Blustery winter winds swept over the Panhandle early today pushing temperatures in Pampa to a low reading of 6 degrees by between 8 and 9 a. m.

The latest cold snap, blowing from the north-northwest, ended abruptly the mild weather in Pampa the past two days

The mercury, which had been standing at 45 degrees at midnight, began skidding between 12 and 1 a. m. as a 16 mile-per-hour wind strengthened to a 35 mph blow by 1 a. m.

ISY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Turkey prices were trimmed two to six cents a pound this week as food stores prepared for the annual big upsurge of Christ-mas buying.

The holiday gobblers now are at about the same general level as at Thanksgiving and a fow cents a pound higher than last year.

Chicken prices were up two to as much as six cents a pound in many places, ducks about un-changed, lambs off slightly, beef and pork steady compared with last week-end.

Fresh cranberries were a little higher than they were just be-fore Thanksgiving Day and in somewhat tighter supply than is usual this time of year. Top grade eggs eased two to five cents a dozen, reflecting recent new declines at wholeale. Butter continued climbing some markets, up as much as three cents a pound from last week — but in other places levelled off at the highest rates since the summer of 1948. Of the fresh vegetables, only snap beans showed any notable price reduction from last weekend. Several were higher as shipments lightened, including lettuce, carrots, brussels sprouts, mushrooms, tomatoes and spinach. Most oranges were lower and fruit auctioneers said there would be plenty, at reasonable prices, for the toes of those Christmas stockings. But grapefruit edged higher, and so did tangerines.



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
