Mrs. Fred Haiduk Wins High Honor In Homemaker Conservation Survey

Mrs. Fred Haiduk was recently awarded first place in the district in a state-wide conservation nomemaker survey.

The following sketch tells some of the obstacles the winner faced and conquered before receiving

The Fred Haiduks came to Gray County and their present location in 1942, during the war. They were married in 1938 and settled on a farm in Carson County. Their farm was in the area taken by the government for a wartime ordinance plant, and they are now on. This farm consists of 575 acres in cultivation and 65 acres in pasture, and is located 18 miles southwest of Pampa.







Curing inflation is completely beyond the power of the American people, except by the radical change of government administration. As we pointed out a short time ago the total deposits in private banks is no more than the total funds of government lending agencies. Credit and production and labor do not overate on a free market: they are government pawns. They can curtailed only by politics.

There being some doubt about many citizens of the United States favoring the Vatican's establishment here, Quebec is the logical spot and Mr. Tyrnhauer says plans have already been made covering the details of transferring the papal seat to America.

'America, then, would remain the permanent center of Catholicism for a long time to come. The United States would be looked upon as the logical protector of the Popes-with all the consequences it entails. The tremendous enduring power of the papacy will in all likelihood assert itself in the Western Hemisphere as it did in the old world during the two thousand years of history." Those are Mr. Tyrnhauer's words. They were in LIB-ERTY, of which Mr. Fulton Oursler, one of America's greatest Catholics, was for years the editor.

U.S. THE POPE'S PROTECTOR The idea of the United States hecoming the Pope's proter' quences. Since the Vatican itself is temporal government with its own flag, sending and receiving ambassadors, it reasons that should the Pope, in Quebec, become embroiled with foreign governments or should any power attempt to attack the Vatican, the United States might, as the Pope's protector, find itself in trouble with the Pope's opponents. While such help for union organizers will be welcomed by the AFL and CIO it will unquestionably stir up antagonism athose who feel that it is not the province of a national church organization to make itself virtually the auxiliary arm of




