State Department Concerned:

Fear Indochina Is Next Goal For Reds

WASHINGTON (AP)—State Department officials reportedly are deeply concerned over the possibility that a Korean armistice might be followed by a shift of Communist aggression southward to Indochina. American government reports, qualified informants said today, bear out a Chinese Nationalist estimate that some 200,000 Red Chinese troops already are assembled near the Indochina border.

liminary meeting was a "100 percent success."

Another envoy indicated, however, that there were a number of disagreements that had to be ironed out. He said there were several times when he thought the talks would fall through.

The UN delegation to the full scale talks probably will fly by helicopter from Munsan about 8 a. m. (6 p. m. Monday, EST).

There has been no announcement of when the Red delegation will arrive, or how it will travel. The Red plans probably were worked out in the preliminary meeting Sunday. It was assumed the Reds will travel by road, and that UN planes will give them the same immunity granted the preliminary negotiators.

Before he left Seoul, General Craigie said, "I don't believe any of us have any idea how long these talks will last. We have received our instructions and are all very happy with this job."

Lt. Gen. James A. Van Fleet, Eighth Army commander, met the Ridgway party at the airport. He said he only wanted to discuss "Eighth Army business" with Ridgway.

As ranking officers of the opposing sides prepared to talk peace, there was no large scale ground fighting on the Korean front. UN troops launched two limited objective attacks Sunday against Red resistance that varied from light to heavy.

United Nations military leaders took no chances along the front. They reasoned that until a definite agreement is reached to stop the shooting, the best course is to keep hitting away at the enemy.

At Eighth Army headquarters, everyone went about business as usual, but there was a feeling of elation and hope.

Everyone realized that Tuesday's talks and succeeding ones represented the first big chance for peace since the Chinese "volunteers" entered the war last winter.

They also knew that should the talks fail, Chinese and North Korean Reds might again come streaming out of the Korean hills in another attempt to shatter the United Nations army and drive it into the sea.

Army officials, meanwhile, busily put finishing touches on plans for the conference.

In an open letter to Roman newspapers, the guards said 16 of their number have already quit and gone home to Switzerland because they could not support their families on wages paid.

They said that after several requests for pay raises, the Vatican offered \$1.50 a month more which they angrily rejected.

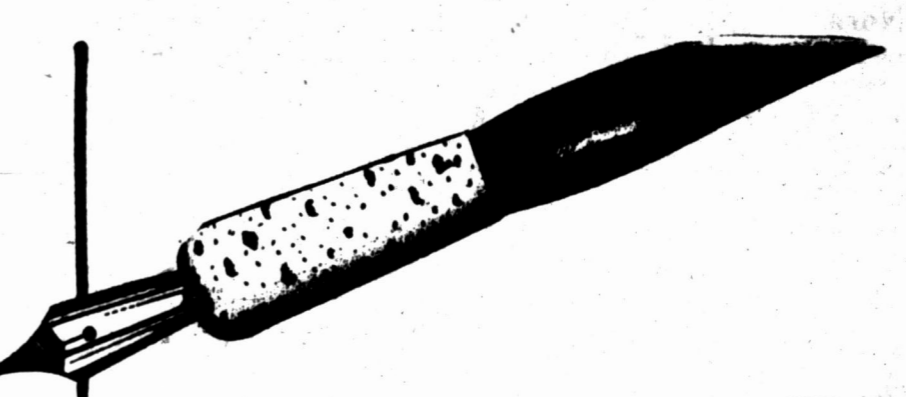
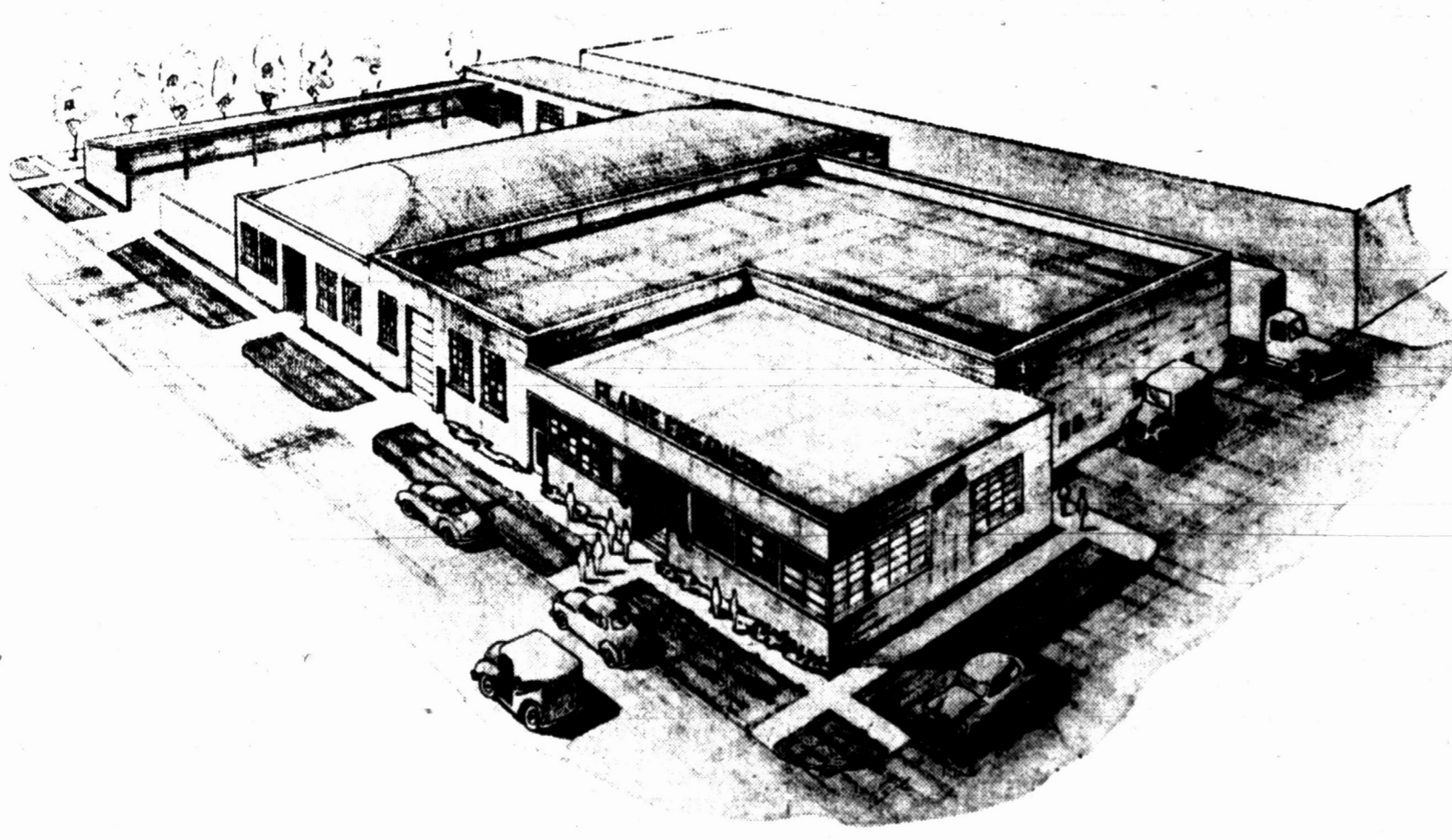

Texans Feel Loss Of Lives In Korean War Not In Vain

 WASHINGTON — (AP) — Most Texas members of Congress feel the loss of American lives in Korea has not been in vain.
 Without exception, those voicing views on the Korean conflict see a symbol of the determination of free nations to resist aggression.
 Among those expressing this view were the two Texans most qualified to talk on the subject — Chairman Tom Connally of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and Rep. Omar Burelion, a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee.
 The veteran Texas senator, a key figure in foreign policy formation for more than a decade, had this to say about the intervention of the United Nations after the North Koreans launched their attack across the 38th parallel:
 "If it had not been resisted by the free nations of the world, aggression would have been practiced in many other countries unable to resist."
 "The action of the United States was not one of selfishness. We acted not alone for ourselves, but for all nations that might become victims of aggression."
 "Our resistance in Korea has made a deep impression on the entire world. It served notice on aggressors that they can not plunder and conquer free nations without suffering penalties for their total disregard for freedom and humanity."
 "Our enterprise in Korea has been a success. It was a stroke of freedom against tyranny and misrule. The God of nations gave us success."
 Texas House members, asked their views when the Korean

truce rumors first reached the Capitol, replied similarly.
 "To think of Korea in terms of losses and expenditures," commented Burelion, "it's hard to find a silver lining."
 "But, looking at it from a global standpoint, and trying to see what may be the ultimate good, several things are apparent."
 "There is no question but that it has weakened the Chinese communists. The peace-loving people there may be able to overthrow their aggressors. There is no question as to the unrest in China."
 "The Chinese communists have failed to advance or even hold their own ground in South China. According to our military authorities, they will have to build their army again from the ground up before they can attack another," he continued.
 "Remember, that is what Hitler did, and it led to World War II."
 "The Korean conflict also has demonstrated that the free nations of the world must stick together to maintain peace. We must not let down our guard in the future."
 Rep. Tom Pickett of Palestine said the Korean war "has served notice to the world that this country is determined to resist active aggression in an effort to prevent the spread of a third world war."
 He agreed that the United States must continue to maintain a strong Army, Navy and Air Force.
 "There's something else that we must give our serious study," he continued, "and that is the matter of trying to keep our expenditures within our income."
 Warning that unbalanced budgets can lead to bankruptcy and regimentation as surely as aggression from outside, Pickett said he favored taking all that is absolutely necessary for national defense and slashing domestic expenditures accordingly.
 "Taxes are now as high as our economy can stand," he added. "We are up to within about three and one half billion dollars of balancing our output with our income. I am in favor of trimming down on domestic items, even if it hurts, and if there is any left, apply it to reducing the national debt."
 Rep. Olin Teague of College Station said the Korean war has provided a lesson to communists that will serve as a deterrent to their aggressive tendencies.
 "We had to have a Korea somewhere in the world," Teague said.
 "I think we've taught the international gangsters that we will fight for world peace."
 "If we're going to have world peace, we've got to remain strong and let such mobsters know that any time they want to destroy peace, they've got a fight for world peace."

player, so South insisted on going on to four spades. Curiously enough, this contract also was "impossible" — but it was fairly easy for the defense to make a fatal error.
 West opened the deuce of diamonds, and South won with the ace. Declarer then led his singleton heart and allowed West to hold the trick with the nine of hearts.
 At this point West should have sniffed the scent of danger. Obviously South did not have either the ace or king of hearts. Just as obviously, South was planning to ruff hearts in his hand. This was bound to establish dummy's hearts in short order. The only hope was to lead a club to set up tricks at once in the only suit that offered a chance for defensive tricks.
 West didn't like the looks of the clubs, so led another diamond. This was the fatal slip.
 Dummy won with the queen of diamonds, and South ruffed a heart. Dummy then took the queen of spades, and South ruffed



another heart. This established dummy's queen.
 South next laid down the ace and king of trumps, leaving East with the last trump. Dummy was entered with the king of diamonds, and the queen of hearts was led. East could ruff — but then he had no tricks to cash. If the ace of clubs had been knocked out East could have taken two clubs at this point to set the contract.
 As it was East had to return a club, whereupon dummy took

Yam Source Of Cortisone

NEW YORK — (AP) — A Mexico City firm says a poisonous yam is a new source for cortisone, the wonder drug. The discovery may bring an eventual price drop in the drug, the company adds.
 Maker of the new cortisone is Syntex, Inc., of Mexico City, producers of steroids, the basic substances in many kinds of hormones. Cortisone is a hormone of the adrenal glands.
 Syntex announced its cortisone product through the American branch in New York, the Chemical Specialties Co., Inc.
 The new cortisone is made from a poisonous Mexican yam, Syntex said. All cortisone now on the market is made from ox bile.
 Research of the yams, Syntex said, showed they produced all the male and female sex hormones plus a few others.
 The yams, whose botanical name is discorea, grow wild in southern Mexico. Natives use them for soap and as a fish bait. One yam may weigh 500 pounds. Syntex said it now uses 500 tons of yams a month in its Mexico City plant. It plans a \$2,000,000 expansion program.
 The Syntex announcement said that yam cortisone would cost about the same as the ox bile product. But it added that the yam way is simpler and that costs are likely to drop as production increases.
 Two years ago, cortisone sold to doctors for \$200 a gram. Merck

Co. now markets the drug under the trade name Cortone, to doctors for \$30 a gram.
 Scientists in the U. S. also are seeking new sources for the wonder drug and are working with soy beans and other materials. An additional cortisone supply will come within a year when Merck completes its second ox bile cortisone plant.

With the onslaught of hot weather each year, many women resign themselves to their annual session with the "dish-rag" look. With the sun and going limp under the humidity, they sit sadly by and wait for autumn to look pretty again.

That isn't necessary. With a bit of extra grooming care, you can beat the heat no matter how the temperature soars. Common sense is your best ally.

Perhaps a face-shine is your biggest hot-weather bugaboo. If so, your cleansing routine may be a contributing factor. Heavy creams are fine during the winter months for removing dirt and soil and for lubrication—but during the summer you may find they augment complexion greasiness. Try substituting for your customary creams a creamy liquid cleanser. Tell-tale traces of shine, resulting from excess

lubrication, should begin to disappear.

After making your face spic and span with this summer-right cleanser, try splashing your face and neck with refreshing, skin-toning cold water. This will help close your pores and ready your face for the application of make-up.

A good trick for those who use cake make-up or tinted liquid powder base is that of soaking fluted cotton squares in cold water and patting them about the face to set the make-up and remove excesses. Blot completely dry with a fresh cotton square.

You may find your refrigerator an unexpected aid in helping you preserve a fresh, crisp summer appearance. For a refreshing pick-up at make-up time, try chilling your liquid foundation, your lipstick and your liquid cleanser in the ice-box. Not only will these pre-cooled cosmetics feel pleasant

to your skin, but you'll find a firm lipstick much easier to use than a warm, sticky one.

Another candidate for a place on your refrigerator shelf is your favorite cologne. Not only does cologne offer you fragrance, but the evaporation of its alcohol cools your skin.

Dusting powder, too, is a hot weather aid. It will help you achieve a feeling of pleasant, all-over freshness by absorbing excess dampness. It serves too as a good sliding agent when you're donning your undergarments.

The discomfort of wearing hose in summer is partially alleviated if you remember to dust your feet and the backs of your knees with powder before putting on your stockings. A small amount sprinkled in your shoes will help contract the effects of perspiration.

Witch hazel is another summer friend. When your feet begin throbbing or even become swollen from hot pavements or constricting shoes, try this routine for relief.

Soak your feet in warm water for several minutes, wriggling your toes to loosen and relax them. Then scrub them briskly with a soft brush until they tingle. After drying, pat on chilled witch hazel with cotton squares before lying down with your legs elevated. It'll give your feet a new lease on life and you a new outlook on summer comfort and beauty.

The Girl Scout office will be closed during the month of August, scout officials announced Saturday.

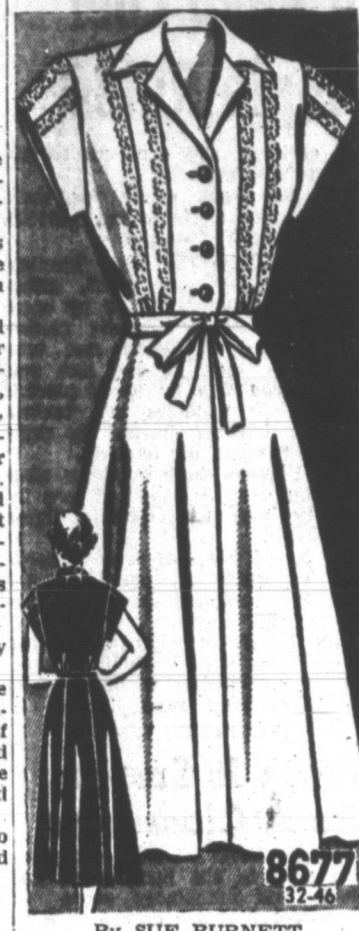
Any supplies, books and molds belonging to the office should be checked into the office as soon as possible.

Weekly Pedicure For Foot Comfort

One pedicure will not last an entire summer. If you want your toes to twinkle as they peek-a-boo out of your play shoes for your leisure time in the sun, a weekly pedicure is your best foot-insurance.

If you can keep your feet in good condition, your disposition will stay sweet in spite of sweltering summer days. Even minor foot discomforts can put wrinkles in a little girl's brow. So if you haven't attended to callous, corns or other foot miseries, do so promptly, for your own sake.

A simple treatment to refresh your feet after an active day of standing or walking as suggested by a foot expert is this: Soak your feet in a basin of very warm soapy water for ten or fifteen minutes. Then plunge them into ice cold water. Dry well and massage with rubbing alcohol. Lie down with the legs elevated on pillows and relax for fifteen minutes or so.

There are some very good foot soaps and ointments which can be used to ease tired feet. Your doctor or druggist should be glad to advise you about them.

The pedicure procedure is almost the same as that followed for a manicure. Remove the old lacquer, then trim your toenails—but make sure you trim them straight across. (This helps avoid ingrown toenails.)

If you leave your nails long enough to protect the end of the toe from pressure and irritation, nails will still serve their purpose, and feet are as attractive as well. Dip a cotton-tipped stick into cuticle remover and oil around your nails to help soften dead cuticle. Then scrub the nails with a little brush, soap and water.

The professional manicurist dips a cotton-wrapped stick in peroxide to clean and bleach under the nail. Another trick is to put tufts of cotton between the toes to keep them apart while the lacquer dries. A base top coat is applied before the polish. Summer polishes are gay and festive in seashell, sun red and other glamor shades.

After the first coat of lacquer has been applied, let it dry thoroughly, then apply another coat. A coat of sealing base coat, is now applied on top of the two coats of lacquer.

If a manicure and pedicure are properly given, it should stay in perfect shape until the week is up. And the ten or fifteen minutes spent on keeping fingernails and toenails in pretty is well worth the effort.

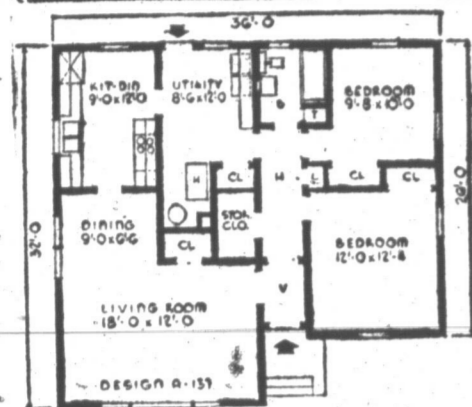
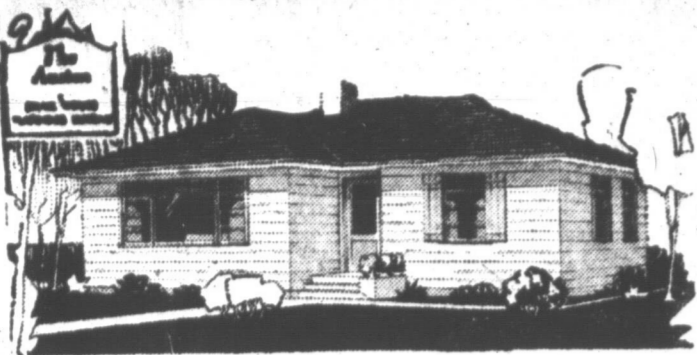
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Basementless House Features Circulation

House Is Easy To Keep Cool By Following Simple Rules

The secret of maintaining a cool home is to keep hot air outside and to generate as little heat as possible inside the house. This will mean cool, comfortable nights and greater daytime comfort.

- Here are some of the rules:
1. Keep windows closed when hot winds are blowing.
 2. Draw the shades on the sunny side of the house.
 3. Replace heavy draperies with mesh weave.
 4. Use light-colored linen or cretonne slip-covers on upholstered furniture.

5. Use light colors for walls and floors, including smooth, cool Kente tile flooring.
6. Ventilate the attic throughout the day and night, either with an exhaust fan or by opening windows in opposite gables.
7. Open all doors and windows as soon as the sun sets and place two or three electric fans in windows in various rooms, blowing inward to draw in cool night air quickly.
8. Replace high wattage electric bulbs with lamps of less intensity and use electric lights sparingly.
9. Avoid top-of-stove cooking as much as possible and use the insulated oven for preparing hot meals.
10. Keep the kitchen-dining room door closed while cooking, and open kitchen windows wide, to expel heat rapidly.

Farm Is Serving As A Classroom

AMES, Iowa — Classes are held in the farm yard and fields and machinery serve as "textbooks" in one course at Iowa State College. This is the way the students in the course in farm management look their final examination at the close of this year's term.

They were taken to a nearby 185-acre farm, and given time to examine the buildings, tour the fields, note the type and condition of the soil, check the fences, observe the livestock and take inventory of the machinery. Then they talked with the professional farm manager and quizzed the tenant at length about every detail of the operation.

When they were through, the students sat down in the farm yard to answer a series of questions about their evaluations of the farm and its resources, and what they would do to be a good program for the future to get maximum net income for the owner.

Faculty members who helped plan the course say they believe it is a good way to tie together the teachings from the departments of animal husbandry, agronomy, agricultural engineering, and agricultural economics.

Cracked Skulls Keep Missionary Busy

SEATTLE (AP) — A Seattle woman is going back to Pig's Peak to mend broken heads and minister spiritually to the Bantu people of southeastern Africa. She is Miss Estella MacDonald, who has spent most of her adult life working with natives of Africa as a missionary for the Church of the Nazarene. She sails from New Orleans soon. She will be returning to Pig's Peak, where she served from 1941 to 1947 in Swaziland, South Africa. She recalls from her previous sojourn there that most of the medical cases she handled were broken heads.

"The natives carry what they call snake sticks," she said. "There are a lot of snakes down there. But, when the natives get full of their own mountain style of beer they start using those snake sticks on each other's skulls."

Government statistics show that there have been an average of 500 marriages a day since the end of the war, as against a daily average of 50 divorces during the period.

Man's Room Should Be Of Masculine, Rugged Design

Comfort and masculine atmosphere, plain, rugged furnishings and simple decorative ideas are essential in a room that a man can call his own for reading or study, hobby work or play.

To mark the room as masculine and to remove the sleeping-room atmosphere, in case it must do double-duty both as study and bedroom, a bed without head or footboard should be used. By covering it with fabric which matches the draperies, decorative unity is attained.

Furniture should follow simple, straightforward lines. Chairs should be deep and roomy. Use sectional drawer and cabinet units which can be fitted together in any desired combination to make dresser space, or build in drawers and cabinets with broad tops along one wall.

For rugged, masculine atmosphere, cover walls and floor with Kencork. This material has an interesting texture and men like its coloring — the woody browns of nature, ranging from light oak to dark walnut. The tiles are made from natural cork and thus have an added value as insulation against both noise and heat.

If it is desired to use color on the walls, a floor of this material will harmonize with any color chosen. If little sunshine penetrates the room, yellow, orange or any of the red tones used as wall color will provide cheer. In a sunny room, blues, grays and greens are restful. For the ceiling, a stronger or lighter shade of the wall color, or a contrasting color, is recommended by interior designers.

A capacious wall magazine rack and a desk with a broad work surface should be included. A comfortable, brightly-upholstered desk chair and a lamp completely the room. Drawers under one end, open shelves on the other side, will keep papers and frequently-used books in easy reach.

Wall cabinets above the desk, a comfortable, brightly-upholstered chair and a lamp completely the room. The lamp should be large enough to reflect light across the desk without glare or shadows.

Plenty of bookshelves should be provided, together with a deep, comfortable lounge chair, a group-sized table to hold a tray and radio; floor lamp with high-wattage bulbs; and a bedside table with a broad top, high-wattage bulbs; and a bedside table with a broad top.

Dallas, Seattle, Louisville, Spokane, Camden, Takoma and other cities are sites of the Bruce Walker homes, NAHB said.

So the building pace is expected to fall off at an even more rapid rate during the remainder of 1951.

Builders Say More Planning Going Into Homes In U. S.

New designs in bright, modern, well planned new homes are evident in practically every city, the National Association of Home Builders reported today.

NAHB said much of this upsurge in new home design can be attributed to the recent \$100,000 contest sponsored by NAHB in connection with Architectural Forum, the Magazine of Building.

Prizes totaling \$100,000 were awarded to architects submitting best designs for contemporary homes in the \$8,000 to \$11,000 price group.

The number one prize winner, by Bruce Walker, architectural student doing graduate work at Harvard, had been created in several cities.

Dallas, Seattle, Louisville, Spokane, Camden, Takoma and other cities are sites of the Bruce Walker homes, NAHB said.

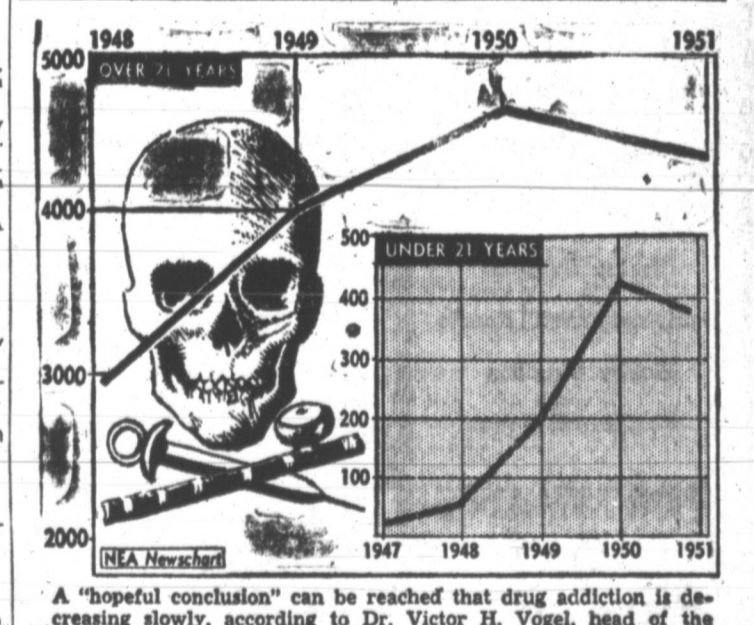
