The students were given a list of books, containing the "Grapes of Wrath," and they were to choose from THAT LIST. THAT LIST was the school's (or English teacher's SELECTED LIST. I did not say that the book itself was in the high school but that it was one of a very few which

students were told to select and to read. If anyone wants proof I'll be

glad to supply it. As a matter of

In my article on Steinbeck's book, I had not mentioned Newport High specifically as one of the schools presenting this list of books to its students, but Mr. Davidson apparently sees fit to reflect upon this column's accuracy, using the technique of denying something that wasn't charged and saying a BOOK wasn't in the school, while NOT denying that the school placed Steinbeck's book on its approved list for Junior students.
