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Allies, Reds Resume Peace Talks

Kumsong Defenders Melt Away

Allied Troops Advance On Central Front

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea — (P) — Chinese defenders of Kumsong melted away through the fog-draped hills of the Central Front today and Allied infantrymen advanced unopposed.

Fighting quieted all along the damp front lines in Korea as liaison officers completed arrangements for resuming truce talks.

There was no break in the air and sea action. Jet battles flared for the second successive day. Outnumbered U.S. Sabre jets damaged two Red jets Sunday and fought another 25-minute battle Monday without either side scoring a hit.

RAILS BLASTED — The Navy reported the U.S. cruiser Helena steamed to within 60 miles of the Soviet Siberian frontier, blasting a 175-mile stretch of rail lines with her eight-inch guns.

United Nations artillery kept the battle blazing on the Central Front. A front line dispatch reported an estimated 500 Chinese were killed by artillery firing over flaming Kumsong into Red troop concentrations in the hills to the north.

A UN tank patrol entered the former Red stronghold briefly Saturday. Another patrol pushed to within 600 miles of the city Monday without finding a single Chinese.

Allied infantrymen swept unopposed over a mass of fog-shrouded hills five to seven miles southeast of the city.

AP Correspondent Sam Sumnerin reported green-cloaked doughboys pushed out two separate columns. One moved east along a ridge about two miles long. The other column swept the southern slopes of the hills.

Plans were formulated today for the Top of Texas Hereford Breeder and Junior Livestock show and sale next February.

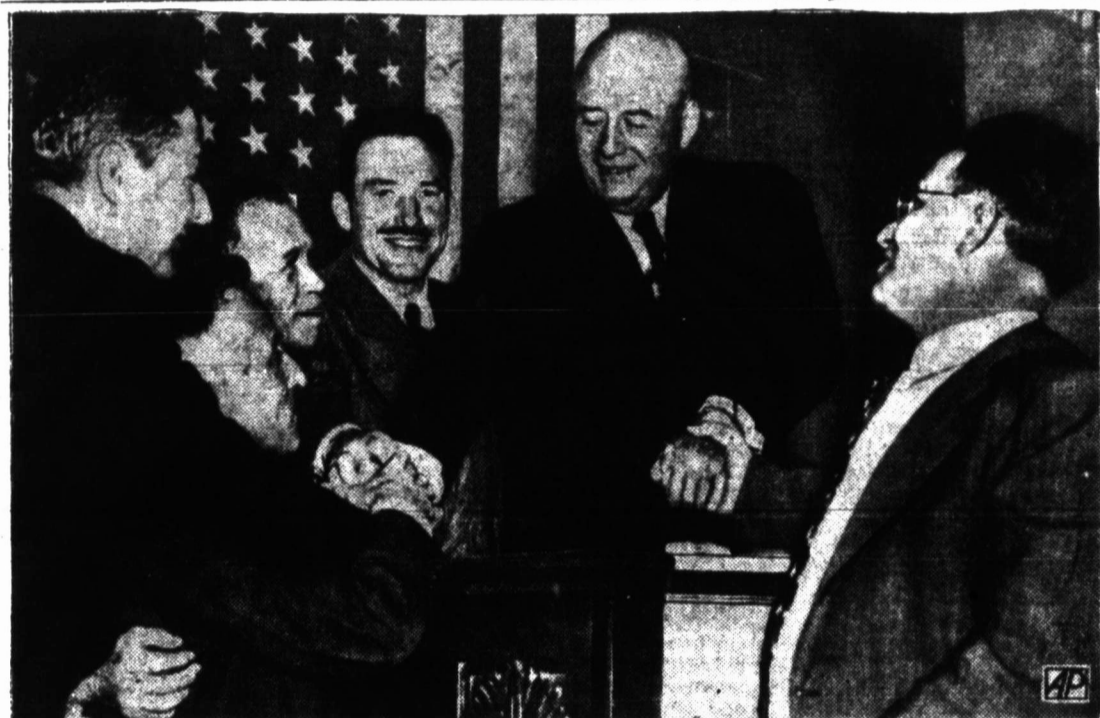

Work Already Piles Up For Congressional Consideration

WASHINGTON — (P) — The second session of the 82nd Congress convening Jan. 8 will face a crowded work docket, topped by two continuing major problems — national defense and how to pay the huge cost of it.

The first session which ended Saturday night dealt for nine and a half months with those key issues plus a variety of others, and the lawmakers chalked up a spending record for what technically is called peacetime.

Congress went home after appropriating \$91,600,000,000. That was the figure most members used, although Senator Ferguson (R - Mich) said \$6,000,000,000 should be added to it to cover so-called permanent appropriations — mostly interest on the national debt.

In any event, only during World War II was the total for a single year greater. In 1943 Congress voted \$147,000,000,000 the record.

In the orderly closing hours of the first session of this Congress, three bills carrying \$13,133,000,000 were sent to the White House. One provided \$7,328,000,000 in foreign aid — military and economic — to bolster friendly nations abroad against Communism.

The amount was slightly less than President Truman requested. The second bill was a \$4,128,000,000 military construction measure, which brought this year's appropriations for the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines to approximately \$61,000,000,000. The other bill carried \$1,675,000,000 in supplemental funds for miscellaneous purposes.

Indicating he may seek an additional increase, Mr. Truman said that when Congress returns in January he will ask for legislation "improving our tax laws."

Slim Pickings Offered Voters As Off-Year Elections Near

WASHINGTON — (P) — Listless campaigns except in a few local races, plus absence of national issues, provide slim pickings for politicians looking for 1952 signs in the off-year elections Nov. 6.

A special house election in Maine today to fill a vacant Republican seat is expected to go Republican as usual. Four minor house vacancies will be filled Nov. 6 and legislators do not look for any party overtures.

A sixth special house election comes off Dec. 4 in Nebraska. Voters next month also will choose governors in Kentucky and Mississippi, state legislators in those states and Virginia and New Jersey, and a host of city officers, including mayors in Philadelphia, Boston, San Francisco, Indianapolis, Cleveland, Salt Lake City, and several Connecticut cities.

Law enforcement issues, arising from the Seneca crime investigation, are figuring in the races for the New York legislature and for the New York City council.

The sole governor's contest is in the border state of Kentucky. Hugh White's election as Democratic governor of Mississippi is a mere formality since he won the primary there and has no opposition in the general election.

Democrats say they will be greatly surprised if they fail to retain the Kentucky governorship. The Blue Grass state is normally Democratic, having only three Republican governors in the last 50 years.

Contesting there are Democrat Gov. Lawrence W. Wetherby, a 43-year-old Louisville attorney who moved up from lieutenant governor last Nov. 27 when Gov. Earle C. Clements resigned to become a U. S. Senator. Wetherby won the Aug. 4 primary with a record plurality of 381,000.

His Republican opponent for the four-year term is Eugene E. Siler, 51, Williamsburg attorney.

Income Tax Probe Holds Capital Stage

WASHINGTON — (P) — An leading up to the 1952 elections, practices by federal income tax collectors today had the Congressional investigation stage pretty much to itself.

Even though most congressmen have gone home for this year, investigating lawmakers still on the scene promised to rattle more skeletons in both Democrat and Republican closets in the months leading up to the 82d elections.

The House Ways and Means subcommittee checking into the activities of the Internal Revenue bureau's tax-gathering agents continued its public hearings (10 a.m. EST). Edward H. Foley, undersecretary of the treasury, and Thomas Scanlon, supervisor of accounts and collections at the revenue bureau's Boston office, were called to testify.

The investigation already has resulted in dismissal, suspension or resignation of 21 internal revenue agents. And the committee, headed by Rep. King (D-Calif), has indicated its probe may be widened to cover the Dept. of Justice.

The Internal Revenue bureau, meanwhile, sets out this week on the biggest job of inquiring into employees' financial affairs ever attempted by a government agency.

Delinquents Cut To Seven By Local Selective Service

Gray county draft board has cut the number of delinquents today to seven men. Olan K. Sloan, Clarendon, reported to the board and said he had not been receiving his mail.

Still missing are Leon Joseph Williams, Cecil Ray Short, Herman Sullivan, Manuel Fuentes, Jr., John B. Lewis, Ross R. Robbins and Dale Leon Clift.

The board has reclassified 103 Gray county men under the law requiring married men with children to register according to Chafflyne Court, draft board clerk. These names have been forwarded to State Selective Service headquarters which in turn will notify the local board how many men will be sent for physical examinations.

Draft officials here said a number of men outside the Selective Service age classification have been asking about their registration. Officials said only those men who were born after Aug. 30, 1922 are required to register. All others younger than 18 or who were born before Aug. 30, 1922 are not required to register with the draft board.

\$3600 Needed In Fund Campaign

Nearly \$3600 is still needed to put the Girl Scout fund drive over the top, Virginia McDonald, Scout executive, said today.

By 10 a. m. today \$3092.50 had been contributed. Goal for the drive which ends Saturday is \$7800.

Miss McDonald said if contributions from surrounding towns begin to come in there is a possibility the goal still may be reached.

Newest Bomb Test Is Just Small Flash

LOS VEGAS, Nev. — (P) — The smallest U.S. atomic explosion on record was set off at sunrise today by Atomic Energy commission scientists.

Signaling perhaps the start of a new atomic weapon era, the infant A-bomb — if bomb it was — flashed sharply for about one-tenth of a second. It was seen on a mountain about 50 miles away.

To eager onlookers in Las Vegas, the flash was obliterated by the bright early morning sun. It was a letdown in contrast to the five brilliant flashes which lit up the desert sky in tests here last winter.

To scientists, it probably was a better thrill than many of the previous larger blasts.

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Clark's Nomination Draws Varied Reactions In Nation

WASHINGTON — (P) — A wave of protest against President Truman's decision to enter regular diplomatic relations with the Vatican promised today to touch off a heated battle when Congress reconvenes.

There was little if any criticism of the President's selection of Gen. Mark Clark as ambassador to the Roman Catholic church state. The protests, some of them from the pulpit, were from Protestants who argued that the establishment of diplomatic relations violates the constitutional injunction that church and state shall be separate.

The U.S. has never had a full ambassador at the Vatican, although Myron Taylor served there as personal representative of Presidents Roosevelt and Truman from 1940 until last Jan. 18, when he resigned.

Late Saturday Mr. Truman announced that he had selected Clark, an Episcopalian who now is commander of Army Field Forces, to be ambassador. A White House statement said the President felt "the purposes of diplomacy and humanitarianism will be served" and added that direct relations with the Vatican will help coordinate a common fight against Communism.

The White House statement noted that 37 other nations maintain diplomatic representatives at the Vatican.

An unofficial comment from the Vatican indicated delight at Mr. Truman's move. That was the reaction of Catholic churchmen in this country.

Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York said the Vatican and the U.S. hold "identical objectives of peace." The Most Rev. Patrick J. McCormick, rector of St. Patrick's church here, praised Clark and said "I am glad to see our country taking advantage of representation at the Vatican."

The opposing view was expressed by Protestants all over the nation, starting with Dr. Edward H. Pruden, Mr. Truman's own pastor at the First Baptist church here.

"I did my utmost to point out the great dangers which seemed to me to lie in the President's move, he said in a sermon yesterday. Dr. Pruden declined to elaborate when a reporter asked whether he meant he had talked to the President about the matter.

Mercury In Pampa Plunges 28 Degrees

Winter slipped in a hard punch at Pampa Sunday as local temperatures plummeted 28 degrees in four hours.

Temperatures were 73 degrees at 7 p. m.; 67 degrees at 5, 52 degrees at 3 and 45 at 10 p. m. Low temperature for the night was 34 degrees.

Today, sun was obstructed at times by partly cloudy skies and by 11 a. m. the mercury had managed to climb to 44 degrees. No moisture accompanied the cold front.

Commies To Ratify Security Agreement

MUNSAN, Korea — (P) — Everything was set today to resume Korean truce talks as soon as Red negotiators ratify a security agreement.

Allied and Communist liaison officers completed the pact Monday, detailing ground rules for renewing armistice negotiations after a two-month break.

The United Nations command promptly ratified it and called on the Reds to reopen talks "without further delay."

The Reds didn't answer Monday. Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, UN command spokesman, said if the Red answer is received Tuesday morning a full scale negotiation session may be called for the afternoon.

The general view in this Allied peace camp was that truce talks would be underway again by Wednesday, at the latest.

The two five-man negotiating committees will meet in a faded yellow tent at Panmunjom, midway between opposing front lines. They will take up right where they left off at Kaesong on the question of where to create a demilitarized zone for the armistice. The Reds suspended the Kaesong talks Aug. 23. They charged the Allies bombed the Kaesong neutral zone the day before but the Allies denied the charge.

UN and Communist liaison officers completed their arrangements for renewal of negotiations by signing an eight-point security pact at 10:45 a.m. Monday.

Three hours and 20 minutes later the UN ratification was delivered to the Reds at Panmunjom.

It called on the Communists to renew truce talks "without further delay."

The UN ratification was signed by vice adm. C. Turner Joy, chief U.N. delegate. He told North Korean Lt. Gen. Nam Il, head of the Red delegation, the Allied negotiating team was prepared to meet with the Communists the day after the Red reply was received. He set the hour for meeting at 11 a.m.

Joy's purpose in ratifying the security agreement before talks actually began was to get the Red endorsement in advance, to prevent a possible reopening of discussion of the "ground rules" by the Communists.

Reds Fight To Keep MIG-15 From UN Force

WASHINGTON — (P) — Communist soldiers and airmen fought for two days in a vain attempt to keep Allied Naval forces from capturing a downed MIG-15 fighter, now providing the United States with secrets of the Russian-made jets.

This was disclosed today in an official account by the Defense Dept. and Far East Naval forces of the capture of the MIG last July by a daring Naval sea-air task force which went 100 miles into enemy territory to get the plane from shallow water near Hamchon on the West Coast of North Korea.

UNDERGOING STUDY — The MIG, said the Defense Dept. statement, "is plane that is undergoing study at Wright - Patterson Air Force base, Ohio." It referred to the Soviet jet as a "nearly intact MIG-15." The jet engine, of paramount interest to allied air intelligence experts and aero engine designers, "was covered with mud but intact," the department said.

An Air Force spokesman in an independent comment after the Defense Dept. announcement was issued, said "the MIG-15 parts are still under study." The plane has not been reassembled, he said, "for security reasons" the Air Force could not say what had been done with it.

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Betting Shows British Election Picture Changing

LONDON — (P) — The betting odds against a Labor government victory in Thursday's national election were shaved to 5 to 2 today.

This was the price quoted by a leading London handbook which one week ago was willing to give 7 to 2 for the Prime Minister Attlee and his followers would not be returned to office.

Odds against Winston Churchill and his Conservatives lengthened slightly this morning to 1 to 7. A week ago they were 2 to 1 in the betting.

A better who thinks Labor will retain power can put up two dollars to win five. A conservative backer must put up four to win one.

The shift in the betting was attributed to public opinion polls showing that the Labor party is making up ground.

\$125,000 Damage Suit Is Delayed

The \$125,000 damage suit brought by E. E. Cockrell against Lawrence Blasberg was delayed this morning until 11 a.m. after an insufficient number of jurors reported for service in District court.

The suit arose out of an automobile crash on U. S. Hwy. 66 west of McLean in which Wheeler County Commissioner Don Rives of Shamrock was killed and several others, including Cockrell, were seriously injured.

Since then the case took on numerous legal complications as hearing after hearing was held before today's trial came up.

Judge Lewis M. Goodrich at 1:20 a.m. recessed the jury until 11 a.m. and ordered sheriff's deputies to summon talesmen for jury duty.

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Pleasure Gained From Repairing Own Items

Much of the fun of living in a house comes from the endless accumulation of jobs to be done — things you can fix yourself and make for yourself.

Old hands seldom stop to think of this — the routine in their blood. But if they ever had to live in a swanky apartment hotel they'd probably sneak to the basement for a workout.

After sweating and worrying all summer over the yard and garden, with resolutions to do better next year, the householder now barges into the indoor season with a brave vow to finish all jobs left over from last winter.

He's going to shellac the insides and edges of dresser drawers that stuck in humid weather. He'll get around to fixing that squeak in the floor and paint the whole basement, among other important jobs. But first, if he's human, he'll probably start making something more or less unimportant — a bird house, no doubt.

Well, you can't blame him. There are so many nifty materials at well-stocked lumber supply houses that it seems any dab can be a cabinet maker. And far from being designed for useless jim-cracks, they make it easy to panel a room in fine hardwood, refinish a bathroom or kitchen in simulated tile — or to build a doll house for daughter, if you insist.

Various plywoods, hardwood veneers, predecorated panelboard,

color-impregnated woods and several pressed hardwoods that can be bent for round corners are some of the materials you can do surprising jobs with.

For instance, there's a hardwood called leatherwood that has a patterned finish similar to the Spanish-grained leather. It gives the warm appearance of being leather covered.

Another is a black tempered hardwood, dyed in its manufacture to give a permanent glossy surface to countertops, kitchen kick-strips and baseboards.

Fabricated hardwoods, incidentally, are one of the most interesting products of modern industry. They are made entirely of wood fibers, yet have no grain to soak or take. Wood chips are exploded under high pressure steam into a mass of ligno-cellulose fibers. This mass is felted into thin mats and compressed under heat. The natural lignin of the wood binds the fibers without addition of artificial binders.

Because of their composition, hardwoods can be worked with all woodworking tools. You can nail them, glue them, paint them, or give them any finish that wood takes.

Tempered pressed woods, 1.8-inch thick, can be bent cold on a nine-inch radius with the smooth side out, or on a six-inch radius with the smooth side in. Sharper bends can be made by soaking the board by using heat. Regular tables have been compiled for the minimum bends possible for all thicknesses.

These various thin materials open new fields for the amateur craftsman. Panelled furniture, folding screens, novel finishes, all come within his reach. Virtually all plywoods and hardwoods are available in ready-cut panel sizes that range from 4x1 to 4x12 feet.

Predecorated panelboards can be found under a variety of trade names at building supply dealers. These materials have baked-on

Rules Listed For Safety

Nearly 4000 children die in fires every year, largely because parents fail to follow the few simple safety rules which can safeguard children's lives.

Insurance statistics show that more pre-school children die from burns than from any other accidental cause except automobile accidents. Among year-old children, fire is the top cause of accidental death.

Fire fascinates children of all ages. Matches should never be left where children can find them. Keep matches in a metal container on a high shelf.

Fire-fighting authorities urge that children never be left alone in a house. A mature baby-sitter carefully instructed in what to do in case of fire will protect the children and relieve parents of anxiety.

Caution dictates use of fire-resistant materials wherever possible in and adjacent to children's rooms.

Fire-stops in wall spaces surrounding the room will retard fire for a considerable period. Flame-proofed fabrics will not support a fire.

In choosing children's clothing, avoid flimsy, quick-burning materials. When children reach the toddling stage, open fires become a real danger. Be especially watchful of children near bonfires, and avoid using candles at children's parties.

Authorities advise holiday decorations impregnated with fire-proofing solutions, use of asbestos instead of cotton wool for "snow" and substantial holders for candles. Candles should never be put in windows or on trees. Never put candles in paper Halloween lanterns.

De Gasperi And Egyptian Envoy Have Discussion

ROME — (AP) — Premier Alcide De Gasperi Saturday had a "cordial discussion" with the Egyptian Ambassador, Mohamed Abdul Aziz Badr Bey.

There was no immediate disclosure of what was discussed. The meeting took place in the Viminale palace just after De Gasperi had talked for an hour with President Luigi Einaudi.

Two days ago De Gasperi had expressed to the Italian Senate Italy's willingness to help in "solving the difficulties" between Britain and Egypt.

At that time the prime minister said: "Italy follows closely the developments (in Egypt) and will be happy should an opportunity come to help in solving the difficulties and facilitating the aspirations of these peoples with the need to defend the common Mediterranean civilization."

He also declared to the Senate that Italy "looks with special sympathy and deep understanding towards Egypt, which holds in the Arabic-Islamic world a parallel function of (the one of) Italy in the Christian world."

SHAMROCK — (Special) — Juniors netted \$28.50 from a class-sponsored dance at the Shamrock Country club here last week, class officials said.

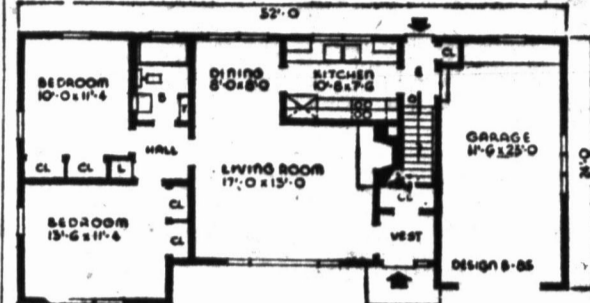

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THE BAFFIN features a combination living and dining alcove through the center of the house with two bedrooms and bath on one side, kitchen and garage on the other. The front vestibule leads into a vestibule with a coat closet. The rear goes to the garage and basement. Rear has closet, too.

The kitchen is small and compact with cabinets on both walls. Sink is under the windows, stove, next to chimney, and refrigerator on inside wall.

Each bedroom has twin wardrobe type closets. Linen closet is in hall, towel cabinet in bath.

Rules Given For Dry Foundation

Masonry and concrete require protection from the weather — especially from water. Stucco houses can absorb as much as one ton of water during a rain. Cement block basements can hold more than two tons of water in the walls. Development Of New Crew-Cut Wig Is Close Guarded Secret

NEW YORK — (AP) — This was top secret, so Louis Feder was taking no chances.

He looked nervously from side to side. The door was closed and the corridor beyond was quiet. The window was open but, 11 floors above Fifth avenue, we seemed safe enough from enemy ears.

"No one else has the process," Feder began in a cautious murmur. "Nobody but me. It's completely secret. I got four men working on it, but none of them knows what the other three are doing. No one of them could make the thing itself."

Feder glanced around again. "You see, the secret is in making the hair stand up. Sure, other people make crew-cut wigs, but none of them can make it so the hair stands up the way it does in a natural crew-cut. I do, by a secret crocheting process.

The wigmaker, a short man with a finely pointed mustache and thin, reinforced hair, exhibited the window was open but, it modified an extreme crew-cut. The first had hair standing about an inch. In the extreme model, the hair stood up about an inch and a quarter to an inch and a half.

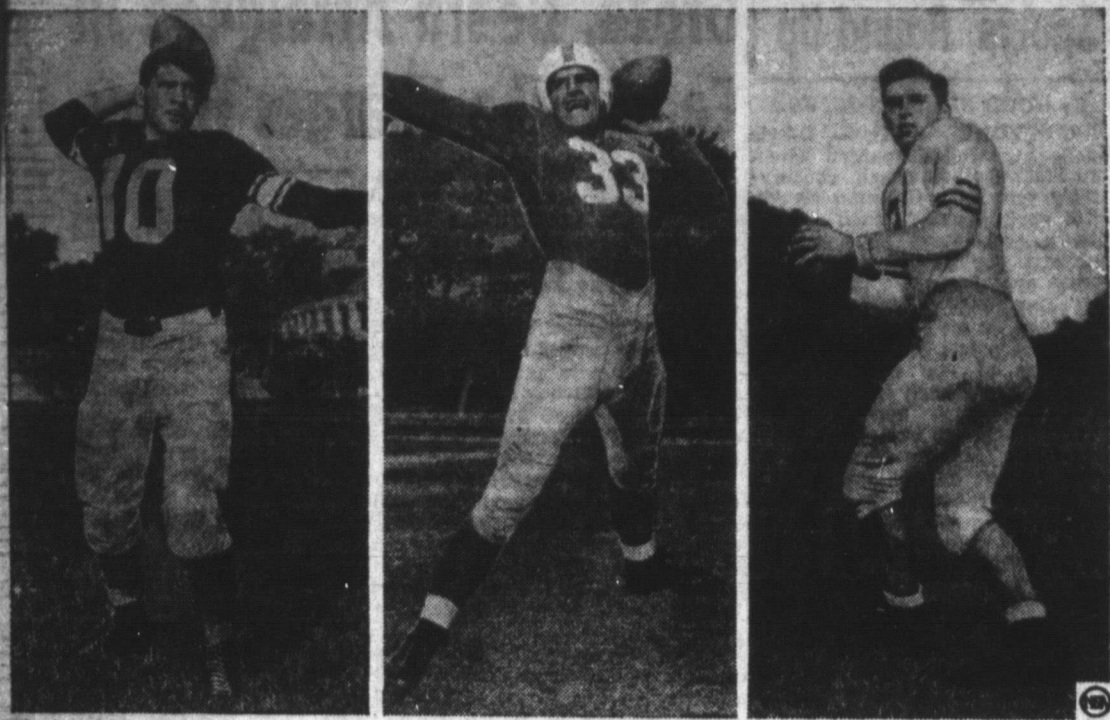

Also Rice won, 28-7, over SMU the team that beat Notre Dame. But it took a governor's proclamation to beat Texas. Last week Arkansas' chief executive, Sid McMath, issued an order that the Razorbacks' snap Texas' 13-year victory string in the series. The Razorbacks obeyed.

Princeton, with a 17-game winning streak, took similar orders but not from the governor. Before the game with Lafayette at Palmer Stadium the Princeton band spelled out: "Murder the Maroon." Princeton won, 60-7, scoring at a point-a-minute pace.

Tulane's B football squad will play three games this season. They will meet Georgia Tech, Florida and Alabama.

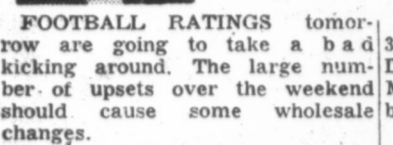

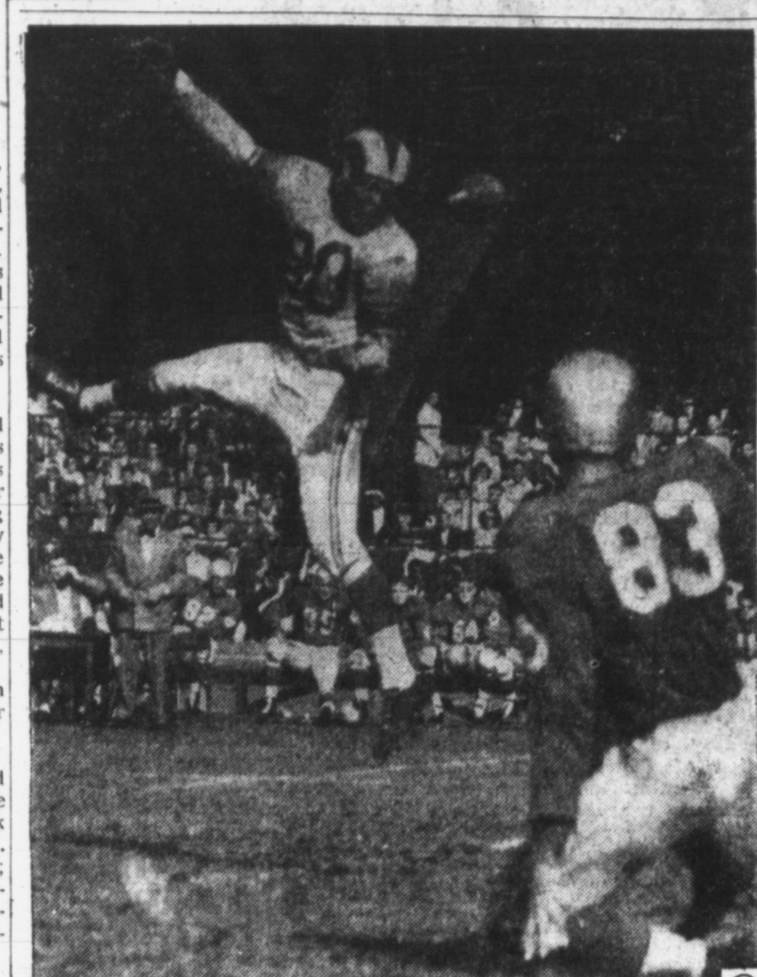

Two Crucial Contests Loom Within SWC This Weekend

Two more conference games—considered as the most crucial of the season until Saturday—are scheduled with Baylor, the last undefeated team in the league, meeting Texas A&M at College Station and Rice, one of three unbeaten teams in the conference race, going to Austin to battle Texas.

The shine was removed from both games last week when the most complete round of upsets in football history had the coaches shaking to themselves, the fans shouting at each other and the gamblers hunting holes to hide in.

Texas, the nation's No. 4 team, was toppled by twice-beaten Arkansas 16-14. Texas A&M, the No. 6 outfit, was stung into a 20-14 defeat by a last-quarter TCU revival.

Rice completed the upset picture by slamming SMU 28-7 after being knocked down by a defensive lineman. Don got up, passed Bolden and made the key block for a 33-yard run. . . . If Michigan State climbs back to the top of the rankings after Saturday's triumph over Penn State, Coleman's blocking did it. "They ask him to do things no other tackle would try," remarked one observer, "and he's so fast he makes them look easy."

The conference is in a mess except in inter-sectional play. Against the powers from outside, the league has the gaudiest record in the nation—13 victories against five defeats.

Saturday it will have a chance to make the margin prohibitive. TCU, battered but happy, journeys to Los Angeles to play Southern California, the team that kicked the nation's No. 1, Baylor, last Saturday.

Ray McKown, the "substitute" tailback of TCU, Bill Howton, the ironman of Rice, Lamar McKown, the dazzling Arkansas sophomore, and Larry Isbell wizard of Baylor's T, had the plaudits Saturday.

McKown quarterbacked TCU to whip A&M scoring one touchdown on a 43-yard run, another on a line plunge and setting up another with a brilliantly executed inside kick. He stepped in to star for TCU when two tailbacks, Gil Barosh and Malvin Fowler, went out with injuries.

Howton caught three passes for 128 yards and three touchdowns in the rout of SMU.

McKown piloted Arkansas to its smashing upset of Texas, his passing and running providing the heart of the frenzied Razorback offense.

Isbell completed 13 of 18 passes for 133 yards and two touchdowns, then scored a touchdown in carrying Baylor to a smashing 40-20 triumph over Texas Tech.

Two-team affair. The battle for the national conference lead was reduced to a two-team affair—Chicago's Bears and Los Angeles. A week ago five teams were deadlocked. The Bears, with Johnny Lujack coordinating his passing with the running of rookie John Doolley, defeated San Francisco 13-7.

The Rams, exploding for all of their points in the second half, shutout Green Bay 28-0.

Lujack was injured in the fourth period and carried from the field.

Sammy Baugh, playing every minute of the Redskins' offense on the offensive, passing for the touchdown that gave Washington a 7-3 triumph over Chicago's Cardinals, and the skins first victory of the season.

Bob Celler's aerial work was instrumental in bringing on the New York Yanks from behind four times as they tied the Detroit Lions' 24-24. Leon Hart accounted for two of Detroit's touchdowns, catching 15 and a seven-yard touchdown pass.

Coach Celebrates Win Too Much. WEST LOS ANGELES (AP)—Coach Henry (Red) Sanders of the UCLA football team was arrested and booked on a drunk driving charge last night.

Officers C. F. Palmerton and C. L. Bahner said they saw Sanders drive through an intersection "very fast" and subsequently saw him drive "as much as five feet" on the wrong side of a highway center line.

"Sanders was quoted in the arrest report as saying he had three drinks at a bar and felt "reasonably good." His team beat Oregon 41-0 Saturday, its second win in five starts.

Groza, Beard Arraigned In Cage Bribe Charges Today

CHICAGO (AP)—The octopus-like college basketball scandallightened its tentacles on two of the game's greatest modern players today and sent capitalism's top pro circuit into an emergency session.

Former Kentucky all-American, Alex Groza and Ralph Beard, were to be arraigned this morning on a fugitive warrant, charging bribery in a 1949 game at New York's Madison Square Garden.

The executive board of the National Basketball Association will meet in New York to consider a policy for the hard-mitten Indianapolis Olympians, from which Groza and Beard, stockholder stars, already have been suspended.

Seized here Friday night by officers of the New York district attorney's office, Groza and Beard were expected to waive extradition in court today.

With another former Kentucky star, 1949-50 captain, Dale Barnstable, they will face bribe charges before the New York grand jury. Barnstable yesterday went from Louisville, where he coaches at a high school, to New York.

The three have admitted accepting \$500 bribes each from a ring of gamblers to rig the points spread against Loyola of Chicago in a 1949 invitational tourney game at Madison Square Garden. Underdog Loyola won 67-56 in what was regarded a prime upset.

Although he captured the state welterweight title for Amarillo in 1948, Cooper didn't reach his peak until last year when he won the Texas middleweight belt and was runner-up in the Chicago Tournaments of Champions. He was representing Sheppard. The son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Cooper, 610 N. Gray St., Pampa, was born in Borger and attended Lefors High school but has always boxed out of Pampa.

Cooper has about half a dozen fights since his injury, received several years ago in a football game, has completely healed.

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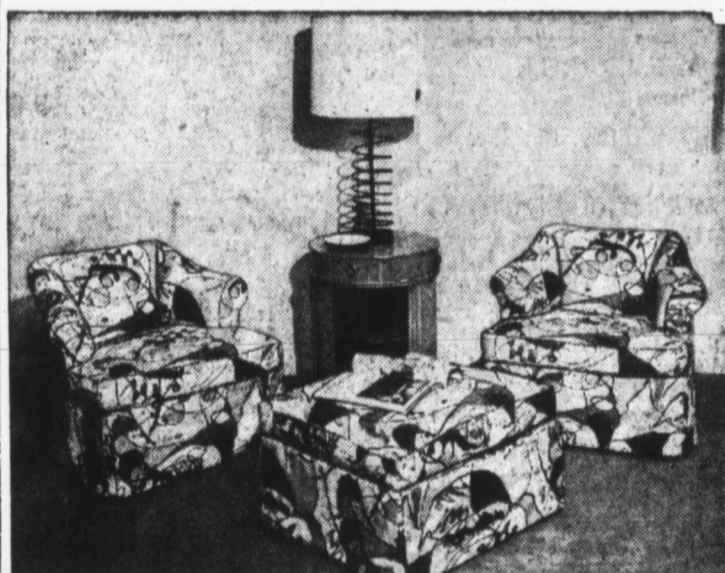
