Annual Open House And API Meeting Attract 900 Oilmen

More than 900 oilmen and representatives from allied industries attended the third annual open house held by Beacon Supply Co. yesterday. The open house preceded the first fall meeting of the Panhandle chapter of the American Petroleum Institute.

Also attending the oil industry affair were almost 80 executives from the oil field supply division of the industry from as far off as California, Wisconsin and New Jersey.

Oilmen termed the affair a success. They were shown displays on regular field equipment and supplies in addition to new developments in the field which included a hydraulic pumping unit. This latest development in the equipment line, was set up outside the building on South Cuyler.

Oilmen attending the API meeting which followed the open house at 8 p. m. saw a film which described some of the phases of the natural gas industry and outlined problems confronting the industry in the form of governmental controls.

They also heard a Korean war veteran describe the operations of the American fleet in the bombardment of the Communists.

Lt. Don Cain, World War II veteran who has just been discharged from the Navy following a 24-month tour of duty with the Navy during the Korean campaign, told oilmen and their guests how the United Nations Navy shelled Communist positions, rail yards, boats, trucks, supply centers and any other targets whose destruction would hamper Red operations.

Cain, an attorney in civilian life, said the Navy estimated 33 percent of the Communists' east coast traffic had been destroyed by the Navy's operations.

In a question-and-answer period following the meeting Cain told API members there were few visible effects of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima; Japanese were disappointed when President Truman fired Gen. MacArthur; that the Korean war had provided a business boom for the Japanese and the nation had little apparent desire to enter the Korean war. He also said the nation was generally satisfied with the peace treaty signed with Japan by the United States and that the man on the street in Japan saw an alliance with Nationalist China as the country's next step in world affairs.

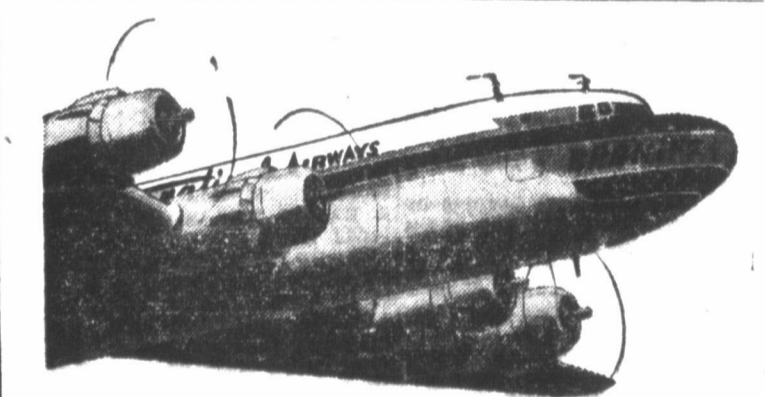

Cornfield New Population Center In U.S., Experts Say

DUNDAS, Ill. (AP) — Census experts have pinpointed a new U.S. population center in Carl Snider's cornfield. Farm folks in the southern Illinois area are pleased, although amused at the fuss over it. The young Mr. and Mrs. Carl Snider and their boys, Don, five, and John, two, live in Denver township, Richland county, Ill. Crossroads nearest the new center are graveled — leading to the nearest village, Dundas (pop. 200), and the nearest church, Mt. Gilead. It's off the beaten track, U.S. Hwy. 50 is a seven-mile drive south. Snider's neighbors are typical general farmers. Most cash in on corn and soybeans. A few luckier ones get oil royalties. Most took the first news that the nation's center had moved into their midst with less enthusiasm than they would have for a new family moving onto the next farm. They point out that it's only a mathematical balance of population. However, the Census bureau formally fixes the center once every decade. The center now has crossed a state line for the first time since 1890 and gone farther south than ever on its western course. Reacting to the news that the center now is in her community, Mrs. Gene Kermicle said, "early in the surveying we were told it might be on our own place. I kidded the man by saying wouldn't it be funny if it was in our hog pen. I knew it would be around here but I didn't think it would be such a glamorous thing." She referred to talk of a "big celebration" Oct. 18 with state and government officials taking part. The Rev. L. E. Lousignot announced the news at the centennial anniversary program at the Mt. Gilead Congregational Christian church. The minister said visiting dignitaries would be welcome to eat in the church basement. It seats only 100 or so but church

Snider was born across the road from the center; Postmaster John Gruenisen seemed doubtful enough tourists would want to send mail from the heart town of the nation to advance Dundas above a fourth class post office rating. Dundas' oldest resident is Adam Kestner at 82. When he was born the population center was in southern Ohio. Some 80 years before that it had started near Baltimore, Md.

Local Man Recovers From Korea Wound; Back In Action

HM2 James H. Cline, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thurman Cline, 1125 Terrace, is back in action after a short recuperation from what he called "not a bad wound."

In letters to his family, young Cline, a Navy medic attached to the First Marine division in Korea, said a sniper's bullet hit him in the left leg just as he came over a ridge in a battle Sept. 17. The bullet struck his pack and just grazed his leg.

"It wasn't bad, but nearly scared me to death," Cline wrote. "Cline, making light of his own wound, expressed hope the peace talks would be resumed. He summed the thoughts of all young GIs who are "just plain scared" at the enormity of this war.

"People back home just don't realize what it's like," he said.

The young Pampa High school graduate was a pre-dental student before he went into the Navy. He shipped overseas Aug. 15 and was in battle Sept. 3.

Two other Pampa boys, George Whitten and Jimmy Parker serve in that area with Cline. John T. Hill, son of Mrs. Ruth Ross, 437 Pitts, was on the same ship with Cline and was wounded the same week.

Hill is on a hospital ship and has temporary paralysis in one leg. Mrs. Ross reports his letters indicate his condition as fair.

Two Die As Car Plunges Off Ferry

RIDGELEY, Tenn. —(AP)—While the woman screamed for help, a man zoomed his car off a ferry boat landing at the Mississippi river crossing here yesterday. Both drowned.

Horrified witnesses told police the car cut around a line of stubby waiting for the ferry at Powell's landing, shifted into a two-story brick building and plunged into the river.

Lake County Sheriff J. C. Foyes identified the pair as T. L. Cook, 20, and Mrs. Alice Tilda Swater, 29, both of Dyersburg, in upper west Tennessee.

Navy Schedules NROTC Exams In Amarillo Dec. 8

Competitive examinations for entrance into the Naval Reserve Training corps next fall will be held in Amarillo Dec. 8. Eighth Naval District headquarters has announced.

Successful candidates between 17 and 21 will be given a four-year college education with government assistance. Upon graduation they may be commissioned as officers of the Navy or Marine corps.

NROTC students are deferred from Selective Service induction, but must agree to serve three years on active duty upon commissioning.

Applications for permission to take the written test may be obtained at most high schools and colleges, or by writing any Navy recruiting office or Office of Naval Officer Procurement.

Applications must be mailed to reach the Navy examining board, Princeton, N. J., not later than midnight Nov. 17. Students will then be notified where to take the examination.

Names of those who successfully pass the aptitude test and a subsequent interview and physical examination will be submitted state committees for final selections.

When accepted by the schools, students will be appointed midshipmen in the naval reserve. They will receive their tuition, books and normal fees, plus \$50 a month for the four-year period.

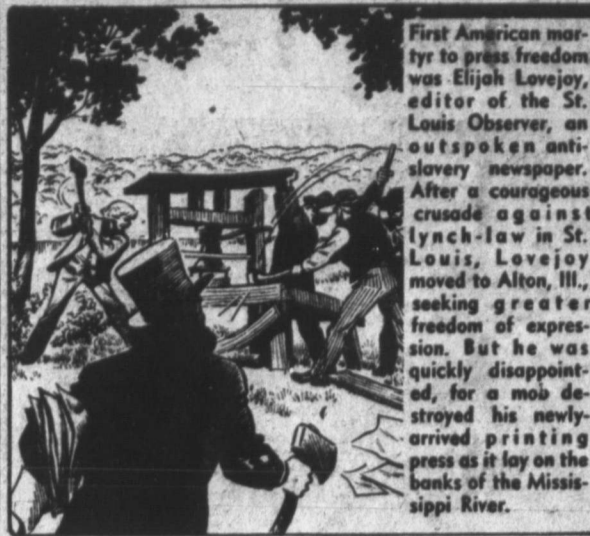
New Crop For Texas

PALESTINE, Texas —(AP)—The success of a four-row field of castor beans this year in Anderson county near here may determine whether the area has another cash crop in 1952.

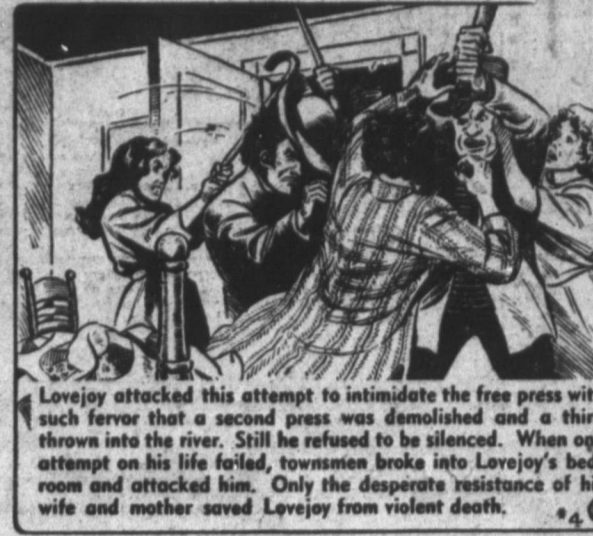
According to agriculture officials the castor bean, used not only for castor oil but also important in textiles, plastics and soap, may be an important cash crop in the Southwest in a few years.

FREEDOM OF THE PRESS - from Zenger to Oatis (3)

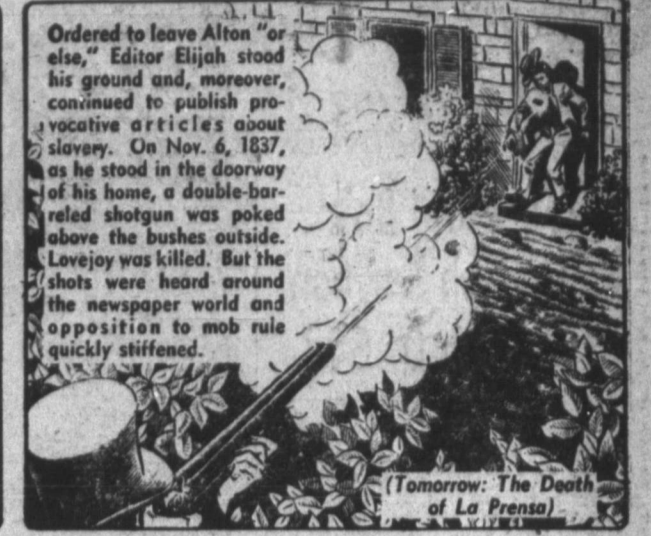

First American martyr to press freedom was Elijah Lovejoy, editor of the St. Louis Observer, an outspoken anti-slavery newspaper. After a courageous crusade against lynch-law in St. Louis, Lovejoy moved to Alton, Ill., seeking greater freedom of expression. But he was quickly disappointed, for a mob destroyed his newly-arrived printing press as it lay on the banks of the Mississippi River.



Lovejoy attacked this attempt to intimidate the free press with such fervor that a second press was demolished and a third thrown into the river. Still he refused to be silenced. When an attempt on his life failed, townspeople broke into Lovejoy's bedroom and attacked him. Only the desperate assistance of his wife and mother saved Lovejoy from violent death.



Ordered to leave Alton "or else," Editor Elijah stood his ground and, moreover, continued to publish provocative articles about slavery. On Nov. 6, 1837, as he stood in the doorway of his home, a double-barreled shotgun was poked above the bushes outside. Lovejoy was killed. But the shots were heard around the newspaper world and opposition to mob rule quickly stiffened.

Iran Delays Debate On Oil Crisis

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. —(AP)—Iran appeared today to have out-manuevered Britain by getting the United Nations Security Council to agree to a 10-day postponement of the British-Iranian oil debate.

While Britain's Sir Gladwyn Jebb delivered a blistering attack yesterday on Iran and called for urgent action to protect Brit-

ain's stake in the rich Iranian oil industry, Ambassador Ali Gholi Ardalan, Iran's permanent UN delegate, sat quietly at the council's big horseshoe table in the Flushing Meadow meeting hall.

Then he announced he had no power to take part in the debate and said his government would need 10 days to get a high-aged Premier, Mohammed Mos-

sadegh, would come to New York to make a personal appeal to the council. Some delegates understood Ardalan to mean that the high representative he referred to was Mossadegh, but he was careful to point out that he had not said Mossadegh was coming.

There still was no answer here to the question whether Iran's ranking representative here from Tehran to present its case. Jebb protested, but there was no way of getting around the delay. It is traditional in the UN that government must have time to get its chosen representative to New York.

Yankees Sit And Cool Heels As

Giants Dodgers Decide NL Champion Today

NEW YORK — (AP) — Today is flag day in the National League.

The entire season is wrapped up in today's game for those old flaming baseball antagonists — Brooklyn's redoubtable Dodgers and New York's miracle Giants.

Deadlocked at one playoff victory apiece, the bitter inter-borough rivals clashed head-on in the rubber game this afternoon with each manager shooting the works and no quarter given.

The game shaped up as a burning battle for the pennant between two of the game's finest right-handers, Sal Maglie of the Giants and Don Newcombe of the Dodgers.

Maglie, winner of 23 games and loser of only six, has beaten the Dodgers five times in six decisions. He was 4-0 against them last year.

Despite Brooklyn's stunning 10-0 victory yesterday, the Giants were a 1-2 to 5 choice to turn the tables and earn the right to meet the Yankees in an all-New York world series starting tomorrow at 1 p. m. (EST).

The weatherman predicted "fair and warmer" with the temperature in the low 70's and moderately fresh winds, contrary to the gloomy, rainy weather which marred yesterday's game.

Experts conceded a slight edge to the Giants because Maglie was to pitch with his normal three-days rest. He last worked Saturday, shutting out the Braves in Boston on five hits.

On the other hand, Newcombe hurled a shutout in Philadelphia the same night and then, in an emergency, added five and two-thirds more innings of shutout ball in relief on Sunday.

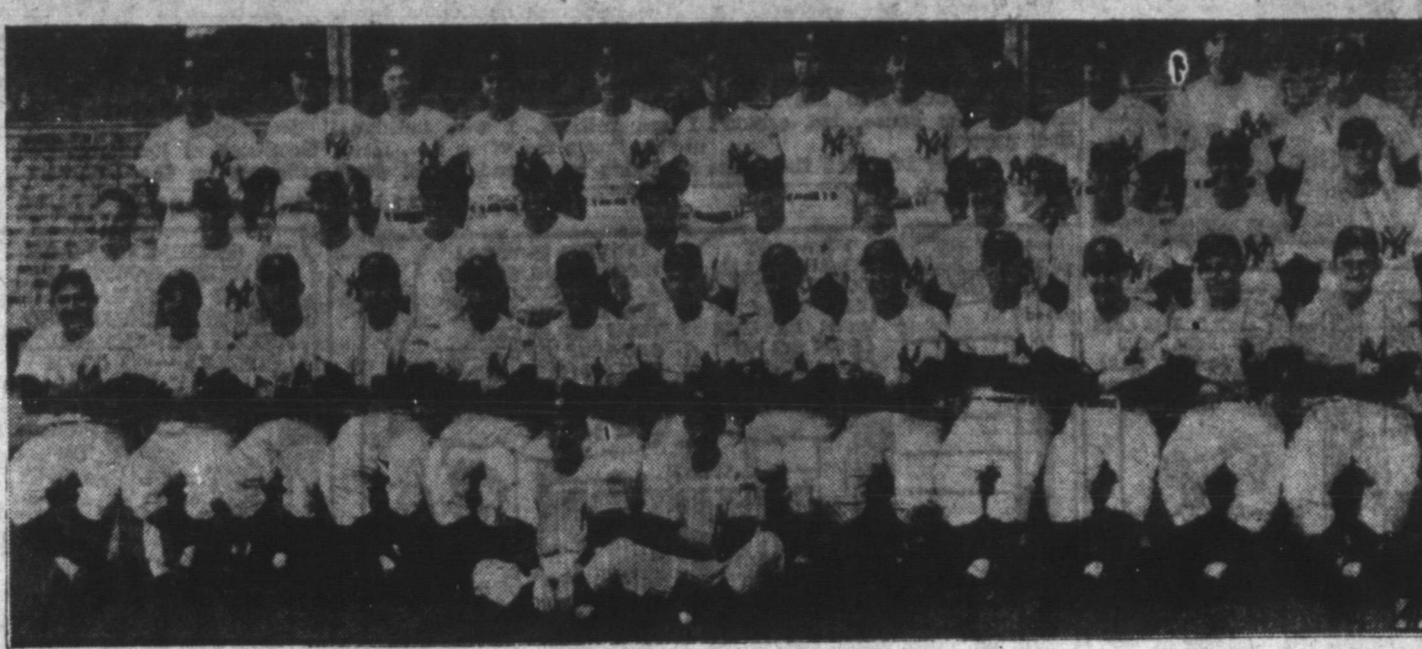
The 28th-year Dodger ace, who came out of Philly complaining of a sore arm, said his arm was still tight yesterday. Preacher Roe, brilliant but frail Dodger southpaw with 22 victories, might have been the logical starter under those circumstances, but the 23-year-oldster has not had his required rest.

While both pitchers purposely refrained from appearing too optimistic, each felt his team would emerge victorious.

"We've got 'em on the run," said Dreesen happily. "My boys are back to slatin' and slamin'." Duke Snider is swinging again and Gil Hodges' team has pulled out of his slump.

Leo was not as exuberant, but was just as confident. "The barber will be shaving tomorrow," he said.

That was Leo's way of saying that Maglie, nicknamed "The Barber" by his mates, would do a lathering job on the Dodgers.

Defenders Are 5-8 Favorites

NEW YORK — (AP) — Baseball's 48th world series opens tomorrow — a fact that may have been overlooked in the furor of the Brooklyn Dodgers and the New York Giants trying to decide the winner of the National League pennant.

A few things are certain. The New York Yankees will represent the American League in quest of their third straight world championship.

Allie Reynolds, winner of 17 games, including two no-hitters, will pitch the opener for the Yankees.

The games will start at 12 noon (EST). The first two will be played at the Yankee Stadium, the third, fourth and fifth, if necessary, in the National League winners' park and the next two, also if necessary, on the Yankees' grounds.

The other facts are in the laps of the gods and the pitching arms of Sal Maglie of the Giants and big Don Newcombe of the Dodgers.

Frick A Logical Choice For Baseball Commissioner Job

When I heard that baseball had elected a new high commissioner, I looked in a hundred stationary stores for a card that said, "Congratulations, Ford." I couldn't find one anywhere. I found almost every other kind of card.

"To My Dear Rich Uncle—My Address Is Noted Below." "To My Dear Rich Aunt — Address Same As Before." "Happy Arbor Day, Cousin Luther." "Sweetheart, I Miss You With All My Heart." "To Another Sweetheart: Sweetheart, I Love You With All My Heart."

"Congratulations on Your 77th Year of Service with the Rhode Island Cat and Dog Hospital." And, "Congratulations on Being a Bookie for Two Years Without Having Been Caught."

But, as I said before, there was no card to send Ford Frick on his election as baseball commissioner. To tell the truth, I don't blame the greeting card manufacturers because his selection caught me as much by surprise as it must have caught them. The fact that he was a logical choice from the start made his choice even more amazing.

Baseball has had only two commissioners, and their qualifications for the job have always puzzled me. Landis was a lawyer who, I am quite sure, didn't know this is the truth, because a base on balls, if he had any qualifications at all they consisted of honesty (which most men are supposed to have), a shock of white hair that Toscanini would envy, and a sternness which I think only could have been punctured with a hairpin.

I never have been as bitter as most newspapermen about Happy Chandler. He was a friend of mine long before he became baseball czar. But friendship never blinded me to his weakness. In the first place he took the job for money. He was having a hard time living the way he liked to live on a senator's salary in Washington. I know this is the truth, because he told me so at a barbecue the

day after a Kentucky Derby, and quite frankly declared he was looking for the baseball commissioner's job. I think he got the gate principally because he was a little more show-offy than the baseball owners who like to show off themselves.

But let's get back to the new commissioner, Ford Frick. Frick played baseball, so he knows the game. As one of the best baseball writers in New York he learned it better. Ford is a quiet, gentle man who loves the game, and is willing to back it with his integrity. He is not stuffy, mild you. When I first knew him, he was a guiding spirit in the Annual New York Baseball Writers' dinner in which every weakness of every club in both leagues was given the satirical treatment. In either 1931 or 1932 — the year that Connie Mack started to break up the Athletics — I was cast as an end

man and a singer, if you can imagine anything so horrible.

To prepare myself for my singing debut, I kept hitting a bottle of tomato juice laced with V-8 and old lace. The now new commissioner of baseball took me under his wing and told me if I didn't quit drinking so much tomato juice I wouldn't be able to sing. I fooled him, and answered my cue like the Leaning Tower of Pisa. I remember the song, Connie Mack had just sold Lefty Grove to Boston, and my song was a parody to the tune of "Annie Doesn't Live Here Any More." It began, "Lefty Doesn't Live Here Any More."

When I walked off the stage, Frick put his arm around me and said, "Henry, I didn't think you'd make it." I'd like to tell Ford this: "I didn't think you'd make it either. You were so far and away the most logical choice."

Newspapers Say Russ May Try To Ease World Tension

Russia may propose a Big Four conference in Berlin late this month.

It may ask the Koreans and Chinese to accept an armistice on the present front.

In case of such agreements,

the United States should be disposed to favor agreements between Communist China and Japan and entry of China into the United Nations.

France-Soir said sources close to the Russian embassy indicated

Russia might propose a world economic conference in Moscow this winter, and would suggest cultural and economic exchanges between the United States and Russia, including an exchange of 1000 students.
