## All Egypt Will Rejoice When King Farouk Takes A Bride

CAIRO, Egypt. — (AP) — All Egypt will rejoice with colorful parades and pageants today when King Farouk takes beautiful 17-year-old Narriman Sadek as his bride.

The day — which also marks the 15th anniversary of Farouk's accession to the throne — will be heralded by the thunder of cannon and an unprecedented air show as Egyptian Air Force planes roar over Cairo in salute to the 17-year-old monarch.

The wedding itself will be a simple ceremony at Farouk's Koubbeh palace. In accordance with Islamic tradition, the bride will not attend the signing of the contract, but will be receiving sets installed in Cairo's urban Heliopolis.

In the wedding contract, but will be the first time television will be seen remain at her house in various squares. This will be the emony. They will include members of the royal family, government officials and other dignitaries, such as the Aga Khan, spiritual leader of the Ismail sect Moslems.

King Farouk will wear a gray, double-breasted suit for the ceremony, which will be presided over by the president of the higher Moslem "Shari" (court). The latter will ask the King

whether he will take Narriman to be his wife. He will then ask the question of the bride's representative. This will be her paternal uncle, Mohamed Aly Sadek Bey, Egyptian minister to The Hague.

Then the King will sign the contract, this will be followed by the signatures of his witnesses. King Farouk and the bride's witnesses will then join hands while the president of the Moslem court recites the "Fatwa" (the opening verses of the Koran-Moslem bible).

When this is over Narriman will become Queen of Egypt. It will be the signal for general rejoicing throughout the Nile Kingdom and down to Khartoum in the Sudan.

Millions of Egyptians will celebrate the great day with bright parades, pageants and other festivities.

Guns will roar their salvos to mark the wedding and the anniversary of the monarch's accession, while colorful crowds spread through the flag-decked streets of Cairo.

Egyptian regiments with their brass bands will parade through the city's main thoroughfares, lanes of the Royal Air Force will sweep over the city in formations reproducing the Egyptian flag — a crescent and three stars in the center of a rectangle.

The city's gardens will be invaded by thousands of picnickers — men clad in their saigon night-gown-like "galibias," women graciously enrobed in their original sport-like "melayas" and children sporting gaily colored dresses and costumes.

People from all over Egypt will flock to Cairo for the occasion. The government has ordered a 75 percent reduction on train fares.

Tens of thousands of poor will receive rice meals, clothing and small sums of money.

At night Cairo will glitter like a huge diamond. From the minarets of the city's several hundreds of multi-colored electric buildings along the streets, hundreds of mosques and from modern light joes reproducing archaic designs will be illuminated with quibis will shine.

Parliament and the government will be a reproduction of the royal crown of Egypt. A torch parade will march down the streets and squares. Officers and men representing all branches of

the Egyptian armed forces will swarm to the centers of the city. In the country villagers will admire dairy horsemen, who will distribute free to the distribution for sweets. They will leave their cotton fields to clear and the beat of — the drums.

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## Iran's Oil Coup Could Upset U.S.

HOUSTON — (AP) — Government seizure of Iran's oil fields could lead to a tight supply situation in the United States.

Loss of current flush production from the middle eastern country would cramp supplies of the western powers at least temporarily.

As yet, there has been no indication the Iranian government, under its nationalization program, plans to drop old customers of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. in favor of new consumers, but the possibility remains.

Texas oil and gas conservation officials have warned such a loss could well mean rationing of petroleum products in the United States.

The United States could be expected to be called on to replace a large portion of Iranian oil that has been moving into western European countries.

Meanwhile, Russia could bolster her defense sharply if she could persuade Iran to divert its oil supplies from the western powers.

Acquiring Iran's current level of output would practically double estimated Russian petroleum supplies.

February crude oil production in Russia and her European satellites has been estimated at 625,000 barrels a day. Iran was producing at a rate of 704,000 barrels daily.

It was Iran that oil first was discovered in the Middle East in 1908. Since then production has spread to Iraq, Kuwait and Saudi Arabia.

These four areas, all at Russia's front door, produced about 1,860,000 barrels of oil a day in February.

Oil reserves for the area are believed to exceed 30,000,000,000 barrels, considerably higher than the proven reserves of the United States.

Since the end of the last war, there have been frequent predictions that control of this flush Middle East oil production would determine whether there is to be a World War III.

The British Navy is vitally affected by the Iranian developments. Much of its oil supplies have come from Iran in that the British government holds a majority of the common stock of the Anglo-Iranian company.

Anglo-Iranian facilities affected by the nationalization order have been estimated to exceed \$500,000,000 in value, excluding the value of the oil itself.

Included is the world's largest refinery — with a 600,000 barrels a day capacity — at Abadan.

There are less than 90 producing wells in Iran, but the average daily production per well exceeds 8000 barrels.

This is in sharp contrast to the United States, whose approximately 490,000 wells last week produced a record 6,154,000 barrels of crude daily.

It is this production rate that has members of the Texas Railroad Commission concerned over the Iranian problem.

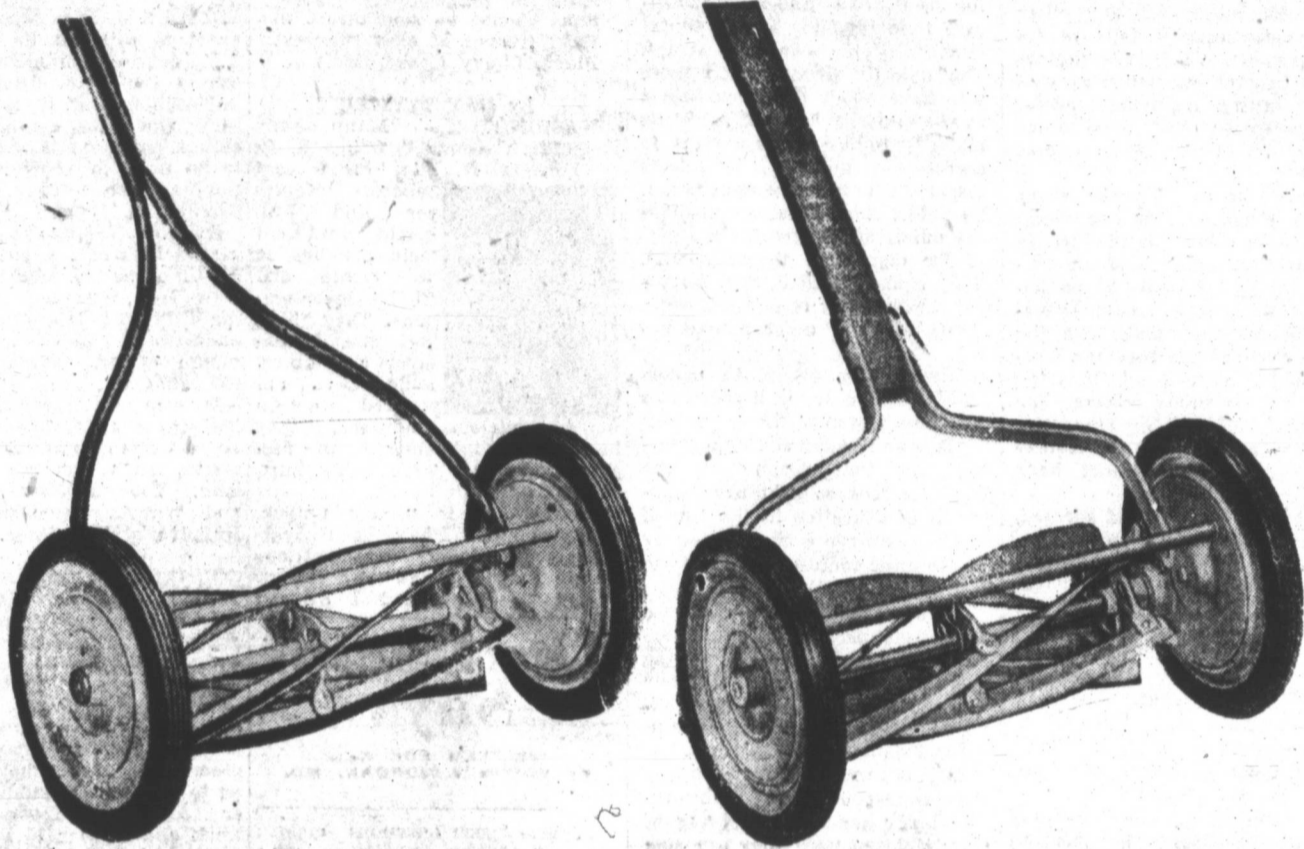

**Businessmen Meet With OPS Monday**

A meeting for businessmen of this area will be held Monday to provide additional information on the Office of Price Stabilization regulation No. 7 and amendment No. 2 that covers all consumer durable goods.

The meeting, to be conducted by Lawrence R. Shaddix of the OPS in Lubbock, will be the first in a series of four meetings to be held here each Monday in May.

Shaddix is a specialist in the consumer durable goods branch which includes wearing apparel, jewelry, radios, musical instruments, general housewares, luggage, sporting goods, china and silverware. He will be able to give information concerning other regulations, particularly the general ceiling price regulation.

Other specialists who will conduct classes here include Alton R. Taylor, who will be here May 14 to answer questions on regulation No. 11 which covers all cafes, restaurants, drug store soda fountains, lunch counters, drive-ins, or any establishment that serves food.

Fidelle R. Egge will conduct classes May 21 on a new regulation that covers all new and used car dealers, farm machinery and building materials.

Last classes will be instructed by Leonard C. Tyson, who will explain regulations No. 14, 15 and 16 which includes all wholesale and retail grocers.

Morning classes in the Monday meetings will begin at 9, and will run till 1:30. All area businessmen are urged to attend the meetings or send a representative.

Classes will be held in the city courtroom next door to the police department.

experts have shown that a maximum distance for good reception is 50 miles.

Pampa is 190 air miles from the nearest station, WKY - TV in Oklahoma City! Despite this, many persons are purchasing the sets and are getting good results from the Oklahoma station and from several others.

One of the first TV sets in Pampa was that of W. F. Hawkins, Sr. He has also installed several sets. Most of the sets installed by Hawkins have been in nearby towns; Stinnett, Borger and McLean.

D. P. Kilgo, a customer of Hawkins, lives at the southwest end of McClellan Lake. Since the lake is in a valley, Hawkins was at first skeptical of setting up a TV, but by pointing the aerial beam toward two bluffs across the lake and directly toward Oklahoma City, the set has been successful.

One theory offered for the success of the Kilgo set was that the waves are reflected from the air upon the lake and then transferred to the set.

But, according to engineers who have seen it in operation, this is not true because the beam is not directed across the lake, which runs northeast and south-

west, but goes diagonally across the lake toward the Oklahoma City station.

One reason for the power of this particular station is a 995 foot aerial — the tallest in the world. But it still remains to be explained why the Pampa reception is possible.

Good reception depends entirely on atmospheric conditions. It is strange that sudden changes in weather will either bring in a station more clearly or completely cut it out.

For instance, during the first snow storm in January, Hawkins said that clear all afternoon on his set. Best months during the year for televising are the summer months because of the clearest weather.

Other stations received here have been Jacksonville, Fla., Tulsa, Okla., Donlee Station in Hollywood, Baltimore, Md., Milwaukee, Wis., and Charlotte and Greensboro, N.C., and Houston.

The Dallas station, WBAP-TV has never been received in Pampa. This is believed to be because Dallas is at a more sudden lower altitude than Oklahoma City.

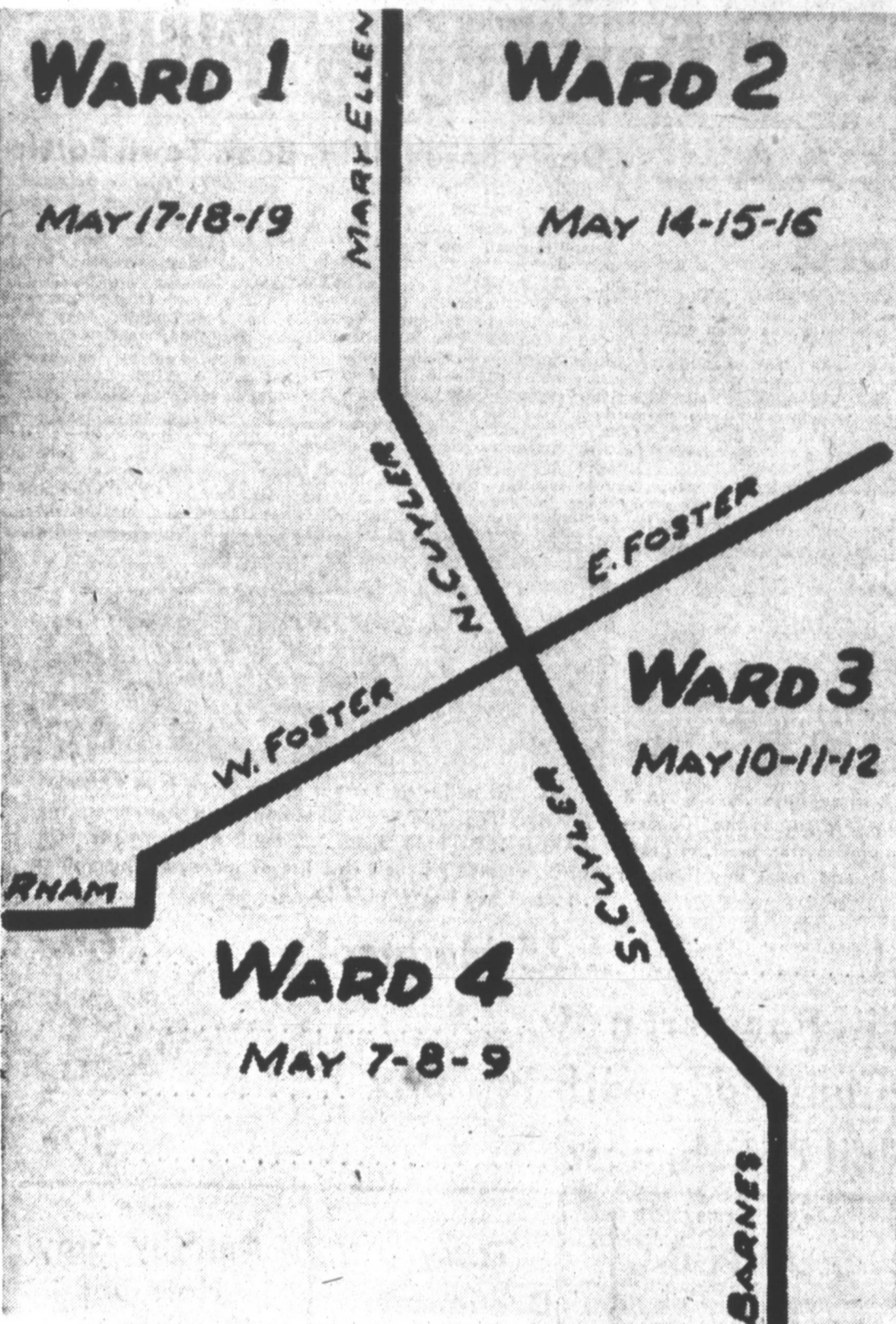

The two boys, cousins, age 15, were in the fourth day of a projected trip to California when they arrived in Canadian Wednesday afternoon and stopped in the Killarney for lunch. They were down to their last \$3, they confessed to Callaway, and said they had "run away from home" in Springfield last Saturday. A long distance call to Springfield brought quick response from the worried parents. Funds were wired to Callaway with instructions to put the boys aboard a bus and start them home.

**Doctors Delve Into Babies' Sleep Habits**

CLEVELAND — (AP) — Here you know this long ago: babies don't sleep as much as science once thought. But they probably snooze a lot more than some mothers would be willing to admit, declare physiologists Nathaniel Kleitman and Theodore G. Engelmann, of the University of Chicago. Reporting on "the first conclusive study ever made," of the hours Junior spends in dreamland, the scientists came up with this tally: Four-week-olds get about 15 hours sleep in every 24 more than half of it at night. Some previous surveys have rated snoozability at that age as high as 20 hours. Other findings, based on a study of 19 infants, ten of them boys: 1. The hours from one to three a.m. are most likely to find all babies asleep; and be-

tween 6 and 8 p.m. they're probably awake. 2. Crying spells vary in number. Some kids howl as often as twice a night; others have only one crying spell every ten nights. Night sleep steadily increases, until at six months, day sleeping is less than a third that of the night run. Some kids do the 24-hour course on as little as 14 hours sleep. Boys and girls differ little in length of sleeping time, but boys tend to eat more often. Giving a baby pureed meat does not affect his sleeping habits nor does it make a child cry more at night than babies fed a meatless diet. The doctors made it clear that they themselves did not picket the nurseries constantly. They got some of their information by attaching a recording device to the mattresses of babies' cribs. Oh yes, about diaper changes: Diest babies, five changes a wettest, 11; average, 8 1/2. ## Plaintiffs Win Four Suits In District Court

Four judgments involving property and money were handed Friday in favor of the plaintiffs by Judge Lewis M. Goodrich in 51st District court.

An award of \$5,000 was granted to the survivors of Walter E. Shelton from Arius Ferguson, Guymon, Okla., driver of the car that struck and killed Shelton Feb. 10, 1951, near Dumas, Texas.

According to testimony, Shelton was walking along the highway when Ferguson's car struck him. Shelton, the pleadings said, was walking in the bar ditch when hit.

The Court, dividing the damages claimed by Mrs. Margaret

Shelton, his widow, gave \$2,800 to Mrs. Shelton; \$1,400 to Pat Shelton, father of the dead man; and \$400 each to the dead man's daughters, Carlene and Phyllis. Unable to locate any of the heirs of C. A. Lester, deceased, through citation by publication, Judge Goodrich entered a default judgment in favor of Ethel Noel, giving her full title to the west half of Section 26, Block 25, H & GM Railroad Surveys of Gray County.

Another default judgment was granted to W. Ray Webster from Marshall Hubbard, doing business as Alpacco Construction Co., and Security Federal Savings and Loan Association, garnishee. The

judgment gave Webster \$1,850 for gasoline and oil supplies sold to the construction company and \$474.20 from the loan association as garnishee.

Personal injury damages amounting to \$150 went to Geary Don Dalton for injuries sustained when struck by a car driven by Henry Link. The suit was brought against Link's wife, Mrs. Agnes Wilson Link, owner of the car.

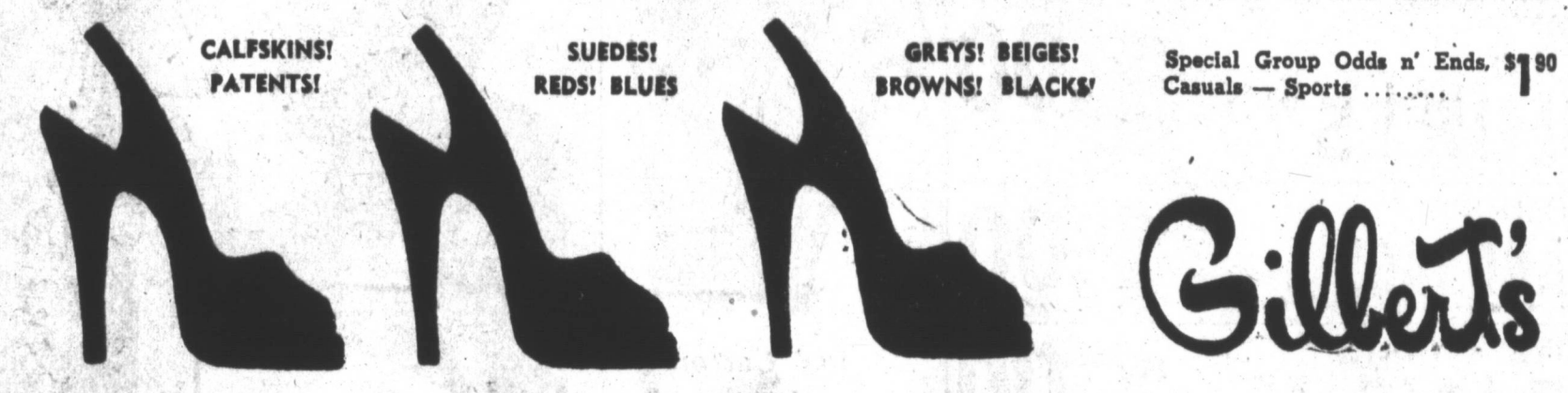

# If You Want To Knock On Wood, See Carl J. Wright

If you ever want to "knock on wood for luck," you might look in the workshop of Carl J. Wright, 1229 Christine. There, some 150 different kinds of wood are used in the ancient art of marquetry. This art is the forming of varicolored veneers

and other materials into designs which are inlaid on a background and glued to solid wood. There is no written history of the exact time the use of veneer started. Works in museums indicate the origin dates back 15 centuries prior to the Christian era.

But for Wright, the art goes back just 20 years to the time he began collecting machinery for his home workshop. The workshop, located in the basement of the Wright home, is complete with a jig saw, wood lathe drill press and a quantity of attachments, many made by Wright, and various shelves filled with brushes, files, wrenches and other items necessary to woodcraft.

One of the most unusual pieces produced in the Pampa man's workshop is the inlaid picture which requires about 75 hours of tedious work, and is a superb example of craftsmanship. The pictures resemble a painting, but instead of painting with oils, Wright paints with wood—wood in its natural state. He combines pieces of veneers of the same thickness (1/28th of an inch) and fits them together like a jig saw puzzle, and thus forms the picture into its component parts.

The Wright home is accented with the results of many hours labor in the workshop, even though he gives away almost everything he makes. There are candlesticks, coffee tables, lamp bases, serving trays and inlaid pictures. Woods for the workshop are ordered by the square foot from order houses catering to the home craftsman and come in thin sheets. Wright has mahogany from Cuba and the Philippines, ebony from India, burbinga from Africa, rosewood from Brazil, lacewood from Australia, tamo from Japan and hundreds of other varieties from this country and other parts of the world.

The multifarious colors help achieve the unusual shading effect on the inlaid pictures. A zebra wood from Africa is appropriately named because of brown stripes on blonde. A purpleheart wood from Dutch Guiana was named because of its deep purple color. A sample of holly wood compared to other woods proved it to be the whitest wood available.

Where a color is not available in the natural woods, dyed wood can be ordered from the order houses. Maple is used almost exclusively for dyeing. Wright, who was reared in Colorado, has lived around trees all his life (until he came to the Plains in 1942 from New York) and has made an extensive study of woods. On a trip to Cuba he brought back a very dense wood, Lignum Vitae, that is used for ship bearings. It is the heaviest and hardest wood known to commerce, weighing 84 pounds per cubic foot, and is one of the most unusual woods in the world.

Another different kind of wood is the burl. It is a side wart-like growth found on many kinds of trees and has the appearance of a mass of penetrating eyes with a swirling character. The wood grainings are important to the character of the inlaid pictures. Laying the pieces of veneer according to their grain is similar to the way a seamstress cuts "on the straight of the material."

An ardent fisherman, the Pampa man has been tying his own flies for the last five years and completes a fly in 10 minutes. He uses everything from a skunk tail to hair from a polar bear (dyed yellow) for making flies. He also uses silk, yarn, tinsel, peacock feathers (a choice material), and human hair (just to show people it would work). He's caught a "bunch of trout," too! The main equipment for tying flies is a little ingenuity and a fly-tying device.

Of all the things Wright makes and gives away, there's one item that he makes for himself exclusively. "I never give away a fly rod," he said. He has devised special tools on his drill press to work and taper split bamboo at the same time, but still it takes some 40 or 50 hours to complete a rod. He builds the rods in five sections because he believes it is better and stronger than the commercially popular six sectioned rod.

For the beginning home craftsman, Wright suggests the magazine "Popular Home Crafts" and explains that the cost of the hobby is insignificant compared to the time spent. A home workshop can be built around one lathe and from that one machine hundreds of items can be made such as bowls, candlesticks, lamps and plates.

Wright is perhaps the only man in Pampa who practices marquetry. When the Trapp family appeared here in connection with the Community Concert series, they visited in the Wright home and were surprised to see the inlaid pictures. They had known the use of veneer to exist in Austria when they were children, but had not seen it in many years.

Though the use of veneer goes back 15 centuries B. C., it was not until the Renaissance that work in veneer got a strong foothold. In the tomb of King Tut objects were found showing the use of fine veneer, and it is, in a way, remarkable that similar work is being done by a total man.

For after all, fifteen centuries is a long time!

## Debate Limit Set On Proposed Bill

WASHINGTON — (AP) — In an effort to get a vote next week, the senate agreed to limit debate on a bill to authorize the importing of Mexican farm labor.

The debate limit will become effective when the senate resumes consideration of the measure Monday. It will allow 40 minutes argument on each amendment and two hours discussion before the final vote.

The bill has been pending before the senate for nine days.

Russian officers ordered the father to hand the child back. When the father was separated a second time from his son against the law, he decided to "kidnap" the child. He did so, and now is living as a "refugee" in western Austria, out of the reach of the Russians and his divorced wife.

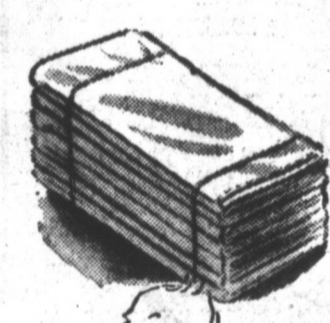
Exceptionally high prices for mother-of-pearl shells last year resulted in the near depletion of all the principal pearl lagoons in this South Pacific archipelago.

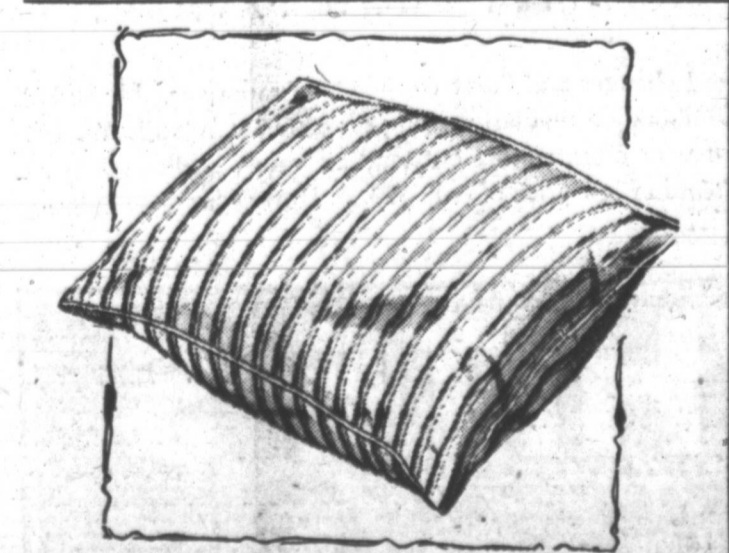

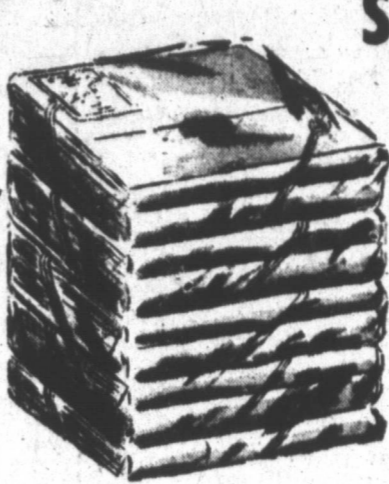

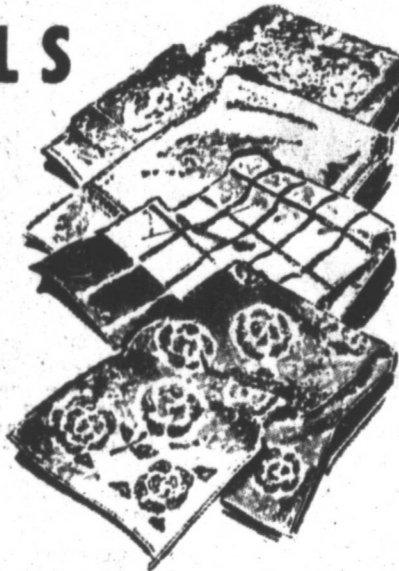

# MacArthur Slated For Summer Talk In Cotton Bowl

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Douglas MacArthur figures battle casualties in Korea are around 1,000,000 men for both sides, with many civil lians losses for our side of about 250,000. In addition, many civilians have been casualties of the fighting. He used these figures in telling senators the battling there is no mere "skirmish" and in protesting this "continuous slaughter."

"Our own (battle) casualties, American casualties, have passed 65,000," MacArthur said. "The Koreans have lost about 140,000. Our losses, on our side, are a quarter of a million men."

"I am not talking of the civilian populations who must have lost many, many times that. The enemy probably has lost 750,000 men."

**POINTERS ON BUYING FOOD**  
Food costs are a big problem these days, even for the farm housewife. The homemaker can stretch her food dollars by paying more attention to purchases.

Here are a few suggestions for trimming the family food budget:

1. Buy foods that are in season.
2. Learn the comparative value of a food that is available in different forms, such as fresh, canned and frozen.
3. Use cheaper grades of canned foods.
4. Use milk, whenever possible, in its less expensive forms — dried and evaporated.
5. Buy eggs on the basis of grade for different uses, and compare egg sizes against the cost per pound.
6. Buy meat that will give the most food value per pound, and cook more fish.
7. Learn how to use the various fats and oils and buy them according to use and price.
8. Plan meals ahead, and plan your grocery shopping around those plans.
9. And finally, the housewife should learn more about nutrition and how to prepare foods in order to preserve food value and eating qualities.

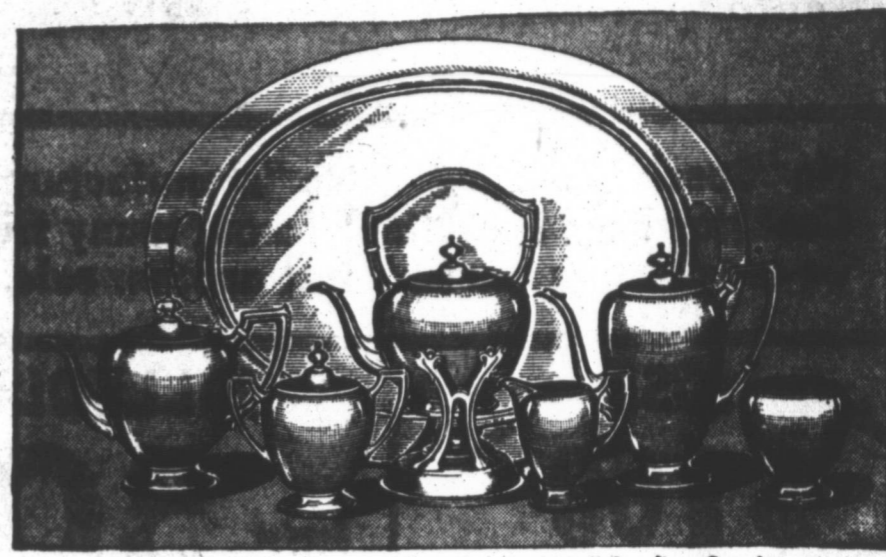

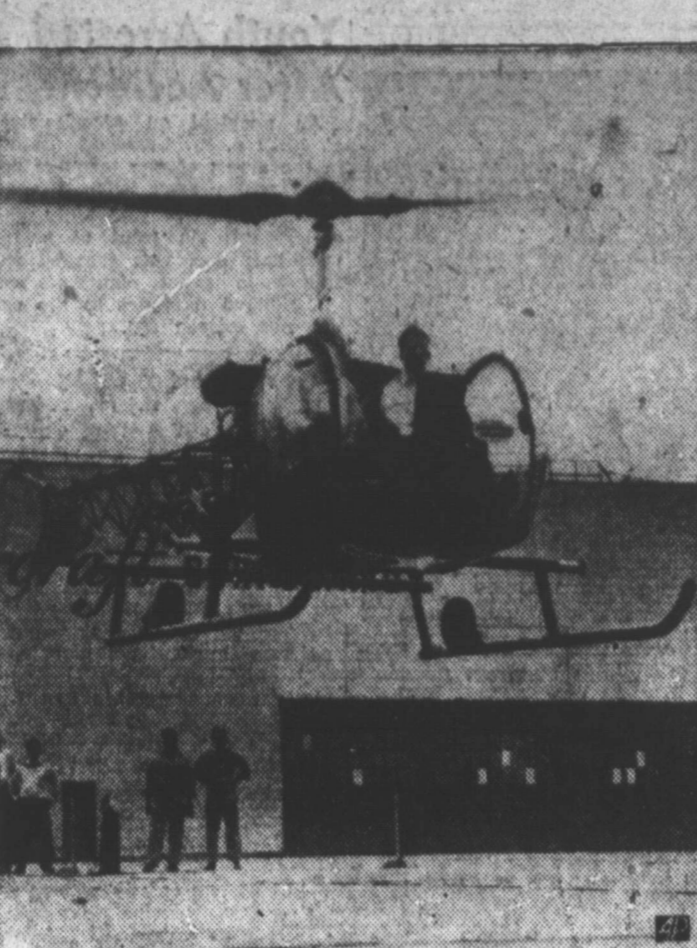

# Atom Bomb Tests To Give Data On Civilian Defense

HONOLULU — (AP) — The final of the Eniwetok tests, designed to get information for planning civilian defense against the atomic bomb, is expected next week.

As indicated by announcements by the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) itself, one chief aim will be to find the kind of factory and civilian shelters needed to withstand atomic blast.

Up through "Operation Sandstone" at Eniwetok in May of 1948, the main purpose of these experiments was to determine the bomb's destructive power and its value as a military weapon.

Now "Operation Greenhouse," as it is called, will try to learn what materials and structural designs may afford protection should atomic warfare come to the United States.

The commission also told the American Institute of Architects that the impending test will provide data for the development of design criteria.

The approximate time of the test was established through reports of two congressional observers, Rep. F. Edward Hebert (D-La.), now en route from Washington, and Sen. Warren F. Magnuson (D-Wash.), en route to Eniwetok from Hong Kong. Hebert has said he expects to

return to Washington May 12. Both Hebert and Magnuson now have signed security pledges not to disclose any information not cleared with the AEC.

Analysis of AEC announcements on Operation Greenhouse and of reports on the 1948 test develop these fairly sound conclusions: The Operation Greenhouse blast will be that of a fixed-in-place bomb, as was the original A-bomb test at Alamogordo N. M., July 16, 1945.

As in the 1948 test, the impending test is a controlled field laboratory operation in which control and precision are desired. It seems evident there will be no plane drop of the bomb.

With the announced purpose of testing materials and structural design, it seems obvious there would be no underwater blast. The Air Force has announced that B-50s, B-29s and its new B-47 jet bomber would take part. But their participation apparently will be with instruments and cameras and in search operations, rather than in making a bomb drop.

The coming explosion will not necessarily be larger than any previous A-bomb blast. The destructive power of the bomb was fairly well determined in the previous experiments.

However, it seems clear that some important new advance and improvement is to be measured in Operation Greenhouse. At the end of the 1948 test, Dr. Darol K. Froman, nuclear scientist, said atomic tests cost so much money, man hours and natural resources that they could not and should not be attempted unless there was a major advance to be proved.

# New Pill Treatment May Be Relief To Anemia Sufferers

CLEVELAND — (AP) — There's a possibility of a pill treatment for pernicious anemia, the blood disease which now requires its 100,000 American sufferers to take regular injections of vitamin B-12 or liver extract.

There's also hope of preventing potential victims of the disease and of applying a preventive treatment to forestall it, a research team from New York Medical College has reported.

Dr. George B. Jerry Glass declared these possibilities are based upon discovery of a substance in human stomach juice which may be the long-sought "missing link" in science's knowledge of the disease. It is called "granular mucoprotein."

Glass believes the material — or at least some fraction of it — is the intrinsic bodily factor needed to escape the disease but which is lacking in persons having malady.

He said that tiny doses of the substance given by mouth to a few patients allowed oral administration of the usual doses of vitamin B-12 which otherwise would have to be given by injection. Liver is a rich source of B-12. Explaining that vitamin IV is the extrinsic factor needed to

avoid pernicious anemia, Glass said normal people get it in their every day food and utilize it by means of the intrinsic factor.

But since they lack the internal factor, pernicious anemics must get the vitamin in a way they can utilize it.

Glass said the vitamin alone could be administered to patients by mouth but that large and expensive quantities are required and results are unreliable. That's because B-12 is poorly absorbed into the blood system by way of the intestines when it has no other help. Hence, the "vitamin is now

given by injection in relatively small doses.

The new substance, said Glass, shows evidence of being able to aid the vitamin's absorption by the intestinal route so that the injection-size dose can be taken by mouth.

The substance was discovered by doctors Glass, L. J. Boyd, Michael Rubenstein and Chester Bygala. It is under development and refinement and its use is limited to clinical research.

But Glass foresaw the possibility of patients someday using pills made up of the new substance or some modification of it — and pills of vitamin B-12.

He said there is some reason to believe that a potentially for the disease may exist for years before symptoms develop.

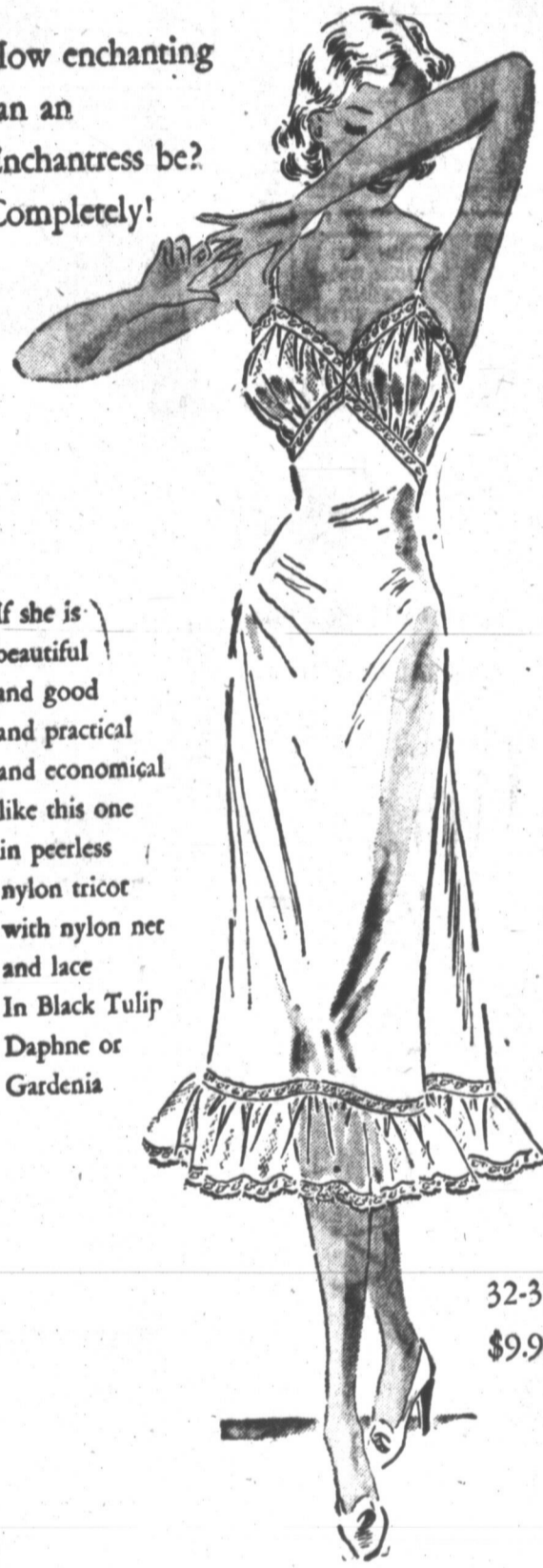

# Tidelands Controversy A Warning On Dictatorship

(Editor's Note: Curtis Douglas, prominent Pampa attorney, has studied the controversy between the federal government, the states and oilmen who have leases from its states for submerged lands. Douglas sees the fight as going deeper than a decision on which power shall have jurisdiction. Rather, it is a fight now to determine the status of state sovereignty. Here is presented in three installments, his views as presented to Pampa Times meeting last week.)

A sober warning must be sounded that far more than oil, but the structure of state sovereignty which stands as an effective bar to some future totalitarian dictatorship through seizure of an all-powerful centralized government, is involved in the pending tidelands controversy.

Looking into the unforeseeable future, it seems clear that a dictatorship could be established over this nation only if the states are so subservient to the federal government that seizure of the federal government would invest the tyrant with irresistible control over the whole nation.

So long as we have 48 or more strong sovereign states, the establishment of a dictatorship will be virtually impossible. The decision in the tidelands case opens the door to a new method of centralization which has shocked the

lawyers of the nation and caused grave concern to all people who have studied its full portent. Aside from the desire to expand federal dominion at the expense of the states, what explanation is there for the federal executive department's stubborn refusal to restore the coastal submerged lands to state ownership?

Any state which thinks it does not have a vital interest in the controversy should study this new pattern of expansion with an eye to the future. Today it is

oil bearing submerged lands, but what will it be tomorrow?

Recent senate committee hearings on the so-called interim bill to provide for continued operation and exploration of the submerged coastal oil lands under strict federal control have served to clarify the issue between the states on the one hand and the federal government on the other.

Many of the advocates of federal ownership of the submerged coastal lands within the boundaries of the coastal states have heretofore deliberately befogged the real issue by accusing those opposed to federal control of being interested only in protecting the rights of oil companies.

These companies obtained mineral leases on parts of the submerged lands from the states, who were at the time considered to have full ownership of such lands. This occurred before the Supreme Court decision in the U. S. against California, which was handed down a few years ago in 1947.



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Actually, the tidelands issue is and always has been squarely between the states and the federal government, with the oil companies, being merely innocent third parties involved in the controversy only because they developed the submerged lands pursuant to state leases.

These oil companies did this with the full knowledge and consent of the federal government, which unequivocally maintained until a few years ago that the states owned the coastal submerged lands within their boundaries and that the federal government had no powers over them except control of navigation and similar national powers which the states have never questioned and which are not involved in the current controversy.

Yet, some of the proponents of federal ownership are attempting to becloud the real issue by using the oil companies as whipping boys, because responsible federal officers have assured the oil companies that their rights under the state leases will be respected if the federal government is awarded a decision against the states in the supreme court.

Nevertheless, the loudest proponents of federal ownership have constantly directed their propaganda attacks against the oil companies not daring to openly direct their attacks against the real target, the sovereignty of the states.

This is the very heart of the controversy. The interim bill hearings served to clarify the issue because this bill is sponsored by proponents of federal control; it is supported by the present administration; and by its terms it definitely validates the oil leases issued by the states to the oil companies before the decision in the U. S. vs. California, and also those issued thereafter pursuant to a stipulation between California and the federal government.

This validating provision has caused some oil companies holding state leases to support the resolution but the states have refused to do so.

The fact that an oil company lessee is in favor of the proposed temporary compromise while the states involved are opposed to it, shows that the issue goes far deeper than the federal ownership people were willing to admit. While they were pretending to be fighting oil companies but

were actually confiscating state property — property which the federal government conceded to be owned by the states until the founding of the nation until the filing of the federal government's case against California in 1945 and the supreme court's decision in favor of the federal government in 1947.

This unprecedented decision of the supreme court sets a new pattern for conquest or confiscation — a pattern which if followed to its ultimate conclusion could mean the complete destruction of the sovereignty of the states. Obviously, it could be used to confiscate privately owned property as well.

Although the states would like to get the controversy settled, they prefer to leave it where it is rather than to complicate matters by temporary expediency which it is feared might compound the confusion that already exists.

Interim arrangements might endure indefinitely and diminish the states chance of forcing a clear cut decision on the principal issue involved, which is nothing less than the maintenance of the identity of the states as sovereign units of a federation in which all powers constitutionally remain with the states which are not delegated to the federal government by the states.

Let's look at the Texas picture for a moment, if you please. Within the short period since Texas began to sell leases on Tidelands areas, the state received \$34,125,000.00 in lease bonuses.

The Texas tideland area includes some 18,200,000 acres, of which approximately 1-64th or 284 thousand acres was leased by the state. These figures would indicate to you a total bonus value above two billion dollars.

Approximately nine million dollars was collected in royalties by the state of Texas. This money belonged to the state school fund of Texas. Consequently, it is needless for me to tell you that this is a matter of great importance to not only the oil industry, the landowner, but every citizen in Texas.

The title to the Texas tidelands arises out of the fact that by Texas' victory over Mexico in 1836, the Republic of Texas was born and became an independent sovereign nation, universally recognized under international law, and this Republic was the owner of the waters of the Gulf of Mexico.
