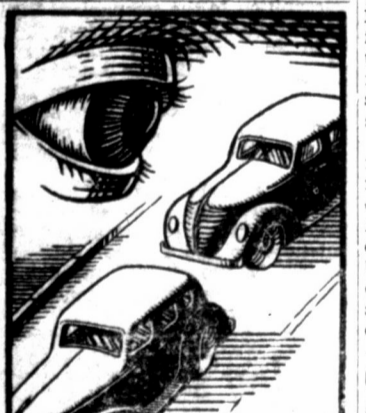

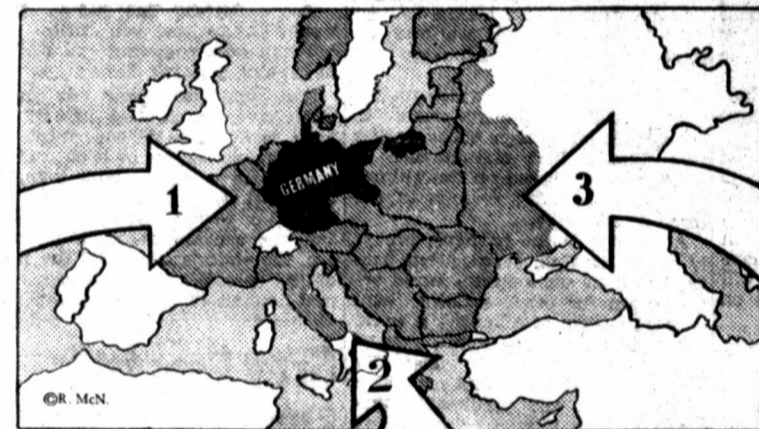

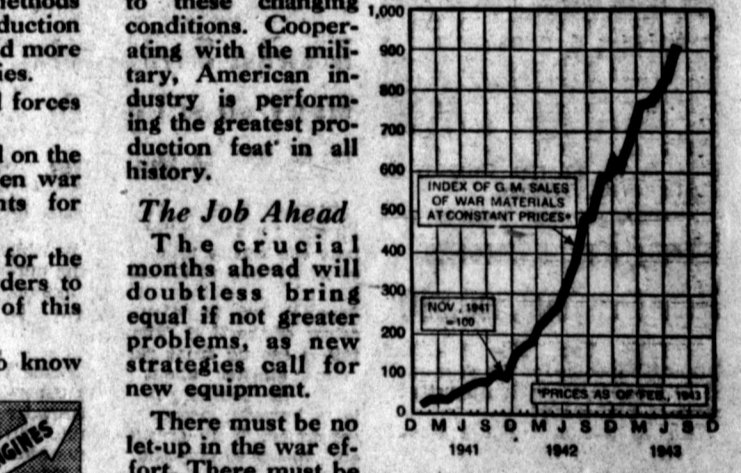

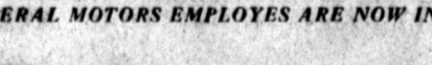
THIS CHART SHOWS THE INCREASING PHYSICAL VOLUME OF WAR PRODUCTION, MONTH BY MONTH.

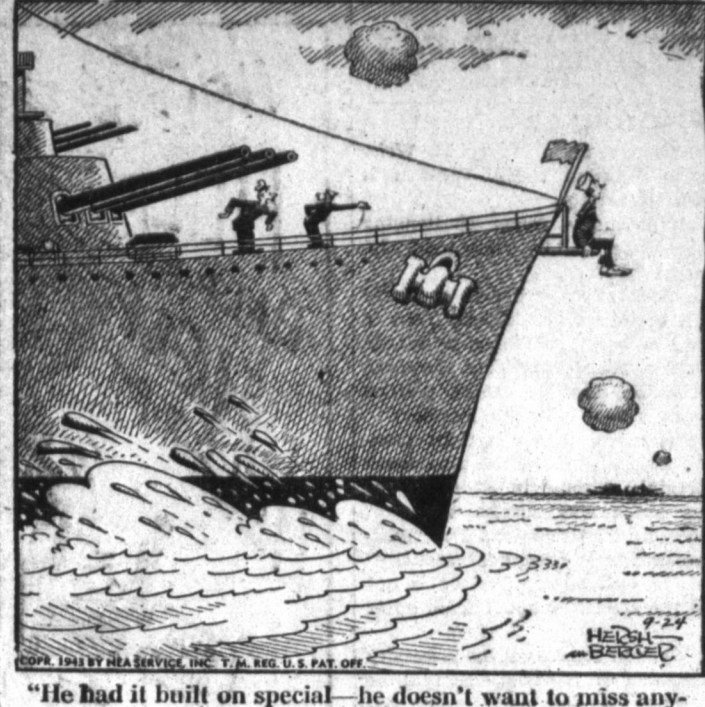

American Fifth Army troops flanking the great port of Naples to the east captured Cassano, 18 miles northeast of Salerno and just 10 miles from Avellino, major German communications center.

Lt. Gen. Mark Clark's Fifth Army units also captured Calabritto, another town northeast of Salerno and 27 miles in from the coast, while Muro, 18 miles northwest of Potenza and 32 miles east of Salerno, was overrun by British troops moving up on the Eighth Army's left flank.

Dispatches from a Reuters correspondent with the Fifth Army said British naval units had joined in the battle for the mountain passes leading to Naples, blasting German positions from off shore while American and British artillery

pounded the enemy from behind the Allied lines.

The air war over Western Europe gained momentum as American Flying Fortresses roared more than 200 miles across the North Sea today to batter the German shipbuilding center of Emden in their second straight daylight raid, carrying U. S. air force operations in Britain to a new high for a single month.

RAP Mosquitoes struck at targets in Germany's Rhineland during the night and yesterday American four-engine Fortresses pounded a big enemy airfield and repair base at Rheims.

last May, on the recovery of the American wounded, gave figures that only 2.6 per cent of the Navy and Marine Corps personnel wounded in action subsequently died. Comparable Army figures weren't then available but, said the report, "An analysis of available data on Army wounded shows that recoveries are comparable to naval and marine percentages."

All this presentation has served to build up the legend that in this war, "the wounded don't die." It may be true as far as it goes, but is it the whole story? What are the facts of battle casualties—the proportion of dead to wounded, the prevalence of N. P. or neuro-psychiatric "shell shock" breakdowns, the nature of the afflictions with which the 97 per cent of the wounded who are saved must carry with them through life?

OWI's report on 105,000 war casualties as of Sept. 18 was boiled down to 20 lines or fewer and in most papers it was buried inside under a small headline. Should it have been first-graded and played-up?

A week before the first picture of American dead on the field of battle was released for general publication, to be followed later by another. The two pictures were released by Navy and Army at the suggestion or insistence of OWI. But the real original impetus for the release came not from the war information specialists but from the people concerned with the conduct of the Third War Loan drive. Why then? It was their contention that the complacent American people needed to be shocked into a realization of the actualities of the war to make them buy more bonds.

The Office of War Information is determined it is going to get out and tell the full story of this war as it really is, now putting out the bad news along with the good. Can you take it? Or do you think you should be spared the gory details?

There you have the crux of the whole issue.

**Juvenile Crime Increases With War Intensity**

AUSTIN, Sept. 27.—(AP)—University of Texas investigators have found that increases in juvenile delinquency have kept pace with increasing intensity of the war.

A study of juvenile delinquency was made during a conference laboratory course in education at the university under direction of Dr. J. G. Umstad, professor of education.

A report on the study reveals that delinquency is on the increase throughout the nation.

"War problems undoubtedly cause much of the delinquencies occurring now," the report says, "with investigators giving as causes 'parental mothers' and latch-key' children, emotional upsets because of broken family ties, interrupted education and an unusual amount of easily-made money to spend."

In most cases juvenile delinquency is attributable to causes more fundamental than the immediate war situation, the educators found. A great number of children were already potentially delinquent because of poverty, lack of schooling, broken homes, racial and nationalistic rivalry, or physical and mental disabilities.

Members of the conference recommended four principles to be used as a basis of school action in combating delinquency: (1) To give the child some status—a feeling of "belonging"; (2) Attend to his health needs; (3) Teach him a skill; and (4) Train him in an attitude of good will.

## Juvenile Crime Increases With War Intensity

## Desk Officer Gets Sky-Side Seat For Pacific Air Battle

SOMEWHERE IN NEW GUINEA, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Major Charles Gallup of Chicago, Ill., who holds down an office job with the 11th air force, wanted a "little excitement." Well, he got it.

Gallup hopped into a P-38 when word came that 20 to 30 Japanese bombers, with an escort of 30 to 40 fighters, were attempting to disrupt landings of Australian troops on the beach north of Finschhafen, New Guinea, two days ago.

So he had a front seat to the flaming spectacle that followed as American Lightnings, Marauders and P-40's shot down 40 enemy planes and placed five more in the "probable" class.

"Our fighters," said Gallup, "hit those Nips like a ton of bricks—only a lot faster and harder."

The pilots first sighted the enemy at about 12,000 feet, and then, Gallup related, "planes from all over the sky poured down in hot dives to get into them."

"We saw Thunderbolts and P-40's tearing into the Japs, sending bombers and fighters flaming into the drink. Some of those fighters almost got into the sea with the Japs, they fired at them so close."

After dropping bombs from low altitude, the Japanese attempted to get away, but Gallup said our flyers saw five or six enemy fighters heading for home and took after them.

"The first part of our flight knocked three down. Then one of the best split-second deals I have ever seen happened. One Jap decided to tear around the other side of a huge cloud to try and get away. A Thunderbolt coming from the opposite direction met him and his 50 caliber demolished that guy in seconds."

Flight leaders in the fight included Major Frank B. Pomplins, Palestine, Texas.

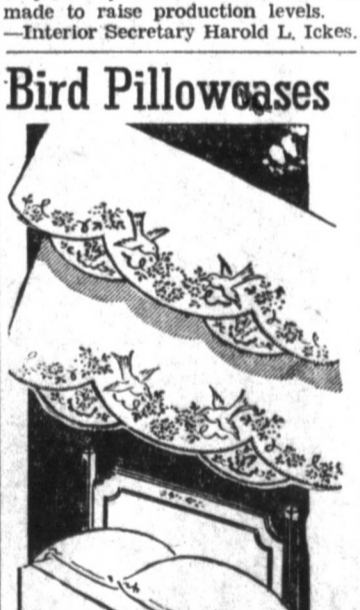

Japs Suffer Great Air Loss in China

FOURTEENTH UNITED STATES AIR FORCE HEADQUARTERS IN CHINA, Sept. 24—(Delayed)—The Japanese suffered "one of their most serious losses of the air war in China" in their bombing attack on the 14th USAAF headquarters Sept. 20, Brig. Gen. Edgar Glenn announced today.

Glenn, chief of staff to Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault, made the statement in a review of the week's air operations in this theater.

In the raid on headquarters the Japanese sent over 27 bombers, 15 of which were definitely shot down, seven probably destroyed and three damaged for the largest bomber score yet turned in by American fighter planes in China.

In addition, two Zero fighters were confirmed destroyed, two probably shot down and four damaged.

Our loss was minor damage to the air base. One P-40 was shot down, but the pilot is safe.

German Prison Train Wrecked In Virginia

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., Sept. 27—(AP)—Three hundred German prisoners of war, delayed at near-by Shadwell for nine hours when the train on which they were being transported wrecked and killed the fireman and engineer, were loaded into another train last night for the remainder of their trip to an inland prison camp.

Six enlisted men of the military guard and a brakeman, Garrard Plagman, II, of Richmond, Va., were under treatment. Two conductors also were hurt.

Two injured Germans were taken away in an ambulance under guard to the new Woodrow Wilson general hospital being used by the army at Staunton, Va.

Given food by the Red Cross, the German prisoners offered no trouble during the time the train was stalled at the scene of the wreck, the cause of which had not been announced by railroad officials.

Birth Rate Highest In Past 16 Years

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27—(AP)—In its first full year of World War II—1942—the nation's birth rate was the highest in 16 years and the death rate the lowest on record.

The census bureau so reported today. Births totaled 2,808,996, an increase of 11.6 per cent over the 1941 figure, and deaths, not counting war casualties abroad, numbered 1,855,187, a decline of 0.9 per cent from the preceding year.

The birth rate of 21.0 per 1,000 population was the highest since 1926, while the death rate of 10.4 was the lowest yet recorded.

Despite an increase of 295,569 in births, both the maternal and infant death rates of 2.6 and 40.4 per 1,000 live births, respectively, were new lows. The respective declines from the previous year were 18.8 and 10.8 per cent.

Total deaths were 12,455 fewer than in 1941.
