an address prepared under the auspices of the commission to study the organization of peace.

German pattern of rule in Czechoslovakia. The Danish radio continued to operate, but nothing in the evening's news broadcast gave a hint as to the new turn in German efforts to curb the nation-wide surge of sabotage and clashes between Danes and occupation troops.

If the situation meant that German Gen. Hermann von Hanneken and his occupation army are about to take over full military control, it threatens to explode even more violence by the Danes against the Germans.

The Danes know full well that Gen. Hanneken will take ruthless measures in surpassing the revolt. Rather than submit to that, they may develop their sporadic outbreaks into an organized revolution.

Danes here in close touch with their mother country said that feeling is even more bitter against the Germans now than when they took over Denmark in the sneak attack of April 4, 1940.

locomotive works at Benevento besides tearing up the rail lines, and these flights, meeting the heaviest opposition, shot down 16 of the day's bag of enemy planes. One formation alone tallied 13 of the attackers.

Meanwhile, Allied headquarters announced that last Wednesday's hedgehopping attack on Foggia's airport; and rail yards was the most successful ever made in this theater.

A final checkup showed more than 100 JU-88 bombers were destroyed or damaged on the ground and a total of 47 enemy planes shot down. The previous official announcement claimed only 19 enemy planes shot down.

Thirty-eight of these were accounted for by the Fortresses, the largest number they have bagged in any operation in this area. The bag was so great that the interrogators could hardly believe it and spent two days checking the figures.

Letha Mae Trostle, 210 E. Brown, who has done work as a sheet metal worker in recent months, and who recently enlisted in the Women's Reserve of the United States Marine Corps, has received her orders to report for active duty.

She will receive her six weeks' basic training at Camp LeJeune, at the New River, North Carolina Marine Base.

Mrs. Trostle, graduated from the local high school, her maiden name of Harrelson being no doubt familiar to those who knew her in school.

She will be at the Marine Base for training about six weeks, after which she will be assigned to duty at one of the many bases or stations of the Marine Corps, where she will relieve a trained fighting man for duty at his battle station.

Now that it is the time of year that we are all hard at work trying to further the war effort along, lots of things happen to us, and not only the men at the Air base are suffering a bad case of the grinnings, but you and me, whether we are flying a twin engine bomber or merely going around with out daily duties, we sometimes suffer mental blackouts caused by these little people who used to live in the woods and fields with gnomes and fairies.

So if you are suffering grinnings, now is the time to rid yourself of the little pests. With school opening peeking out at all P. H. S. Intellectuals, grinnings should be exterminated.

When school and grinnings get together, then one of the two must be eliminated, and since there appears to be no legal way of eliminating school, the only other thing to do is to try to get rid of the grinnings.

Now that we have clearly identified the species of the grinnings the first thing to do if you feel that a grmlin is working on you is to give yourself a careful character analysis. A sure-fire sign that a grmlin is boring from within is to discover that you have come to resemble one of the little imps.

Then get busy and kick him out. But grmmings won't discourage easily—working hard and asserting your will power immediately, are the most powerful methods of elimination.

Then there'll be no more mental blackouts—no more grmmings—and who knows ??? no more stories like this.

Naturally we are all concerned about mailing instruction for mailing overseas Christmas packages. If we have some member of the family or a friend that will spend the Yuletide season "over there," then, of course, we want to make up a box to send to him, and in time, and because of the "tight shipping space" and other transportation difficulties, Christmas packages for members of the armed forces overseas may not exceed five pounds in weight, are limited in size and must be mailed early.

The packages may not be more than 15 inches in length or more than 36 inches in length and girth combined, and must be mailed between Sept. 15 and Oct. 15, and for members of the navy, marines and coast guard, between Sept. 15 and Nov. 1. And the earlier the packages are mailed, the better the chances are that they will reach the men for Christmas.

Customary requests from addresses will not be required during these special Christmas mailing periods, but patrons are asked to mark "Christmas parcel" on the packages.

Then comes the problem of what to send. Since members of the armed forces are well supplied with food and clothing, the public is requested not to include such items in the Christmas parcels. Perishable goods are not acceptable, and not more than one parcel a week during the mailing period may be sent to the same addressee by a sender.

Packages should be packed tightly in metal, wood, fiberboard or corrugated cardboard boxes, wrapped in strong paper and securely tied with twine. As the parcels are subject to censorship, they should be tied so as to permit ready inspection.

Sealed packages of candy, cigars, tobacco and toilet articles may be included in the parcels without affecting their parcel post classification.

Non-acceptable goods include poisons or any compositions which might kill or injure a person, or damage the mails.

Addresses should be full and complete, including the name and address of the sender, the name, rank, serial number, branch of service, organization, postoffice number and the postoffice through which the parcel is to be routed.

For naval personnel, the rank or rating of the addressee should be shown, as well as the naval unit to which he is assigned, with the navy number assigned thereto, or the name of the ship and fleet postoffice through which the parcel is to be routed.

These are the rules which the U. S. postoffice has set down to be followed. Follow them closely, if you think you cannot remember all of them clip this article and put it away for reference later. Just get the package out, and on time so that the service man may have a merry Christmas.

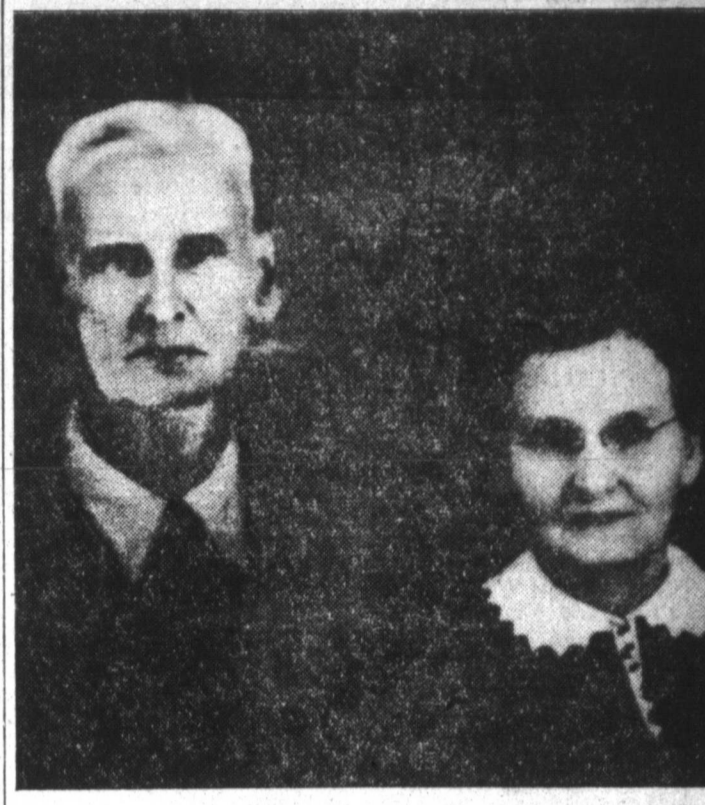

Mrs. M. F. Roche, chairman of home service, has provided us with some valuable information concerning relief to American and other United Nations prisoners through the American Red Cross. The American Red Cross at present is distributing four general types of supplies through the International Red Cross: (1) standard food packages and invalid food packages; (2) surgical, dental, and medical supplies in bulk and medical kits; (3) clothing; (4) comfort and toilet articles and tobacco.

The standard food package weighs approximately 11 pounds and contains such items as processed cheese, chocolate bars, 100 cigarettes, soluble coffee, white lump sugar, odorless soap, tin of whole milk. The invalid food package weighs approximately 11 pounds and contains, among other articles, the following: tin of instant coffee, orange concentrate, prunes, liver paste, 120 cigarettes, concentrated soup. The standard medical kit contains—tame only a few items—absorbent cotton, cathartic pills, safety pins, gauze sponges, aspirin tablets, 5 yard roll adhesive.

American military prisoners of war in Europe receive one standard or invalid food package weekly for which the American Red Cross is reimbursed by the U. S. War Department. One standard or invalid food package weekly is provided for

American naval prisoners of war in Europe for which the American Red Cross is being reimbursed by the U. S. Navy Department. Each civilian internee (American), including Merchant seamen, in Europe, receives one standard or invalid food package weekly or every two weeks, according to camp, which is being provided from the President's War Relief Fund.

The American Red Cross is preparing a "capture package" containing first necessity articles to be given each American as soon as possible after his capture. It has been possible to make only one shipment of relief supplies to the Far East for relief of American prisoners of war and civilian internees there. Until such time as the American Red Cross is able to resume shipments of relief supplies to the Far East, the American Red Cross has provided certain sums and established revolving funds with Swiss Legations and Consulate Offices and representatives of the International Red Cross Committee in the Far East for the purchase of supplies locally.

The nearest relative of each American prisoner of war (officially listed next of kin) is sent the first news news received from the International Red Cross Committee that an officer or soldier in our forces has been captured by the enemy. As soon as the camp address is known, the family is told how to address letters to the prisoner, and if practical post facilities are available, a parcel label is then sent every six days. Parcels, except books, sent to prisoners of war from this country must carry official labels inside and out, and only next of kin can send such parcels unless they give the labels to someone else. Using the labels, an eleven pound parcel can be sent.

Five women from the Pampa area came to the Red Cross office this week for assistance in making up packages for prisoners of war. One parcel contained these articles: 2 suits underwear; 3 pairs socks; 1 sweater; 2 handkerchiefs; 2 bath cloths; 1 towel; 500 malted milk tablets; 1 carton Ovaltine; 2 pounds prunes; 2 packages chewing gum; 1 carton cocoa; 2 packages razor blades; 1 pound candy; 2 bars soap; tooth brushes and powder; 2 packages aspirin; 1 camphor ice; 1 box laxative tablets; 4 packages dehydrated soup; 1 package bouillon cubes. Each article had to be placed in a carefully planned position, and this meant solving a three-dimensional jigsaw puzzle.

The wrapping of these parcels must be strong and durable, for the packages travel long distances and receive rough handling. It is advisable that packages contain an inner wrapping, giving the full address exactly as it appears on the outside. Only plain paper, containing no printed matter, other than the address information, may be used. The finished package must not be more than 18 inches in length and 42 inches in length and girth combined.

Raise Ration Points
 DETROIT, Aug. 28—(AP)—The office of price administration yesterday imposed penalties against nine persons accused of violating price regulations, in one instance revoking a family's war ration books until Dec. 31, 1944.
 Frederic S. Glover, Jr., of Cleveland, OPA regional hearing commissioner, assessed the most severe penalty against Mrs. A. D. Wilkinson of suburban Grosse Pointe, one of a group of socially prominent persons accused of making illegal purchases.
 Mrs. Wilkinson received the "extreme penalty" Glover said, because of evidence the family had a food supply "of several years" on hand. Testimony indicated she had an inventory of 1,276 cans of rationed foods with a point value of 7,273 and deep-freeze foods valued at 1,978 points.

Civilians Can't Get Penicillin

BOSTON, August 28—(AP)—Dr. Chester S. Keefer of Evans Memorial hospital, in charge of the civilian supply of penicillin, said today that the public might not expect the new bacteria-killing drug to be used for their benefit in the end of the year, at least.
 Dr. Keefer explained that the War Production Board allocated all penicillin and regarded its development as a significant part of the war effort.

Allied Sea Losses In Sicily Fight Low

COVENTRY, England, August 28—(AP)—Overall Allied sea losses during the initial invasion voyages and supplying of Allied armies in Sicily from June 10 to midnight, August 17, totaled less than 85,000 tons, A. V. Alexander said in an address.
 The first lord of the admiralty disclosed that within 48 hours of the first landing, 80,000 men, 7,000 vehicles, 300 tanks and 700 guns had been put ashore.
 Alexander said that the British fleet units alone, in this year's most intensive naval support of landing operations, fired more than 20,000 shells with guns ranging from four to 15 inches.
 Saying that the seaborne invasions of North Africa and Sicily were on a scale believed by many to be utterly impossible, he added, "Literally we have moved tanks and aircraft in their thousands, mechanical vehicles in their hundreds of thousands and men in their millions."

Fire Destroys 2,500 Acres Of Wheeler Grass

SHAMROCK, August 28—Fire has destroyed about 2,500 acres of grass in Wheeler county within the past two weeks.

Texas Marine Gets Air Medal

SOMEWHERE IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC — (Delayed) — Staff Sergeant Melton William Judson, 18 of Boyd, Texas, became the first member of his marine aircraft group to receive the air medal when it was pinned on his chest by Major General Ralph Mitchell, former director of marine aviation in Washington, D. C.

The citation which accompanied the air medal "for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity while serving with a marine aircraft group as radioman of naval transport airplanes operating in the Solomon Islands during October 14 and 15, 1942, 'set out.'"

"Staff Sergeant Judson was radioman on an airplane loaded with bombs, gasoline and oxygen, which was urgently needed to carry out the defense of Guadalcanal Island.

"Staff sergeant Judson displayed exceptional courage and devotion to duty by assisting in the unloading of his cargo and the loading of wounded with no regard for his personal safety, while Henderson Field was being bombed and shelled by enemy shore-based artillery."

Sergeant Judson attended school in Fort Worth, but graduated from high school at Boyd.

Roberts Quota Set at \$109,700

MIAMI, Aug. 28 — (AP) — The third war loan quota for Roberts county is \$109,700, according to Judge J. A. Mead, chairman of the war fund committee. This is by far the largest amount asked for in this county.

The following committee has been appointed for Roberts county: C. L. Thomas, Mrs. Avis Edwards, Willis Clark, Ellis Locke, Clark Mathers, C. O. Shield and Judge Mead. The drive starts Sept. 9 and ends Sept. 30.

Newspaper Pulpwood Production Clarified

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 — (AP) — War Manpower Commissioner Paul V. McNutt has clarified the WMC's attitude as to essentiality of pulpwood production in a statement to the newspaper pulpwood committee, which is conducting a drive in 27 states to avert a shortage of such wood.

"Pulpwood is an essential war material used among other things for making rayon parachutes, shipping containers and smokeless powder," he said yesterday.

"Its many wartime uses have created a shortage which is rapidly becoming acute. With these conditions in mind, the WMC has recently classified pulpwood cutting and production of pulp as essential war occupations."

Pulpwood cutting now is on a revised list of essential activities and is included among essential farm products listed by selective service as a guide to local boards in deferment of registrants engaged in agriculture.

McNutt urged "every man engaged in the essential work, either part or full time, to give it the best he has in him."

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 — (AP) — Pan-American Airways estimated today that in 1948 vacationers may be able to travel to Moscow over the top of the world for a round-trip fare of \$259.20, using 19 hours of travel time in each direction.

In a tentative schedule displayed at an airways exhibit, Pan American calculated a traveler could reach Tokyo from New York in 27 hours and 36 minutes at a round trip cost of \$378.00, and Singapore in 43 hours flat at a round trip cost of \$680.

Wallace Opposes Good Treatment for Enemy

WASHINGTON, August 28 — (AP) — Vice President Wallace agrees with President Roosevelt that the aims of the Atlantic Charter are thorough and attainable. But, he said, "it might be well to take a second look" before applying section 4 to the aggressor nations immediately after the war.

Section 4 pledges the United States and Great Britain to "endeavor, with due respect for their existing obligations, to further the enjoyment by all states, great or small, victor or vanquished, of access, on equal terms, to the trade and to the raw materials of the world which are needed for their economic prosperity."

"It seems to me," Wallace said, "we will have to think twice about giving any aggressor nation equal access to trade and raw materials." He cited in this connection Japan's industrial pre-war acquisition of American scrap iron.

Taxpayers Are Invited to See U. S. Official

If you are required to file a declaration of your estimated income and victory tax for the year 1943 on or before Sept. 15, it will be wise of you to take advantage of a visit of Deputy Collector Ralph Kenniston to Pampa next Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Sept. 1, 2 and 3. Kenniston will consult with taxpayers at the post office building to assist you in preparing your declaration.

Generally speaking, taxpayers required to file the Sept. 15 declarations are single persons earning more than \$2,700 and married persons earning more than \$3,500 from wages or salaries—subject to withholding, or those who have incomes of more than \$100 from sources outside of wages and salaries, or persons whose 1943 wages subject to withholding are reasonably expected to be less than their 1942 wages if they were required to file 1942 income tax returns.

Heavy penalties are imposed on persons required to file declarations who fail to do so or who fail to pay the required amount of estimated tax on or before Sept. 15. Penalties are also provided for substantial under-estimations of tax due.

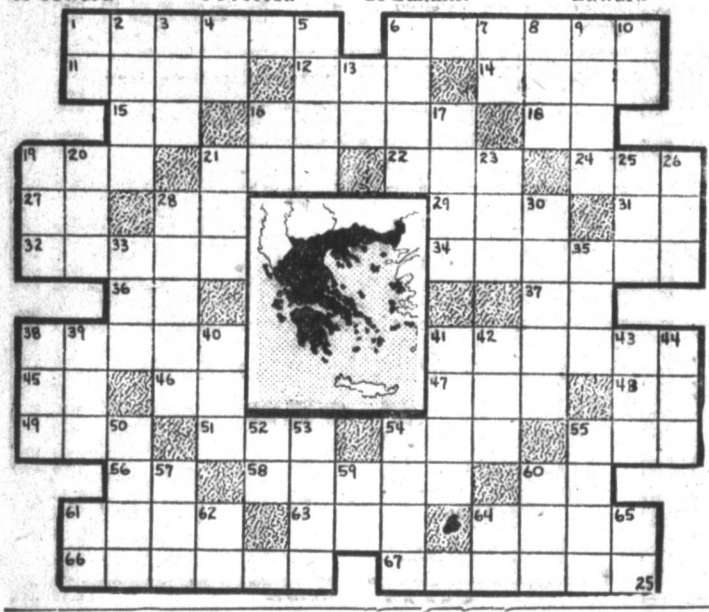
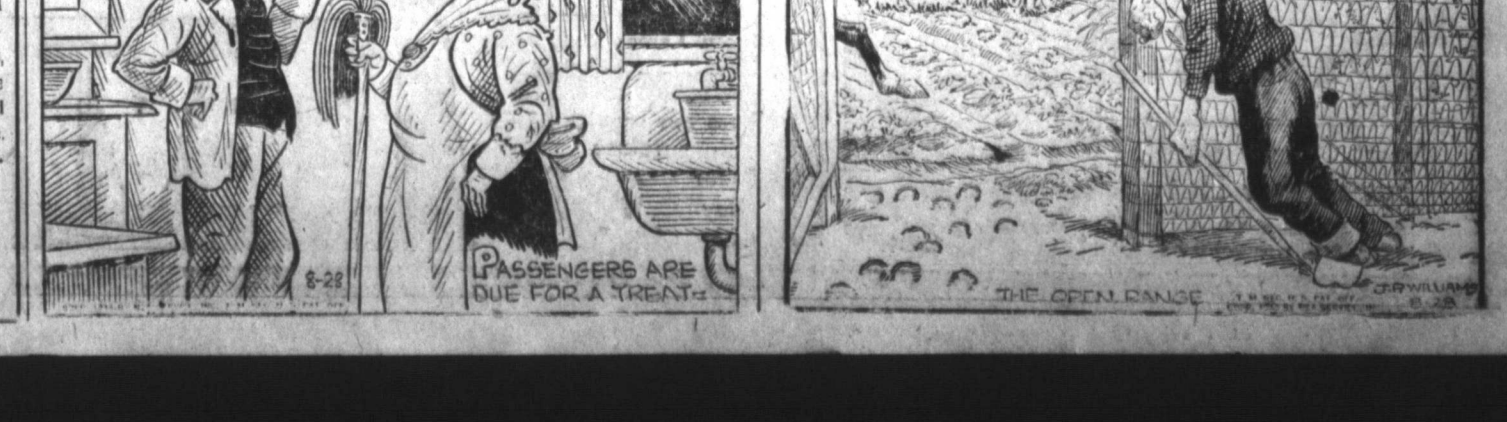
