



NEW YORK (P) — If en-assignment. what would happen to your nestegg of savings and investments?
Big business had been worrying about that for some time. And now individuals are, too. Many of them are seeking ways of dispersing their investments, just as corporations are dispersing their vital records a mong outlaying branches, or in converted mines, or in vaults in smaller cities unlikely to be

Individuals are moving their securities and records to bank But even more than that, larger investors are checking their securities, to make sure they are widely scattered among com-panies that wouldn't fold up if one bomb fell, according to those who make a full-time job handling investments.

Investors are beginning to disperse their investments whenever possible, according to Clinton Davidson, president of Fiduciary Counsel, Inc., which supervises about \$500 million for

His clients reason that a company with many plants located in various parts of the United States, such as large oil comor chemical companies, ranies would be able to continue producing and earning even if some of the units were damaged or destroyed.

The small investor is just as much involved as the large one. Dispersal of investment has long been considered good sense—with or without litters over

"Investment is more than a means of obtaining current in-come on your capital," Davidson points out. "It is also a way to protect your funds against the hazards of the future."

To protect capital against war, investors seek stock of companies whose activities will not be badly restricted by war effort or by the inevitable inflation which accompanies war. Such companies are the most likely to go on making money when over nesses are being hurt by short-

ages and price controls.



By R. C. HOILES A Statement Accredited To

Jesus That Seems To Imply Two Masters

There is one passage in Matthew, Mark and Luke accredited to Jesus that I think has caused much con-fusion. Since I have never heard a rational explanation of this statement, I want to experiment and try to explain it with the hope that someone will point out my errors. A good way to learn is to think outloud and have someone point out one's errors.

The statement referred to is "Render therefore unto Caesar the things that are Ceasar's and unto God the things which are God's."

Matthew, Mark and Luke quote practically the same thing. The Moffatt and Goodspeed translations change the text very little. Moffatt says: "Give Caesar what belongs to Caesar. Give God what belongs to God." Goodspeed gives about the same translation as Moffatt.

Of course, this statement means render unto the government what belongs to the government, be-cause in this case Caesar stood for

the government. However, this statement does not give any enlightenment to the individual as to what belongs to the government and what belongs to God. The statement, of course, was made to the Pharisees who were not very much in symphathy with the doctrines of Jesus. They were trying to ask Him a question that might get Him into trouble Possibly the explanation for this statement accredited to Jesus is that He used this method of evading a dircet answer.

Why So Harmful?

The reason that this statement seems to me to cause a lot of confusion is that it leaves the impression that an individual can be loyal to two masters-to the state or the government and to his own conscience or to God. It seems to me that it implies that the state or the government has a right to do things that no individual has a moral right to do. In other words, that you can serve two masters or two gods.

And this theory that you can serve two masters and two gods is entirely contradictory to whole philosophy of Jesus Christ that you can only serve one god. statement is invariably quoted by church people in their defense of some form of statism or collectivism. 

get Him into This statement, of course, was made to the Pharisees and not to his disciples. At that time people knew very little about a limited government. They were used to having the government direct their lives. It was a new statement, as far as the times were concerned, for it implied that there were things that the state had nothing to do with and that the individual's conscience was above the state. At that time, of course, the Declaration of Independence had not been written that says: "governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed". But the whole philosophy of Jesus would indicate that He believed in one god-one master and, that loyalty could not be divided. Or possibly Jesus meant that an honest manner, and SERVES the individual was to support the gov-people instead of BOSSING them. ernment or render service to the ernment or render service to the government for things that it could do better and more easily than they could be done by individuals. But this is hard to conceive because individuals have a right to voluntarily cooperate and in so doing can voluntarily do things better than they can be done on a compulsory basis, as is

the case with government. At any rate, the belief that there are two standards and that the government has a moral right ty." to do things that are immoral for an individual to do is a belief that is contrary to the Commandments and the Golden Rule and the De-claration of Independence. It is a belief that leads us into long periods of unemployment, unnecessary poverty and misery, one war after another and into a governproud father of a bouncing baby boy. 




