Buyers Crowd Floor

GAIL-After a slow start on Friday at the Livestock show, it was good to see the bleachers filled with spectators and the floor crowded with buyers Saturday as announcer Ross Westbrook introduced auctioneer Monte Paxton prior to the Livestock Sale beginning at 1:00 p.m.

Monte is a familiar face to Borden County. By his own admission he is "an Old timer". Except for being snowed out one year, Monte has led a successful sale in the county since 1965.

Borden County continues to break records in this area with their Jr. Livestock Sale and 1981 was no exception.

Eventho the market is depressed at this time of year, the floor bids held their own except for the lambs.

Asking for a floor bid for the 82 Barrows going to market, Paxton received a price of \$41.00 from Plains Hog Company of Lubbock. This was up \$4.00 from 1980. Thirty two hogs out of 113 shown actually went through the sale ring.

Sweetwater Livestock Auction was awarded the bid of \$53. for the lambs. This was considerably lower than the \$67. bid for the previous year. With 100 lambs going to market, 44 were sold through the ring out of 167 shown.

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Most of US spent 444 frustrating days trying to figger out the reasoning behind the taking of the hostages-the reason why they remained captivity-and why all of a sudden with no plausible overt action on the part of US, they were sent home. I may not have discovered answers to those questions. But I just may have a clue. Whether my clue is the reason for the 444 days or whether the Iranians made use of 52 laborers, I will never know.

On November 1, 1979, I placed an order for two custom woven rugs from one of those countries over there, it makes little difference in a world of international intrigue. I was told I would have my rugs in six months time. Two weeks ago my rugs arrived in my hometown, 474 patient days.

The hostages went into captivity Nov. 4, 1979 and were released on Jan. 21, 1981, 444 patient days. No I don't know for a fact that my rugs had anything to do with humiliating my nation or not but you can see a correlation, can't you? Iranians, Indians, Turks, Iraqis are used to weaving rugs, they have been at it for centuries. But maybe they ran a little short of forced labor in 1979. Or maybe once the prisoners were taken, the Iranians decided to help them pass the days that rug weaving just might be the perfect therapy. They could keep their prisoners in fairly good mental health and yet enjoy the fruits of the free labor.

My only worry is that my order for 2 rugs may have precipitated this whole shameful epic in our history. But it does make as much sense as any other conjecture. If it is so, I shall always be grateful to those 52 men and women who so patiently spent their time on my rugs, they are beautiful.

WINDOW SHADES, HELPFUL HINTS FOR MAKING

First of a series.

Before you try to make your own window shades, consider several important factors.

First, spend some time choosing the correct fabric. Be sure to choose a firmly woven fabric. This is expecially important for larger shades.

Looser weaves will tend to stretch and ravel more easily.

Next, be sure to make a test sample of your shade, and in doing this, consider several things by asking yourself these questions:

1) Is the backing compatible with the fabric to produce enough, but not too much, body? If the backing is too lightweight, the edges of the shade will ripple.

Also, if you don't want to use a backing, the shade may not have enough body to maintain shape alone, and liquid stiffeners often do not work well with fabric that has been treated.

2) Do you want room-darkening shades?

Only commercial blackout backings can provide complete darkening.

Some fabrics are more translucent (light shows through them) than others. Hold samples up to light to check for color changes and light transmission.

3) Have you considered sun fading?

Some fading can be expected over a period of time, but bright colors and dark ones are the most susceptible.

On the other hand, laminated shades are the most protected from fading, and light colors will fade the

4) How much can you spend?

Add up your total costs. Know what you are going to spend on supplies, and then compare that plus your labor, if you want to compare the total costs to custom-shade prices.

When you start to add up total costs, remember that tools you'll need include a roller, brackets, fabric, backing or stiffener, a slat, shade pull, perhaps trim, scissors, glue, a staple gun or tape, a carpenter's square and straight edge guides, rulers, cardboard cutting board and an iron.

Finally, there are two other reminders before you start.

Arrange to work on a large work surface to avoid stretching the shade as you make it.

A shade hanging over the edge of an ironing board or table can be stretched easily, or distorted, and it is difficult to keep measurements and markings accurate.

Also, if you're making shades for short, wide ranch-style windows, consider placing fabric on a cross wise direction, if the design permits. Don't worry about the fabric stretching, since fusing, bonding or gluing it to the backing will stabilize it. This idea will allow wider shades than the usual fabric width of 45 or 54 inches, with no splices.







Ring superintendent in the Lamb division was Brent Murphy, assisted by Buster Taylor, Don cox and Ed Rinehart.


CHAMPION STEERS









SMALL GRAIN CERTIFICATION

Even though there are no crop acreage limitations for the 1981 crop year, producers will be required to report planted acreage of crops to be eligible for program benefits. Acreages of wheat, oats, barley, rye, and other small grains should be reported by May 1, 1981. An accurate report of acreage is a must, so be sure and measure the crop acreage. Measurement service is available at the County Office.

FEDERAL CROPINSURANCE

The Borden County ASCS has very limited information concerning the Federal Crop Insurance Program (FCIC), however we have been notified that cotton and grain sorghum will be covered for the 1981 crop. Producers interested in insuring their crop for 1981 should contact the FCIC office in Big Spring.

A.C. 915-263-1866. The deadline for cotton is March 31 and the deadline for grain sorghum is April 30.

LOANS - 1980 CROPS

The final date to request a loan for 1980 crop of cotton is May 31, 1981. The interest rate is 11.5 per cent.






Guests, exhibitors, parents and friends visited with the special guests, the buyers, while eating

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
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
