



### No Other City Equalled That Of Naples in Welcoming Allies

WITH THE AMERICAN FIFTH ARMY IN NAPLES, Oct. 1 (Delayed)—Naples is a city with its hand out.

It is a beggar city of almost a million people without water and without food, except scraps for a week. They have been thirsty so long they have forgotten they are hungry too.

The city is perhaps the largest that has been completely and scientifically paralyzed, in the days when the Neapolitans were enemies. Allied bombers wrecked havoc on the dock and warehouse areas covering the harbor with the battered hulks of Axis naval and cargo vessels.

Then when Italy capitulated the Germans laid their plans to bring Naples to its knees, exacting vengeance from the men, women and children there to save their own wounded vanity. With tough and shell they systematically destroyed all remaining communication systems, blew up power feeder plants and smashed what remained of the water supply system. There were no lights.

Civil war broke out when they tried to draft 30,000 young Italians for forced labor in North Italy and the Reich. For seven days machine-gun and rifle fire swept the streets and the noise of exploding grenades echoed all day as the Germans moved about in squads seeking the Italians. The Germans dare not travel alone.

The inhabitants—pampered and the firing—ventured out only when unbearable thirst forced them to hunt broken water mains or dip into stinking sewers. Often they were caught in the cross fire in street battles. Sometimes nervous Nazis took no chances and mowed them down without warning. Bodies lay in the streets for hours. For days the wounded lay in their blood. Some died.

Still the Germans could not shoot or stab the people into submission. The guerrilla bands grew in size and daring.

The British and Americans marched into a city festering with filth. They waded through narrow streets ankle deep in dirty papers and rotten orange peelings from which all the juice had been sucked.

They passed lines where women screamed, pulled each other's hair and fought with tooth and nail for a few drops of water dripping from a broken pump. Only in the center of the city had the wide streets been swept clean in a semblance of order.

The reception these scared dirty, thin, violently emotional people gave the Allied soldiers would melt the heart of Midas. To them the Allied occupation meant salvation and life no less. The people wept at Ferrville, Tunis and Bizerte in North Africa. They cried at Palermo, Catania and Messina in Sicily, but not with the same tired tears shed by these exhausted Neapolitans transported by deliverance from the Germans.

"You know we did not want to be in the war. Those who could speak English mumbled over and over, 'The leg of St. Thomas Studd, Paducah, Ky. dangled over the side of a jeep in which he was riding with Charles Corte, Washington, D. C. newspaper photographer.'

"An old woman began kissing my boot," he said. "Before I could pull it away she kissed it again and again. The people treated us like we were gods."

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### Workers Should Have Only One Security Card

More than one social security account number card in the possession of one individual should be avoided," according to Dewey Reed, manager of the Amarillo office of the social security board. The number on the card is the number of the individual's social security account. If the wage earner, Bill Doe, has two account number cards, two social security accounts have been established for him. When Bill Doe works under card number one his wages will be posted to account number one and when he uses card number two his wages will be posted to account number two.

"When Bill Doe's survivors file for insurance there is great danger that his two accounts may not be identified as belonging to the same individual, and the wages posted to one account might not be enough to give him an insured status. Bill's survivors might not receive any insurance payments or they might receive only a part of the insurance Bill had earned and paid for, all because Bill had taken out and used two different account numbers.

"No employee should ever have but one social security account. All of his wages throughout his entire lifetime should be posted to that account. Any employee who has been issued two cards with different numbers on them has had two accounts established. All such persons should contact the nearest office of the social security board, turn in all but one of their account number cards and request that all of their wages be posted to the account bearing the number on the card they keep.

"An employee who loses his account number card," Reed said, "should apply at the nearest office of the social security board for a duplicate showing the same number that appeared on his original card. Each employee should have one, and ONLY one, social security account number during his lifetime, and he should be sure that he has shown his card to each employer for whom he works. He should also know that each employer has accurately recorded his account number and his name. This is the best way to protect his old-age and survivors insurance. If his employer correctly reports all of his wages, his widow and children will be assured of the full amount of their survivors insurance in case of his death. He and his wife will likewise be sure of receiving the full amount of their retirement insurance."

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### Text of Allies' Joint Statement

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14—(AP)—The text of a joint statement by President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Joseph Stalin on the declaration of war by Italy against Germany follows:

The governments of Great Britain, the United States and the Soviet Union acknowledge the position of the royal Italian government as stated by Marshal Badoglio and accept the active cooperation of the Italian nation and armed forces as a co-belligerent in the war against Germany.

The military events since Sept. 8 and the brutal maltreatment by the Germans of the Italian population, culminating in the Italian declaration of war against Germany, have in fact made Italy a co-belligerent and the American, British and Soviet governments will continue to work with the Italian government on that basis.

The three governments acknowledge the Italian government's pledge to submit to the will of the Italian people after the Germans have been driven from Italy, and it is understood that nothing can detract from the absolute and untrammelled right of the people of Italy by constitutional means to decide on the democratic form of government they will eventually have.

The relationship of co-belligerency between the governments of Italy and the United Nations governments can not of itself affect the terms recently signed, which retain their full force and can only be adjusted by agreement between the Allied governments in the light of the assistance which the Italian government may be able to afford to the United Nations' cause.

### Revolutionary Compass Now Used by Allies

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 14—(AP)—Existence of a revolutionary new compass, which has been guiding United Nations bombers to their objectives and home again for months, was revealed today.

Charles Marcus, vice president in charge of engineering of Bendix Aviation Corporation, said the compass was the result of seven years of research by the company, and its existence can be revealed now because one or more of them have fallen into enemy hands.

"There is no possibility that the

enemy can catch up with us, however," he said, "because it will be impossible for them to duplicate the performance of this compass, much less get it into volume production during this war."

Marcus said the apparatus, known as the Gyro Flux Gate Compass,

uses the earth's magnetic field to develop minute electrical impulses which, when amplified, turn the compass indicator.

He added that the compass would not go off its reading in a dive or climb, will not "lay" or "overshoot" in a turn and will not oscillate in rough weather.

An advantage, Marcus said, is that no "correction card" is necessary, as it is with magnetic types, because the new compass gives fully corrected readings at all times.

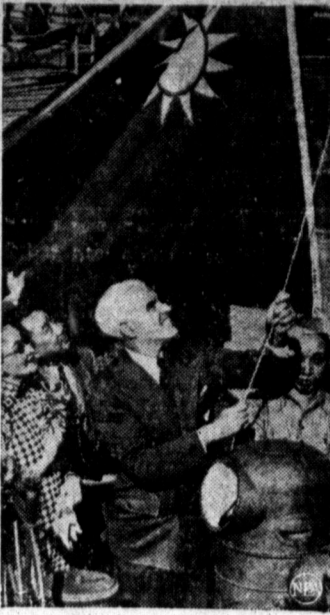

mortar and rifle fire and a heavy concentration of shells from their bigger guns back in the hills. But the Allied troops battled across the 100 to 200-yard river—some by swimming, some in assault boats and others in amphibious trucks.

Combat engineers who went into action with the assault forces, quickly established temporary bridges under fire as soon as infantry footholds had been gained on the north bank of the Voltorno, and tanks rushed across.

But the German divisions now in line were showing signs of extreme fatigue and their morale was bound to suffer, now that Clark had smashed the positions they perhaps hoped to make into a strong winter defense line just at the time the Russians were breaking down other winter defenses in the east along the Dnieper.

They seemed confronted, therefore, with the alternative of either attempting to bring south some of the divisions north of Rome, or of relinquishing the Italian capital and all the political prestige that goes with its retention.

### Armor-Piercing Projectiles Are Supplied Quickly

American invasion armies are being supplied by army ordnance with new armor-piercing projectiles that are designed to rip open Axis planes, tanks and other armored equipment and emplacements.

Lt. Col. R. M. Bacher, commanding Pantex ordnance plant, said today that this achievement repre-

sents a smashing production victory for an industry-ordnance team composed of top-flight steel producers, shell makers, war production board steel experts and hard driving ordnance department metallurgical engineers.

"When we started," Col. Bacher said, "we were definitely behind the eight ball. Today, we are outproducing the Axis with superior air and ground ammunition."

In order to meet huge production schedules, Col. Bacher said, two factors influenced the selection of both design and steel used. For many years, manufacturers of ordnance had been producing armor-piercing projectiles of large caliber—8 to 16 inches—for the navy. This backlog of knowledge was combined with the results of basic research conducted in army ordnance armories to produce the new shells. The steels selected were of the same high alloy types previously used in

the large navy shells. But as soon as major production problems had been straitjacketed out, the tonnage of steel being consumed threatened to exhaust stock piles of critical alloys. The ordnance department, army service forces, was therefore directed to study the reduction of alloys used in the shells for armor-piercing projectiles, keeping in mind that high military characteristics must not be reduced.

This ordnance order started a long and energetic search for suitable low alloy steels. Steel producers, shell makers, metallurgical societies, WPB steel experts and the ordnance department pooled their vast resources and rolled up their sleeves. The work of the civilian group, including their expenses and the cost of producing experimental projectiles, was contributed gratis to the army ordnance department.

"Although the availability of various alloys changed several times," Col. Bacher said, "the development

was rushed until a superior triple alloy steel formula was found. The new ordnance projectiles for air and ground invasion forces are far in advance of similar Nazi projectiles and can blast open Nazi plane and tank armor. In addition to having high military characteristics, these new projectiles will conserve tremendous quantities of virgin alloys, which constitute a saving of the natural resources of our country.

"Industry-ordnance teamwork has provided United Nations armies with countless lethal keys to Hitler's European fortress."

Army ordnance's armored vehicles now in production are based on exhaustive studies of the turtle. "Myrtle the Turtle" taught ordnance engineers the essential lesson of firestreaming.

Lt. Col. R. M. Bacher, commanding Pantex ordnance plant, said today that "we wanted our tanks, tank destroyers and motorized artillery to shed enemy projectiles as easily as the horny shell of the turtle sheds a horse's hoof. That's firestreaming."

Firestream design thus sheds missiles as effectively as streamlining, applied to the family automobile, sheds the invisible but very real barrier of air.

Remarkable as they were, our earlier models of armored vehicles are today no more than a gleam in the dark when compared to the powerful new firestreamed weapons of terrifying firepower which are now blasting the Axis in Europe and the Southwest Pacific.

The exposed surfaces of the new vehicles present a minimum area to direct fire. The slope of the armor at all points provides a maximum turtle-like slant or curve so that enemy shells will bounce off harmlessly or with a minimum of damage.

"Automobile streamlining facilities smooth air flow," Col. Bacher said, "while ordnance firestreaming, borrowed from the turtle, produces projectile ricochet. 'Myrtle the Turtle' is now wearing an army ordnance service ribbon."

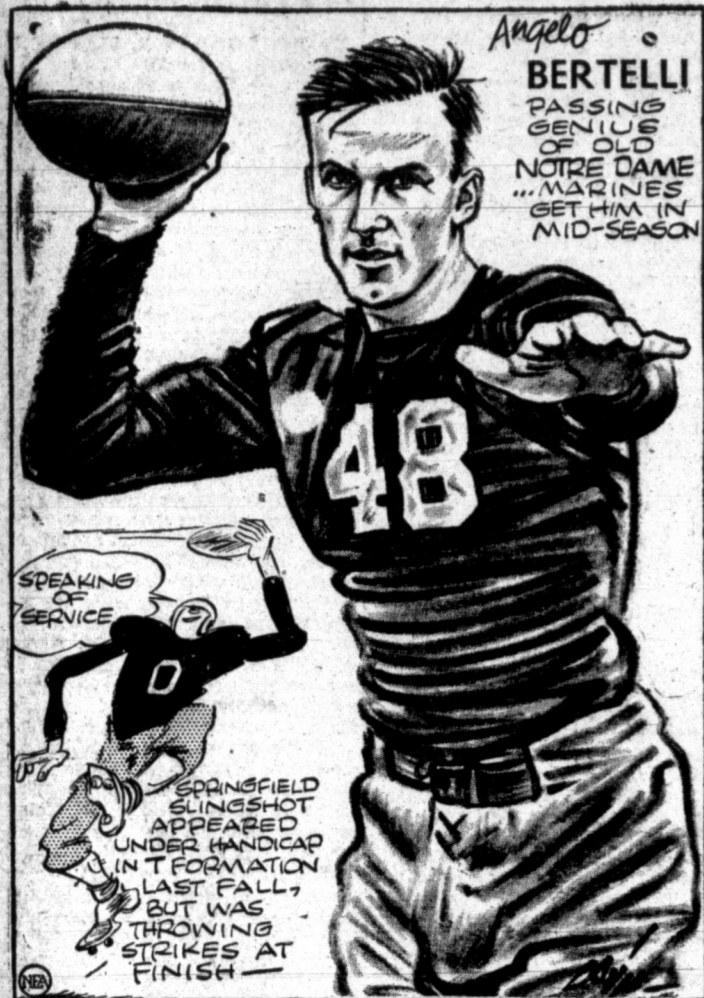

## Soviets to Center On Nazi Defeat

MOSCOW, Oct. 14—(AP)—In the first announcement here that the tri-power conference would be held in Moscow, the Communist party organ Pravda let the world know today the Soviets do not intend to discuss frontiers or the status of the Baltics, declaring firmly that the second front and complete defeat of Hitler is the question before the meeting.

"It should be known to everyone," Pravda said, "that the borders of the Soviet union could no more serve as a subject of discussion than, for instance, the borders of the United States or the status of California."

In an editorial, Pravda also replied and commented on some questions appearing in the foreign press which stated that political questions would be uppermost on the agenda when the foreign secretaries shortly sit down across the conference table in Moscow.

"The New York Times and many other American papers say political and not military questions will be the main item before the conference, particularly questions regarding the post-war organization of Europe," said the editorial. "These papers forget at the present moment the main task of the United Nations is to hasten the advent of the post-war period more rapidly."

## Germans Short On Troops in Yugoslavia

LONDON, Oct. 14—(AP)—Germany has discovered that she has insufficient soldiers in Yugoslavia to hold the patriot armies at bay and has been forced to send in large reinforcements, a Yugoslav liberation army communique said today.

Troops that are badly needed in Italy and elsewhere along the Mediterranean front have been ordered by the German high command to all sectors of Yugoslavia, particularly around Susak, Karlovac, Zagreb and Debno, declared a war bulletin broadcast by the Free Yugoslav radio.

The communique said that around these cities the Germans have concentrated sufficient strength to open an offensive against the patriots. Bitter fighting has been reported in these areas for the past several days.

The Swiss radio, broadcasting reports from Yugoslavia, said that patriot forces had battled their way into the outskirts of the important city of Zagreb and that fierce fighting for possession of the city had begun. The Yugoslav communique, however, made no mention of fighting in the Zagreb environs.

Repeated attempts by German troops to recapture Tuzla, agricultural center 100 miles southwest of Belgrade, have been beaten off, the communique said.

In Slovenia, the Yugoslav bulletin declared, fierce fighting continues, with the partisans everywhere offering "stiff resistance" to well-equipped German forces.

## Prisoners to Work At Military Posts

DALLAS, Oct. 14—(AP)—Hundreds of German and Italian prisoners of war will be moved within the next 10 days into military posts for temporary labor, the eighth service command announced.

The prisoners, now stationed at permanent prisoner camps in the command, will be paid the established rate of 80 cents per day for work which is in keeping with provisions of the Geneva convention which forbids use of war prisoners in activities directly supporting the war effort, the command said yesterday. They will be used as carpenters, painters, automotive mechanics, masons, in various other types of work and in mosquito control and drainage.

Italian prisoners will be sent to Fort Bliss, El Paso. German prisoners will be moved to these other posts: Camp Wallace, Galveston; Camp Barkley, Abilene; Camp Wolters, Mineral Wells; Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio; Fort Sill, Okla., and Camp Claiborne, La.

## Low Countries Sign Money Pact

LONDON, Oct. 14—(AP)—The governments-in-exile of Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg have agreed on a tripartite monetary pact pegging the rate of exchange between the guilder and the franc in a move which may set an example for the development of "good neighbor" relations between other European countries after the war.

Officials of the three governments were expected to set official seals to the agreement within a week and perhaps sooner, but in advance of signing no intimation was given as to what rate of exchange would be fixed.

Out of the monetary agreement was expected to come wide postwar trade agreements among the countries involved, with the possibility of a customs union and even the relaxation of visa requirements among nationals.

The agreement wrapped up the "good neighbor" hopes expressed by Holland and Belgium in the original announcement of preliminary moves a fortnight ago. Since then Luxembourg has joined the negotiations, represented by Belgium. Luxembourg also uses the franc.

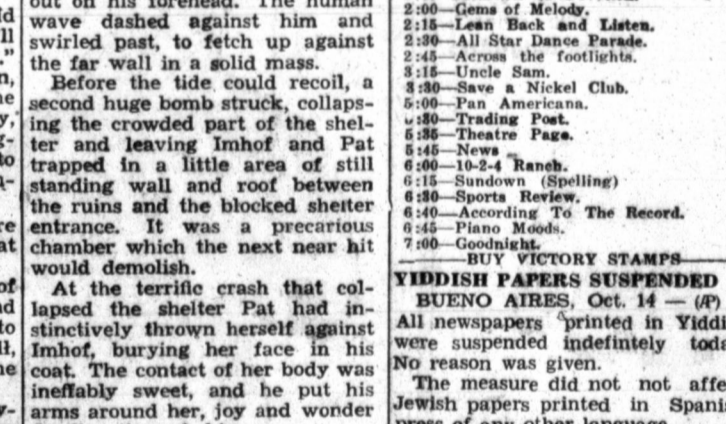

Graziani Orders Italians to Work

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 14 (AP)—Marshal Rodolfo Graziani, minister of defense in Benito Mussolini's new Fascist government, has issued an order summoning reluctant Italians for "voluntary work" under the direction of German military engineers and offering special premiums as an inducement to help restore bombed railroads and highways.

In addition to the daily wage of 12 1/2 lire, Aftonbladet's Berlin correspondent reported, Graziani offered 30 lire as a daily allowance for the support of each worker's wife, five lire for each child and 10 lire for the parents.

Guadalcanal Story

Canadain Oil Deal Flayed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—Rep. Gavin (R-Pa.) said that if money being spent by the American government to develop a "questionable" Canadian oil field had been spent in the petroleum fields of the United States, American production would be increased "several hundred thousand barrels" daily.

Gavin referred to the Canol project on the MacKenzie River 75 miles south of the Arctic circle, asserting it had been widely publicized in Canada, including printed maps showing the location of the field and pipelines, but that the war department has refused to make public the terms of the American-Canadian contract on grounds of military secrecy.

"There can be no valid reason for refusal to tell exactly what our war department has contracted to do in this petroleum venture up there near the Arctic circle," Gavin said. "The only reason for refusal now to make the matter fully public is the fear of letting the full truth be known—that or a tacit admission that the whole thing is a failure."

Jane Froman Is Back on Stage

BOSTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—Following her doctor's prescription, charming radio singer Jane Froman is "getting back in the groove again" as star of the new variety revue "Artists and Models" eight months after she was injured seriously in the Lisbon Clipper plane crash.

She made her first stage appearance since the accident, which took the lives of 28 persons, at the Boston opera house Monday night, coming out from the wings in a disguised invalid's chair.

Fort Shoots Down 12 German Planes

12 German Planes

A U. S. BOMBER STATION IN ENGLAND, Oct. 14 (AP)—A new record of 12 German fighters shot down by one bomber on a single raid was set Sunday in the raid on Muenster by the Flying Fortress "Ohio Airforce" piloted by Lt. John Ritchey, Steubenville, O. The previous record was 11 planes.

The crew said they thought they actually shot down 20 planes in the hectic 90-minute air battle from which they escaped without a scratch but filed claims for only 12. All these were officially corroborated.

The pilot and co-pilot, Lt. Thomas Helman, Medford, Ore., were the only crewmen who did not make kills—and they have no guns.

The previous record of 11 was set by the Fortress piloted by Lt. Robert H. Smith, Lamesa, Texas, who was killed in a flight over the Gulf of Mexico after he had returned to the United States on completion of his mission here.

Two-Man Crews Directed Subs Against Tirpitz

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—Navy Secretary Frank Knox has revealed that the British submarines which have immobilized the German battleship Tirpitz operated 1,000 miles from home with two-man crews.

The submarines slipped through mine fields and mazes of submarine nets to launch their torpedoes against the mighty Nazi battleship in a Norwegian hideout.

Knox, in his first press conference since his return from a 25,000-mile tour of European battlefronts, said that the attack on the Tirpitz was carried out while he was in England and was "characterized by a high spirit of daring and courage that is amazing."

He added that the little two-man submarines not only made their way through submarine nets guarding the harbor, but also penetrated nets hung about the big ship itself.

Knox reported a high spirit of cooperation between British and American forces in England, the Mediterranean area and elsewhere on his long tour. In England, he said, there is "an almost total ignoring of whether a man wears a British uniform or an American uniform."

In describing his visit to the Mediterranean area, he paid tribute to the men who operate landing craft, asserting: "What these boys have done is an epic." As an example he told of "one youngster who was busy carrying men to Salerno. A shell went through the officer's ship and killed five men, wounded several others. The youngster, he said, not only handled his ship but in a crisis met a personnel problem, using a penknife to perform an emergency operation and save the life of a member of the crew."

Knox told also of seeing a part of the battle of Naples from a PT boat, and described the damage to the city as "frightful." More than 70 vessels, he said, were sunk in the Naples harbor in an attempt to make it impossible for Allied troops to land men and equipment.

Gilchrist Says All Cities Need Plans

PARIS, Texas, Oct. 14 (AP)—Gibb Gilchrist, recently appointed chairman of the state post-war economic planning commission, says all cities should have a definite plan designed to meet local needs and functioning under local leadership.

"We have been too prone in the past to tag along and let the other fellow take the initiative," he added this week in an address to the annual meeting of the Lamar County Chamber of Commerce in which he envisioned an industrialized Texas—planned and developed through the efforts of its own citizens. He warned against leaning too heavily upon federal government aid in the readjustment period after the war, adding:

"Texas, by its constitutional rights, is free and independent, and the perpetuity of the union is dependent upon local self-government."

"A public works program will be needed after the war but it should fill a genuine want and not be created as a makeshift solution to unemployment."

Count Sforza Is On Way to Italy

LONDON, Oct. 14 (AP)—Count Carlo Sforza has left for Sicily, to return to Italian soil after nearly 20 years' absence.

The former Italian foreign minister departed after conferences with Prime Minister Churchill. Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and other British officials. An associate said Sforza intended to remain in Italy indefinitely "examining" the political situation and working toward a program for post-Fascist Italy.

Supreme Court Will Review Draft Case

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—The supreme court has agreed to determine whether a draft registrant was taken legally into the army when the induction oath was read to him after he had refused to take it.

This was one of approximately 300 review petitions acted upon Monday by the tribunal. It involved Arthur Goodwyn Billings, a former teacher at the University of Texas who described himself as a conscientious objector.

The court declined to pass on a five-year penitentiary sentence given Walter Ford Gormly of Milwaukee for refusing to report for work at a conscientious objectors' camp. He contended that such work would make him "a participant in the war machine and an accessory to murder on the battlefield."

The justices deferred action on a petition by William T. Reid of New Orleans, convicted on a charge of threatening to kill President Roosevelt. Reid was sentenced to 18 months' imprisonment.

Among other actions, the court agreed to pass on a decision which sustained Massachusetts legislation prohibiting a parent or guardian from furnishing literature to a child for sale in any street or public place. The legislation was challenged by a member of "Jehovah's Witnesses" at Brockton.

But the tribunal refused to reconsider its June 21 decision that mere membership in the Communist party is not an adequate ground for cancelling United States citizenship obtained by an alien.

Solicitor General Charles Fahy sought the rehearing, contending that William Schneiderman, state secretary of the Communist party for California and a native of Russia, was not entitled to citizenship obtained in 1927 because he "was a member of an organization which disbelieved in organized government."

Cases which the tribunal agreed to review will be set for argument within the next few months, after which a written opinion will be delivered. Denial of a review means that the decision appealed from remains in effect.
