Higher Income Or Sales Tax **Are Studied**

WASHINGTON, August 5-(P)-The preliminary search for new billions of war-financing revenue appeared narrowing today to two major potentialities — increases in individual and corporate income taxes, or a federal retail sales tax. Capitol Hill heard informal reports that treasury and congressional tax experts in joint conferences were leaning heavily toward income tax increases, possibly with an excess profits levy against individuals with swollen wartime incomes, and were putting little if any emphasis on a retail sales levy.

At the same time there were in creasing signs that a bloc might form within congress favoring a sales tax up to 10 per cent to avoid further drastic direct deductions from



THE SCOPE OF COLLECTIVE BARGAINING Those people who believe that collective bargaining is beneficial to workers have little conception as to what it means. They do not realize now far it goes in taking away from individuals their God-given rights. Here is an illustration of how collective bargaining grows when people

come to believe that it is beneficial. The providence, Rhode Island, Journal for years paid their printers who produced more than the minimum above the minimum scale. TAXING THE UNIFORM (Daily Oklahoman)

Shall we pay our own grocery bills as we eat ur rationed way through this war period or shall set aside a portion of the bill to be paid by our ldiers and sailors after their return from the war?

That is one of the many questions presented this subsidy roll back program. Politicians may not like a question that is so brusque, but the question is here no matter whether the politicians like it or not.

Government proposes to spend at least 525 million dollars in subsidies. That amounts to about \$4.25 for each of us food consuming citizens. That much is to be deducted from the grocery bill of each of us. That much will be paid the government with borrowed money added to the tax total for future payment. It will be paid by the taxpayers, including those who are

lucky enough to get back from the war alive. Now a \$4:25 reduction in our cost of living is not going to solve the problem of living costs, which have advanced an estimated 46 per cent in two years. And it will increase the highest tax levies in history by just that much. It will increase the tax bill of every returned veteran. Having won the war at a terrible cost the veterans will have to help pay the grocery bills of every citizen who stayed at home and profited from the high prices and high wages of the war period.

This roll back program has the fervent approval of the CIO fraternity, most of whom are receiving the highest wages they ever drew. Although they are receiving a swollen war wage they are unwilling to pay in full for their gro-ceries. They want the \$52 a month buck private and gobs to pay a part of the bill after they have shed their job of saving the country.

This roll back program has many factors. ome of those factors support the program and some condemn it. But there is one factor that stands out as prominent as a broken egg on a cement sidewalk: unless we as individuals pay our war time grocery bills in full, the survivors of the battle will have to pay a part of them.





Greater Farm Freedom Seen For Next Year

WASHINGTON, President Edward A. the American Farm Bureau Federation expressed belief today that farmers would have more freedom next year in determining their individual crop and livestock producon programs.

"The trend in agriculture," he aid, "is definitely away from cenward more local, individual control.' O'Neal made this statement after conferring with War Food Adminstrator Marvin Jones on plans for

1944 food production which, Jones has announced, will call for record plantings of 380,000,000 acres to food and feed crops and the maintenance of livestock production at near the present peak. One of the questions discussed

with Jones, the farm bureau chief said, was the matter of obtaining farmer cooperation with production goals of various crops to be set up under the food program. The food administrator has indicated that AAA acreage allotments and rigid marketing quotas-with the exception of the non-food crop of tobacco—would be abandoned.
O'Neal said Jones had asked of-

ficers of various major farm organizations to give him their ideas on what next year's program should contain. It is the food administrator's hope, O'Neal said, to lay before congress this fall a completely worked-out program.
