Solons Disagree On Airing Document

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Secretary of State Acheson took the witness chair today in the Senate's MacArthur inquiry. But the first two hours brought only debate over whether to make public a 1949 State Department document dealing with Formosa.

Then, without deciding the question, the senators ordered a recess for lunch. Acheson was told to come back at 12:30 p.m. (CST).

Some members of the committee have said the document indicated Formosa might fall to the Communists and questioned its strategic value. Formosa is the island where the Chinese Nationalist forces took refuge after they wer driven from the mainland by the Communists.

The State Department has kept a "confidential" label on the document and doesn't want it made public.

Bennett asked Web-ster, who had his back to the physician and the

"Oh, nothing," came the dejected reply. "Everything will be all right by and by." The doctor turned back to his desk where he wrote prescriptions as a profession and verse as a hobby. "By and by," he mused, "the sweet by and by." He paused, looked up at Webster, then

reached for writing paper. Joseph Philbrick Webster was an out and out musician. In the East, where he was born in 1819, he had been an active member of the Handel and Haydn Society and a prolific composer of popular

When the verse writing physician, Sanford Fillmore Bennett. moved to the same town in 1861, the two struck up a partnership in the production of sheet music. After six years Bennett had learned Webster like a song book. He had soon learned that the best prescription for his partner's spells of melancholia was a batch of verses to be set to music. But on that Autum day in 1867 the doctor had no remedy in stock. But Webster's casual remark had given him a theme . . . not for another of their popular songs, but for a church hymn.

While the physician wrote hastily at his desk two townsmen joined Webster at the stove. In a few minutes Bennett handed Webster three verses and a chorus. In less time than it had taken the doctor to write the words, the composer had the music. He gave the melody a few rounds on his wiolin and the four men sang for the first time:



Eric Johnston

Wants More Power Eric Johnston, who holds the title of "Economic Stabilizer" told the Senate Banking Committee recently that there are six major threats to a sound dollar. One of them was that there is "too much profit." He never defined course, what is too much profit. It is evidently whatever Eric Johnston, like Joseph Stalin, thinks is too much profit.

There is only one threat that leads to inflation. That is the government interfering with an hampered market by way of either printing extra currency dollars or porrowing from the banks. The more they borrow, the more currency credit there is in the country. And by the law of action and reaction, the more pieces of paper called money, whether it be bonds or currency, the less each unit will buy.

Every person who knows enough about moral principles and economics so that he is not afraid to answer questions about what he advocates, knows this to be true. But men like Eric Johnston, prattle about things that bring on inflation instead of stop it. He seems to think that he is omnipotent that he is wise enough to know at what price everyone should ex-change goods and services. Even if he was honest, which we doubt, he would not be wise enough to know what values should be. There is no true value of anything when some people are excluded from helping establish true value. But Johnston wants to exclude everybody from having the right to help establish values except himself and bureaucrats.

"1. The expected injection of one billion dollars weekly into the country's economic bloodstream when defense spending goes into high gear later this year

"2. 'Milk-it-dry' profits, price and wage demands. "3. Rising food prices. "4. Speculative scare buying and hoarding when consumer

I once offered him \$1,000 if he would attempt to harmonize his statement that collective bargaining raises wage levels permanently. He wouldn't dare undertake it. cause he would have to admit in ten minutes' time that labor unions prevent billions of dollars of wealth from being created, and thus there is that much less to be divided up in the form of wages and profits, which have to be dis tributed in order to benefit the

Everything is happening just as could be expected when children are grabbed in their formative period and taught by example that might makes right, that the majority is synonymous with God, and that the majority has a right to do things that are immoral for an individual to do. The emergency we have is exactly what we have been sowing for years and years in public schools, most newspapers, and by most politicians and in churches. Our trouble is a moral decline. A more frequent source of early hay fever are the grass pollens. Grasses grow practically every-where and they pollinate heavily through a good part of May and June. Timothy, June grass and Bermuda grass are the most important sources of trouble, and everyone knows these grasses are

THREE CURES If early hay fever causes too much misery there are three possi-bue ways to lessen the difficulty. One is to go to some place where the particular pollen causing the trouble does not exist. This is pretty hard to do.

Another is to take injections

which consist of gradually increasing doses of pollen with the aim of desensitizing. This is fairly effective for most people if kept up iong enough.


