**Americans Punch Swiftly Through Korea Mountains** 

## **Communists Using** Hit-And-Run Move

TOKYO -(AP)- Tank-led American forces punched swiftly up the mountainnous spine of central Korea late today and occupied freshly vacated Red foxholes overlooking Hoengsong, key Communist defense point.

The twin U.S. spearheads were setting the pace for the owerful allied offensive that shoved ahead virtually unopposed all along the muddy 60-mile front,

Brief but bitter Red ressitance was met in some sectors earlier today. This indicated the Communists are using fight-and-run tactics against the 100,000-man United Nations Red-killer drive.

AP Correspondent Stan Swinton reported American forces advancing on Hoengsong in the middle sector of the front were within a mile and a quarter of the burned-out town. The push carried four miles.

"American soldiers occupied foxholes dug by the Communists for themselves while tanks and dive bombers dropped tons of missiles into the town," Swinton reported from outside Hoengsong. "At dusk, the American tanks and troops pulled back slightly Call In Probe to make themselves secure for

## **Requirements For Draft May Be Cut**

WASHINGTON -(AP)- The House Armed Services Committee has tentatively approved legislation which would require the Army to accept physically fit draft age men whether or not they can read or write.

The proposal was included in a compromise military manpower bill Committee Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) introduced yesterday. The committee spent nearly three weeks in closed session rewriting a bill urged by the defense department.

The Pentagon wanted 18-year-olds brought into the military man-power program. The committee's ompromise calls for induction at 18<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> and requires four months basic training. It also proposes return to the
