Why did he do so if the original ten were adequate? Christianity, which grew up subsequent to the statement of the Ten Commandments, is also worthy of consideration as a basis of moral principles for determining right from wrong. Why is the Declaration of Independence

omitted in the first question?" You will note that he does not say whether or not one can determine right from wrong by the Ten Commandments and the Golden Rule. He contends that they can only be accepted as a partial standard.

So that we can stick to the questions, we will not at this time answer the questions asked by Mr. Stanley's secret agent. We will answer them later, and we will not evade answering, as has Mr. Stanley's secret agent. Our second question was: "If your answer to question No. 1 is 'no', will you name an impersonal, eternal rule to use as a standard

to determine right from wrong?" Mr. Stanley's answer was: There is no single, eternal rule. We base our actions on several sources.' Note that he did not even at tempt to set down an impersonal, eternal rule to determine right

from wrong-and of course this

question refers to what is mor-

ally right and wrong, not what is

legally right and wrong. There is no more chance of determining what is morally right and what is immoral without a norm or a standard or a principle or a rule of conduct than there would be to determine distance from a given point without having a unit of measure, or than there would be to reason about any subject without having a standard from which to reason, This Mr. Stanley utterly refuses to do, and he would leave the impression that the Ten Commandments and the Golden Rule are not adequate guides to determine what is morally right and what is immoral or wrong. He does this even though Jesus did say, according to Moffatt,: "Whatever, you would have men do to you, do just the same to them; that is the meaning of the Law and the prophets." Mr. Stanley would leave the impression that what is morally right or immoral cannot be determined by using the Ten Commandments the Colden Rule as guides.



By GAYNOR MADDOX NEA Staff Writer Milk is one of the most eco omical forms of nutrition for our growing children. A quart day furnishes the amount of calcium needed for a child, daily, as well as other important nutrients. Like all dairy foods, milk is an essential part of the child's

Give the child a glass at each meal. The fourth glass (to make up the quart) can be served in cooked foods or after school in popular milk drinks. Caramel Milk Shake

(Serves 4)
Four cups milk, pinch salt, tablespoons caramel syrup, vanilla ice cream or whipped cream. Combine all ingredients and shake vigorously. Serve cold with a spoonful of vanilla ice cream, or hot with a spoonful of whipped cream.

To make caramel syrup: Dis solve 2 cups sugar in 1-2 cup num pan). Cover and boil rapid ly until syrup thickens. Remove cover and cook over low heat until syrup is amber color. Remove from heat and slowly add one cup boiling water.

Return to heat and continue to cook over low heat until caramel melts (about 3 or 4 minutes). Makes about 1 1-4 cups Store in a tightly covered jar in a cool place.
