You take orders or else-When Caesar entered office his budget (mostly related to personal expenses) totaled \$538,000. In his present budget he seeks the staggering sum of \$2,614,000. When he took over the White House his office force numbered 56. It numbers 293. He and his family have a personal staff of 33 servincluding the chauffers of his 29 automobiles, all of which are paid for by Caesar's subjects,

the ordinary taxpayers. Even though your Congress (which now wants to vote itself another fat salary increase but is a little afraid of what YOU might think) gave Caesar his \$50,000 tax exemption, upped his salary to \$100.000 a year and gave him a personal airplane (in which one ash tray is reported to have cost \$100,000 \$18,000), he wants another \$1,763,-000 for the upkeep of his office equipment and personnel. The monthly upkeep on his plane alone costs \$10,000.

Caesar's yacht cost his subjects millions, including attendants and maintenance. His relatives often go about in limousines, which his subjects, of course, pay for, along with chauffers' salaries and secret

service men who go along. This kind of personal debauchery on the part of rulers has always, in past history, presaged the downfall of rich, overindulgent, dissipated, soft nations which permitted the practice. Of course, the whole thing is simply legal racketeering which the people could promptly end by a thunderous pro-test—but that kind of protest itself requires a vigorous, red-blooded, vigilant people of the pioneer who are themselves not debauched and too drunk with prosperity to care what happens to their country.

No President has a moral right to take the people's material substance away from them-but he DOES, right or no right. No man can spend years as a Pendergast Capone or Luciano gangster without learning something about robbery. A graduate of these applied banditry also learns the fine art of legalizing the pilfering of other people's pocketbooks so they can't get cought outside the law. When a thing isn't moral they make it legal, anyway. This is a way of breaking the commandments of God while making such a violation the commandments of men. People who tolerate or condone such conflict with Divine law are just as responsible as the men

they authorize to do it. And yet, there are people who have either silently permitted Caesar and his legions of underlings to teal or have openly supported who, as parents of dead, wonder why crosses are being removed from soldiers' graves on the ground that the "upkeep"

A-The dangers of X-ray treatment for the removal of excessive hair have been pointed out frequently. If enough X-ray treatments are given to actual move the hair permanently, there is a real risk of damage to the skin; If not enough X-ray is given, there is unlikely to be any results as far as the hair is concerned. The only treatment for excessive hair which seems to have general acceptance is the use of electrolysis or the electric needle which de-

stroys the hair follicles. Q-To settle an argument with my brother, please tell whether it is possible for a doctor to put a goat's stomach into a human being and take out the person's, My brother has been operated on twice for ulcerated stomach and said that the doctors told him that if they operate again, they will take his stomach out and put goat's stomach. I do not believe

A-So far as I know this operative procedure has never been successfully. I should not want it tried on me.

Q-Over a year ago I lost the senses of taste and smell. Several treatments have been tried but suggest-MRS, E. H.

A-The first problem is to make a diagnosis; that is, to identify the cause of this change in sensation. This will involve a careful neurological examination, that is, examination of the nerves, and very likely, the use of special tests. Unthe cause can be identified, which may be rather difficult, it is obviously impossible to suggest what treatment should be under-

The Nation's Press

CHAFEE SELLS SOME LAWYERS A BALE OF GOODS (New York Daily News) This editorial is addressed primarily to the American Bar Asso-

citaion members now convening in New York (and very welcome too), but the general public would do well to listen in. What we're worried about is the fact that Harvard Prof. Zechariah

Chafee succeeded Tuesday in sell-

ing a dangerous bale of goods to the ABA's committee on international and comparative law. Prof. Chafee is an oldtime semiprofessional hater and baiter of U. S. newspapers. He usually operates in left field, and in a pious

The thing Chafee peddled Tuesday to a favorable vote in the ABA committee was the proposed United Nations Convention on the International Transmission of News and the Right of Correction. This impressively named docu-

ment says that news correspon-dents should be allowed to move freely between and inside countries and should not be thrown out or otherwise penalized for legitimate news-gathering activities. So far so good. But then the

proposed international agreement goes on to say that news dispatches should be censored in peacetime only as to matters involving "national defense." It also contains a clause stating that the press everywhere is obligated to "promote" world peace and other worthy things.

Obviously the phrase "national defense" could be stretched to almost any degree by bureaucrats and censors intent on keeping straight, unbiased news reports from getting beyond their borders. And the press' prime obligation, in the American and British view as maintained for generations, is to report what goes on. It is not obligated to "promote" anything, no matter how worthy, and should be wary of doing so, because promotion can so easily lead to slant-

ing or omitting facts.

The proposed UN agreement, if adopted by the UN, will enable anti-free-press governments (of which there are many) to hamper and harass free-press countries' correspondents, thereby keeping a lot of important foreign news from U. S. readers, Canadians, Britons, Australians, et al. If it is ratified as a treaty by the U.S. Senate a similar club for killing off domestic news will be placed in the hands of official busybodies, bureaucrats and other things beginning with B in this country.
We hope the ABA's House of

Delegates will turn down its committee's recommendation, procured Tuesday by Prof. Chafee, that the ABA urge immediate submission of the agreement to all governments and U. S. consent to it. This is merely another attack on U. S .- style freedom of the press. American lawyers, we believe, should be in the forefront of the fight to beat it back.

The revised Bureau of Mines report says the normal seasonal increase in imports of crude oil and oil products is being reduced due to the current shortage in supplies abroad. NOT SNOWDRIFTS, BUT "MOLD-DRIFTS" - This model "town", built on a large culture plate by GE engineers at Nela Park, Cleveland, Ohio, was left for a few days in a warm, humid atmosphere. Mold began to grow—the same kind Mama sometimes finds on stale bread. But a small germicidal lamp was left shining on the model. No mold grew where the lamp's ultraviolet light one, but in the shadows cast by the buildings and trees, green and white mold grew rapidly and thickly. Cpl. Douglas had to wait until his mother could locate some nice people and have his trousers mended so he could stand up and yell at the game.


