### THE NEW DEAL IN WASHINGTON

### BY RODNEY DUTCHER NEA Service Staff Correspondent

WASHINGTON,-It is contended in effect by both the government and the "power trust" that the fight over the holding company act has lost none of its trickery or miscellaneous dirty work at the crossroads since. transfer of the scene of battle from Congress to the

Holding company strategy, maneuvered by John W. Davis and other big Wall Street lawyers, is to get any kind of decision adverse to the act which can be had before Dec. 1.

On Dec. 1 the act goes into operation. Holding companies must then register and go under the jurisdiction of the Securities Exchange Commission.

An adverse opinion, even though it comes in the pending Baltimore case to which the government is not a party and before the act becomes effective, could be used to create great confusion.

Holding companies would be encouraged not to regster with SEC, to shriek the issue of "unconstitutionalty" and, it is believed, to make a prompt fight in Conress for repeal of the act even before the supreme ourt had a chance to rule.

Such an achievement presumably was worth to Mr. Davis, hired by the Edison Electric Institute to test the ct, the razzing he received in Baltimore federal court when the courtroom crowd laughed at the discovery that Davis had never met his client, Fred Lautenbach, the lentist who owned \$2500 of holding company stock, but was hazy both as to the issues and the position of Mr.

Nevertheless, Davis, a man of great dignity, but no great capacity for "taking it," hadn't counted on the appearance of three tough guys whom the SEC and the Department of Justice had sent from Washington to opse him, to ask what business he had in this case, incolving reorganization of American States Public Serrice Co., and to suggest more or less delicately that the whole proceeding was a frameup.

Neither Chief Counsel John J. Burns of SEC nor Thomas Corcoran, for the government, actually cried any pprobrious names at the distinguished Mr. Davis. But he effect was near that, which was what caused Mr. Davis to complain of suggestions which "would have been offensive to the dignity of a police court" and of an unworthy, undignified, and contemptible presentation."

The Baltimore case, in which counsel for trustees and Dr. Lautenbach appear to ask Judge Coleman to give an dvisory opinion on the act-claiming it will interfere with American States reorganization plans-was careully picked by the big holding companies and their

The government, which was able to appear only as a riend of the court, cannot appeal such an advisory opinon, which would be only for the guidance of trustees.

Appeal presumably would be up to the lawyer repreenting another of American States securities, who unertook to argue the constitutionality of the act and was t one time told by Coleman (commonly regarded as an anti-New Deal judge) that he was arguing "in circles."

## FINANCIAL BLOCKADE OF ITALY IS BEFORE LEAGUE MEM

SMALLER COUNTRIES IN RELUCTANT MOOD ON TRADE

BY WADE WERNER. GENEVA, Oct 14 (AP)-The fiisolation of Italy was, in effect, decreed tonight by the League of Nations' plenary committee of 52 nations. The committee, the league's big central staff for sanctions, formally approved the financial sanctions nittee's program on loan and credit embargoes aimed at suffo-cating Premier Mussolini's war against Ethiopia. Two exemptions were included in the sanctions resolution as adopted — religious and humanitarian projects.

GENEVA. Oct. 14.—The League of Nations committee of 18 for "immediate sanctions" approved today a project for a financial blockade of Italy.

Only minor alterations were made in the text of the blockade resolution as submitted by the league's financial sanctions committee.

The proposal went to the general staff for sanctions, comprising representatives of all league states except Italy and Ethiopia, and it was anticipated generally that the fi-nancial blockade would be voted finally tonight.



## RUSSIANS CLAIM BORDER CLASH PROVOKED BY JAPANESE

MILITARY CLIQUE SAID TO BE CAUSING FRICTION

BY JOHN LLOYD Associated Press Foreign Staff MOSCOW, Oct. 14 (AP)—Informed Russian sources asserted today that Saturday's clash on Russo-Manchoukuan border was a product of provocative tactics of Japanese military officials. Acting on orders from Moscow, the soviet ambassador to Japan delivered an emphatic protest Tokyo, but no answer was immedforthcoming.

The official soviet press refrainfrom comment, publishing a brief communique setting forth some details of the clash but not giving the number of casualties.

The incident was treated in Mos-

cow circles as admittedly the most serious in a series of border clashes extending over a period of six months, but not as a threat of general warfare.

As in previous instances, they said a Japanese military clique was promoting friction with the union to justify keeping large armed forces in the Japanese-sponsored state of Manchoukuo. bordering on the soviet province of Siberia

They placed the responsibility on the shoulders of the Tokyo government, but on the grounds of giv-ing the Manchuokuan army too great leeway, not on the grounds of deliberate official instigation.

No attempt was made to conceal the fact that the repeated border incidents were viewed here with concern. It was pointed out in previous protests that incursions in soviet territory "may bring very serious consequences to the course of peace in the far east."

Later warnings in the controlled press said the soviet government could not tolerate violations of its

Foreign observers believed, howthat Moscow authorities would be willing to go a long way to prevent any major trouble. An indication of this was seen in renewed proposals for creation of a mixed commission to investigate cincidents on the spot.




