The radio, a short time after announcing civil war had broken out in Argentina, declared the government quelled the rising led by former Gen. Arturo Rawson and former Gen. Benjamin Menendez. Rawson was a leader of a 1943 rebellion which placed him in the presidency just two days.

Chemical engineer and J. B. Phelps, production superintendent at Pampa plant. Others at the main table were former Congressman Ben Gull and Mayor Huff.

Holding back tears of appreciation, Burdette and Green accepted their plaques of recognition from Huff after the latter's glowing recapitulation of their accomplishments since setting up in Pampa.

"If I didn't say I am humble, I'd be crazy. I feel deeply grateful," Burdette said as he gratefully fondled the copper plaque engraved with his photo, name and tribute.

"I am overwhelmed — I never had anything so nice happen to me or touch me so deeply. I have had a good time here tonight and you have been very kind to give me partial credit for bringing Celanese to Pampa. The credit actually belongs to my company for permitting me to contract our gas to the Celanese Corp," Green said, holding firmly to his plaque.

Prior to individual introductions of Celanese officials by Gull, Mayor Huff officially welcomed the company to Pampa, saying: "When you hear something that shocks you, it is usually followed by a feeling of gratitude or sorrow. When we were given the shocking news that your company was definitely locating in Pampa we were grateful that a company such as yours was becoming our neighbor."

But it was during the introductions by Gull that the party got its surprise. No one knew that Kammiller was also lauded as a musician and singer. They soon learned when he strummed out a parody to "The Streets of Laredo" using Burdette, Green and Allen as the ones to gently pan.

JACOBY ON CANASTA

Settle Card Problems Yourself

We have a few letters about black threes from readers in various parts of the country. Apparently America is still the country of inventors. If you can't invent a new kind of mousetrap people seem to think, at least you can invent a new rule for Canasta.

"I drew the last card from the stock, a black three," writes a lady from Canas, Wash. "I had five cards in my hand, all of them very dangerous discards. I wanted to discard the black three, but was told I must discard a card that my opponents could use if I had one. This process would go on until somebody went out or until somebody ran out of usable cards. I was even told that this rule had appeared in the Jacoby column. What about it?"

I'm getting used to hearing that all sorts of impossible things have appeared in my column. It usually develops that the lady didn't read it there herself, but she knows somebody whose cousin's brother-in-law did read it.

There is no such rule, of course. In this situation you discard the black three if that's what you want to do. You are never compelled to make a discard for the benefit of your opponents. Any game that had such a rule would be a very silly game.

"My opponent melted out and caught me with all four black threes in my hand," writes another correspondent, from Eau Claire, Wis. "They said my side would have to pay a penalty of 500 points. My answer was short, decisive, and not very polite. Is there anything in this?"

There is less in it than meets the eye. If your opponents had said 800 points, it would be possible to believe that they confused red threes and black threes. Since they said 500 points, however, it's clear case of an invented rule.

As I have often pointed out in this column, this is free country, and you don't have to stick rigidly to the official rules of Canasta. It's equally true that you don't have to adopt every weird new rule that somebody feels like cooking up. This is a problem that every player must settle for himself.

King Resting Comfortably

LONDON — (AP) — King George spent another comfortable night and maintained steady progress, a medical bulletin said today.

It was the second optimistic bulletin in a row from the doctors who handled the King's critical lung operation Sunday.

The bulletin, the ninth since the operation, said: "The King has had another comfortable night and is making steady progress."

Barring unforeseen complications, the King is now nearly out of danger, some medical specialists indicated today. A number of Buckingham palace actions tend to back up their belief.

According to one source in Harley street — London's street of doctors — the worst of King George's recovery period should be over within 24 hours.

Yesterday the King came safely through the critical fifth day since all or part of his lung was cut out. Buckingham palace sources said Thursday marked the start of a second danger period of two or three days. Doctors say internal bleeding and fatigue could set in during this phase.

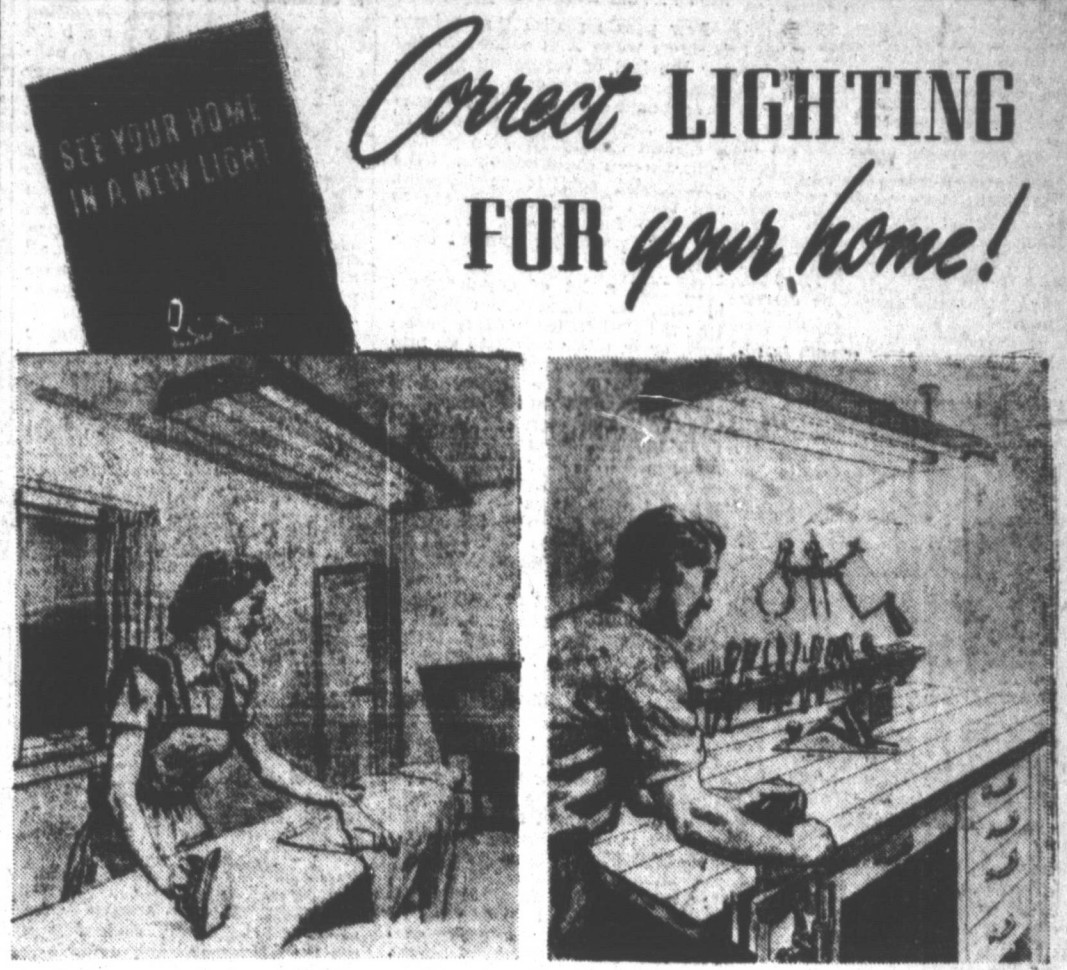

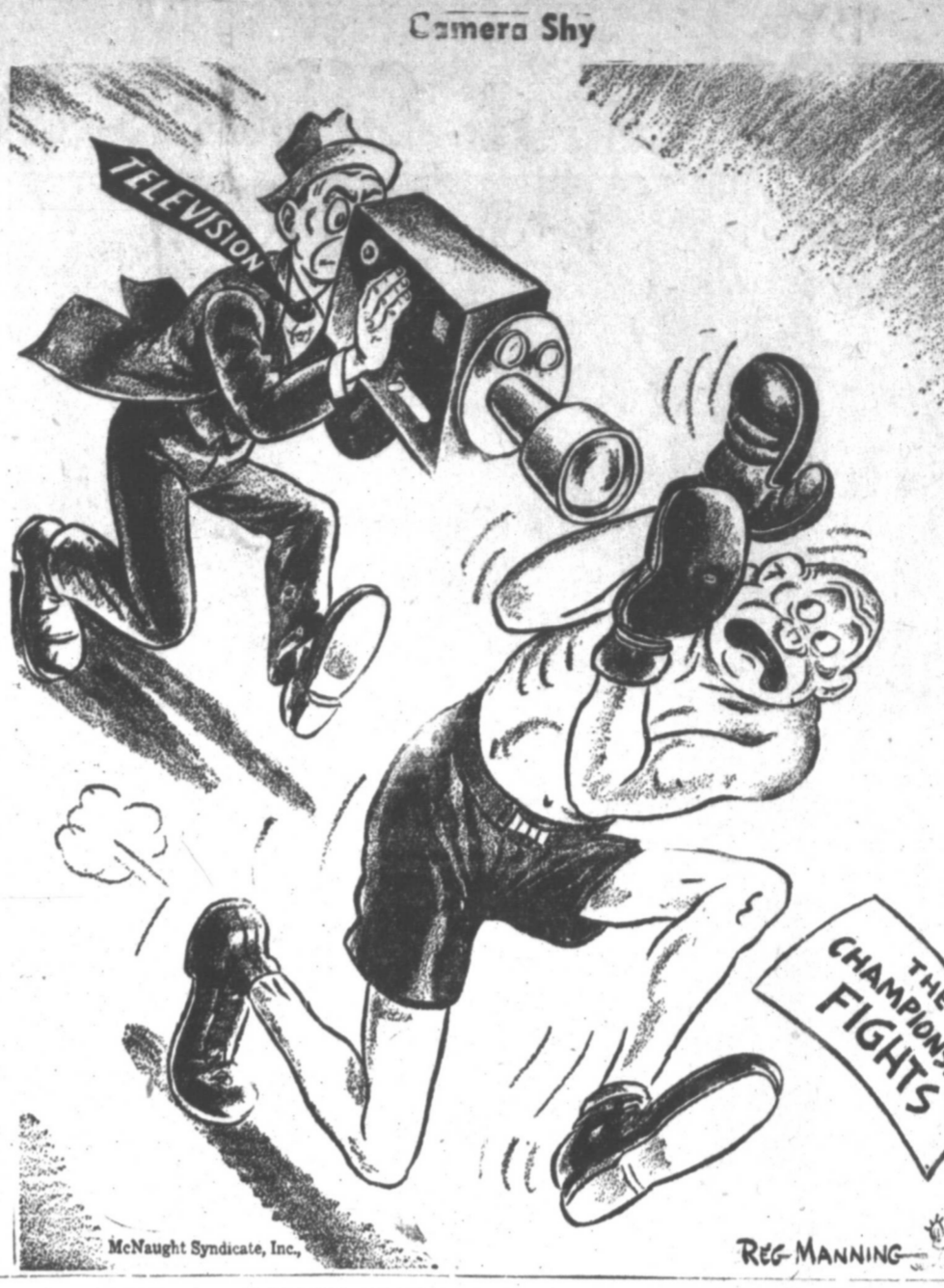

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Stalin's Image Likely To Be Predominant In Tie Contest

 NEW YORK — (AP) — The news from Russia sounds more and more capitalistic. What's going on behind the iron curtain these days?
 First the Soviet doll industry is warned it has got to produce a greater variety of dolls, as little girls don't like all dolls to look alike.
 And now the Soviet Ministry of Light Industry has announced a national necktie design contest. Ivan is apparently tired of wearing the same old drab cravat, and wants to spruce up a bit. The ministry is giving 14 prizes to the winners, and doesn't that

rather jar you? In the old days, comrade, a man wouldn't expect a prize for designing the better necktie. He would do it for the glory of the masses. Just what the prizes will be, the ministry doesn't say. But if they should turn out to be the collected speeches of Joseph Stalin, the winners will still be expected to muster expressions of delight.
 The contest has one interesting rule: Each necktie must be designed that it can be manufactured in five different colors. Presumably, these are the five primary Russian colors—crimson, crimson, scarlet, maroon and red.
 The real problem for a Russian artist, however, won't be one of color. It will be how to design a prize-winning necktie without putting a portrait of Stalin on it. I predict no Russian artist will get around that problem.

It should be fairly easy right not to predict the top winning design. It will have the figure of the Kremlin standing out against a field of red. Over the Kremlin a great full moon will be rising. The moon will have a mustache, and the great slow tiger smile of Uncle Joe himself.
 This same design is sure to turn up at least 18,000 times during the contest. All the judges will have to do is to pick the 14 best — 14, of course, that show the full moon face of Stalin as larger than the Kremlin.

 "I tried to get you to slam," North reproached him. "Oh well, play it quickly and maybe we'll have time for another rubber."
 Thus encouraged, South played the hand quickly and found a very easy way to go down at his game contract. South quavered miserably that he had played the hand too hastily, but this

was a poor excuse and he knew it. The truth was that he'd have made the same plays no matter how much time he had taken.
 West led the king of hearts, and dummy ruffed with the deuce of spades. Declarer promptly led the six of spades from dummy, winning with the ace. His next step was to lay down the king of spades.
 It all seems very natural, doesn't it? Nevertheless, South has now fumbled away his contract.
 At best, South can ruff another heart in dummy and begin on the clubs. West can ruff the second club, however, and South is stuck with two losing hearts and two losing diamonds and no way to get rid of them. Down two on a hand that was good enough for a slam.
 The correct play is very hard to find even if you see all the cards. In actual play I doubt that one player in a thousand would make the contract.
 At the second trick, North leads the six of spades, and East plays the five of spades. South should not win with a high trump, but should give up the trick by playing his low trump.
 This remarkable play protects declarer against a 4-1 break in trumps. By giving up this trump at once South can make twelve tricks instead of only eight.
 West wins the second trick with the nine of spades and returns a trump (as good a defense as any). South wins, ruffs a second heart in dummy, and returns to his hand with a diamond to draw the rest of the trumps. The clubs then provide the rest of the tricks.

Arkansas vs Arizona State at Tempe at Fayetteville, Ark.

Ohio State is a 14-point choice and Nebraska is granted six but Texas is a seven-point favorite over Purdue. Rice is even with Clemson and Arkansas is considered such a certainty no odds are being posted.

Southern Methodist meets an Ohio State that has bitter memories of a 32-27 upset last year when Fred Benner completed four touchdown passes in the last 11 minutes. Benner is again with SMU but he doesn't have many of the fellows who helped him do the job last season. On the other hand Ohio State is rated stronger than last season.

Texas, 7-6 victor last week over Kentucky, is expected to have just what it takes to handle Purdue, a rock-ribbed defense. Dale Samuels of the Ballers is one of the better passers but he couldn't whip Texas last year and he doesn't have as strong a team behind him this time. Texas may be better than last season.

The Rice-Clemson game a night after the Rice-Kentucky affair, could be the most interesting of them all. Clemson, unbeaten since 1949 and champion of the Orange Bowl, has more experienced men than Rice but the Owls have a classy array of sophomores and a more potent aerial game. It should be a wide open offensive.

Coach Frank Howard of Clemson will be aiming at winning his first game in Texas this year. He was the coach of a Texas all-star team at the coaching school in San Antonio in August and his team took a licking. However, he wasn't very much impressed with the Texas schoolboy football players. "I'd been hearing a lot about these Texas boys," he said, "but heck, they're not so hot."

Howard might change his mind after the Rice game.

Arizona State of Tempe brings an undefeated record to Arkansas. The Sun Devils beat San Diego Navy 28-13 and Utah State 33-27 while Arkansas won its only game played to date, kicking Oklahoma A&M 42-7. There is no reason to believe Tempe will have an unbeaten record after Saturday.

In another Southwest Conference game, Texas A&M plays Texas Tech of the Bowler Conference in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas. It will be a night game. The Aggies are given a 20-point bulge over Tech which, however, looks stronger than anticipated. The Texans beat West Texas State 46-7 last week and didn't try very hard.

Baylor doesn't play this week. The Bears take time off to get ready for Tulane at New Orleans next week.

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Taxpayers Foot \$35,325 Mail Costs

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas taxpayers footed a bill of \$35,325 for the cost of 31 state senators — from Nov. 14, 1950, through Aug. 6, State Auditor C. H. Cavness reports.

The expenditure covers such items as stationery, stamps, telegrams, telephone calls, scratch-pads, pencils and ink.

Individual outlays ranged from a high of \$4322 by Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton to a low of \$217 by Sen. Walter Tynan of San Antonio. Most spending was during the five-month legislature.

Two senators other than Phillips spent more than \$2000. They were Rogers Kelley of Edinburg, \$2471, and Warren McDonald of Tyler, \$2087.

Senate Sergeant-at-Arms Stephen Haley said high expenditures reflected heavy correspondence between the senators and their constituents.

Sam Cook, chief of the printing division, state board of control, said Phillips secured 25,000 engraved letterheads and envelopes between April 25 and June 5 at a state cost of \$730.

He also procured 20,000 letterheads and 15,000 envelopes Aug. 16, not covered by the auditor's report, at a cost of \$472.

Cavness released the audit after securing permission from Sen. Otis Lock of Lufkin to make it public.

Expenses of other senators included: A. M. Aikin, Jr., Paris, \$580; Joe D. Carter, Sherman, \$909; Kilmer B. Corbin, Lubbock, \$1733;

Joe S. Fuller, Fort Arthur, \$1084; Dorsey B. Hardeman, San Angelo, \$576; Grady Hazlewood, Amarillo, \$1213; Otis E. Lock, Lufkin, \$844; Crawford C. Martin, Hillsboro, \$978; William T. Moore, Bryan, \$1085; George O. Nokes, Jr., Corsicana, \$1486; and Kyle Vick, Waco, \$655.

TEEN TALKS

Many mothers complain that their teen-agers are inconsiderate and ill-mannered in their homes. One naturally wonders why a teen-ager is permitted these liberties, and why the habit has grown to a point where Mom is at her wit's end. A mother should be able to curb her off-spring's thoughtlessness and bad manners when the first danger signals appear.

Usually, the upshot of a household of unruly teen-agers is unhappiness and discontent for all.

Some young people take the attitude that home is just a waystation, a place where they stop to eat and sleep. Mom is just the servant girl who launders and puts out clean clothes and steaming dinners — whenever the little princess feels like eating. To add to the confusion, today's young people dictate the dinner menu, not according to budget or calorie balance, but according to their own tastes. A mother who spoils her family will cook a different dish for each.

The habit of dropping clothes wherever they are removed at home, and leaving them for others to pick up is another fault that mothers criticize. While the kids demand a spanking clean home when their own friends are to be entertained, they will litter the house with trash, books and clothing, thoughtlessly, before the folks' guests appear.

Then there's that afternoon raid on the ice-box. A big girl will get hungry enough to fix herself an interesting snack, and then leave the remains of her after-school repast for Mom to clean up before she can begin dinner.

This thoughtlessness is magnified when a youngster invites the gang in for an evening at home. After the crowd leaves, the living room looks like a junk shop. Records and books are left all over the place, furniture is pushed out of place. Cigarette ends, crackers, bread crumbs and other bits of food are ground into the rug. Soda pop bottles and glasses are left around on the floor, under chairs, in corners, and other places where they can be tripped over and perhaps broken.

Sometimes ashtrays are not emptied during the evening and cigarettes topple over to burn Mom's favorite dolly or end table. Many a fire has started by a cigarette falling behind a chair cushion and smoldering for hours before it is discovered.

If the home is borrowed for the evening by the kids there is no reason why an interest should not be taken in the clean-up job. A smart parent would deny use of the room again to a daughter who leaves everything askew.

When Sonny borrows the car, it is not unlikely that he will return it with an empty gas tank, a dent here or there and in a generally dusty state. But does he ever wash it for Dad or offer to pay for the gas father is minus? Hardly ever.

It isn't that kids are different today than they were yesterday. It's just that today's parents have spoiled them. Families are smaller and in the old days when there were six or eight kids, everybody had to do his share. Today's mother of one or two or three children thinks it is an easier proposition to do the chores herself, rather than get into a discussion about them.

There is no reason why any mother should be a slave to grown children — and if she is, it probably is her own fault. Everybody — does — his — own —

job should be the rule of any adult family.

Mom has plenty to do with her normal household and culinary tasks without adding daughter's personal laundry to her own lingerie. And there is no reason why young men cannot wash their own socks. And when they borrow Dad's car, tuxedo, suspenders or ties — the things should be returned in good condition.

Gilman Estimates 25,000 Wells For Spraberry Trend

FORT WORTH — (AP) — An estimated 25,000 oil wells and 4,500,000 tons of steel would be required to develop the "million-acre Spraberry trend of West Texas under the 40-acre spacing plan," a Fort Worth oil operator says.

Archer Rowan addressed several hundred oil operators called to discuss how to develop the area.

A committee was named to handle recommendations.

Discussion mainly was on methods despite tight steel allocations.

Rowan, who called the meeting, placed the total wells in the trend on Sept. 22 at 222, scattered among 16 separate areas and with a calendar day allowable of 48,560 barrels.

Rowan said if the remaining undrilled area could be drilled on 80-acre spacing, about 2,250,000 tons of steel would be saved. He said this was one and one fourth times the total oil field requirements of Texas in 1950 and represents enough steel to supply West Texas' normal needs for over 3 1/2 years.

"It is believed," Rowan said, "that the productive area may cover more than 1,000,000 acres; in fact, a million acres is now regarded as semi-proved with 500,000 acres already believed proved."

The committee will meet here again Oct. 4 to discuss other formulas. Another general session of the oil operators has been called at Midland for the week of Oct. 8.

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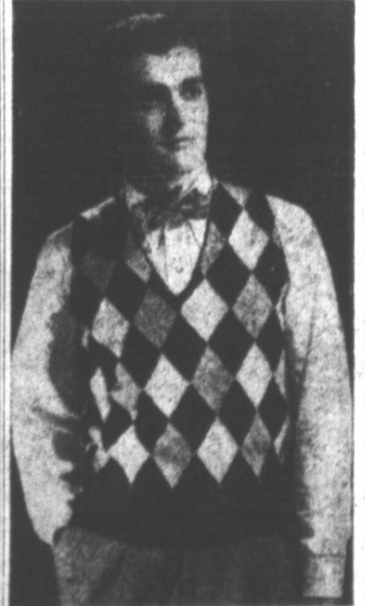

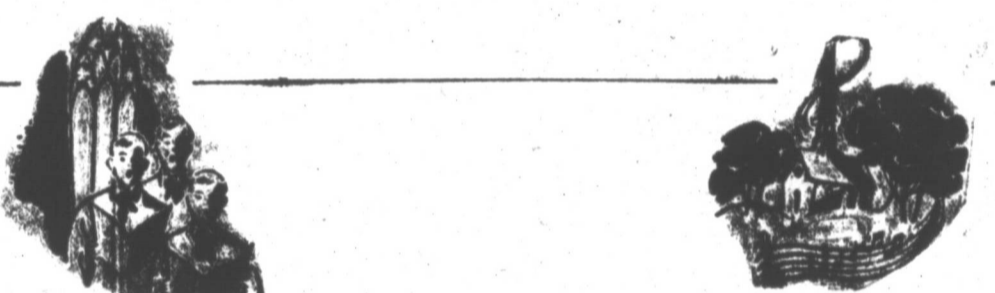

More formal styles add exotic plunage (ostrich tips and plumes are returning) precious furs and

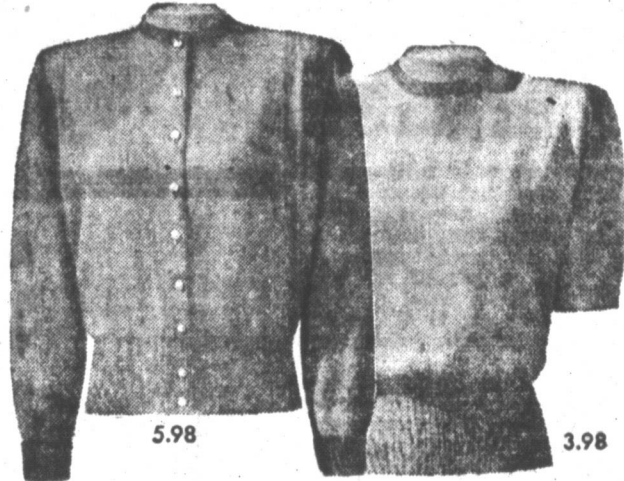

Rounded sleeves provide a most feminine contrast in new slimmer silhouette coats. And there's a tendency to use dress-up fabrics, such as velours featured in boundstooth and lattersall combinations such as oxford grey and purple, for more casual fashion coats.

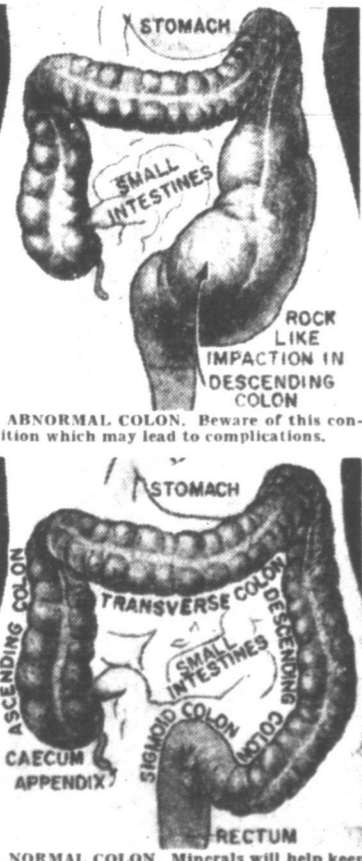
