A Bribe for Newspapers

Newspapers, like other businesses, need money on which to run and the principal source of revenue for a newspaper is from the advertising it carries.

Sen. John H. Bankhead, Alabama Democrat, has introduced a bill to direct the Treasury department to expend not less than \$25,000,000 nor more than \$30,000,000 for advertising space to promote the sale of bonds, notes and other U. S. Obligations.

Not less than half of the money is to be expended in weekly, semi-weekly, tri-weekly and monthly newspapers.

Obviously the precedent set by the bill is a dangerous threat to the freedom of the American press. If the congress can appropriate \$30,000,000 for what constitutes a virtual bribe for the newspapers, there is nothing to prevent the congress from increasing the appropriation to 300 million or three billion or any other figure desired.

Certainly any paper that believed that the sale of bonds or any governmental obligations would be of benefit to the people and didn't voluntarily promote the sales would be derelict in its duty as a newspaper and would not be worth the subscriber's money.

Aside from the fact that the money has to come from the pockets of the people, since the government has no money, the Bankhead measure is unsound in principle and ought to be thrown out before it goes any farther.

Gen. Brehon B. Somervell, chief of army services and supply, in a speech in New York Tuesday declared that "there have been no huge accumulations of stores which could not be moved overseas."

However, an Associated Press dispatch last week from Mead, Neb., said that officials of the Nebraska Ordnance plant had given out the following statement: "The war department announces that at the present time the supply of bombs and shells is more than adequate to take care of present needs."

Furthermore, the Rock Island Argus of last Wednesday published a story telling of the reclassification of the Tri-City area into a Group 3 noncritical labor area by the war man power commission at Washington.

Again, a story from Washington, published in The Tribune Sunday, told of plans that were being made for reconverting a number of plants, "now contributing to an overproduction of some types of munitions, back into production of civilian goods."

And, finally, taking account of all of the evidences of the accumulation of supplies he had seen, Brig. Gen. Thomas S. Hammond, chief of the Chicago Ordnance district, told a Tribune reporter last Friday that, because of the "marvelous job" which industry has done in producing war supplies, there would soon be a need to reconvert some war plants to the production of civilian goods.

"NOT MERE STRIKES AGAINST EMPLOYERS"

In President Roosevelt's plea to the coal miners not to strike, he makes a statement which shows his lack of understanding of how free enterprise benefits the workers.

The word "mere" here indicates that he believes the ordinary strike in peace time is merely a strike against employers of the industry to enforce collective bargaining demands.

There never has been a strike that has only been against the employers of industry. Every strike in peace time, as well as in war time, is a strike against every other worker-consumer.

Strikes Same in Peace As War

The only difference between strikes in war time and strikes in peace time is that the harm they do is more immediate and more evident in times of war than in times of peace.

Probably the strike during war times will tend to cause people to understand that strikes in peace time are unchristian, undemocratic, uneconomic, and unAmerican.

The writer of this column has been opposed to collective bargaining because he could foresee that the end results of collective bargaining would be greatly reduced production.

It is too bad that we have to suffer the great inconvenience resulting from the belief that collective bargaining can be beneficial to workers as a whole.

And if the coal miners have a right to establish an artificial wage for their labor, and receive more than others are able to receive, then other groups have an equal right to establish artificial rewards for their labor.

As has been pointed out, labor in reality is not working for the employer, but is working for other laborers. And when any group raises their wages arbitrarily, they automatically reduce the real wages of the other laborers to whom they are supplying their labor.

Yes, the end results of collective bargaining is inflation, a dictator, the abandonment of the American way of life, the free enterprise way of life, the democratic way of life, the Christian way of life.

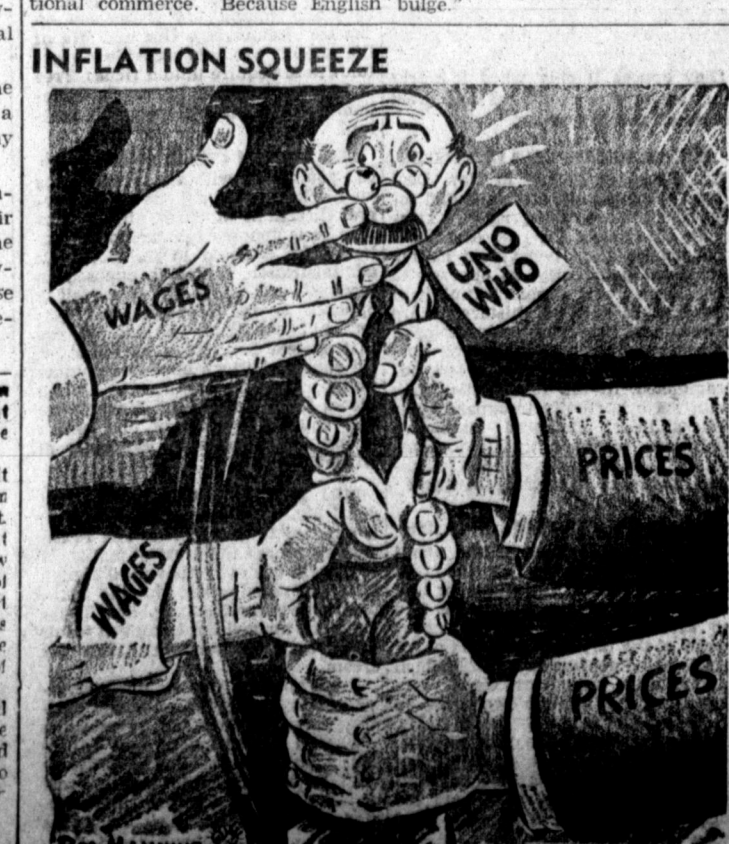

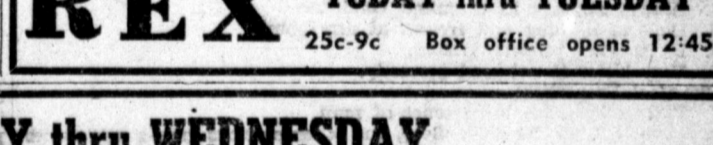

Manpower Rules Are Explained

Rules for what is designated as the "regional stabilization plan" of the war manpower commission were outlined today by Lonnie Hood, manager of the United States employment service, 206 N. Russell.

Do's and don'ts are: Any employer engaged in an essential activity may hire any new employee who for the preceding 30 days was not engaged in an essential activity.

An employer may not hire in any work not essential a new employee who for the preceding 30 days was engaged in an essential activity at a higher wage or salary rate than the worker received at his last job.

Employers engaged in essential activity can hire new employees who have been engaged in non-essential activities without regard to a statement of availability issued by the worker's last employer or by the war manpower commission.

An employer engaged in an essential industry must issue a statement of availability to a worker whenever he discharges a worker or lays off the worker for an indefinite period or for seven days or more; or whenever the worker can establish that he is not being used at his highest skill or is not employed full time.

A worker must first apply to his employer such a statement of availability. If the employer refuses or is prohibited from issuing such statement, the worker then may make a request from the U. S. E. S. office or the war manpower commission.

The WMC may issue a statement to a worker when it is convinced that the action would be in the best interest of the war effort.

No statement may be issued solely on the ground that a worker's wage rate is substantially less than that prevailing in the locality for similar work.

The statement must contain worker's name, social security number, name and address of issuing employer, or the WMC office and officer, and the statement that this employee is available for work in an essential activity. No other information may be placed on the statement by an employer.

Workers are prohibited from accepting work from an employer if such employment is prohibited by the regional stabilization plan.

Either worker or employer may appeal a USES decision on an application for a statement of availability.

The plan went into effect in Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico on April 29.

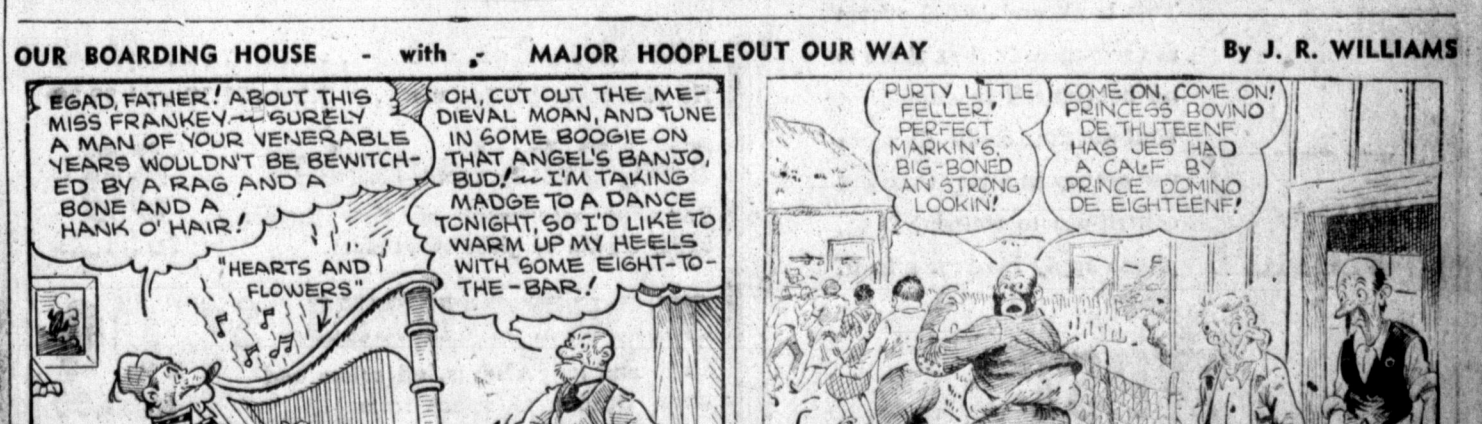

Small Firms Can Obtain War Loans

BY BRACK CURRY Associated Press Staff
On the spot loans up to \$25,000 are available to Texas small plant owners at four War Production Board offices in the state to convert factories to war production.

Regional and district offices of the Smaller War Plants Corporation, a branch of WPB, can make loans to this amount without Washington's approval, says Col. Robert W. Johnson, WPB vice chairman and chairman of SWPC.

This is one more step in the corporation's speed-up process to integrate small plants into war production.
War contracts for little businessmen in Texas and other states are available in multibillion-dollar volume, says Johnson, announcing a goal of 25 to 35 billion dollars for smaller plants.

"If persuasion fails to obtain these contracts, we'll use the powers given us by congress," he says. "We will decentralize our operations. This job cannot be done in Washington. It can only be done on the industrial front."
