Salad Variety Will Make A Table Bright

For green salad—add one tablespoon sugar, one tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, three tablespoons tomato juice, and three tablespoons dried onions.

For cole slaw—add one-fourth cup chopped ripe or stuffed olives.

For fruit salad—add two tablespoons chopped mint leaves.

For vegetable salad—add one-half can tomato soup, one teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, one teaspoon grated onion.

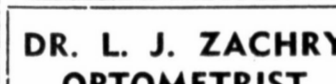

Easterners Using Too Much Gas

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Eastern motorists had a renewed warning today that the pleasure driving ban can't be lifted Sept. 1 unless they obey the current driving restrictions and make it possible to replenish seaboard gasoline stocks.

Disclosing that the stocks were overdrawn 22,700 barrels a day last week, deputy petroleum administrator Ralph K. Davies said a decline in the flow of petroleum products to the east coast during the past three weeks was caused in part by a Gulf coast hurricane, part by the necessity of filling the eastern leg of the "Big Inch" pipeline. Military requirements have mounted until they take in approximately one-third of all gasoline produced east of the Rocky Mountains, and are expected to rise still further.

Musso Reported On Bonza Isle

BERN, Switzerland, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The Swiss Telegraphic Agency, in a dispatch from Chiasso on the Swiss-Italian border, said today that it had been assured that former Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy had been removed from Ft. Breschla, near Rome, to Bonza, an island to which the Fascists once sent political prisoners.

The dispatch supported an article in the Neue Zuercher Zeitung which said that Premier Marshal Pietro Badoglio took the precaution to place Mussolini where he could not be reached by German motorized divisions and to which there was no access except by "swimming."

LONDON, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The Italian underground radio station "Milano e Libertia" broadcast a new appeal by anti-Fascist parties today calling for a general strike in Italy.

The broadcast, demanded by the Associated Press, recorded an immediate end to hostilities, abdication of King Vittorio Emanuele, dismissal of Premier Badoglio, amnesty for political prisoners and freedom for workers to organize.

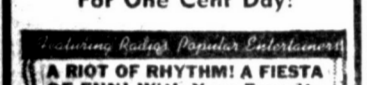

Germans Expect French Attack

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 19—(P)—Germans view the heavy assaults on French air fields by great fleets of American four-engine bombers as a prelude to the invasion of France, Berlin dispatches reported today.

While the RAF continued its mighty aerial offensive against Germany, the Nazis were reported watching with mounting concern not only the Fortress raids on air fields but the tightening circle of heavy American attacks against the heart of Germany herself.

The Berlin correspondent of Svenska Dagbladet said that the Germans know the air blows against air fields in the vicinity of Marseille Tuesday and on the North coast of France the previous day "must be connected with higher military strategy dealing with the start of another European front."

At Wewak, a once potent force of 225 planes was reduced to an impotent 10 in two spectacular raids by our bombers and fighters Tuesday and Wednesday. Japanese fighters and ground crewmen killed exceeded 1,500.

Down the coast 350 miles, the Japanese air base town of Salamaua is largely in ruins from more than 1,000 tons of bombs dropped within the past month by Americans.

Five miles below Salamaua, in the jungles and on the mountain ridges, Japanese troops are fighting to keep Allied jungle forces from capturing the airdrome.

Somberly by Allied planes, these troops have need of air support such as was wiped out on the ground at Wewak.

They likewise need the supplies and reinforcements which the Japanese try to sneak down by barge and small boat. Yesterday Allied planes blew up several of these barges near Salamaua. They also hit at least four small coastal vessels. Across the way on Southern New Britain, whence many supply barges are moved to Salamaua, 17 were destroyed or damaged by medium bombers. Hundreds of these barges have been sunk or fired in the New Guinea-New Britain coastal waters in recent months.

Other Allied planes yesterday bombed a 4,500-ton enemy freighter-tranport in waters between New Britain and New Ireland.

Today's communique from Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters reported that Allied bombers and fighters went back yesterday to the Wewak area airdromes where on Tuesday all but 50 of a fleet of 225 enemy planes were either destroyed or damaged. Thirty of the 52 rose to meet the raiders. Twenty-eight were shot down.

Then the raiders methodically bombed and strafed the dromes for hours until only 10 of the fleet remained intact. They also set fire to three ships in the harbor. In this second raid, three Allied planes were lost, making a total of six for the two raids.

Tuesday night, in the heaviest of three raids made within a week on Balikpapan, Boreo, bombers covered 2,600 miles roundtrip to sink four tankers, damage two others and rekindle fires among oil refineries. As on the other two raids, all the bombers got back.

RELEASE—The War Labor Board has staged a behind-the-scenes revolt against the White House by reason of President Roosevelt's persistent refusal to execute its recommendations for a crackdown on labor...

The WLB held an indignation meeting not long ago, with Chairman William H. Davis, a loyal New Dealer, and Wayne L. Morse, a public member, as the principal assailants of the Chief Executive.

The chief cause for their resentment was that their proposal to abolish the checkoff for Mr. Lewis's miners had been sidetracked by the President. He countered with a suggestion that withholding the diggers' funds from their weekly pay envelopes...

Such a step would cripple John L. industrially and politically, but only temporarily. At the present moment, according to the WLB-ers, it is only an empty gesture.

Mr. Davis bridled at this curtailment of his more drastic plan, but agreed to go along with the usual condition that he be permitted to announce this supposedly hard-bolted program. Mr. Roosevelt consented to these terms. But a few hours after the White House sent this acquiescent message to WLB...

PREROGATIVE—President Roosevelt has refused to approve an arrangement by which the Senate Foreign Relations Committee should be informed in advance of all private and postwar covenants that he may negotiate with others of the United Nations family.

High ranking and Democratic members of this committee, where all overseas settlements must be considered first, have had several discussions with the committee. But Mr. Acheson, Assistant Secretary of State in charge of economic affairs...

He has organized an army for his own protection. His own security force of specially trained young Nazi toughs is said to number 750,000, men who would kill Germans as readily as they would kill Poles.

He has been warned by friends that it would be wise to satisfy Capitol Hill, but in this instance he intends to assert his Constitutional prerogative.

Panhandle Pilot On Great Wewak Raid

SOMEWHERE IN NEW GUINEA, August 17 - (Delayed)—Two surprise attacks by Allied heavy and medium bombers on four enemy airbases near Wewak, New Guinea, today staggered the Japanese with one of the hardest blows yet struck against their air force.

One hundred twenty enemy planes—an estimated 80 per cent of the grounded Nipponese aircraft in the Wewak sector—were destroyed while three of our own planes failed to return.

Our heavy bombers loosed more than 100 tons of bombs on the Wewak sector which in recent weeks had been built up to probably exceed the enemy base at Rabaul, New Britain, in striking force.

Anniversary Of Atlantic Charter

That being the case, it may not be amiss by way of birthday celebration to take it point by point and see how closely it comes to stating the principles for which you or your men and boys are fighting: "First: Their countries seek no aggrandizement, territorial or other."

POINTS OF THE CHARTER

Well, maybe that holds good for the United States, but Great Britain has lost Burma, Borneo and other Pacific possessions, and is she going to give up Lybia, Eritrea and the other African gains?

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Girl Kills Father, 6-Year-Old Brother

COVINGTON, Ky., August 19—(AP)—Sixteen-year-old and pretty Joann Kiger was charged in a warrant today with murder in the fatal shooting early Tuesday of her father, Vice Mayor Carl C. Kiger, 49, and her youngest brother, Jerry, 6.

The warrant was signed by Sheriff Jacob P. Williams of adjoining Boone county, where the shooting occurred.

Kiger and his son died amid a fusillade of bullets as they slept in their summer home southwest of this northern Kentucky city, Mrs. Jennie Kiger, 49, Kiger's wife, was wounded during the tragic climax to the couple's 24th wedding anniversary, observed Monday.

County Attorney Charles Riley said the girl doesn't show any signs and observed "it's a strange case."

Mrs. Kiger is confined under police guard in a Covington hospital. She was shot through the right hip.

SIDE GLANCES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19—(AP)—The Big Inch pipeline is more than making good. Acting Petroleum Administrator for War Ralph K. Davies said today.

He announced a record 24-hour test run of 326,000 barrels of Texas crude oil through the western leg of the new pipe line, and said it "vindicated the contention of the designing engineers that the big underground petroleum carrier would have a top capacity of at least 325,000 barrels per day during the warm summer months."

The western leg runs from Longview, Texas, to Norris City, Ill. Oil flowing from Norris City through the eastern leg is expected to reach refineries in the New York harbor area today.

Big Inch Line Proves Worth

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Today's War Analysis

As the big chiefs go into action at Quebec to grease the skids for Zaidom it strikes me that we might well pause for a touch of the cap to our gallant fighting services which have continued to hold our Pacific lines while we have been engaged in "beating Hitler first."

It gave me a chill to think what might have happened to Australia, the Hawaiian Islands, Alaska or even the west coast of continental United States if it hadn't been for the skill and sacrifice of all categories in the far Pacific. They've done one of the decisive jobs of the war.

Our latest aerial success yesterday and Tuesday at Wewak, New Guinea, is a reminder that not only have our Pacific forces performed the essential holding operation against a powerful enemy, but they have done the "impossible by setting the initiative and putting the Japs on the defensive." In the Wewak show our bombers destroyed or damaged some 215 precious enemy planes, thereby virtually wiping out Nipponese airpower in Central New Guinea.

The significance? Well, that beautiful job brings us just so much closer to the day when we shall wipe out the great Jap naval base at Truk, thus rendering the Mikado's forces impotent in that whole vast zone of islands northeast of Australia. The little men of the Rising Sun are being forced back step by step.

Meantime in the "Hitler first" campaign, Moscow reports that the Germans are counterattacking before Kharkov on the fiercely contested southern battle-front, seeking an opening for an offensive to offset the devastating Red drive. Such a development would greatly intensify the already bloody crisis which is threatening to force the Nazis to withdraw his entire great line in Russia.

This turn of events has resulted in the Soviet army newspaper Red Star making a fresh appeal for a second land front in western Europe, to force Hitler to divert troops from Russia and pull him off his defensive in both east and west. The paper says that "only such an operation can cut down the length of the war to any considerable extent."

The Russian report that the Germans are trying to find an opening for a counter-offensive in the Kharkov sector is vastly important. If may mark Hitler's supreme effort to save his blood-soaked line. If so we are likely to see some of the most terrific fighting of the whole war.

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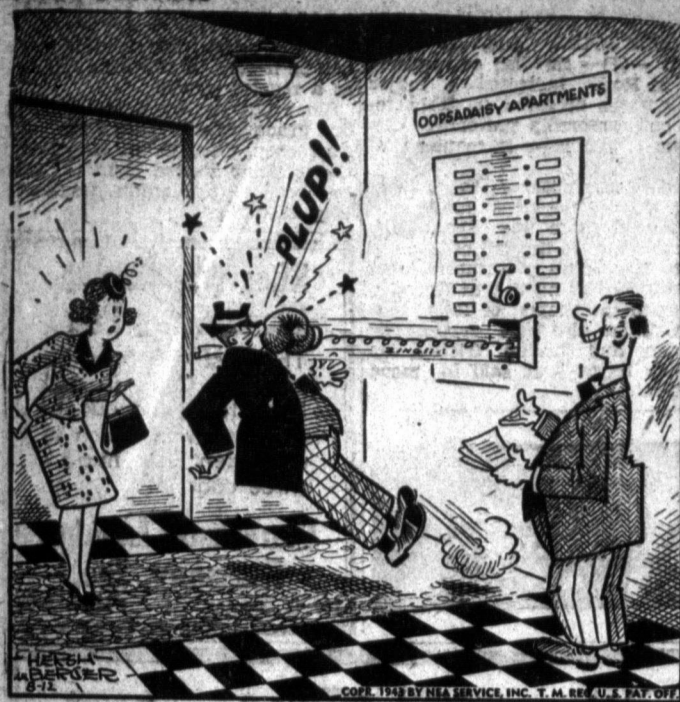

Formula Developed to Forecast Next Year's Wheat Crop Yield

A simple formula has been developed that will help Southern High Plains wheat farmers forecast next year's yields and to take advantage of favorable seasonal conditions or to forestall soil erosion hazards when they plan for fall wheat sowings in an effort to meet expanded acreage goals set by the war food administration.

H. H. Fennell, research specialist of the war food administration soil conservation service of Amarillo, extracted the formula from records on 901 wheat farms in soil conservation demonstration projects, and he said it has worked successfully "hundreds of times under a wide variation of seasonal and soil conditions."

"These effects do not hold good, however, above 5 inches of July rainfall and 60 inches of soil moisture penetration," Fennell reminded, "for the reason that excessive quantities of moisture are not utilized by the crop with the same efficiency that moderate supplies are used."

Farmers can't do anything to increase the July rainfall, Fennell said, but they can use soil conservation practices to store more of the water in the soil.

"Although the two factors of July rainfall and fall soil moisture store account for only 41 percent of the total influence of factors determining the wheat yield, this is a sufficiently large proportion of the total of what it takes to make a crop," the research specialist said.

"There is no reason why wheat growers should not begin to take these factors into account in planning their crop management. Although such other factors as wind erosion, the date of planting, and the spring rainfall enter definitely into the increase of wheat yield, the amount of soil moisture present at sowing time is by far the most important single factor effecting the yield of grain."

Fennell said that a practical method of determining available soil moisture is to bore into the soil with an auger or to sink a posthole digger until the layer of soil too dry to ball up in the hand is reached; then measure the depth to which moisture has penetrated. This measurement he explained is sufficiently accurate to be used in the formula.

As to the rainfall records, an actual measurement in the immediate locality is more dependable; however, the Weather Bureau record at the nearest weather station can be used with a reasonable degree of accuracy providing it has been observed that the rains were approximately equal in size and number during the month in both localities.

"Try making a forecast," Fennell challenged, "and see how it comes out before accepting this method, and bear in mind that one out of three results may be expected to fall outside the range calculated. The two to one odds are not high, but where the necessity for gambling is admitted, it is better to have two to one odds in your favor than none at all. Advance information about your crop production possibilities can be used to increase war production with safety against erosion hazards."

As an example of the application of the formula, the research specialist said, "suppose the July rainfall was 3 inches and the soil was moist 42 inches deep, 3 times 2-1-3 equals 42 divided by 3 equals 14. 7 plus 14 minus 6-1-4 equals 14 3-4. Where these conditions exist the chances are two to one that the yield harvested the following year will range somewhere between 11 3-4 and 17 3-4 bushels per acre."

"Suppose the July rainfall was only 1-2 inches and the soil was moisted only a depth of 18 inches, by the same formula an average yield of 2 1-4 bushels would be expected, or the chances are two to one that the yield would be between 0 and 5 1-4 bushels."

His long experience in erosion control research and use of soil conservation practices has led Fennell to accept this formula of forecasting next year's wheat crop on the basis of this year's known conditions:

Multiply the number of inches of July rainfall by 2-1-3.

Divide the number of inches of depth of soil moisture penetration at wheat sowing time by 3.

Add these two values together and subtract 6 1-4.

The number obtained, Fennell declared, will be the average expected yield per acre in bushels of wheat, and, he added, the "chances are two to one that this average will be within three bushels of the actual yield harvested."

Skelly Honors Panhandle Man

S. H. Kammerer of Panhandle will be honored Saturday, August 21, with the W. G. Skelly award for superior achievement in agriculture. He will be presented with a \$100 War Bond, the Skelly "S" pennant, and other identifying insignia which constitute the award.

The neighbors of Kammerer, in recommending him to the selection committee, praise him as "a good farmer, a fine gentleman and a staunch American." He landed in Carson county 22 years ago and started, not "from scratch" but from \$400 below it. Now he owns 400 acres, with a modern farm home, and, renting 320 acres, is doing an outstanding job on the food production front.

He is a member of the Methodist church and for 12 years served as superintendent of the Community Sunday school. He is a Triple A committee member, member of the farm bureau and the wheat growers' association, United States crop reporter, member of the War Bond sales committee and of a committee to increase dairy production. He works with his neighbors, owns an ensilage cutter with three, a concrete mixer with two others, a combine with another, a threshing machine with another and a hay press with another three.

Mrs. Kammerer does her part. She is a member of the five different war program committees, and, besides her household work, cuts over 500 quarts of fruits and vegetables.

The son, Sewell, at 17 has already made a record as a Future Farmer of America. Starting in 1940, he has raised pigs and calves, successfully and profitably. His 7,500 pounds of Top cane seed raised in 1941 set this spring for 13 1/2 cents per pound. Half destroyed, his 19 acres of wheat last year but he harvested a 22-acre crop this year. His profits go into War Bonds and he himself now goes into air pilot training. Two daughters, Ella Mae and Hazel, have helped in the house, cared for the poultry and driven trucks. Ella Mae, now graduated from the University of Texas, is in war work in Houston, and Hazel continues as a junior in the university next fall.

The plan for recognizing and rewarding superior achievement in agriculture originated with W. G. Skelly, president of Skelly Oil company, who, in addition to being a producer, refiner and distributor of petroleum products, is also a farmer in his own right. His idea in sponsoring recognition for superior achievement in agriculture has a double purpose: first, to give recognition for the outstanding contribution that farmers are making to the nation's war effort; second, to stimulate further interest in the kind of intensive agricultural activity that will extract from the soil every possible ounce of the food needed to win the war and write the peace.

Military men agree that the time to hit this side of Germany is when the Nazi military machine is off-balance in the east.

Such timing it is noted would not only limit the reserves of men and munitions which the Germans could throw into counterattacks but would also weaken the resistance to the Russian advances and prove a powerful factor in keeping the Red armies rolling.

This latter purpose apparently is the motivation behind the latest hue and cry in Moscow for a "second front." The line taken by the army newspaper Red Star is that the struggle for Sicily had failed to divert "a single German division from the Soviet front."

How far this reflected Premier Stalin's views, of course, was not known, but it was interpreted as suggesting a plea for help, an argument as to why the Allies want the German tide to continue against Germany they must act, and act soon. Whatever plans for invasion are in progress were made months ago, but it would be the function of the combined chiefs of staff and the conclusion that the prime minister here to determine the extent to which these plans could be speeded up in order to take full advantage of the present situation.

When their directives are shaped they will, as has been customary in the past, be communicated with all possible speed to Stalin.

There is considerable belief that the highly important task of courier has been delegated to British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, who arrived yesterday.

Government Offers To Sell FSA Projects

DALLAS, August 19—(P)—The government is trying to sell its Farm Security Administration projects to farmers, with complete liquidation by next June.

Hugh McLaughlin, associate director of the management division of the nation's FSA office in Cincinnati, explained this yesterday at a conference of FSA supervisors from Texas and Oklahoma.

He said these federally-owned lands—handed down to FSA from the old state rehabilitation corporations through the resettlement administration—had been under a long-range program for liquidation for almost two years but that congress had pressed for more speed.

Project managers have become real estate salesmen and if present tenant farmers on the projects are not willing or able to buy the land it will have to be sold at auction to the highest bidder, McLaughlin said.

Projects in Texas are located in Houston, Fannin, McLennan, Sabine, Wichita and Hockley counties.

Heath, who had walked a two-run homer in the first inning, also hit a triple and a single in the second game to bat in a total of seven runs for the day.

Allied Money Only Supplements Sicily's

WASHINGTON, August 19.—(AP)—The Allied military currency introduced in the occupation of Sicily was said by authorities to be intended merely to supplement the island's own currency, with which it will be equally acceptable "in every respect."

Explaining that the money—half of in some quarters as a blueprint for monetary aspects of future United Nations offensives—was issued under authority of international rather than American law, a joint treasury-war department announcement declared:

"It should be noted that in contrast with Axis procedure, which

is governed by a policy of exploitation or of outright destruction of the existing economy of a conquered area, Allied military policy and procedure is governed by a spirit of liberation and a policy of rehabilitation and fair dealing with the liberated peoples."

Pointing to the obligation of an occupying authority to maintain an adequate exchange medium in order to protect local trade and thereby secure public order, the announcement said the Allies had to be in a position to meet a "variety of conditions."

"In all cases," the announcement said, "complete records are being kept and a detailed accounting procedure has been set up in connection with the issuance and use of this currency. These complete records will also facilitate the adjustment of financial matters growing out of the military operations of the Allied forces in the occupied area."

Famous Wrong Quotes

NEW YORK, August 19.—(AP)—In the tirades of Axis leaders and propaganda broadcasts as recently as May of this year, Sicily could never have been invaded by the Allies. It was "impregnable." Here are some things they said about it:

Mussolini, at Palermo, August 20, 1937—"You have seen with your own eyes the military apparatus grow up that protects the island on land, on sea and in the air. It would be sheer madness to think of an invasion of the island. Nobody will land here—not a single soldier."

Radio Zeelen, August 14, 1942—"Once and for all the Mediterranean has ceased to be a passage—let alone a playing ground—for Anglo-Saxon warships and convoys."

Kaltenbach on Radio Zeelen, August 14, 1942—"To fight overseas wars Roosevelt must rely on merchant shipping, and it is these that the U-boats intend to sink faster than they can be built."

Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, August 16, 1942—"The united forces of the Axis are on watch in the Mediterranean. They guarantee that every future desperate action of the British in the Mediterranean will be doomed to failure."

Transocean, Jan. 7, 1943—"Sicily has been turned into an impregnable fortress."

German Broadcast to Denmark, May 24, 1943—"It is unlikely that the Allies will make their first in-

vasion attempt in Sicily because Sicily is probably the best defended of the islands and supplies are comparatively easy across the narrow Messina Straits."

Messina History One Of Tragedy, Defeat

(By The Associated Press) Messina, battered doorstep to the Italian mainland, which American forces entered today, has a history of tragedy and defeat.

Earthquakes, plagues and battling armies have swept over and around it for a period of time longer than the Christian era. It sheltered pirates of the ancient world and knew the sound of marching feet of Garthaginians, Romans, Saracens and Normans.

Its greatest tragedy occurred on Dec. 28, 1908, when one of the most disastrous earthquakes ever recorded destroyed the city, killing approximately 84,000 persons.

In the present war it was repeatedly rocked by Allied bombers that blasted its harbor facilities to retard the movement of Axis forces between Sicily and the Italian mainland.

Approximately 40,000 of the city's inhabitants were killed by plague in 1743, and the city was partly destroyed by earthquake in 1783. In 1854 cholera brought death to 15,000.

Garibaldi landed in Sicily in 1800, and Messina was the last city on the island taken from the Bourbons and made a part of United Italy.

MADRID, Aug. 17.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Dispatches from La Linea today said that three Allied airplane carriers and six gunboats had left Gibraltar for the Mediterranean this morning while 25 merchantmen under convoy departed in the direction of the Atlantic.

Two cruisers and eight gunboats remained in Gibraltar harbor while an American tanker, carrying 14 planes on its decks, entered the port, the advices said.

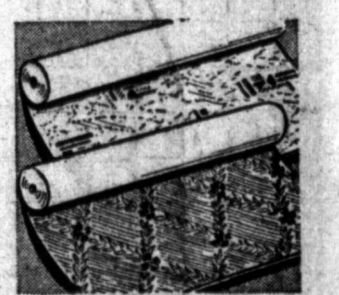

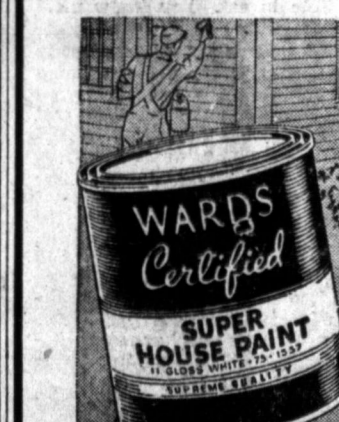

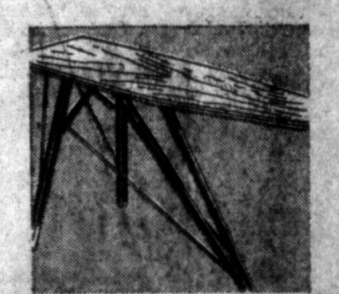
