





Charges Against OPA

The charges of Lou R. Maxon, former OPA deputy administrator, that the OPA is filled "confusion, indecision, compromise, red tape, young lawyers, professors and slide rule theorists" can be considered news only insomuch as it is the word of one who has been on the inside of the government agency.

This paper, as well as hundreds of others throughout the country have reiterated this information time and again. This paper has opposed the Office of Price Administration and its workings because the OPA has been, from the start, a governmental device that attempted to do away with free enterprise and was set up in violation of the natural law of supply and demand.

So long as we in America continue, through our governmental agencies, to ignore the natural laws under which free enterprise must operate. just so leng will we become more and more confused. We cannot agree with Mr. Maxon that the OPA needs "a drastic reorganization." The OPA can only be successful if the law of supply and demand is recognized and if such recognition is given then there can be no need or use for the

The former OPA administrator is right in his contention that the apparent determination of the government to force grade labelling onto industry in this country "presents the greatest threat to American industry and our way of life that ever existed because it is without question the spearhead in a drive to eliminate brands, trade marks and eventually free enterprise.'

The steps toward the elimination of free enterprise by doing away with brand names are easy to follow. If a manufacturer is no longer able to make his product distinguishable from that of his competitors, he has lost the incentive for bettering the product. Why try to improve and make cheaper the product, he says in effect, when the consumer has no way of knowing whose product it is? The portion of the profits now being made will no longer be turned back into improvement of the product and in research for new products since there is no reason for attempting to better the merchandise. This can only mean, in the long run, that the consumer gets less and less for his money until he refuses to buy the product. Then the manufacturer can no longer remain in business and "the government is obliged to take over" and free enterprise is gone.

WAGE EARNERS' DEBT TO SCIENCE

(L. A. Times—By Halbert P. Gillette)

This article is a salute to science, made in behalf of all American wage earners to contribute to a better understanding of the major source of their unequaled prosperity.

The present need of such an article was brought forcefully to my attention by the recent publication of quite a different essay by one who has quite a different conception of the cause of American high wages. In his last chapter, after mentioning our natural resources and free institutions as factors, Wendell Willkie attributed the main cause of our great prosperity to mass production in a populous country free from internal trade barriers, such as tariff walls between our 48 States. Not even by so much as a hint did he attribute the widely envied income of American workers to our inventors and the scientists back of the inventions. Yet a study of economic history clearly shows that we owe our nation-wide prosperity primarily to those very

The Reason Back of It

Had Willkie spent a fraction as much time reading scientific history as he has evidently spent reading political history, he would have made no such mistake. The same holds true of union labor leaders like Green, Lewis and Murphy. It is said that a doctor who specializes in one e can always find symptoms of it in the healthiest man. Certainly that is true of both political and labor union "doctors," for the olitician always prescribes more political pills. and the union leader nearly always prescribes strong massaging of the employer, with a few bone-breakings for good measure

To throw a spotlight on Willkie's ignorance of what American workers owe to scientists and inventors, no better selection can be made than source of his own great income when he was president of an electric power company. What made that income possible? Cheap electric power sold, like cheap motorcars, in great volume to millions of Americans. Who first made possible cheap electric power? Michael Faraday, who, about a century ago, was bending anxiously over a magnet while moving a loop of copper wire across it. Common Ground

IS THE APOSTLES CREED HELPFUL OR HARMFUL?

A reader inquires "what is there so sinful in the Apostles Creed?"

If the reader means by sin things that are harmful to society, then I think this question should be answered. The harm that comes from repeating the Apostles Creed is that it attempts to mix dogmas, superstition and blind irrational faith in hearsay statements which eternal principles, the compliance to which are absolutely necessary for the development of the individual. And blind faith and principles will not mix. They are like the Gresham Law of Money: the bad money drives out the good. And since the church should contain Christian men of principle, men ceaselessly seeking to understand and obey God's laws, any practice that drives them out is harmful. It causes men like Jefferson, Lincoln, Emerson, Whitman and Burbank, all of whom were seekers of the truth, to stay out of the church. And the world really needs a church that has men in it who are absolutely dependable, who are attempting to live by impersonal rules and are constantly seeking to understand the truth. This kind of a church with men in it, like the above, could do much to lead our country and the world out of its precarious position.

The Apostles Creed and principles do not mix. Often as young people grow up in the church where the Apostles Creed is used and later come not to believe in it they then also often come not to believe in the necessity of obeying the eternal principles as set forth in the Commandments. They walk away from the whole thing.

The people who profess to blindly believe things that are contrary to all human experience drive out of the church those people who believe in a God of order, just as bad money, under the Gresham Law, drives out the good money.

EFFECT OF BAD LAWS ON GOOD BUSINESS MEN

Every New Deal law rests on the principle that honest business cannot compete with dishonest business. They seem to think that the honest business man who treats his help fairly cannot compete with dishonest men who lie to employes and customers. So we make law after law under the pretext that it is necessary to protect the honest business man.

In every case, men with equal ability, the honest man, can always compete with a dishonest man. In other words, it pays to be decent and

But when the government makes laws that make classes out of society and favors the crooks, then these discriminatory laws intended to help the good people, drive the good men out of business. The same principle works here, as the fact that bad money drives out good money. Under discriminatory laws, the cheat, the man whose word is of no value, has a decided advantage over the honest man. They eventually break the honest man, just as bad money drives out good money under Gresham's Law of Money.

All we need are laws that protect all people in their equal rights to pursue happiness on the same terms. And the good business man will eventually drive out the dishonest business man. People can be their own judge as to which man is serving them best. Any man who attempts to serve them by trickery and deception might appear to prosper for a little while, but he never can succeed for long. The honest man will "entually take his business.
