Public Schools Teaching That Declaration of Independence

Is False In the last issue I attempted to show how our public schools and many of our private colleges are peddling "dope" and that they are doing infinitely more harm than the peddlers of narcotic dope. They are peddling 'dope' that poisons the minds of the American youth, if the ideologies of the Declaration of Independence and the Commandments and the Golden Rule are to be used as a spiritual and

It is in 65% of the high schools. It is in 25 times as many high schools as its nearest competitor. Therefore books like this one have much to do with undermining and corrupting the youth of the land as far as the belief in the spirit of the Declaration of Independence is concerned. Now, let's see how this book is undermining the ideologies on which this government was formed. The Declaration of Indepen-

dence sets forth that: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights-that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed."

Note that the Declaration says "to secure" these rights to "Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness" governments are instituted. Liberty is a natural right that belongs to each and every individual It is not granted by the government. Each person is born with this right to "Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

Now listen to what this book teaches on page 643 to the youth in 65% of the high schools in the United States:

"The welfare and the prosperity of the community are of sufficient importance for each individual to willing to surrender somewhat of his liberty, somewhat of his independence, to secure the desired

Note that the author uses the soft misleading word "require" and doesn't use the word compel or force to conform. 

More taxes are coming, but do not be fooled by the idle chatter of politicians with regard to these new taxes; nor with regard to any taxes, for that matter. However the new bill is written, wherever the burden is theoretically placed, will be designed to get greatest amount of feathers from amount of squawking.


