Opinions Differ On Cause Of Wheat Failure On Great Plains

What was to blame for the disaster in this year's winter wheat? The greenbug or the drought? Great Plains farmers will set up sides in the argument of the moment's notice, and the issue is apt to get strong and bitter, reports the October issue of Country Gentleman.

Leading exponent of the greenbug theory is A. W. Erickson, a crop reporter, who holds the little green critter is the real catastrophe, short of the drought, ever to visit the wheat grower.

The greenbug took \$250,000,000 worth of wheat last year, says Erickson. "This year it took \$100,000,000 worth. If we have a drought epidemic this coming year, Great Plains wheat will lose an acre in the value," he says, "which certain long-experienced and highly regarded exper-

imentation agronomists and entomologists partly reply: "Erickson has gone off the deep end. The weather was the main cause of crop loss. The greenbug simply added to the trouble."

Whatever the cause, the result was disastrous. Planted under promising conditions last fall, with the subsoil soaked full of moisture, the crop did one of the worst fade-outs in recent history. Kansas growers had to abandon 3,800,000 acres, most of it in the southwestern part of the state. Texas lost 4,500,000 acres; Oklahoma, 2,200,000 and Colorado, 1,100,000 acres.

Erickson claimed that the greenbug did the damage in the fall, by injecting a poison which stopped root development. He also claimed that the bug was spreading the mosaic disease across the Plains to the far reaches of Montana.

Dr. Harold E. Myers, head of Kansas State college's agronomy department, takes issue with Erickson. "Winterkill and drought were the main causes, helped by leaf rust in some areas, some mosaic disease and greenbugs," he says.

Dr. Reginald H. Painter, Kansas State entomologist, says that researchers have never found a case where the greenbug transmitted the mosaic, although they have made hundreds of carefully-controlled tests in which greenbugs feeding on mosaic-infested wheat were transferred to healthy wheat.

Butcher, Wife Getting Angry About Prices

NEW YORK — (AP) — Every one — the housewife as well as the Army, the butcher as well as the packer — is getting steamed up about the meat price, and supply situation.

Black markets, above-ceiling prices and inferior quality plague the industry as well as the consumer. Chain store executives say they may not be able to supply meat much longer. New York butchers threaten to close 3,400 shops in protest to a fast-spreading black market.

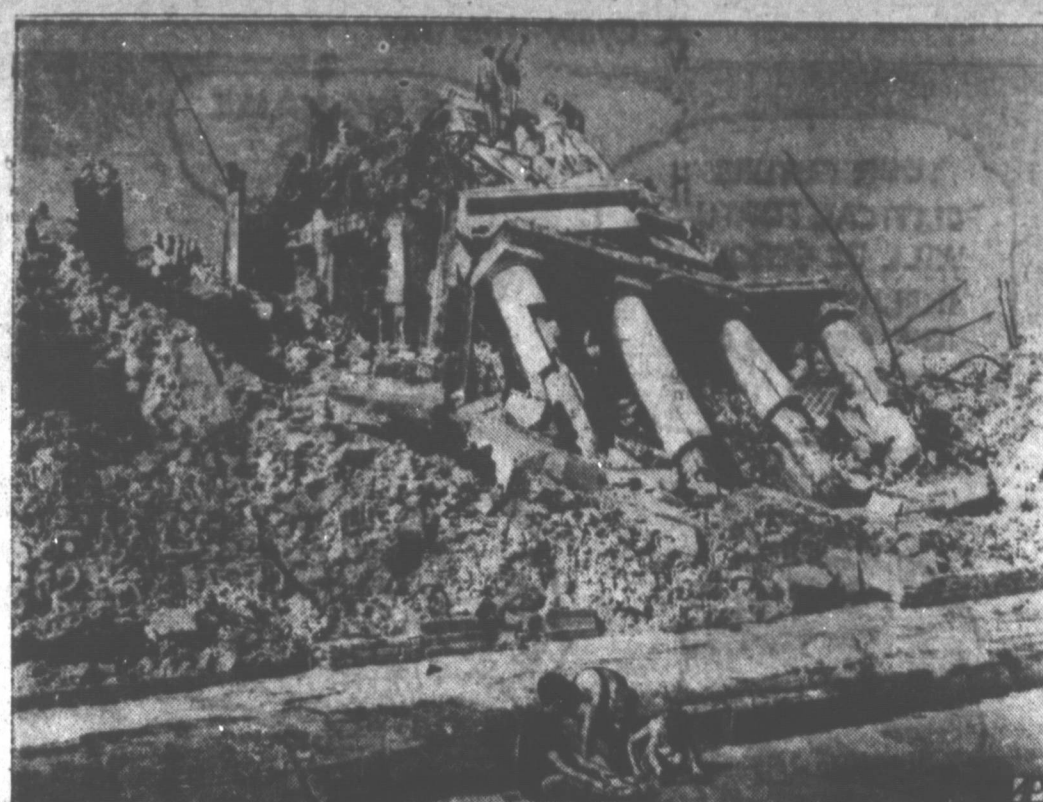
Many in the meat industry say controls can never work as long as they are not placed at the production level — and this, the farmer says, would be unfair and would cut off production incentive.

Grocerymen say many companies are thinking of going to court to force the Office of Price Stabilization to change its price control methods. The chains call the rules outmoded and unworkable. They say they can't break even on meat — and can't sell it at a loss because they aren't allowed to make up the loss by higher prices on other foods.

The housewife finds it harder to get good meat and finds favored cuts mostly priced out of her reach.

The packers say they buy all the beef they can under the OPS pricing rules. These rules permit the cattle grower or feeder to sell the animal at any price he can get. The packer can pay as high a price as he cared to on any one animal. But his purchases for any one month must average out at a specific ceiling for the various grades of beef.

Packers complain this puts them in the guessing business. Even when the packer can't always be sure an animal they buy alive will turn out to have a certain quality of beef after it's butchered. If they pay too high on animal and find they got inferior quality, they have used part of their quota for the month and can't afford to take a chance on other animals.

There is some talk that Washington may scrap the present system and go in for a mark-up ceiling — that is, allow the packer to buy animals for what they bring in the stockyards and then add his usual profit margin. Why are livestock prices going up while the cattle population is at record heights? Packers say some growers and feeders are holding back cattle in anticipation of a break-down in price controls.

Others are holding back animals for breeding bigger herds. Dealers say a few packers are buying all the cattle they can get at above-ceiling prices. They are said to carry the meat on their books at more than the actual value of the animal — thus making their monthly quota look right on the books. Some are accused of selling inferior quality meat to distributors at prices set for top quality. While there is much talk in the industry of this practice, formal charges of violations have been few.

Chain store operators contend they are unable to find beef at the legal price ceiling and that they will not sell beef that has been up-graded in quality to get around price ceilings.

The Army got into the meat last week when it sought to buy 12 million pounds of beef for November and got bids for only 300,000 pounds. Most packers said they couldn't find beef at ceiling prices. The Army threatens to buy outside the United States but the meat industry here doubts if it can find much quality beef abroad.

Army Fires 'Sad Sack'

INS 1-24 BOLD ARMY FIRES - FORT ORD, Calif. (AP) - The Army recently burned several hundred copies of its comic book depicting a "Sad Sack" who lived happily ever after only after re-enlisting in the service.

The book is the one Senator Capehart (R-Ind.) denounced as "socialist propaganda" 10 days ago.

A Fort Ord public information officer said several unopened packages of the colored books, containing several hundred copies, were thrown into the incinerator recently on orders from Sixth Army.

A spokesman at the Presidio of San Francisco said Sixth Army headquarters had ordered distribution and use of the book stopped one or two weeks ago, presumably by order of the Department of the Army.

The book follows "Sad Sack," from his discharge - when he says "civilian life for me" - to his re-enlistment. In between times, he acquires a family and more debts than he can meet. Finally his last nickel turns out to be counterfeit.

Winter Will Test Nation's Ability In Oil Production

WASHINGTON - (AP) - Approaching winter will test the nation's ability to get along without Iran's oil.

The void caused by the Iranian nationalization move, and consequent shutdown of production, has been fairly well filled, up to now. Crude output in the United States, the Caribbean and Venezuela has been increased, while some imports normally reaching this hemisphere from other parts of the Middle East have been diverted to Europe.

With cold weather, Europe is expected to feel a real pinch in supplies if Iranian oil still is not available. High level diplomatic policy will dictate the extent to which American production will be used to satisfy European needs - and, therefore, determine how much the average American will be affected.

Some confusion arose over remarks Friday by Deputy Petroleum Administrator for Defense Bruce Brown speaking at Jennings, La., he said the nation faces the unhappy possibility of gasoline rationing unless the oil industry gets sufficient steel to expand production.

A PAD spokesman here, elaborating on the speech, said Brown had in mind the long-range outlook for national defense requirements, irrespective of the Iranian situation. There isn't any prospect whatever of gasoline rationing this winter, the spokesman added.
