FDR Calls on Nation, Allies To Help Deliver Final Blow

WASHINGTON, July 29—(AP)—Reporting Italy on the ropes, Germany blackened by bombs, and Japan losing the initiative in the Pacific, President Roosevelt called on the American people and their Allies today to follow through with the knockout punch that spells "total victory."

The chief executive, reporting to the nation on the war effort abroad and at home for the first time in almost six months, told a radio audience last night that:

1—The United Nations may not take time to gloat over the downfall of Dictator Benito Mussolini and the obvious plight of Italy, but must go on to demand unconditional surrender. Then Japan and Germany must be whipped on their home grounds.

Then he said that the United States should always be "glad to be a good neighbor and a sincere friend" to Russia which "in saving itself is thereby helping to save all the world from the Nazi menace."

His reference to ill-starred Mussolini was brief, but pointed. The Duce and his fascist gang will be brought to book and punished for their crimes," the president declared.

"We will have no truck with fascism—we will permit no vestige of it to remain."

"We are helping the Italian people in Sicily" and will continue to help Italians reconstitute their government as they wish. There will be no pillage or starvation—conquered peoples will be restored to the dignity of human beings entitled to freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom from want, freedom from fear."

"If that is 'crazy altruism or starry-eyed dreaming,'" Mr. Roosevelt said he was "sorry."

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"We are pushing the Japanese from the Aleutians to New Guinea. We have taken the initiative and we are not going to let go of it. The Japs have lost more planes and more ships than they have been able to replace."

Mexico Cites Discrimination Among Texans

MEXICO CITY, July 29—(AP)—The Mexican government will send farm workers to Texas fields if the government of that state will carry out measures to eliminate discriminations against Mexicans, Foreign Minister, Esequiel Padilla said in a letter to Texas' governor Coke Stevenson.

Padilla answered a letter in which Stevenson asserted his state's "urgent necessity" for Mexican workers.

The foreign minister declared that despite the friendship between Mexico and the United States "it is indispensable to call your attention to the concrete situation in Texas."

He listed a series of discriminations he said were practiced against Mexicans and continued:

"What are the remedies to solve this conflict? Laws, propaganda and punishments. If these measures could be carried out at once, we would contribute to the eliminations of the evils which gravely menace the relations of our peoples."

"In these conditions, I believe the government of Mexico would agree with genuine satisfaction to the co-operation of our workers in Texas fields, to which they would go with the same enthusiasms they show for work in other states of the North American union."

Gov. Stevenson, in a letter dated July 12, told Padilla that it had been reported the Mexican government "in view of the unjust distinctions which possibly exist against Mexicans resident in this state," was thinking of refusing to send farm workers to Texas.

No formal request for such workers has been made to the Mexican government by the U. S. farm security administration which has sent some 33,000 workers to other U. S. states. However, it has been reported that Texas needed many farm hands for harvest work.

The Texas governor's letter continued by saying that he was doing all possible to erase whatever distinctions exist.

Nueces and San Patricio counties, Stevenson said, are faced with the possible loss of the largest cotton crops in recent years if they do not obtain 17,000 workers.

The governor added that he would be sorry to see Mexico refuse to send workers to Texas because "my government is making a sincere effort to eliminate unjust distinctions. Also, he urged it be ordered that all law enforcement agencies to be "especially on the alert to impede distinctions against Mexicans and to act sternly to make sure such violations of the good neighbor policy are not repeated."

He called attention to the number of Mexicans who live happily and content in Texas, and said all complaints by Mexico of discrimination "either have been happily settled or are on their way to being settled." He also referred to the efforts being made by the state to solve the educational problems of Mexican children.

The governor also asked Padilla to advise Mexican consuls to give direct, unofficial reports to the governor's office whenever cases of discrimination were reported. He then listed three steps he had taken to eliminate discrimination: A public address to the Texans asking them to wipe out racial prejudice; studies looking toward the appointment of a special commission to investigate racial clashes; and orders to all law enforcement agencies to take civil action in case of prejudice if the case could not be covered by the penal law.

Padilla replied: "In many cases Mexican residents are not allowed in theaters and cannot go to honorable amusement places without annoyances, censure, criticisms and protests."

"There are cities in which my compatriots have to meet only in certain sections. Not even the families of official representatives are safe from persecution or improper molestations. Not a week ago the son of our consul in an important Texas city was refused service in a public establishment, solely because he spoke Spanish to a Mexican girl who accompanied him. Such incidents happen daily."

Reports of such discrimination, he added, transmitted by Mexican newspapers and the frontier population have "created a just feeling of resentment."

Over 50 percent of the underplanting of permitted acreage occurred in Texas, Georgia and Oklahoma.

The 1943 national AAA cotton allotment was about 27,200,000 acres but a 10 percent increase was authorized later, bringing the permitted acreage to about 30 million acres.

The cotton acreage estimate for this year not only is 8 million below the permitted acreage but is also nearly a million and a half acres under the acreage in cultivation on July 1, 1942.

Termination of the marketing quotas, WFA officials said, will have no effect on the cotton loan program, which will continue unchanged for the 1943-44 marketing season. Nor will the termination of marketing quotas affect the basis on which payments will be made to farmers under the 1943 agricultural conservation program.

Tokyo Hopes For More Vessels

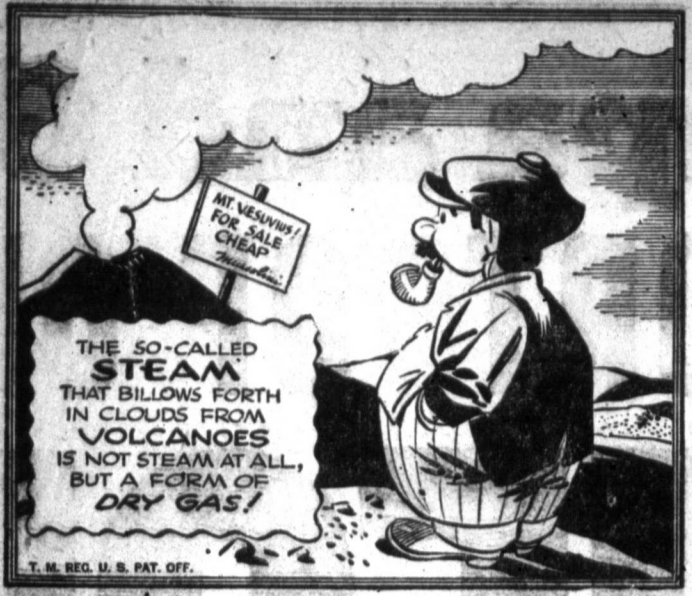

Petrillo Plans Concerts For Small Towns
NEW YORK, July 29—(AP)—A plan to present small town concerts by the country's leading symphony orchestras has been announced by James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians (AFM).

Petrillo said the union had authorized expenditure of \$250,000—and double that "if it is found necessary"—to send big city orchestras to small towns to present free concerts.

The plan, he said, was first suggested to him at a White House meeting last Dec. 29 by President Roosevelt, who, Petrillo added, "was very concerned that the people in the smaller cities were not getting enough first class concert music, especially during wartime."

All expenses would be paid by the AFM, said Petrillo, who estimated that 570 concerts could be staged if the entire \$500,000 is spent.

Petrillo announced that symphony orchestras of the following major cities would participate in the program—

Los Angeles, San Francisco, Washington, Chicago, Baltimore, Detroit, Minneapolis, Kansas City, St. Louis, New York, Rochester, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Philadelphia, Boston, Pittsburgh, and Indianapolis.

On a lesser scale, he said, orchestras from other cities including Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, San Antonio and Waco, Tex., are expected to take part.

Air Invasion Of Sicily Is Told in U. S.

WASHINGTON, July 29—(AP)—The boys in the ankle-high boots slid down out of the skies over Sicily, crawled through the brush to take on tanks with their rifles, and then—bringing up air-borne bazookas, howitzers and machine guns—blocked a Nazi panzer unit cold for 30 hours.

Thus the paratroopers closed the gap between the First and 45th Divisions on Sicilian sands and held the Allied invasion line solid between beachheads. The story of how they did it was told by Major General Joseph P. Swing who was there. And, during the press conference after his return to Washington, he said:

"We landed them by the thousands in Sicily, and we hope to land them by the tens of thousands next time." Swing said the 15th German panzer division was stalling between the landings at Gela and Scoglitti, to split the invading forces, when "the largest simultaneous airborne effort ever undertaken" parachuted down in its pathway, about six miles inland. Sharpshooters from the tank slits to pick off drivers, the troopers waited until the giant 60-ton Mark VI's were only 50 yards away. Then they cut loose with 75 mm. howitzers, bazookas and machine guns and turned them back.

The general said courage was the success secret of this original paratroop combat team which held the line until it was reinforced by glider troops, additional paratroopers and heavier equipment. Jeeps and 37 mm. anti-tank guns came in on the gliders, until the entire 82nd airborne division was in action as an infantry unit between the two beach-landing divisions, he said.

Commander of the 11th airborne division, Swing went to Africa as advisor on American airborne operations to General Sir Harold R. L. G. Alexander, ground force commander of the Sicilian invasion.

Soldiers Who Died of Thirst Are Identified

CAMP YOUNG, Calif., July 29—(AP)—Army authorities disclosed the names today of the three infantrymen who perished of thirst while on maneuvers in a trackless desert waste, and drew a sketchy picture of the wanderings of their 35 comrades, all but one of whom eventually reached safety.

Dear are Private Charles Henry Nash, whose wife, Mary E. Nash, lives at Atlanta, Ga.; Sgt. Robert J. Powers, whose nearest relative is Mrs. Lillian Powers, Trenton, N. J.; and Capt. Julius Ortega, son of Manuel Ortega, New York City. The army intelligence officer did not know whether Mrs. Powers was the sergeant's wife or mother.

The platoon became lost in a wild expanse of the torrid southern California-Arizona desert, said an intelligence officer who refused to be quoted by name, and their water supply ran out. The lieutenant in command, whose name was not disclosed, set out after water, and en route met a messenger who was bringing a fresh supply.

The lieutenant was gone "a not unreasonable length of time," the intelligence officer said, but when he returned four men had straggled away. The three men were found, dead of thirst and exposure to the merciless desert sun.

The fourth man, whose identity was not disclosed, is still missing. By the time the platoon reached civilization, at an unidentified place, most of the men were suffering from exhaustion and the heat. They were sent to Yuma, Ariz., to recuperate.

The troopers became lost from their supply depot Saturday in the remote Ogilby area, near the Rocky Chocolate mountains, a rugged range of hills some 30 miles northeast of El Centro, Calif.

It developed today that six exhausted soldiers who followed down a Southern Pacific train at a way station were not members of the lost platoon.

Tourists Not Included in Order

MEXICO CITY, July 29—(AP)—Foreign tourists are not required to observe Mexico's regulation prohibiting the use of private cars one day a week, the national economy department ruled yesterday.

The ruling came at the request of the federal tourist office, which reported that many tourists have been detained for not observing the rubber saving regulation.
