

# Four Point Proposal Truce Before Christmas If Accepted

The Communists may reply today to a dramatic Allied proposal to complete a Korean armistice within 30 daysa week before Christmas.

Subcommittees of the opposing sides were to meet at Panmunjom at 11 a. m. (8 p m., Saturday, CST), for the promised Red reaction.

The United Nations negotiators Saturday made this four-point proposal:

1. Hostilities to continue until a full armistice is signed; 2. The present battleline to form a provisional cease - fire line and basis for a provisional demilitarized zone:

3. This line and zone to become the final versions provided complete armistice is reached within 30 days; and

4. 





Most complaints result from misunderstandings between patient and doctor. They should be avoided by a frank discussion in advance. Your doctor's primary concern is and always has been the protection of your health.

At first the cough is dry, but later the secretion becomes more and more abundant and is brought up with the coughing Sometimes bronchitis comes on more slowly and is said to be "chronic" from the start. The causes of chronic bronchitis are much the same as those of the acute variety, that is germs, ruses, irritating fumes and the like.

The symptoms are also similiar but not so severe. DRUGS MAY HELP Drugs may relieve the symptoms somewhat. The substance which causes the irritation should be removed, if possible. 








