





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### WLB to Review **Authority Over** Farm Laborers

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15 -(AP)-With potent farmer groups report-ed ready to cry a loud "no!", the War Labor Board will take up the question this week of whether it has any jurisdistion over agricultural labor disputes.

This is a field that was specificalclosed to the national labor reations board by congress.

In a test case to be heard this week, the majority of a panel recommended that the WLB perfrom a function ordinarily within the province of the NLRB, that is, dermine whether the union has a majority of the employes and, if so, order the employer to bargain and sign a contract. The industry member of the panel filed a minority report.

The case involves the California Packing Corporation's midwest di-vision at Rochelle and Dekalb, Ill. and the CIO united cannery, agri cultural packing and allied workers. The NLRB certified the union as the bargaining representative of the cannery workers, but did not take jurisdiction of the agricultural laborers because the national labor relations (Wagner) act specifically excludes agricultural labor from the operation of the act. The union asks the WLB to asme this jurisdiction.

### Inflation? It's Here

The stubborn and still indecisive fight against the "inflationary spiral" of wages and prices is one of the home front's most important battles. And in one sector it is being lost. We have been watching governmental agencies popping away with ceilings and subsidies and Little Steel formulas. But in the meantime another inflationary force has broken through, after a stealthy advance, and seems entrenched beyond any dislodging.

This new inflationary enemy came in when the quality of necessary goods was cut, without a corresponding cut in retail prices. Perhaps economists might say that inflation isn't the right word, but the results certainly are inflationary.

You may have noticed it already in things like this: That suit you bought six months ago fits like a sack and is beginning to wear out already. Your toes came through your new cotton socks after one wearing. Your wife complains that wartime two-way stretches don't stretch. Daughter's new shoes lost most of their color in the last shower.

And that's inflation! For you have to replace these inferior articles so much more quickly that the result is the same as if you had paid 50 or 100 per cent more than the price of their pre-war counter-

The principal cause of this difficulty is as easy to explain as it is hard to solve: the armed forces require most of our wool and cotton and all of our No. 1 leather; rayon is needed in synthetic rubber tires; rubber itself, of course, has gone to war, along with such things as steel and metallic dyes.

Why can't there be a price reduction to match the reduction in quality? There are several reasons, but the chief one seems to be that labor costs have risen. Some trades, like women's dresses and cloaks and suits, have been given pay increases. In other industries, new and inexperienced labor has upped production costs. Thus, many wholesalers find that, in spite of cheaper materials, they are paying as much in the end because of other adjustments.

And when there are savings in manufacturing costs, they are too small to do the consumer much good. For example, a shirt that used to retail nationally at \$2.25 now sells, with noticeably less cloth and no fast color or pre-shrunk guarantee, at \$2.24!

Low-price lines are disappearing in all fields Manufacturers are concentrating on higher priced goods, where there is more profit. And buyers, with more money than ever before, are shunning the bargain basements anyway.

So a good bit of our much-talked-of surplus wealth is being drained off in a wasteful way that doesn't benefit anybody.

Several of our usually contentious government bureaus have pondered the situation, and for once they are in complete accord. They all agree that there is no apparent remedy.

### THIS DIVIDED HOUSE

There is no uncertainty concerning the future of American business and industry if the latest social security offering of Senator Wagner shall become law. Businesses by the tens of thousands will be wiped out of existence. It will be difficult for even a healthy business to survive.

For the proposed law will impose upon every aploying business a payroll tax of 6 per cent and that payment will exceed the total margin of profit of countless businesses. They simply can not meet that enforced payment and stay alive For such as these the Wagner bill is a sentence of

Common Ground

THE APOSTLES CREED QUESTION BOBS UP

A reader of "Common Ground" from Anne, Ohio, who is superintendent of schools of that city, takes me to task for my article under the heading of, "Is the Apostles Creed Helpful or Harmful?" He centends that raising such a question tends to drive people away from the church. That might be so. The important question, however, is not whether it tends to drive them away from the church but whether it tends to drive them away from the belief in Christianity.

My contention is that having people who are seeking to understand Christianity devote their time and energy to understanding the Ten Commandments, rather than mechanically repeating the Apostles Creed, will help make people Christians rather than drive them from Christianity. This reader seems to infer that because I urged church leaders to direct the attention of the attendants at church to the Commandments, that I do this because the Commandments are in the Bible. He, therefore, concludes that since I accept the Commandments as a proper guide of conduct, I should accept the statements in the Apostles Creed, since the Commandments are found in the Bible and the Apostles Creed sets forth the beliefs that come from some organized Christianity's interpretation of the Bible.

While the Commandments are found in the Bible they are true because they are in harmony with all human experience. They existed before the Bible was written. They work today the same as they worked in the time that they were written. They are eternal principles. On the other hand, the statements in the Apostles Creed are contrary to human experience. They cannot be repeated today-men today are not being born of a virgin, as is stated in the Apostles Creed. The creed leaves the impression to inexperienced people that there is a Hell below; that Heaven is some place up above the earth rather than being within the individual, as Jesus contended. It tends to leave the impression that God is an anthropomorphic being; that He occupies a place; that Jesus is sitting on His right hand; that He will later come to judge people and that people can perform sins and have them forgiven and they do not have to pay the penalty for disobeying God's laws, It leaves the impression that the resurrection is a resurrection of the body rather than a resurrection or the immortality of the influence of the individual or of the race.

The same reader says he did not know there was anything sinful in the Apostles Creed. Anything is sinful that tends to detract men's attention from an effort to understand eternal, everlasting principles. If the Apostles Creed tends to do that, it is sinful.

The reader says he is assuming that I agree that the Scriptures are the divine revelations. That, of course, would depend upon what he meant by divine revelations. If he means to believe that God did not reveal any proper way of living until the Scriptures were written and if he assumes that I believe that God did not give any individual the ability to determine right from wrong, until the Scriptures were written, then I do not believe that the Scriptures are divine revelations. If he means by divine revelation that they contain the eternal impersonal rules by which men should live, then I would construe them to be divine revelations, just as any other book that helps people understand God's laws and helps them to live together in peace and harmoney and develop His laws, is divine revelations.

There are thousands of different books called the Bible. All the conflicting statements in these different Bibles cannot all be divine revelations. Certainly, if God were revealing Himself exclusively to individuals, He would not have had the individual write things so contrary to fact, as has been written many places in the Bible.

As an example of the Bible not being factual and thus not wholly of divine revelations, take verse 42 in the Second Bood of Esdras in the Apocrypha, which says. "On the third day you commanded the waters to be gathered together in the seventh part of the earth, but six parts you dried up and kept them so that some of them might be planted and cultivated and serve before

Every student of geology knows that the earth for the last six or seven thousand years has not been six-sevenths land and one-seventh water, as this part of the Bible contends, if the Apocrypha is included in the Bible. If the Apocrypha is not included in the Bible, by what right has man to exclude it, if it is to be regarded in its entirety as the word of God?

But back to the influence of the Apostle Creed: When the Apostles Creed makes the repeater say he believes in the "Holy Ghost", he is making a statement that he cannot define. I remember, when I was a youth, asking my mother who was a Methodist what the "Holy meant. She was honest enough to tell me that she did not know and she also said she never found anybody who did know.

So repeating a creed that makes people say they believe in something they do not know what it means, tends to stultify and deaden man's judgment. It tends to make people gullible. It tends to keep them from understanding that the principles which Jesus taught existed thousands of years before His time. It tends to make people worship dogmas and mysticism and fables rather than the eternal principles of God or of nature.

These are the reasons I raised the question of whether or not the Apostles Creed is harmful or helpful. I certainly believe that the Apostles Creed tends to cause people, as they become more scientific and more capable of understanding axioms and principles, to leave the church that emphasizes the Apostles Creed.

I want a church that the older a man grows and the more intelligent he becomes, the more believes it teaches the benefits and the need of Christianity rather than a church that emphasizes beliefs which are so contrary to present human experience that they tend to cause people to leave the church when they grow up and come in Christianity when they grow up and come in contact with the thinkers of the ages.

### Children's Health Is Dependent On Parents' Wisdom

Babies are, for the most part, healthy. The pediatrician's secon-dary concern is in many instances a primary concern - that is, the owledge and behavior of a baby's parents. Babies are born into the world with amazing constitutional staying power, and the fact that they are dependent upon the min-istration of adults ordinarily ignorant of the job forced upon responsible for much of their trouble in early infancy.

Since many competent physicians being young men, are in the army, and those general practitioners left to take over their duties are not rimarily skilled in dealing with mothers, it will be of great help to the mothers if they know how to inform the doctors properly when there is real need for their serv-ices, and how to prepare the child for the physician's coming, if the infant is sick and the doctor, by necessity of heavy practice, is late in

### IMPORTANCE OF MIDDLE AND FAR EAST

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


