Open Bidding Asked On World Airlines

BOSTON, August 20 — (AP) — Capt. Otis F. Bryan, vice president of Transcontinental and Western Air, Inc., declared today that airlines executives who recently adopted a five-point declaration of policy on international post war transportation were "inflexibly opposed to any system of monopoly which would stifle efforts of domestic operators to expand beyond the continental limits of the United States." Bryan, who flew President Roosevelt part of the way to the historic Casablanca conference, said that some critics of the program "would have us believe that we are advocating in the first fundamental air 'freedom' a system of cut-throat competition akin to the wildcatting that beset the earlier days of the American bus industry. "That is not true. All we are advocating is the right for all United States operators to bid for the world air routes which agencies of this government some day will approve." The five-point program adopted in Washington by presidents of 16 domestic airlines called for: Free and open world wide competition, subject to reasonable regulation by the appropriate governmental agencies, private ownership and management; fostering and encouraging by the government of the United States of sound world wide air transportation system, free transit in peaceful flight—world wide, and acquisition of civil and commercial outlets required in public interest. —BUY VICTORY STAMPS—

If Pampa Field Men Suffer Breakdowns, They May Go to Former Girls' Camp in Texas Hills

Designed to bridge the gap between hospitalization and return to the rigors of army life, Camp Mystic, once an exclusive girls' camp, at Hunt, Texas, has been converted into the first military rest camp in the army air forces Gulf coast training center, according to Col. Daniel S. Campbell, commanding officer at Pampa Field.

The camp, which has a capacity of 200 patients—officers, aviation cadets and enlisted personnel—is situated in the bracing hill country of central Texas. The patients are sent here on the recommendation of their station commanders and with the approval of headquarters Gulf coast training center.

First arrivals, most of them pallid from long illness, came to the camp early in August to be assigned bunks in the screen-walled cabins which cling to the limestone sides of wooded hills. Shaded by huge cypress trees, the cabins offer cool

Food Sanitation Vital in Fight Against Polio

(Editor's Note: This is the second of a series of articles written for the purpose of giving the public information on how to prevent poliomyelitis and other diseases by sanitary measures. They are based on theories, but are measures which have been proved in actual practice by communities and especially by the armed forces.)

By MAJOR MORTON W. ADLER, Post Surgeon.

Pampa Army Air Field. Poliomyelitis, like many intestinal diseases, may be contacted if food becomes contaminated with germs or with the virus that causes poliomyelitis. It has been proved that some people may be carriers of the polio virus and intestinal disease germs and these are deposited with body wastes into sewage systems.

- 1. Keep lids down on toilet seats so that flies are kept out.
- 2. Wash all raw foods, fruits, and vegetables thoroughly before use.
- 3. Keep all perishable foods well refrigerated until ready to be cooked or eaten. Do not leave any food in the open. If necessary, cover with a clean towel or wrap in waxed paper.
- 4. Hands should be thoroughly washed after each visit to the toilet and before eating.
- 5. Do not put food on the table until just before it is ready to be eaten.
- 6. Eliminate all open sewers and have leaking sewage pipes repaired immediately.
- 7. Be sure to thoroughly wash ice to be used in beverages and drinks.

Wallace Amends Business Talk

WASHINGTON, August 20—(P)—Vice President Wallace has declared that his recent criticism of corporations was aimed only at the small minority.

Wallace called in newsmen to declare that a recent speech in Detroit, in which he accused some big corporations of monopolistic practices, had been "misunderstood and misinterpreted" as a general attack on the corporate form of business organization.

Declaring such an implication definitely was not his intent, he said:

"95 to 98 per cent of the corporations are harmless or beneficent, and suffer just as much from the small minority as any other group in the population."

And for that 95 to 98 per cent, Wallace expressed this wish: "God bless 'em if they can make profits."

The corporate form of organization, he declared, "is essential in a Democratic country like the United States for efficient carrying on, not only of large scale business, but also many types of small business."

Wallace said the corporations "which need to be watched most closely are those which move in international trade, and those which enter international cartels respecting markets, prices and the use of inventions."

"These corporations," he said, "are often interested in getting subsidies from their government and therefore are especially in need of controlling government. They move in foreign affairs and therefore are interested in the state department or foreign office. To make money, they enter into arrangements with foreign corporations and foreign governments."

Pension Meeting Set for Aug. 24

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 20—(P)—Representatives of state departments of public welfare will meet federal government officials in Washington, D. C., Aug. 24, and will present plans for continued operation of the old age assistance program in conformity with the federal law, James B. Marley, social security board director for region 10, announced here today.

An informal conference was held in Gov. Coke Stevenson's office in Austin Wednesday, Marley said, to make provisional plans for reconciling the different interpretations of state and federal laws.

Chief point of difference, Marley said, is the federal requirement that old age assistance be paid according to individual needs, while the state law, as recently interpreted by the state's attorney general, would allow recipients to earn other income up to \$250 a year, regardless of need.

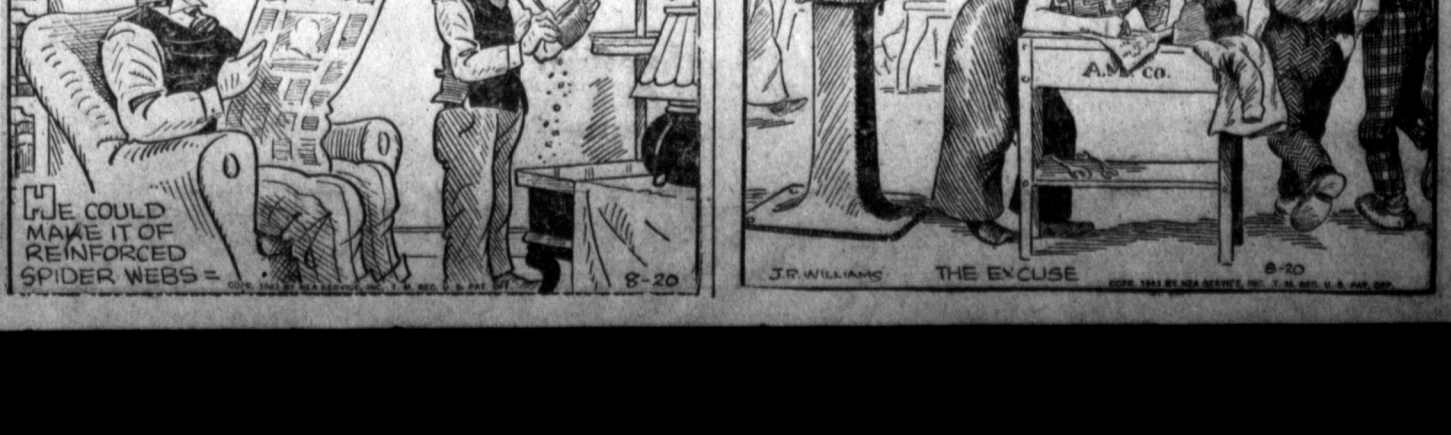
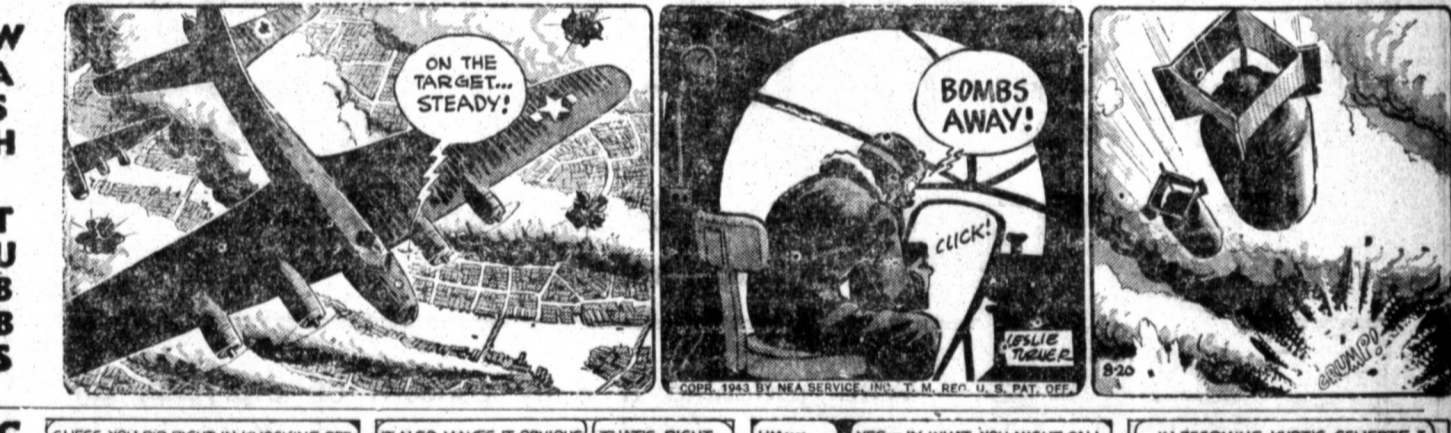

The Polish government-in-exile here, disclosing the existence of these forces, said their nucleus was formed by survivors of the Polish army which nearly was wiped out when the Nazis stormed through Poland in September, 1939.

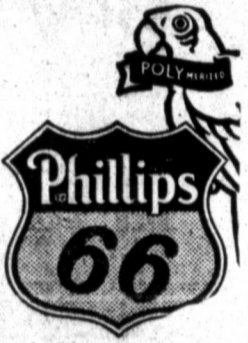
