City Lays Schedule For Improvements Voted By Pampanas

Pampa, next year, may not be so beautiful to view during the warming spring and hot summer months when the city will settle down to work on the \$575,000 improvement project along with routine summer paving and E. and W. Kingsmill widening program.

Beginning this afternoon, S. Starkweather from Foster to Atchinson will be the first to feel the bite of excavating equipment, preparatory to paving.

Excavation, grading, running of curb and gutter and stabilization work will be started and finished this year. Topping will be held off until summer of 1952.

WIDENING MARCH 1

Widening operations along the 100 blocks of E. and W. Kingsmill are tentatively slated to start on March 1, about the same time ditching machines start to tear up intersections, parkways and streets to make way for high pressure water mains and additional sewer lines.

Peppis also said he hoped to have the bridges and culverts opened to traffic several weeks before school opens for the 1952-53 term.

ASK POSTPONEMENT

In the meantime, merchants along the main business blocks of E. and W. Kingsmill asked city officials to withhold widening operations there until after the Christmas rush.

He explained that moisture in fresh concrete freezes in temperatures Pampa is experiencing just now, causing the concrete to crumble and revert back to sand, rock, gravel and cement.

Although W. Kingsmill has been ordinance for widening from Cuyler to Gray, the city plans now to widen only the 100 block, possibly the 200 block if the county is willing to participate and if there is money available for the job.

For the next few weeks a lot of behind-the-scenes technicalities and planning will have to be worked out before actual construction work gets underway on the half-million dollar civic improvement plan voted in last week's bond election.

'America's Sweetheart' In Movie

NEW YORK — (AP) — Mary Pickford, once known as "America's Sweetheart," is coming out of a 19-year retirement to star in just one more film.

The 58-year-old actress will play the role of a librarian in the film, "The Library," to be made by Columbia pictures.

Her return to the screen matches in many ways the movie comeback of another early Hollywood queen, Gloria Swanson.

Miss Swanson, now 62, regained her former prominence last year with the film, "Sunset Boulevard." She went on to further successes on the stage and in television.

The careers of both actresses ran almost parallel. Miss Swanson started her film career in 1913. Miss Pickford in 1914. Miss Swanson appeared in only two films after 1932. Miss Pickford's last film, "Secrets," was made in 1933.

But unlike Miss Swanson, Miss Pickford indicated yesterday that "The Library" would not be followed by further roles. She said in a statement released by Columbia pictures that "it is the one and only story which would have induced me again to appear before the cameras."

Miss Pickford declined to give further details on the film. Since her retirement from acting, Miss Pickford has continued to be active in the management and ownership phases of the film industry. She was one of the founders of the United Artists producing and distributing organizations.

Violent Death Toll Hits 20 Over Week End

An outbreak of six shootings brought the Texas violent death toll during the week-end to 20. Shootings and traffic accidents for 19 of the deaths. One boy hanged while playing cowboy.

The violent deaths included: Three persons were killed Sunday in an automobile-train collision within Midland's city limits. They were Lester Flannigan, 42, automobile salesman; Paul Dillon, 36, letter carrier; and Paula Dillon, 6.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENT Robert C. Atkinson, 46, Wolters Air Force base, was killed near Minera Wells Sunday in a traffic accident.

James Joe Sloan, 27, Houston carpenter, was shot to death near Houston Saturday. Murder charges were filed against E. W. Wilkerson, 17-year-old Aldine high school student and Future Farmers of America member. He said he feared Sloan was going to shoot young Wilkerson's father.

Grady Mozell Hill, 29, of near Austin was killed Sunday in a traffic accident.

Buddy Hooten, 16, Elmendorf, died Sunday of traffic injuries suffered Thursday near San Antonio. Dr. Martin Hoch, 39, Smithville physician, was found shot to death in his car near Yoakum, Tex., Sunday. Justice of the Peace F. A. Hallius ruled it suicide.

ACCIDENTAL SHOOTING Ralph Whitener, 27, a farmer, died Sunday at Corsicana after accidentally shooting himself.

L. D. Bass, 27, Midland Negro, was killed in the collision of his car and a bus.

A two-car collision at Fort Worth killed Richard Leon Terry, 24, on leave of absence from Huntsville penitentiary because of illness in his family. He was serving 30 years for armed robbery at Houston in 1945.

William Edward Welborn, 17, was killed Saturday when his passenger train collided 15 miles north of Orange.

Ralph Leslie, about 50, died Saturday from injuries received Friday night in a car wreck near Kermit.

North Atlantic Army Equipment Plans Now Ready

ROME — (AP) — Experts today put final touches on secret preliminary plans to rush training equipment to the North Atlantic Army.

A star-spangled array of top military leaders from 12 North Atlantic Treaty organization nations gathered to review the plans.

Tomorrow the hush-hush program goes before the NATO military committee, made up of the chiefs of staff of the 11 NATO countries which have armies and a civilian representative of Little Iceland, which doesn't.

A standing group of American, British and French representatives is giving the plan a final work-over. It was in session Saturday and until long after dark Sunday.

The 12-nation military committee will work in secret session until Thursday over the program. Friday it goes before the NATO deputies.

The full-dress NATO council begins meeting in the former gymnastics hall at the old Mussolini forum — now the Italian forum — on Saturday, Nov. 24.

Tight-lipped secrecy has been maintained on the program.

Pennsylvania Hunters Don't Like So Much Weather

KANE, Pa. — (AP) — Winter's first onslaught heaped over a foot and a half of snow on this town, tucked away high in the mountains of Northwestern Pennsylvania, but hardened residents passed over it lightly today as not much of a storm.

Bearing the seasonal nickname of "the ice box," Kane has over the years felt the bite of some of the nation's harshest weather. Its population of slightly more than 6,000 therefore takes pride in an unusual stamina.

"We kinda feel sorry for those fellows," said Kelta. "Most of them aren't used to our winters. They'll have a harder time getting bears, too. When a snow comes along the bears just lie down alongside a log and take it easy instead of roaming around. That means the hunters have to get out and dig for their bears."

The hunters themselves stayed close to their fires, to hotels, lodges, even in camps. They had this consolation, however, for what it was worth: It stopped snowing early today, the first break in the storm for about 28 hours.

Woman Who 'Died' Walks

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — The 60-year-old widow who was taken to the city morgue as dead 11 days ago is walking again.

Mrs. Theresa Butler, whose rapid return from apparent death has amazed doctors, took her first steps yesterday with help. A hospital spokesman, who said she was cheerful and alert, reported that Mrs. Butler now spends considerable time sitting in a chair knitting and chatting with nurses.

The spokesman said her doctors have high hopes that the woman will recover completely.

Mrs. Butler was pronounced dead by a doctor after she had taken an overdose of sleeping pills in an apparent suicide attempt Nov. 8. As ambulance attendants were taking her into the morgue they detected signs of life and rushed her to a hospital.

At first doctors, who said they could find no respiration or measurable blood pressure, feared her brain might have been permanently damaged by lack of oxygen during the time her heart and lungs apparently stopped working.

But a few days later she came out of her coma, recognizing those about her and talking to them. Her progress since then has been rapid.

Youth Committee Asks Dope Probe

SAN ANTONIO — (AP) — The Youth Welfare committee of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce has requested an "emergency narcotic control conference."

The committee yesterday asked Gov. Allan Shivers to call such a meeting because "the current assessment of stiff penalties for narcotic violators in Louisiana has resulted in an influx of dope peddlers in Texas."

Immediate action to "stop this encroaching menace" was asked.

PARIS — (AP) — All Paris morning newspapers except the city's two English-language dailies failed to appear today, due to a nation-wide 24-hour printers strike.

Mercury Begins Rising In Pampa

Slowly rising temperatures were in prospect for Pampa today after winter had driven mercury to a low 14 degrees Friday night, 17 degrees Saturday night and 18 degrees last night.

In Pampa and the area, temperatures were climbing from the below-freezing marks and by 11 a.m. today had reached 50 degrees. Forecast for the area indicated partly cloudy skies and rising temperatures this afternoon, tonight and Tuesday.

Cloudy weather prevailed along the coast and in South Central Texas this morning. The cloudiness is due to the extension of most of the state by tomorrow. A few few scattered showers are forecast but no general rains are yet in view.

No rain was reported during the 24 hour period ending this morning.

Yesterday afternoon the highest temperature reported in the state was 60 at Brownsville while the lowest maximum was did not get above 44 degrees.

at Texarkana where the mercury included Corsicana 22, Mineral Dalhart with 19 degrees, was among the cold overnight spots reported. Amarillo, Lubbock and Wichita Falls had a 23 while in East Texas, Lufkin reported a low of 21. Other lows reported included Corsicana 22, Mineral Wells 24, Childress, Wink, Junction and Fort Worth 25, Marfa 27, Waco 28, and Dallas and Tyler twenty nine degrees.

Judge Dismisses 45-Man Jury Panel

Judge Lewis M. Goodrich this morning dismissed a 45-man 31st District court jury after attorneys announced two of the three civil suits to be heard were in the process of settling, and a third postponed until the latter part of January, 1952.

A non-jury trial, Armstrong Cork Co. vs. D. A. Finklestine, and a companion suit, D. A. Finklestine vs. The Home Insurance Co., were announced as also in the settling process.

Being settled are the Fannie Mae Sinks vs. Mass. Bonding and Insurance Co. case, and Marion Welch vs. Texas Employers Insurance Co., a compensation case.

The compensation suit filed by Orval D. Johnson against the State Highway Dept. was postponed until January, 1952, after attorneys in the case told the court they were not ready for trial due to technicalities involving legal representation.

Reds To Reply Wednesday On Truce Proposal

MUNSAN, Korea — (AP) — Red cease-fire delegates today promised to give their overall reply Wednesday to an Allied proposal for an armistice in 30 days in Korea.

At the close of an hour and 15-minute session at Panmunjom, they asked and got a recess through Tuesday. They wanted to study a plan which got a truce line which courses up to more than 25 miles north of Parallel 38.

The Reds apparently want to refer the matter to Peiping — where Red China's Foreign Minister Chou En-Lai today issued a statement backing up a Russian proposal that Parallel 38 be the line of demarcation for divided Korea.

Chinese Red Gen. Hsieh Fang of the Communist delegation said the Reds, after studying the plan, would come back Wednesday with the overall reply. The hour of the next meeting will be 11 a. m. (8 p. m. Tuesday, CST).

The Norge Count-The-Dot conference settled in 30 days, the UN plan calls for a new demarcation line to be fixed, based on "such conditions as will be at the time mutually agreed to by the delegations of both sides."

Continued fighting might have changed it by then. Point one of the Allied proposal states that fighting will go on until an armistice is signed.

It was the fourth and last point in the UN plan which took up most of the time at Monday's session in Panmunjom. The meeting was the 28th of the joint subcommittees since the armistice talks resumed Oct. 25.

Once before in the long drawn out talks, a Communist recess resulted in settlement of a deadlock. Last July the Reds asked for and got a three-day recess. Immediately afterward, the two delegations agreed on an armistice agenda.

30 DAY PERIOD Maj. Gen. Henry H. Hodges, senior member of the UN subcommittee, explained again to the Reds Monday that a new provisional demarcation line must be determined at the end of a 30-day period if a full armistice has not been reached at that time.

He said point four meant that new and unforeseeable conditions may have arisen in the meantime which would govern the (See WEDNESDAY, Page 2)

Atomic Tests Will Be Continued Today

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — (AP) — Barring a last minute change in the weather, the Atomic Energy commission resumes its fall series of atomic test explosions today.

There was speculation that the burst will be set off underground. An AEC spokesman would neither confirm nor deny this. Observers here for the five blasts between Oct. 22 and Nov. 5 understood that an underground detonation would be part of the "second phase" experiments.

The five blasts in the first phase were either aerial or tower shots.

The new series was to have begun last week but unfavorable weather conditions caused them to be postponed. The weather today was clear with light breezes.

Earl Codlin Is Dead From Heart Attack

Flood In Italy Threatens Home Of Romeo, Juliet

ROVIGO, Italy — (AP) — The home of Romeo and Juliet — Verona — and Mantua today fell under the menace of Italy's rampaging flood with the collapse of a quarter of a mile section of the northern bank of Bianco canal.

The break, which has doubled in size since yesterday, was only one more new calamity in the desolated Po Delta, where nearly 200,000 persons have been made homeless.

A fierce storm-driven rain in some parts of the vast area added to sufferings of thousands of isolated, hungry, threatened persons. It also added to the floods, which in the past 10 days have brought death to more than 100 North Italians.

DESERTED CITY Rovigo, the provincial capital, was a deserted city. A fleet of small boats was rushed to Adria, where 20,000 of the 35,000 population were marooned after ignoring earlier warnings. During the weekend the waters covered the city and today rose in many places to second-story level.

The canal break was 40 miles from Verona, a city of 170,000, made famous by Shakespeare's story.

The flood spread ruin over a Delta triangle 26 miles deep and 18 miles wide at its Adriatic Sea base.

Submerged in the triangle were Adria Cavarzere, a city of 25,000 residents; Loreo, with 11,000, and Donada, 8,700, plus scores of villages, hamlets and farms.

Damage so far estimated in the millions of dollars.

From Rome a U. S. SA-16 amphibious plane took off with rations for the stricken area.

Big Three Start Disarm Ball Rolling

PARIS — (AP) — The Western big three asked the United Nations today to set up a 12-nation disarmament commission to start the ball rolling toward the step-by-step, supervised arms reduction proposed by the United States, France and Britain.

The proposal was to be introduced today before the UN general assembly's political committee by U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson. It puts into resolution form the earlier big three declarations of need for supervised gradual disarmament and a census of all weapons, including atomic.

The disarmament commission, to be composed of the UN Security Council and Canada, would draw up plans for a world-wide arms reduction conference. Such non-UN nations as Communist China would be invited to the conference.

As in the security council, all of the big five — Britain, China, France, the Soviet Union and the United States — would have to agree on the proposed commission's decisions. Each of the five would have the veto power which has so often blocked the council.

The commission would draw up, for submission to the world conference, treaties for the "regulation, limitation and balanced reduction of all armed forces and all armaments."

Russia on Friday proposed that a similar 12-nation commission start work at once on the inspection and control of all weapons. It called for the commission to report to the security council by Feb. 1, 1952 — presumably within the life of the current assembly.

The Western plan set no date for the calling of the disarmament conference, leaving that to the preparatory commission. Russia previously had proposed such a conference be held before June 1, 1952.

"It is a great mistake," the vice premier fighting to gain its rights and will never tire.

He said "Mr. Churchill and his intrigues are aimed at bringing about an election which would be contrary to the wishes of the people."

During the stopover here, Mossadegh issued a statement in which he said Iran's request for \$120,000,000 American aid had been "misinterpreted." He said Iran sought a loan — not an outright grant-in-aid — "for we know that such grants are collected in the form of taxes from the hard-working American people."

Oil Aplenty; Problem Is To Find It

DALLAS — (AP) — The men who find oil met here today with this challenge facing them: There's enough oil in the United States to last 100 years — if they can find it.

The estimate came from Dr. Sigmund Hammer, head of the group — the society of exploration geophysicists. The meeting is a regional one.

Yesterday, Dr. Hammer said in an interview: "As a matter of fact, our known reserves are the greatest in history. Last year, while the nation was using two billion barrels of oil, scientists and wildcaters found three billion."

The world supply, he added, is 600 billion barrels. So far, only 100 billion barrels have been discovered and only 60 billion produced.

On the other hand, there is only a 14-year supply of known reserves and oil explorers will have to find a lot more.

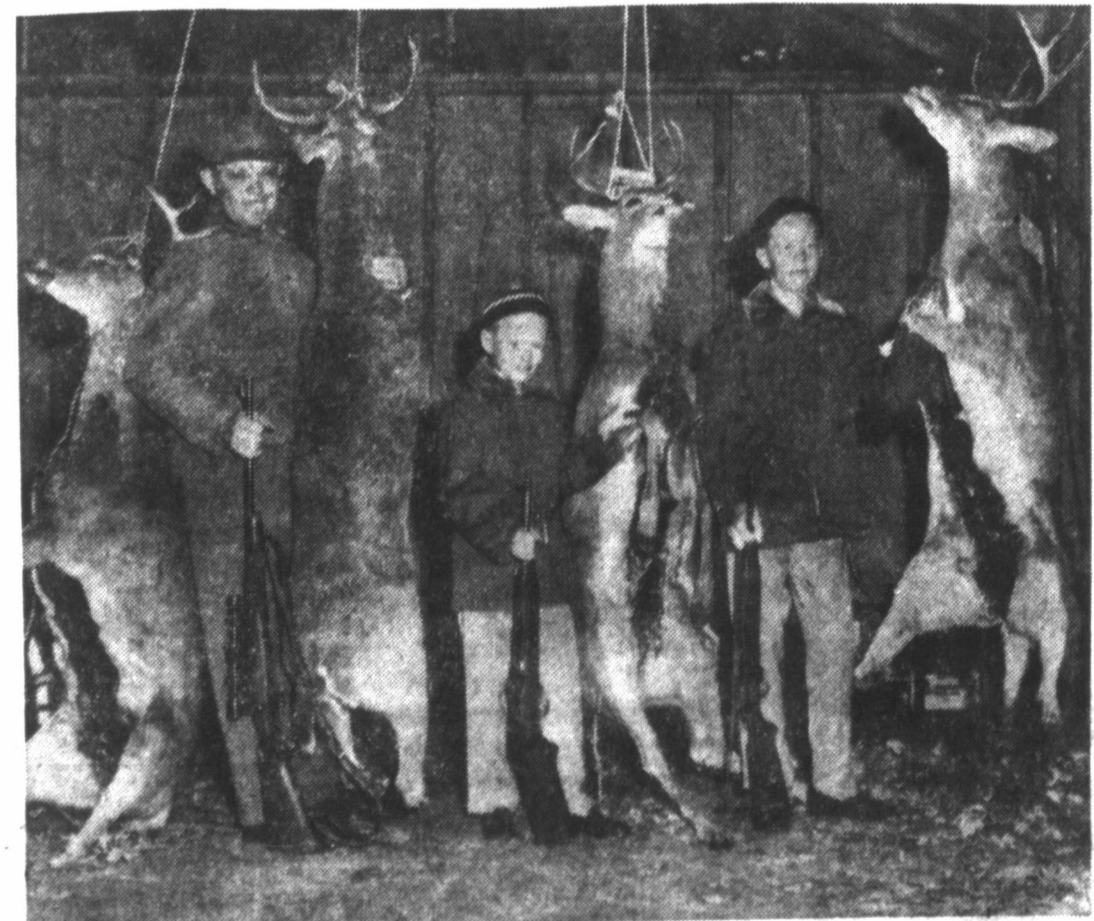
The petroleum industry, he declared, will have to "work like the devil to keep up with a national demand skyrocketing at the rate of 10 percent a year."

More people than ever are hunting oil, Dr. Hammer said. He estimated there are 600 teams of geophysicists at work, a 25 percent increase since Korea.

Most oil findings in the world are by Americans, he pointed out.

"It's a peculiar American ability, probably due to our free enterprise system," he said. "We can think boldly and are willing to gamble."

**Vivian Della Chiesa's Performance
 Praised Successful By Local Musician**

Ed. Note: This is the first of a series of guest reviews of the Pampa Community concerts. The reviews will be written by local professional musicians who are recognized authorities in their fields. Mr. Roy Johnson, author of the Pampa Daily News' first "Guest Review," taught voice at Baylor university before coming here in September. He studied under Walter Jenkins, Herbert Witherspoon Solon Alberti, and is now minister of music and education at the First Methodist church.)

Miss Della Chiesa officially met Vivian Della Chiesa Saturday night in the high school auditorium. Following this number were three more French songs from the Modern school. And finally, Miss Della Chiesa wove a spell of loneliness about us all. The "Il est Doux, il est Bon," the only composition in her next group was expressively sung with the throatiness one associates with Salome. As an encore she sang "Drink to Me Only with Thine Eyes," an old English folk song.

Following the intermission, Mr. Schaefer played two solos: first, "Nocturne in D Flat" by Chopin, and second, "Toccata" by Poulenc. In the "Nocturne," Mr. Schaefer showed a very good style for the composer's music, in as much as he had clear and melodic phrases, with the most beautiful soft passages one ever hopes to hear from the piano. His technique was facile and precise, yet it was not mechanical, for it flowed along with depth and feeling. The "Toccata" gave Mr. Schaefer the opportunity to display brilliance and intricate rhythmic phrases. His playing had finesse, and the audience enjoyed his selections very much. For an encore, he chose an early 18th century minuet arranged by Friedmann, which consisted of a theme, then an elaboration on that same theme.

After Mr. Schaefer's fine group of piano numbers, Miss Vivian Della Chiesa returned to the stage to bring us the best singing of the evening in her last two selections. In the Hebrides Island song "To People Who Have Gardens," the artist seemed at home with the lighter type of music. "Free at Last," a traditional Negro spiritual was first heard by Miss Della Chiesa as her maid, a Father Divine disciple, was dusting in the living room of her apartment. Julia Perry then arranged it in the captivating form which we heard Saturday night. Two more folk songs in English followed and then one in Spanish which our artist sang especially well. As an encore to this group we heard a rousing spiritual, "You Can't Take it With You, Brother Will, Brother John."

The last section began with a contemporary American song "I Am Like a Remnant of a Cloud," which the artist sang beautifully with excellent support from Mr. Schaefer on the stark accompaniment. "The Puffin," that was shaped like a Muffin, was very cleverly written and sung. Our own fellow-Texan, David Guion, contributed the next song, "De Masas and de Misas," a moving spiritual. Probably the best vocal control of the evening was shown on Rubenstein's "Since First I Met Thee," and also displayed a driving emotional quality this reviewer missed in the first half of the program.

Four encores closed the concert and all were exceptionally well done. "Green Dog" or "I'd Never be Seen Except in Green," carried a personal reference to the green of Miss Della Chiesa's gown. "We Kiss in a Shadow" from the current hit "The King and I" was next, followed by a Creole folk song, "Mister Banjo." Instead of the usual light, bright final encore Miss Della Chiesa sang "Think on Me," an old Scotch air. The sentimental test combined with warm, vibrant vocal tone brought down the curtain on a thoroughly enjoyable night.

NEW YORK — (AP) — Judy Garland, feeling "wonderful" after her backstage collapse last Sunday, is back on Broadway singing her way into the hearts of her fans.

The 29-year-old actress returned to the Palace theater vaudeville show last night and received an enrapturing ovation that left her and many in the 3800 audience sobbing.

Miss Garland, who has had a troubled career in recent years, spent four days in a private sanitarium this week recovering from what her doctor called "nervous exhaustion."

After a triumph in London, she made a smashing American comeback here last Oct. 16 and played to full houses twice-a-day until her illness last Sunday.

Her return last night was like another first night. Crowds surged in the street. A sign on the theater marquee said "Welcome Back, Judy." She was showered with flowers and telegrams at the end of the performance.

"It's quite overwhelming," she told her audience in an emotion-choked voice. "... but I love you. I mean it."

NEW YORK — (AP) — A Western Union vice president has been arrested here on a Michigan fugitive warrant charging conspiracy to violate gambling laws by knowingly allowing a horse race wire.

The warrant alleges Samuel Barr, 50, and other officials of the telegraph firm "did unlawfully and wickedly agree, combine, conspire and confederate to violate Michigan betting laws. The warrant also cites four alleged gamblers.

Assistant Attorney General Eugene F. Townsend of Michigan says Barr knew Western Union equipment was being used to transmit horse racing information although he never had been in Michigan.

Two Killed In Train Wreck

NAHUNTA, Ga. — (AP) — Two persons were killed and 21 others injured Thursday night when the Atlantic Coast Line railroad's "Havana Special" sideswiped a freight train and demolished the depot at nearby Hortense crossing.

Sheriff J. Walter Crews of Brantley county said A. H. Byington, engineer of the passenger train, "pumped at the instant of impact and was killed by the wreckage."

James Strickland, 24-year-old Hortense station agent, died beneath the wreckage when the passenger train's three diesel units were hurled nearly 100 feet from the tracks, the sheriff reported.

None of the injured was seriously hurt.

General Manager L. T. Andrews of the ACL said at Wilmington, N.C., that the cause of the wreck has not been determined.

A railroad official at the scene said that nine passenger cars left the tracks in addition to

U.S. Icebreakers Russ To Return

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Russia has notified the United States that it is preparing to return two lend-lease icebreakers the United States has been trying for three years to get back.

A note delivered to the State Department said the two ships — the North Wind and the West Wind — will leave an unnamed Soviet port for Bremerhaven, Germany, this month.

A third icebreaker, the South Wind, loaned to Russia during World War II was returned to American authorities in Japan two years ago. Moscow said then that the other two were stuck in the Arctic ice.

People Now Doing Own Refinishing On Furniture

What with the present high price of new furniture of good quality, more and more people are doing refinishing jobs on their present furniture. It's not too difficult and the results are worthwhile in giving you a handsome "new" piece and a sense of achievement.

Just one caution: before you start to refinish an old chest, chair or bed, decide whether the piece is worth the work and time. It's a waste to spend them on furniture that was not pretty good to start with because cheap-jack furniture is usually so structurally unsound that it won't last very long.

First step in renovating old furniture is to remove the original finish, down to the wood. This finish usually consists of varnish and wax. In the case of painted furniture that has been done over before, you'll have to remove the successive coats of paint or enamel.

Varnish remover generally will do the trick. First, disassemble the piece as far as possible without breaking glued joints. Remove drawers and hardware. Such as knobs and lock plates. Flow the varnish remover on with an old brush onto a flat surface so it can set for 10 minutes and loosen the varnish.

Sagging Beams Can Cause Many House Ailments

Everyone knows the ominous sound and feel of creaky, warped floor boards. Maybe you've noticed that when you walk across a certain patch of floor the bookcase rocks a bit or the lamp on the corner table rattles. Or perhaps you wonder why the doors on the ground floor stick, while those above do not. Or that the wall plaster is cracking.

All these symptoms generally mean that the floor beams have sagged and that you're in for trouble unless you do something about it. If the floor isn't too much out of level, you can raise it by using wedges between the girders and the joists. Use two wooden wedges under each joist and tap them into place from opposite directions.

Repeat this at each joist under the low area until the correct level has been reached. Secure the wedges so that vibration will not loosen them. A nail through each one will do the trick.

It is natural for wood to shrink a little as it dries in a house, especially in a new one, and usually the use of wedges is all that is necessary.

In the event that the wooden girder has sagged so far as to make the use of wedges impractical, you will have to raise the girder to its original position. This is best done with metal column jacks which are available at many builders' supply firms and the larger mail order houses.

The column jack is a hollow metal column with a large screw in the lower end. When this is turned with a metal bar or rod it forces the upper end against the girder, gradually pushing the latter back into place.

Girders should have a support at least every 10 feet, so that you may need more than one column to return the sagging girder to its original straight position. After this is done, the metal column must be left in position.

Pipe Line Slated In North Dakota

TULSA — (AP) — J. L. Burke, president of the Service Pipe Line Co., said today that the first crude oil pipe line in the North Dakota portion of the Williston Basin is being planned for early construction.

Burke said a 14-mile gathering system will be built near Tioga to transport the oil production of that area to a tank car loading rack. Service, a subsidiary of the Standard Oil of Indiana, will install a 12-car loading rack and two 5000 barrel tanks at Tioga on a spur track to be built by the Great Northern railroad.

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Odorless Coatings In Hospital Solve Paint Problems

WASHINGTON, D. C. — A quick-drying paint that is completely odorless is now being used almost exclusively at the George Washington University hospital. No longer obliged to close down wards or rooms during repainting, work is done either in a short period of time during which patients are transferred to temporary quarters, or between the discharge of one patient and the admission of the next.

Even the nurseries are vacated for only a relatively brief period. As soon as the final coat is applied, the babies are moved back to their regular quarters. Before odorless paint was available, these nurseries had to be left vacant for at least 48 hours. The new odorless paint has an oil base and, in addition, an primer coat is used. Surfaces painted in this manner can take the numerous and vigorous washings essential in maintaining the standard of cleanliness demanded by a hospital.

With delays in repainting and paint maintenance at an end, one of the busiest spots in this new and modern hospital is its paint shop. A full-time paint crew is required to keep the institution in spotless condition. All the paint colors are mixed in the shop and each job is carefully supervised. Keeping painted surfaces in the hospital clean and fresh not only protects the patients and guarantees that the attractiveness of the building's interior will be preserved, it also aids in protecting an investment of several million dollars through proper maintenance of painted surfaces.

Like many other modern hospitals, George Washington has avoided the use of white paint. The walls of the lobby and corridors are done in a warm buff, while the walls of the operating rooms and delivery rooms are finished in a soft yellow-gray that is restful and soothing to the eye.

A total of 220 rooms and 15 wards now have been redecorated in sunshine yellow, ocean green, soft gray, peach or pinkish-buff. As the remaining rooms and wards are refinished, these new colors will be used. A generous but tasteful application of color has proved to be good therapy.

All walls are given a flat rather than a gloss finish. Flat paint has good hiding power, concealing tiny defects or uneven areas in the surface that would

The delivery room linen is teal blue as are the gowns worn by the obstetricians and delivery room nurses. Cafeterias and parties are supplied with orange tea towels — a pleasing contrast to their olive green walls. Color, most assuredly, is in this hospital to stay.

Czech Books Abandoned

AUSTIN — For more than 20 years, textbooks for Czech language classes at the University of Texas were imported from Czechoslovakia.

Dr. Eduard Micek, Slavonic languages department chairman, could still order books from his native country, but he doesn't. "They are full of Communist propaganda," Professor Micek explains. "We must be independent now."

So Micek has written a Czech reader called "Spring," which has gone into its second edition and is moving rapidly toward a third edition. The first printing sold out in two months.

A picture of the University of Texas Main Bldg. appears on the book's cover, and 37 pictures by famous Czech artists are scattered through the text. Czech songs, with musical scores, also are included.

"Spring" was published by the University's Czech Literary Society and has been distributed throughout the U.S. and Canada.

ONE WIN

Still the Cats will field a forward wall averaging 178 pounds per man down the line. The Cats just got off on the "wrong foot" when they dropped their opener to Midland and after a against Big Spring, had the misfortune to run in Breckenridge. Since then they haven't been able to recover.

The Bobcats will be using the T formation, and after scouting the Harvesters the past few games, may resort to some of the spreads and passing attacks employed by Borger and Amarillo.

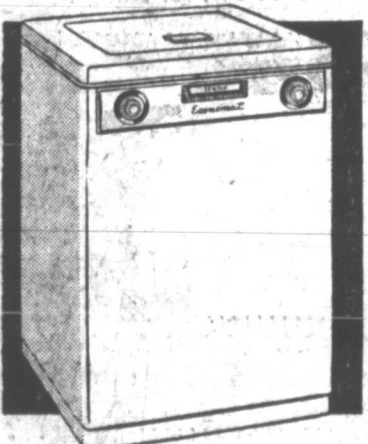
PASSING ATTACK

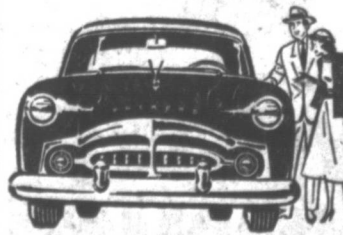

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New Mystery Thriller -- Southwest Conference

There may have been whicker races than the Southwest Conference is putting on this year but nobody can remember it. With two weeks to go five teams still are in the fight for the title or a share of it.

Texas Christian and Rice, tied for the lead with three victories and one loss each, clash at Fort Worth Saturday in the big game of the week. But of little less importance will be the battle of Baylor and Southern Methodist at Waco.

Baylor is close enough to TCU and Rice that the least thing can shoot the Bears right up there. Texas is almost even with Baylor.

Texas added its bit of confusion by beating Texas Christian 32-21. It had been generally conceded that TCU would be in a most advantageous position if it could down Texas. But the Longhorns were never better and to the amazement of everybody had a whirlwind passing attack. It allowed Rice to pull into a first place tie. The Owls beat Texas A&M 25-13.

Actually the chances of two teams—Texas and Southern Methodist—of winning or sharing the championship are pretty dim. But the statisticians are having a field day with the thing and come up with the revelation that Texas conceivably could win the title and SMU could tie for it.

HOW'S THAT AGAIN

Here's how that would work: TCU has Rice and SMU to play. Rice has Baylor, Baylor has SMU and Texas has Texas A&M. If TCU and Rice tied, Baylor beat Rice, SMU beat Baylor and TCU, and Texas lost to A&M, SMU, Baylor, Rice and TCU would tie

for first place with records of three victories, two losses and one tie apiece. If Texas beat A&M, however, Texas would win the title with four victories and two losses.

And you can go on and on. It's not probable but then what is probable in the Southwest Conference? Take last week: an Arkansas team that had beaten Texas 14-14 was slammed 47-7 by a Southern Methodist team that had lost to Texas 20-13. A TCU team that beat Baylor 20-7 was licked by a Texas team that had lost to Baylor 18-6.

And while the conference teams are tying each other in knots, the Cotton Bowl puts its collective foot. What to do? It can't pick a visiting team not knowing who's going to be the host team because the host team has to accept the visiting team.

Arkansas and Texas A&M are not worrying about it, since they definitely are out of everything. So Arkansas Saturday will try to help the conference's inter-sectional record, already mighty good at 15 victories against only seven losses. The Razorbacks play Tulsa at Little Rock.

The inter-sectional record was enhanced last week when Baylor's ferocious Bears whipped the pants of Wake Forest 42-0.

Texas and A&M aren't doing any football business this week. They will be working toward

Pressure Tactics Exploded Into Football Scandal When William & Mary Went After Big-Time Cash

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. —(NEA) — Attempting to keep up with the college football Joneses brought about the most flagrant abuse of all at historic William and Mary, whose prexy, John E. Pomfret, has just quit because of the ruckus. The abuse was the alteration of preparatory school transcripts.

Say a large and mobile back or a bruising blocking back required half a credit in mathematics or English. It was simply given to him somewhere along the line between his high school principal and the College of William and Mary Dean of Admissions. Several former secretaries in the athletic department testified to having doctored transcripts.

In justice to the administration, it must be recorded that as far back as November, 1949, it stopped the policy of having transcripts cleared to the Dean of Admissions through the athletic department. Since then they have arrived at the Dean's office with the high or prep school seal unbroken.

Not more than a half-dozen of these forgeries have come to light, and only two players known to have been involved remain in school. But you have to wonder how long this short cut to eligibility went on and can't help but suspect that there is similar sharp practice elsewhere. There is ample ground for suspicion.

The crack 1947 team went to Birmingham's Dixie Bowl to lose to Arkansas by two points on New Year's Day of 1948. The squad flew to Olean, N. Y., to combat St. Bonaventure; to the University of Houston; to Arkansas; to Michigan State, and to the Orange Bowl to engage Miami.

Regardless of how tough they were if the money was there. And as the pressure increased, more and bigger and better boys had to be obtained.

There are less than 1000 male undergraduates at the College of William and Mary, the second oldest educational institution in the United States. The stands of Williamsburg's Cary Field accommodate only 15,000. One game annually is staged at the Richmond City Stadium, which seats 28,000. The team had to get the money on the road.

McCray accomplished the job he set out to do. He reduced the athletic debt by roughly two-thirds — from \$100,000 to \$30,000 — in an operation that costs, with a 60-man squad, in the neighborhood of \$100,000 a year.

There are 40 football scholarships — tuition, books, food and a \$10 a month — representing upward of \$35,000. No part of the receipts can be used for athletic scholarships, so the Educational Foundation contributes generously.

The main difficulty, however, was that more affluent recruiting systems at larger colleges could give the backs and linemen better propositions. William and Mary had to continue to get its share of stalwarts from Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Five teams still are in the running for the championship or a share of the title. The preferential lists turned in by them apparently make it imperative that there be a clearer picture in the championship race before any team can be invited.

The Cotton Bowl apparently can afford to wait in the case of Kentucky, which isn't likely to be invited to the Orange Bowl in view of the fact that Georgia Tech, already in the bowl game, beat Kentucky in regular season play. Kentucky has a season record of seven wins and three losses.

The Sugar Bowl already is filled with Tennessee and Maryland. The Rose Bowl is a closed corporation between the Pacific Coast and Big Ten conferences — so apparently the only major bowl left for Kentucky is the one in Dallas.

Statistics for the season to date show the Bears and Texas A&M to have gained an average of 336.1 yards per game. Baylor has given up 225.5 yards on defense, compared to 228.4 for Texas.

Czech Tells UN AP Correspondent Trained As Spy

PARIS (AP)—Czechoslovakia's deputy foreign minister told the United Nations general assembly Friday that Associated Press correspondent William N. Oatis was carefully prepared for espionage. The former Associated Press man in Prague is serving a 10-year prison sentence in Czechoslovakia after a trial for spying which has aroused criticism throughout most of the Western world, which called the trial a legal farce.

The Czech delegate to the UN, Madame Gertruda Sekaninova-Carrivova, said U.S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson presented Oatis as a symbol of the freedom of the press.

"He showed, by this," she said, "very clearly what in his conception is the meaning of the freedom of the press. After a careful preparation, not of course in a journalism school, but in a school of espionage," William Oatis "honestly gathered" information on frontier security measures, on the disposition of armed forces and other military matters, transmitting his information to American military authorities.
