Treasury Says Fraud Section **Being Formed**

WASHINGTON - (AP) The Treasury advised Senat crime investigators today it is setting up a special fraud section to check on the income tax returns of gamblers and racketeers.

Secretary Snyder sent to the committee a pledge of a continuing drive to bring 'chiselers to justice." His statement was presented by Edward Foley, under secretary of the treasury.

Snyder said there has not been and will not be any letup in the Internal Revenue Bureau's warfare "against major league criminals." He noted it was the income tax men who bagged the late Scarface Al Capone, Chicago gang overlord of the prohibition

Un'il measures have been discovered to prevent cancer and to treat it by some chemical or tissue preparation (and this may not be so far off) every grownup should be alert to early suspicious symptoms. This is most important because even with the

methods of treatment which we have today a high proportion of cures can be obtained if this disease is recognized early and appropriate steps

What are the signs then which raise suspicion and should lead us to have X-rays or other investigations? Abnormal bleeding from any of the body openings is one. This is by no means always caused by cancer but it should never be ignored without trying to trace what is causing is. The appearance of a lump any-

where on the body should be investigated. In such cases the doctor often wants to make a little cut into it so he can remove a tiny portion of tissue and examine it under the microscope for cancer cells. Since cancer attacks the stom-

ach or intestines more often than any other one part of the anatomy any loss of weight which cannot be explained by dieting or some other obvious reason should not be ignored.

Difficulty in swallowing, loss of appetite or anemia are other signs requiring attention. Long contin-(See THE DOCTOR, Page 8)

American or British. A Britannia who once ruled the waves has been greatly disturbed over the appointment Uncle Sam's Vice Admiral Wat liam M. Fechteler as supreme commander of the combined Atlantic naval forces. Former Prime Minister Winston Churchill has led a fierce attack on the British government for agreeing to this selection, which he re-

garded as a slight to British naval prestige. However, that appointment is water over the dam. Now comes the selection of a supreme commander for the southern theatre and it is generally recognized that he should be a naval man. The reason is that protection of this right flank of Eisenhower's army will be mainly a sea operation, So again Britain is urging her rights to this important post. The London News Chronicle sums the matter up thus:





All this means that we should not delay in the presence of suspicious signs even if they often prove to be a false alarm. And if a cancer almost anywhere is caught early it can be successfully treated. There are three methods of attacking it: to cut it outsurgery—to use X-rays, and to use radium

DOCTOR DECIDES

Great strides have been made in all of these. For example, it is now possible even to remove and thereby cure many cancers of the lungs though 25 years ago this seemed impossible. Which of these methods to use and how to use them is, of course, something that can be decided only by the trained doctor.

In discussing this subject it is always necessary to warn against worrving about cancer so much

that life is no longer worth living. Some people do this and it just doesn't make sense. We should strive to be reasonably careful not to overlook anything death in the United States. important but at the same time to avoid getting into a state of chronic fright.
