It holds that money is a creation of the state and can and should be manufactured by it in whatever amounts necessary to have full employment. The modern economists are not concerned with the causes of economic structural maladjustments, created for instance by inflation or money or credit, neither do they wish to analyze critically the causes of unemployment. They contend that we can cure economic disturbances without knowing their causes, usually by monetary inflation. The labor unions lend their powerful support to these ideas with the result that ve are using all kinds of expedients and seem to have become incapable of mustering the courage to stop the constant deterioration of the dollar or the drifting into a
