Frank Ikard Sweeps Field; **Republican Candidate Third**

WICHITA FALLS -(P)- Frank Ikard, 37-year-old district judge, Saturday was elected congressman from Texas' 13th congressional district.

With returns in from 227 precincts of the 322 precincts in the 15-county district, Ikard's two nearest opponents conceded. Ikard was leading his nearest opponent by alnost two to one.

The first to concede was Walter Jenkins of Wichita Falls, and the second was the lone Republican in the eight-way race, Joe Jackson, Wichita Falls oilman. At that time, Ikard had 7678 votes to 4373 for Jenkins and

4216 for Jackson.


