### **Fasier Planes** Are Needed To Fight U-Boats

By JAMES J. STREBIG octated Press Aviation Editor WASHINGTON Oct. 11 An increasing tendency of Nazi sub narines to stay up and fight is making coastal patrol work more and more a job for fast, heavily-armed Navy officials said today that fly-

ing boats, long considered ideal for patrol, are being shited gradually to obs where their rugged bulk, relative slowness and great range are more advantageous, such as the Pa-cific, which has too few landing fields but plenty of water.

The fat old ladies with wings are not being abandoned. The navy continues to get them in quantity for work not readily assignable to landbased aircraft. Flying boats are expected to remain a big factor in transport operations, also.

#### Dark Days Ahead

Warnings against over optimism, from high military and naval sources, have been intensified of late. They do not seem to have much influence upon the lay public, but they should. The generals and the admirals are not building up alibis for themselves, nor do they enjoy being Cassandras. They are doing what most insiders think is only their

Fortunately, the brass hats are permitted to be a bit more specific now than formerly. They do not have to stop with pointing out the number of statute miles that separate our advance troops from Tokyo and Berlin, but are allowed to give us some idea of the perils that pockmark those statute miles.

Hitler has replaced and equipped the 20 divisions lost at Stalingrad. The Nazi army is bigger than ever. The Luftwaffe is stronger than it was in 1939. The number of workers in German factories has risen by 12 millions, or slightly more than 50 per

Sixty-ton Tiger tanks are appearing in ever-increasing numbers against both Anglo-Americans and Russians. They aren't the invincible weapons the Nazis expected or our laymen feared, but neither can we scoff at them. The Germans have a new rocket gun that is giving us plenty of trouble. The rocket bombs are going to require our vaunted ingenuity to offset.

The German food ration is better now that at the outbreak of the war.

In the Far East we are 3000 miles from Tokyo and have not yet reached the real strongholds of Japanese resistance.

The Japanese still have some 2,000,000 men of military age whom they have felt no need to call up, and as many more in the 17 to 20 age group available when needed. Their air strength is increasing both numerically and qualitatively. Pilot training has been stepped up. They are developing the economic and military resources they took from us, the British and the Dutch in 1942

Are these just the nightmares of an armchair strategist? Not at all. They are facts collected by Allied military and naval intelligence, made public by the chief of American Military Intelligence, Maj. Gen. George V. Strong.

Some of the things he didn't tell the public made strong men go home and toss in their beds. Don't fall for this war-over-before-Christmas talk. It's the mullarkey.

IT WORKED IN 1940 (The Chicago Tribune)

It is obvious that Mr. Roosevelt will try to control the Republican convention next year as he controlled the party's convention in 1940. Until a good many memoirs have been published we shall not know all the details of his 1940 maneuver, but even today there can be little doubt that the original Willkie men were in the conspiracy and so were Secretaries Stimson and Knox who were highly rewarded for their perfidy to their

We know, also, that Mr. Roosevelt came up to the 1940 campaign with the gravest misgivings. He had to overcome the third term handicap. He managed to do so only because he was able to select as the nominee to oppose him a man he knew he could beat.

Naturally Mr. Roosevelt will make every effort this time to repeat the tactics he employed so successfully before. There is evidence that he is already at work along these lines. The proposal of an Anglo-American alliance was bruited about the Mackinac conference even before Mr. Churchill gave it utterance in his Cambridge speech the next day. Mr. Churchill must have discussed his talk with Mr. Roosevelt before it was delivered and, if so, there can be little doubt that the purpose in Mr. Roosevelt's mind was to stampede the iblican gathering.

In that attempt he failed signally. He has since been more fortunate in obtaining Republican support for the eeptive Fullbright resolution in the house. He desires a Republican party so deeply committed to internationalism that the voters in 1944 will have no chance to express opposition to his foreign policies by voting Republican.

Control of the Democratic convention presents great problem to the fourth term candidate. He can manage that thru the crooked metropolitan machines with such help from his loval Commists as may be required. A good deal more subtlety is required in his manipulation of the Republican party, but he has instruments to serve purpose. He can use again the influence of some of his egregiously wealthy friends in Wall street to organize and buy support among the eastern delegations to the convention. For further help he can depend upon a great assortment of Anglophiles, including the Rhodes scholar propagandists for the sacrifice of American independence. A clever and unscrupulous politician can make highly effective use of such instruments Roosevelt demonstrated in 1940.

#### A CHALLENGE TO CONGRESS (The Los Angeles Examiner)

President Roosevelt is entirely wrong, al-ough probably within his rights, in expressing the view to Congress that its legislative ban on continued Federal employment of three specified officers is "unwise, discriminatory and unconstitutional.

And, the President is especially wrong in asserting that, since he regards the act of Congress as an unwarranted encroachment upon the authority of the Executive and judicial branches of the Government, it is not binding upon them.

The prohibition against further employment of three officers was effected by a formal act of Congress.

It was signed by the President.
Hence, it is the law of the land, in conformance with the established and only constitutional processes that exist for the enactment of law.

It is undoubtedly true, as the President says, that he did not approve of the act, and would have vetoed it if it had not been attached as a rider to other legislation he did approve.

"THE GOD OF THE MACHINE"

By ISABEL PATERSON

It is a pity that this informative book written by Isabel Paterson has the name. "The God of the Machine", which in no way seems to describe the book. The book is really described by Albert Nock when he said, "Mrs. Paterson, the author, has presented the ablest, most acute and closelyreasoned piece of political writing that has been produced in this country in my time."-or in this statement by Nock, "Not until now have we had a respectable intellectual defense of doctrine that only free men working in a free economy-free from governmental interference, restraint, prescription, coercion-can build a political structure which has any chance of stability."

It is a book well worth reading to those who think that they believe in freedom. It is, in short, a study of freedom, of liberty. It is sort of a history of the causes of the rise and fall of the

When I read the first sixty chapters. I said it was a lazy man's book because it gave so much information to the reader with so little effort. I will quote briefly some of the gems from the

"Nations are not powerful because they possess wide lands, safe ports, large navies, huge armies, fortifications, stores, money, and credit. They acquire those advantages because they are powerful, having devised on correct principles the political structure which allows the flow of energy to take its proper course." This statement explains why the United States has been powerful. It has more nearly than any other nation in all the world respected the inherent rights, the energy of each individual. It has allowed this energy to be used to benefit the individual and add to the wealth and comfort and pleasure of the world. The pity is that we are receding from the practice of respecting the inherent rights of man. We are paying the penalty of this recession by unemployment and a recession of our increase in our standard of living, if not a decrease in it.

Here is another axiom that Mrs. Paterson, the author, points out that prior to 1913 caused our outstanding growth and prosperity. "The application of science to production requires assured possession of private property, free labor, and time enough to return benefits for the effort and capital expended." To the degree that nations and peoples followed this practice did they prosper in comparison with other peoples of their

Why Rome Was Great Rome evolved the respect for impersonal law. They respected the rights of others who made contracts. This made alliances possible. Here is how Mrs. Paterson describes it. "The practical use of the concept of law in founding the empire began with international relations. Their habit of mind made the Romans more reliable in keeping treaties and more steadfast against reverses, and therefore made their alliance desired. Legal clarity likewise served to specify bearable terms. Citizenship being formulated as a legal condition rather than an accident of birth, Rome could bestow it on the people of another nation. A general grant took effect on individuals; the orbital attraction first exerted on the mass thus acted on the particles separately. The result was a true fusion or welding, a chemical compound rather than a simple mixture or binding together."

Rome Exported Law Rome, being the first nation that respected impersonal rules and recognized to some degree the rights of the individual, spread these ideas through other nations. This is how Mrs. Paterson describes it. "The test of a military society lies ir the question whether the civil or military auis recognized as superior. The Roman civil authority was supreme, as with Paul, when the man of the sword was 'afraid' before his prisoner. An empire can exist only if it offers to the world some negotiable benefit in exchange for tribute. Roman law was Rome's export commodity. 'With a great sum,' the nations obtained the law, but weighed against arbitrary rule it was thought to be worth what it cost. This was what the Carthaginians did not have to offer, and did not understand when they saw it; they never

knew what hit them." I will quote further from Mrs. Paterson's book, "The God of the Machine" in a later issue. only constitutional power possessed by the President for the purpose of nullifying an act of

The President is clearly entitled to his opinion about an act of Congress.

He is not entitled to ignor or flaunt a formal act of Congress duly signed by himself.

He is not entitled to say an act of Congress, specially after it has his signature, has force only if he desires to recognize it.

If it should be true that the President can be bound only by such law as he approves, then, indeed, we have a dictatorship, as Representative Dies asserts would be the consequence if Mr. Roosevelt's position on this matter should prevail.

The great merit of the American system of government is not in any supposed infallibility of

But the remedy for possibly mistaken legislation is reconsideration by Congress and repeal of the offending legislation when and if the facts

The remedy is never in an arbitrary and tyrannical assumption of powers that do not exist by the President.

There is more to the present case, of course, than the issue of whether the authority of Congress or the arrogance of the President is to The three officers Congress seeks to remove

from Federal employment are objectionable to Congress because of their purported sympathy and affiliation with subversive organizations inimical to the democratic interests of the country.

They are objectionable to an overwhelming majority of the American people for the same reason. As Representative Dies well says: "Mr. Roosevelt apparently does not know the sentiment of the country. He is making a play

for left wing political support. But that is only a pandful of Americans." Nevertheless, the vital issue presented by the President himself makes the status of the three

officers originally involved a secondary matter. What must be determined is whether or not Congress can make the laws of the country, as the Constitution empowers it to do; or whether or not the President can accept or reject the acts of

Congress according to his own judgment.

Upon this determination depends whether or not the United States is a democracy or whether or not it is under a dictatorship.

President Roosevelt has raised the issue. Congress must meet it.

#### WARTIME HEALTH: Typhoid Vaccine **Guards Against Wartime Disease**

vaccination. Typhoid fever is an acute in fection caused by a germ known as the Bacillus Typhosus. This germ can be recovered from the blood and excretions of a person seriously sick with the disease. After the germs are taken into the body, from 10 to 14 days elapse, during which time the germs multiply and give off their poisons.

The illness then begins with the customary symptoms of infection, such as headache, pains throughout the body, loss of appetite, and exhaustion. Sometimes chills occur, ushering in a gradually rising fe-

The infection involves the intestinal tract primarily, and in addi-tion to disturbing the bowels, tends to cause ulceration, occasionally perforating the bowel wall, br on peritonitis, or eroding. vessel with the resulting hemor-

#### EMERGENCY PRECAUTIONS

During the emergency of flood conditions, all water should be boiled, and milk pasteurized. But most important of all, each person should assume the responsibility of pro-tecting his health and that of oth-

The vaccine is made from killed typhoid germs and is given in three injections at intervals of one week One complete vaccination confers and often three years.

Vaccination is purely preventive, and not of use in treatment. The disease, once developed, of course, equires competent medical care and nursing.
