Government Orders April 30 Deadline

WASHINGTON —(P)— The nation's retail and wholesale grocers today set about shifting a huge volume of food items—costing the public \$20,000,000,000 a year—to a new method of price controls.

They are under government orders to complete the transfer between April 5 and April 30.

The Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) announced three regulations last night, putting about 60 percent of all foods under fixed "markup" percentages which the agency said are those in effect before the Korean outbreak. A grocer adds the "markup" percentage to his cost in order to determine his ceiling price.

Here is what the new system means to the country: First, it means a great many up and down movements in food prices, depending on the store prices, depending on the store, the locality, and the kind of food. Price Director Michael V. Disalle said "we are sure that there will be more decreases than increases." Since Atomic Energy Commission Chairman Gordon Dean hinted recently that new tests might be made at locations not used heretofore, there has been developing speculation that the Aleutians might be one of the sites. Reasons for this include:

1. Atomic bomb tests to date have been conducted only in favorable weather conditions in areas unlike those which would be logical A-bomb targets in a

So far, atomic bombs have been tested at the original Alamogordo, N.M., site; at Bikini, at Eniwetok and in the experiments during late January and early February on Frenchman's Flat, in the desert near Las Vegas, N.M. In these tests, bombs were exploded from a steel tower (at Alamogordo), dropped from a B-29 bomber (the first Bikini test), exploded in shallow water (the second Bikini test) and fired in unannounced manner at

Eniwetok and Las Vegas. But so far as is known the atomic weaponeers have not exploded a bomb buried below the ground. To simulate a deep-penetration atomic bomb dropped from high altitude.



LEIPZIG, East Germany The century -Leipzig spring fair, once Europe's greatest trade exhibition, has unfurled its banners again. The banners this year appeal for a stronger east-west trade, but there is far more propaganda on display than there is trade.

Visitors to the fair don't act very enthusiastic about it. Most of them are poorly dressed and appear more interested in the displays of food stuffs than in the industrial products.

This is understandable, because there is a lot of unrationed food to be had at the fairfor a price- and the visitors are glad to stand in line for

Last year shops were stocked up for the fair with tantalizing displays of meat butter and other scarce items, but they were only window dressing and had to sent back to Russia afterwards. This year East Zone Germans had their rations cut 20 percent for two months before the fair opened to present visitors with a view of much food and good living."



Better Peanuts In Atomic Age

RALEIGH, N.C. - One of the early Atomic Age achievements promises to be better peanuts. More peanuts per acre, and even something better in nut quality are objectives at North Carolina State College School of Agriculture. The ex-Walton C. Gregory, associate professor of agronomy.

Thirty years ago the U.S. Department of Agriculture set out to discover how to cross-breed these plants to get new or better varieties. This scientific nut has not yet been cracked. The inherited characteristics of a peanut don't vary much, due to selffertilization.

State College sent peanuts to Oak Ridge, Tenn., to be exposed to gamma rays of atomic origin. These radioactive fays caused a profusion of heredity changes, even in peanuts. This year the third generation from the Oak Ridge pappy peanuts is showing hundreds of changes, mostly useless. There are, for example, some the size of walnuts, and some heart-shaped. The Atomic Age stuff seems to be jarring

the nuts' fixed habits. But State College has added evidence that a solution may be nearer, in the form of the sixth generation of some improved nuts that were bred in the old-fashioned way, without benefit of radioactivity.



Almost anything would easier to discuss than leuk This is a condition which is so times called can-

cer of the blood, because like the latter disease the cells multiply and grow wild. But unlike most cancers, leukemia often attacks in youth and childhood; perhaps nothing is so distre

to a family and to doctors. Leukemia used to be considered a rare disease, but many of those interested in it have felt for the last 20 or 30 years that it was increasing. In fact there are several signs leading to this conclusion and indeed the rate of increase seems to have been all too

rapid. There are several forms of leukemia but it is not possible to discuss them all here. In all of them, however, the difficulty lies in the manufacture of abnormal white blood cells or leukocytes which are shoved into the blood, usually in excessive numbers. The disease almost always pro-

duces anemia, too, because the manufacture of red blood cells is interfered with. Among other common effects of the disease are lessened resistance to infection, a tendency to easy bleeding, and interference with some of the functions of other tissues.

Again like cancer the exact cause of leukemia is not clear. As in cancer there is some tendent for leukemia to run in families but this if meaningful at all, is a lowered resistance to the disease rather than a true inheritance.

Another influence which may possibly have to do with developing leukemia is overexposure to X-rays. This does not mean that an X-ray film or two would cause any trouble, but physicians specializing in this field seem to have had more leukemia, for example, than those whose work has not brought them in contact with X-rays so much. We should aim at being able to

prevent leukemia entirely, but for the time being that happy event seems to lie rather far in the future. But treatment looks more hopeful. In some kinds of leukemia X-

rays or radium have produced good improvement. Phosphorus which has been made radioactive has also been useful. Blood transfusions and the use of penicillin or its relatives to control infection help a lot.

Experiments are going on constantly with these methods and others. Even if the first big sup is only one which makes it possible to turn an acute leukemia inrecognize progress. A prominent investigator of his

disease recently stated that he knows a patient who had chronic leukemia for 23 years and when last seen was still engaged in the practice of medicina



NEW DELHI — (P) — Prime Minister Nehru today criticized General Douglas MacArthur's recent peace talk offer to the Korean Chinese Communists as an 'extraordinary development fraught with grave consequences for all countries concerned."


