Yankees Hunt Pitching As Cleveland Extends Lead To 3 Games With Win

(By The Associated Press)

The Cleveland Indians, streaking three games ahead in the bustling American League pennant fight, are in an excellent position today to smash the New York Yankees' hopes of a third straight flag.

Manager Al Lopez' fighting gang have the proud Yankees on the ropes and set up for the kill. The Indians moved three games ahead of New York yesterday as Bob Lemon turned back the Yankees, 3-1, in the opener of a vital three game series.

Early Wynn (14-11), a tough guy when the chips are on the line, will go against the Yankees tonight before an expected capacity crowd in Cleveland's Municipal Stadium.

The Yankees, with their backs to the wall, are gambling on Stubby Overmire (2-7) to pitch them back into the scrap.

The victory was Lemon's 15th and his sixth straight. The triumph also was the Indians' 16th consecutive win at home and their 19th in their last 23 starts.

running. A sweep by the Indians will boost their lead to five games and the way the Tribe has been roaring along that would just about seal it up.

Lemon permitted only three hits in out-pitching Vic Raschi yesterday in a game that was highlighted by a near fist fight in the seventh inning between Bob Avila of the Indians and Gene Woodling of the Yanks.

The Yanks scored first in the third when Hank Bauer stole home on the front end of a double steal. The Indians tied the score in the fourth on a walk to Dale Mitchell and singles by Avila and Harry Simpson. Mitchell doubled home Jim Hegan with the winning run in the fifth.

Avila and Woodling tangled when the Yank outfielder poked into the little Tribe second baseman in a successful attempt to break up a double play. The two were separated before any blows were struck and allowed to remain in the game.

In other American League games the Philadelphia Athletics defeated the Chicago White Sox, 6-3. 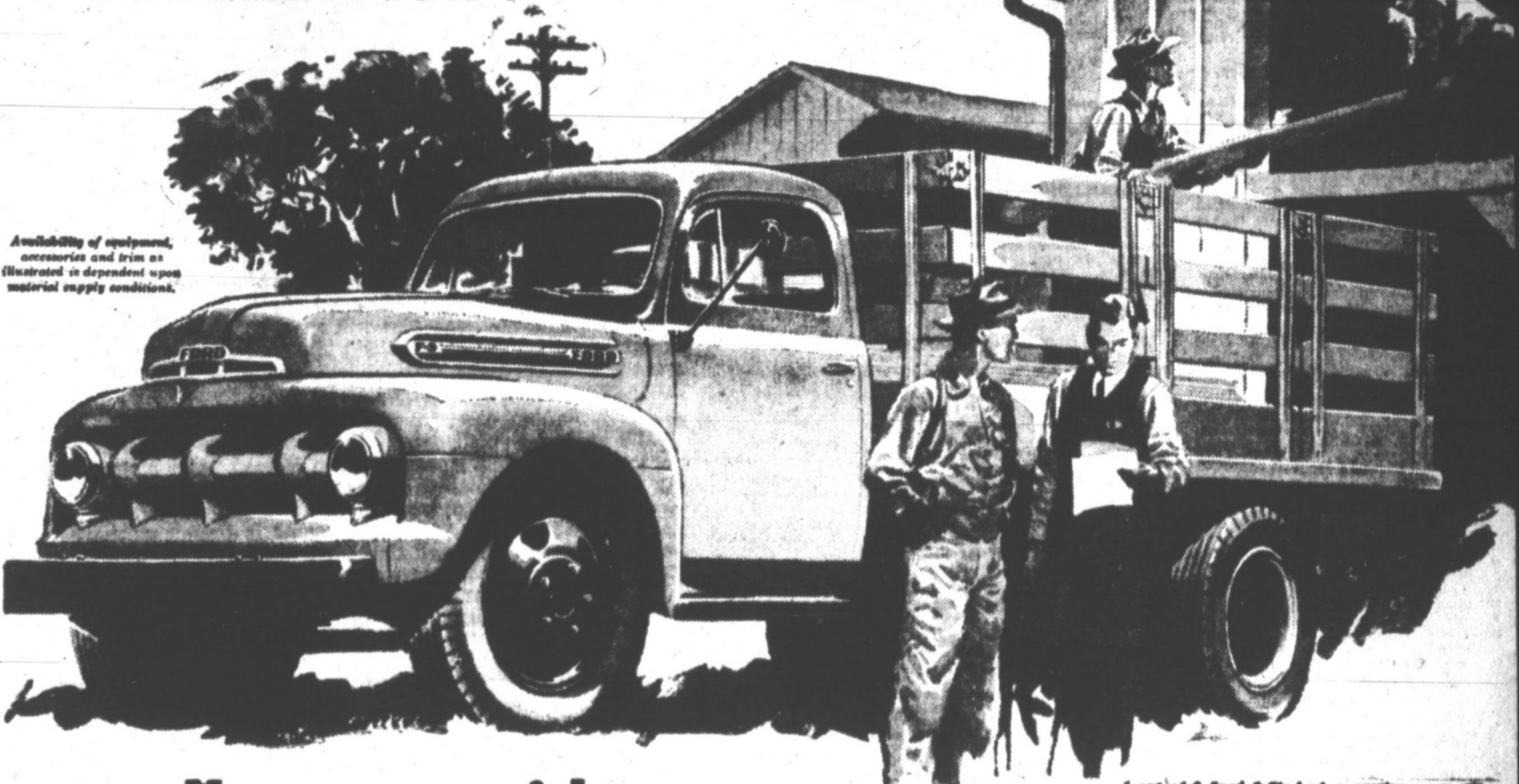

A Hymn Is Born

On Christ, the Solid Rock, I Stand

A cabinet maker takes up writing

"On Christ, the solid rock, I stand; all other ground is sinking sand." That line ran over and over in the mind of a 34-year-old London cabinet maker as he walked toward his woodworking shop.

Edward Mote was happy. He had learned his trade; had worked at it for wages and now he ran a woodworking business of his own. Always busy, Mote spent his spare hours writing articles for London periodicals. And, now and then, when a key line would hit him, he tried his hand at writing verse. But most of all Edward Mote was happy because his once confused mind was settled on his belief in God. He had been brought up in a home where the Bible was not permitted and his playground had been the streets of London. But after he became a man he attended Tottenham Court Road Chapel where sermons of the renowned John Hyatt set his mind at ease.

Edward Mote's cabinet shop ran itself that day in 1934. He had a theme for a poem and he wanted to get it on paper. Closed in his little office he wrote the caption "Crucious Experiences of a Christian" and, as he put it, "In the day I had four verses complete and wrote them off." The Sunday following Mote went to the home of a minister friend whose wife was near death. Groping for words, the cabinet maker thought of his verses. He sang them for the dying woman and, at the conclusion of each verse, added the line "On Christ, the solid rock, I stand; all other ground is sinking sand." It was only then that Mote realized he had written a hymn. He had a thousand copies printed for friends; a hymnal picked it up and "The Solid Rock" has been sung ever since.

Mote gave up his cabinet business, entered the Baptist ministry and at 35 built a church at his own expense. When his congregation offered to deed the property to him he said, "I only want the pulpit." At 77, in 1974, he looked up at friends at his bedside and said, "The truths I have preached will do to die upon." And so passed a man who had been reared in a Godless home, learned an honorable trade and gave it up for the ministry but whose memory will live for generations because he took time off from his work one day to write...

My hope is built on nothing less
Than Jesus' blood and righteousness;
I dare not trust the sweetest frame,
But wholly lean on Jesus' name.

When darkness seems to hide His face
I rest on His unchanging grace;
In every high and stormy gale,
My anchor holds within His veil.

His oath, His covenant, His blood,
Support me in the whirling flood;
When all around my soul-guests cry,
He thou is all my hope and stay.

When He shall come with trumpet sound,
Oh, may I then in Him be found;
Dressed in His righteousness alone,
Faultless to stand before His throne.

The Christian Has A Social Obligation

Some years ago, when I was writing editorials for The Congregationalist, the paper begun on Boston's Beacon Hill over a hundred-and-twenty-five years ago that has never missed a single weekly issue, I wrote an editorial on the question, "Is Mr. Ford Too Rich?"

The Mr. Ford of the editorial was the famous Henry, but the reference was personal only as Mr. Ford typified the inventor, who had made a great and almost revolutionary contribution to society and amassed a great fortune.

We chose to regard as our heritage.

Last week I suggested the problems and confusions with which we are confronted under the pressures, possible perils, and changed conditions, in which our liberties have been restricted. What is our Christian duty in relation to the tense issues of today? And how are Christian leaders meeting these issues, so marked with bitter controversies, conflicts, accusations and smearings?

Frankly, I think that Christian leadership is failing!

Differences of interests, differences of judgments and aims, differences about actions and policies, are inevitable. But it is not inevitable that men should differ with hatred and scorn.

The very tenseness of the situation and issues of today makes all the more necessary the attainment and practice of the virtues that the Christian way enjoins — patience, forbearing, elemental honesty in speech and acts.

If we are to pay our debt to society, we must begin by heeding the wise injunction of St. Paul: "Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others."

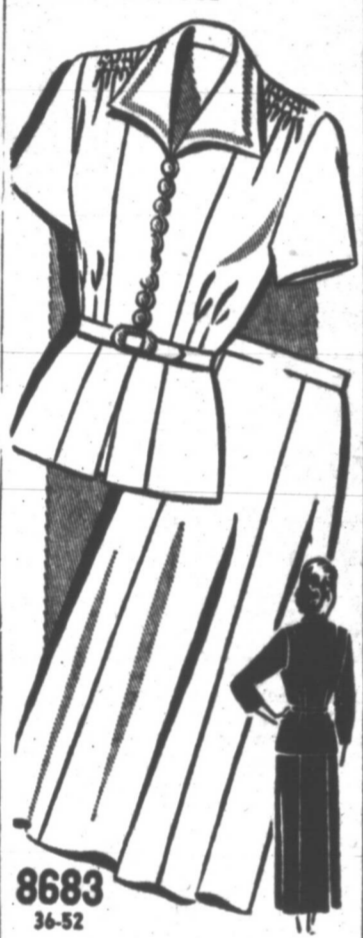
