## American 5th Army **Engages Germans In Crucial Land Battle**

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Sept 13—(AP)—A bitter and bloody battle raged into its fifth consecutive day around the American Fifth Army's Salerno bridgehead today with growing German forces resisting desperately the determined penetration into their hill positions girding the plain and protecting the broad port of Naples.

The British Eighth Army, speeding steadly northward from the Italian toe against little or no enemy opposition, captured the port of Crotone, 110 miles from the southern tip of the peninsula, and found that harbor in good condition for Allied use, a communique from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters announced.

## Dairy, Pork, Poultry **Production Uncertain**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13-47 Poor weather and troub portation problems may team up to make many significant changes in the country's dairy, pork, and poul-

try production map next year. The agriculture department reported today that supplies of feed will be unevenly distributed after this year's harvets, largely because of poor corn and other feed crops in some sections and the depletion of pre-war surpluses. duce feed production prospects.

Under the impetus of unprecedented war demands and favorable prices, these areas had expended livestock production rather sharply during the past few years when feed was easily obtained.

"Probably there will be more than the usual readency." the depart the usual tendency," the depart-ment said, "for each area to adjust vestock to the feed supply avail-

ble locally. This, officials said, probably means a substantial reduction in hog and smaller reduction in dairy produc-



## **Soldiers Allowed** To Donate Blood **At Donor Centers**

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Can servicemen at Pampa Field give their blood to the Red Cross for conversion into dried plasma or use in combat zones?

The answer is that they can, as individuals, if near one of the 33 Red Cross blood donor centers in the large cities of the nation, according to Ray L. Ellis, Red Cross field director at Pampa. Servicemen are not solicited as

opportunity here for donations by We appreciate the volunteering would-be blood donors here, but we can do is to tell them to look up a Red Cross donor center if they happen to be near one on their next furlough," said Ellis. "No arrangement is possible at this point for a group bleeding proj-While donating a pint of blood is a simple matter so far as the individual donor is concerned, it can be seen that the Red Cross-Army-Navy program is of such magnitude that an assembly line type of production close to process ing laboratories must be maintained. Blood obtained at the centers shipped daily in refrigerated containers. Ellis explained It must reach a laboratory within 24 hours after the blood is drawn. All donor centers are within this delivery time from the 11 laboratories under con-93,000 a week. The total army request has been for 5,300,000 pints.

The donor program was launched he said, after medical science found that persons suffering from traumatic shock did not need whole blood transfusions—that the blood plasma, the liquid part remaining after the red and white corpuscles nave been removed, would suffice to combat lowered vitality. Doctors found, too, that plasma did not need to be typed and that it could be preserved by refrigeration or dehydrating. When it was learned that fried plasma could be returned to liquid state within two minutes simply by mixing it with sterile, distilled water, battlefield use of it became possible and thousands of American lives have been saved.

### Why The Oil Shortage?

Oil men and responsible public authorities have pointed out that rationing of fuel oil and gasoline is in no sense attributable to any failure on the part of oil companies.

The facts are simple. To run a mechanized war requires literally billions of barrels of oil. No other nation was as well equipped to produce oil either by nature or by the enterprise of its citizens as this nation was when war came. We had huge oil reserves in the ground and, equally important, we had an efficient private industry operating under competent management which knew how to get that oil out of the ground. And it got it out in astronomical quantities upon very short notice.

Moreover, this is not all the oil industry had to do upon short notice. A thousand bombers during a single four hundred mile raid over Germany burn approximately 1,000,000 gallons of 100-octane gasoline. The oil companies had to develop refineries to produce such high-test gas, in itself a staggering job. Before the war, 100-octane gasoline was not produced in quantity. Suddenly the whole war effort depended upon getting it in quantity quickly. It was up to the oil companies to get it. They got it-and in

Many months ago oil men began warning that the nation's oil reserves were being used faster than the rate of discovery. The discovery rate of new oil reserves has not stepped up to meet increased demands for the simple reason that the cost of "wildcatting" is far too high in relation to the price of oil which is set by government decree. Until the price is adjusted, oil will continue to become more

Continued government-imposed handicaps on oil production will cost our nation dearly.

## **Inventory Jitters**

War manufacturers are reported to be coming down with a bad attack of inventory jitters. This is a symptom rather than a disease.

In World War I industry expanded and expanded (much as the public prior to late 1929 invested and invested) on the apparent theory that an abnormal situation was going to last forever. Most of them were caught flat when the war ended. Some never did recover. Remembering this, present-day managements would like to break near enough even when the Axis capitulates to remain solvent.

Thus, automatically in inflated inventories which many firms are reported to have squirreled away are going to be reduced. What must be guarded against is an excess of caution which would leave critical plants short enough to slow down output.

The Nation's Press SO ALL CAN RIDE

(The Chicago Tribune)

The huge audience at the Chicago Music Festival saw an automobile roll around Soldiers' field on Trib-buna tires, powered by a gasogene fuel generator burning charcoal. This was a working demonstration of the solution of two critical material shortages-rubber and motor fuelbrought about thru Tribune research.

We had no technical knowledge of alcohol or rubber or motor fuel when this research was started. We did know that nobody had been able to make alcohol successfully from the sulphite waste of paper mills. We did not know that the reclaiming process developed by Dr. M. M. Rosten would work, but when governments and large chemical companies refused to try the idea we took it up as a patriotic duty.

The work, as in most pioneering efforts, was difficult, but when the tests were completed it developed, to our surprise and delight, that we had not only made alcohol but a better alcohol, more suitable for rubber manufacture, than that made from grain or petroleum.

We went into the development of gasogene generators and, while we were unable to produce one ourselves for reasons beyond our control, we a satisfactory one produced in this country. Now Dr. Rosten predicts the widespread use of sulphite-waste alcohol as a motor fuel if full scale production can be achieved from the millions of gallons of sulphite liquor now dumped as a usess by-product of paper making and the millions

of tons of wood now burned as waste. The Tribune has presented to the nation a rubber made from a trade waste and gas power made from alcohol and forest products. If the people want to ride, they must persuade congress to force thru manufacture of these products. The advocates of planned scarcity are against the idea, as might be expected of them. They believe that as long as the party members are well supplied. the rest of the people can want. Only the people themselves can win these benefits for the use of all.

THE END OF OUR NOSE OIL POLICIES

Every person who can see further than the end of his nose can see that we are approaching a shortage in gasoline if the present government policy of price fixing is continued. The oil that produced the gasoline that we are now consuming was discovered or developed before the government set the price of crude oil. But after this is used up we will be obliged to do without unless we reward the producers of oil on a basis similar to the rewards paved to producers of other things. It is outrageous to keep the price of oil at parity with what it was years ago when the cost of finding oil was less. The government in reality is confiscating a great part of the property of the stock holders of oil companies. It is just plain stealing.

And yet the labor union groups are opposing an increase in the price of crude oil. They have the unadulterated nerve in contending that to raise the price of oil would be to steal billions of dollars from the people. It would not be stealing at all, it would be freedom and if the labor unions think that the present price of oil is fair and just and right let them go out and wild cat and bring in new oil wells to oblige the people at the present prices

But they have no thought of doing that nor can they find anyone that will do it. Yet they want to confiscate the wealth that has already been produced and give the owners of the oil wells dollars that will not buy them nearly as much as the dollars they put in discovering the

Justice and common sense and even a desire to protect ourselves from the enemy should permit the price of oil to be high enough to pay labor so that we will have a plentiful supply of oil.

If the present policy is continued it will only be a question of time until every automobile user in the country will have even his present allotment of gasoline cut. It will not be his tires that cause this, it will be because of a shortage of gasoline due to the bungling of the bureaucrats or as Rupert Hughes calls them "burearats".

### ORIGIN OF MEANING OF LAISSEZ FAIRE

Most every New Dealer and those who believe in a planned economy by the government like to imply that laissez faire really means a form of anarchy, no laws at all. Let people get goods by force or robbery or any other way.

In order to know the real meaning of the word laissez faire we should go to the origin of it. How did the word and the phrase come about when it was first used? It was started under the rule of Louis XIV in France. At that time France was depressed. There was much unemployment and much industrial regimentation as there is existing now in this country. The famed Secretary of State, Minister Colbert, under Louis XIV, asked the merchants and manufacturers of Lyons in what manner the French state might assist them. It is said that one of them answered, "Laissonsnous faire!" -"Let us alone!" This was really the beginning and the origin of the expression laissez faire. It really meant let our mitiative alone, or do not interfere with our free and voluntary exchanging goods. Do not have the state do anything to help anybody but simply let us alone.

Of course there has never been in any state complete laissez faire. There has inevitably been discriminatory tax laws, discriminatory credit and labor laws aimed at protecting certain groups. In every country to the degree that the government practiced laissez faire, let the initiative of the people to produce alone, everything else being

equal, did that nation prosper. The unemployment in this country before the war was undoubtedly due to lack of laissez faire. people that they would help. And their poverty will get worse the more we permit government politicians planning our economy.
