Northwest's Winter Sweeps Into Pampa

Blustery winter winds swept over the Panhandle early today pushing temperatures in Pampa to a low reading of 6 degrees by between 8 and 9 a. m. The latest cold snap, blowing from the north-northwest, ended abruptly the mild weather in Pampa the past two days. The mercury, which had been standing at 45 degrees at midnight, began skidding between 12 and 1 a. m. as a 16 mile-per-hour wind strengthened to a 35 mph blow by 1 a. m. By 6 a. m. the mercury stood at 9 degrees and was 8 degrees at 7 a. m., 7 degrees at 8 a. m., and 8 degrees between 9 and 10 a. m. It began dropping again at 11 when it showed at 7-degree reading. Lowest reading this year was the one-below-zero reading recorded Dec. 9. The heavily clouded skies began dropping snow about 10:30 a. m., but soon stopped. Forecast is for more snow and sleet, with temperatures expected to drop as low as 5 degrees tonight in the Panhandle. In other parts of the nation a fresh snow storm whistled out of the Pacific Northwest pelted the Rocky Mountain region and spread over the Plains states, the upper Mississippi valley and the upper Great Lakes region. Temperatures tumbled along the route of the snow storm, dipping far below zero in many areas. The colder weather headed into the storm-battered Midwest who is now living with the wake of the snow. It was sub-zero, also, in northern New England and north parts of New York state. The severe weather appeared to follow the pattern of the past week, heavy snow and the ensuing cold. The storm-battered areas have reported a total of 226 deaths attributed to the severe weather of the past week. There was considerable drifting and blowing in the fresh snow belt, adding further danger to the already hazardous driving conditions. The U. S. Weather bureau in Chicago said the sub-zero belt extended as far south as north-eastern Colorado and northwestern Kansas. It was 2 below zero in Havre, Mont., early today and -19 in Sheridan, Wyo. The cold spots in the northeastern section of the country included 11 below zero at Burlington, Vt., and Albany, N. Y. It was chilly in parts of the South as freezing rain and sleet pelted areas in the middle Mississippi valley, the lower Ohio valley and in parts of Georgia. Rain fell southward into the lower Mississippi valley and the East Gulf states. There appeared no immediate relief from the severe cold in the Midwest. Temperatures generally were above zero in most of the north central region today but the icy blasts were expected to move in during the day. The forecast was for below zero readings tonight and Friday. Between 5 and 10 inches of new snow was in prospect for most of the Midwest storm belt. It was generally fair over most of the eastern states but the fresh fall of snow which put record amounts on the ground in many areas was expected to reach the northeastern region tonight or Friday. The far Southwest and the deep South appeared to have escaped the cold. The 28 above reading in Charlotte, N. C., early today compared with 68 in New Orleans, 72 in Brownsville, Texas, 73 in Miami, and 51 in Los Angeles.

End of the drive is Jan. 1. The campaign is to obtain enough money to provide 120 local underprivileged children with a year's supply of milk. Donations up to \$3300 will be matched with a similar amount by Cabot Carbon Co. Funds will be administered by L. Fred McClure, local Salvation Army commander. Committee members include Chairman I. V. E. Duncan, E. L. Green, Jr. and McClure. Committeemen have expressed appreciation to those who have given to the fund and said additional contributions can be made at either local bank. Duncan stated that a donation is made almost every day. He expects of milk, and \$44 will give a child a pint of milk each day for a year.

Sen. Capper Dies, Age 86

TOPEKA, Kas. — (AP) — Arthur Capper, a Kansas Republican who served in the U. S. Senate for three decades, died last night at the age of 86. Capper retired from politics three years ago, giving up his Senate seat on Jan. 3, 1949. In recent months his health had been bad and he became critically ill with pneumonia two weeks ago. Capper, who started newspaper work as a printer's apprentice at \$1 a week during his high school days, owned two daily newspapers and eight farm magazines with a combined circulation of 3,500,000. The newspapers are the Topeka Daily Capital and the Kansas City, Kas., Kansan. He also owned two radio stations. He was a leader in farm legislation during his years in Congress. He was chairman of the Senate agriculture committee when he retired. Legislation bearing his name included the Capper-Volstead act, the Legal Foundation for Farm cooperatives, and the Capper-Trencher act providing for regulation of grain exchanges. He frequently was referred to as the Republican voice of the mid-west farmer. Children were his main hobby although he had none of his own. He lent hundreds of thousands of dollars to farm youths through the Capper "pig and calf clubs" which gave youngsters a chance to own their own livestock. He also established a crippled children's fund. For more than 40 years he gave a birthday anniversary party in Topeka for children of the county. The parties were attended by thousands. Capper served two terms as Kansas governor before being elected to the Senate in 1918. A sister, Mrs. A. L. Estus of Evanston, Ill., is his only survivor.

Two Held On Fire Converts Danish Ship Into Inferno; 27 Missing

ASTORIA, Ore. — (AP) — Fire early today converted the Danish motorship *Erria* into a flaming inferno and the coast guard reported 27 of its 108 passengers and crewmen were unaccounted for on the basis of a steward's report. L. Commander V. A. Johnson, commanding officer at Tongue Point Coast Guard station, reported 81 persons are at the Coast Guard barracks there. The vessel is burning 3/4 of a mile off the station. Johnson said a ship's steward told him 108 people were aboard when the ship left Portland for San Francisco. Johnson said some left the burning ship in lifeboats while others were picked up by Coast Guard vessels. Two people were reported to have been picked up by the ship's crew. He reported the fire had spread to other sections of the ship, forcing removal of Coast Guard crews fighting the fire. An early arrival of the ship, E. L. Blyth of Portland, Ore., reported two children and an elderly man missing. However, he said they may have been picked up by fishing boats of other craft. Earlier, the Coast Guard at Seattle reported all passengers and crewmen apparently were safely ashore at the Tongue Point Coast Guard station. Blyth said the fire started in the middle of the ship and spread rapidly toward both ends. He said there was no disorder when the ship was abandoned. The buoy tender *Ivy* earlier radioed Coast Guard headquarters in Seattle that the vessel was "completely afire amidships. We completely afire amidships. We passengers and personnel apparently safe. Possibility of saving vessel very poor." The *Ivy* is one of two buoy tenders sent out by the Coast Guard to fight the fire. "A distress signal along with a report that the vessel was 'checked up with smoke' was first heard by the Coast Guard at 2:43 a. m. (4:43 a. m., CST). The *Erria* is a 460-foot, 8,786-ton motor vessel of Danish registration operated by East Asiatic lines, the Coast Guard said.

Korean Truce In Hands Of Officer Staff

MUNSAN, Korea — (AP) — Truce negotiators turned the problem of how to supervise a Korean armistice over to staff officers today in a "one-shot effort" to break the deadlock. The staff officers met two hours at Panmunjon. Then they adjourned until 10 a. m. Friday (7 p. m. CST Thursday). There was no report of what happened. An official Allied spokesman said UN subcommittee delegates suggested calling in the staff officers because there had been no progress. "I give you my solemn word," said Brig. Gen. William P. Tucker, "the decision to appoint the staff officers was because of the lack of progress rather than because of any progress." Earlier in the day the Communists suggested their version of a compromise. They asked the Allies to (1) permit construction of North Korean airfields, (2) accept the Red proposal for inspection by neutral teams at specified points and (3) drop a demand for aerial observation over all Korea. In return, the Communists said they "might consider" the UN demand for unlimited rotation of troops and replenishment of equipment and supplies. The UN is represented at the staff officers' session by Air Force Col. Don O. Darrow, Tacoma, Wash., and Air Force Col. Andrew Kinney. TO MEET FRIDAY — The regular subcommittee will meet Friday at 1 p. m. (10 p. m. CST Thursday) regardless of the outcome of the staff officers' session. There has been no announcement as to whether the subcommittee on prisoner exchange will meet Friday. There was no session Thursday. Allied negotiators said they needed more time to check the list of 11,533 Allied prisoners supplied by the Communists Wednesday. The actual method of exchanging prisoners remains to be worked out. But the Eighth Army announced everything is set to fly all UN personnel to Japan after they are freed. Plans also are being made for moving 132,472 Chinese and North Korean prisoners northward from 11 Allied prison camps. Allied prisoners will be taken first to reception centers in Korea for identification, preliminary medical checkups and new uniforms. (See KOREAN Page 3)

Bomb Group Says Probes Unnecessary

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Builders of the government's vast H-bomb materials plant have been "plagued with what they consider unwarranted and unnecessary investigations" by congressional groups, a report to one of them declares. The report, made to the Senate-House defense production committee by two of its investigators, says that during September and October the Atomic Energy commission (AEC) and the construction contractor used up a total of 4100 man-hours taking part in such inquiries. And in an accompanying statement, the contractor, E. I. Du Pont de Nemours & Co., says the investigations sometimes overlapped, both as to time and scope. The big plant, now under construction, is located near Aiken, S. C., and is known as the Savannah river project. JOINT COMMITTEE — The joint committee put out the report of its investigators today in making public testimony taken behind closed doors last Nov. 22. Chairman Gordon Dean of the AEC was among those present. The meeting was arranged to review staff reports to the committee on progress at the South Carolina plant. The reports expressed some criticism and some praise. Dean said at the session he thought an investigation of the kind conducted by the joint committee was "a healthy thing" and that the group's "influence will turn out to be good." He did not comment on the general assertion that the AEC and Du Pont had been "plagued" by congressional inquiries. Senator Maybank (D-S.C.), the committee chairman, took some exception to the investigators' statement, declaring: "Some of the investigations which were made by the congressional committees have more than paid their way, regardless of the amount of time consumed." Senator Capehart (R-Ind.), another member who was present, put it this way: "After all, Congress is for the purpose of legislating, and if we did more legislating, instead of investigating, perhaps we would be better off. "On the other hand, I do not know that that is entirely the case. TOLD GROUP — Former FBI Agent Daniel L. O'Connor, one of the committee's investigators, told the group: "Since September of this year (and through October), Du Pont has devoted approximately 3,400 hours to handling inquiries of investigators and performing acts of cooperation. "The Atomic Energy commission has expended some 700 hours in answering the inquiries of congressional investigators." Statements from the AEC and Du Pont are on page 3.

Young, Lawyer Said Lying Under Oath

WASHINGTON — (AP) — E. Merl Young, who used to have White House entree, and the lawyer who financed Mrs. Young's \$9,450 royal pastel mink coat have been accused by a federal grand jury of lying under oath. The jury late yesterday returned four indictments—the first to come out in the wake of the widely publicized Senate probe of influence peddling in connection with Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC) loans. James M. McInerney, who heads the Justice Dept.'s criminal division, said the jury will resume work on the same investigation after the first of the year. Indicted on perjury charges were Mrs. Young, who was Joseph H. Rosenbaum and Robert W. Young's brother, Herschel Young. All were accused of lying either to the subcommittee headed by Senator Fulbright (D-Ark) or to the grand jury. Mrs. Young's mink coat had been a bumper crop of headlines in the Fulbright hearings. She was a White House stenographer at the time but since has held that job. The testimony revealed that Rosenbaum had paid a payment to Young for his possible influence on RFC lending. Young and Rosenbaum both denied that it was. Senators were interested in whether the mink was a payment to Young for his possible influence on RFC lending. Young and Rosenbaum both denied that it was. One of the perjury counts against Rosenbaum involved his denial that he ever bragged of his close connection with an RFC director. There was testimony before the subcommittee that he said he had two RFC directors "in his hip pocket." He told the senators he said no such thing. Merl Young and Rosenbaum, who represented many loan-seeking applicants, were included in what the Fulbright group described as "a web of influence." Included in this were some former RFC directors and officials as well as Donald S. Dawson, a presidential administrative assistant. ROSE QUICKLY — Merl Young, a 49-year-old former Missourian, held a \$25-a-week job as a government messenger before World War two. He rose quickly to a \$7,500-a-year post as an RFC examiner. Texas Tops List Of Disabled Vets On Jobs In Oct.

AUSTIN — (AP) — More disabled veterans were put on jobs in Texas during October than in any other state, the Texas Employment commission reported. Texas was second to New York, however, in placement of 231 physically handicapped persons. Texas jobs went to 1,006 veterans and 2,501 physically handicapped persons in all. New York employed 3,016 handicapped persons in all. The month marks the observance of a national drive for employment of the physically handicapped.

Britain Takes Steps To Strengthen Pound Sterling

NEW YORK — (AP) — Britain is taking its first cautious step toward restoring confidence in the state-fettered pound sterling. Canada at the same time has taken the final step and set its dollar entirely free. Switzerland has freed the price of gold but not its movement.

These three could represent the first signs of a tendency to return to private, as opposed to state, controls of world economy. They follow two others: Colombia recently dropped all its price controls and Hungary was reported to have dropped rationing — although with an iron curtain country it is always hard to winnow the fact from the propaganda.

By itself, the British government's return to commercial banks of the eight to trade in foreign exchange doesn't mean much, American bankers and foreign traders say. The narrow range in which the bankers can trade prevents that. But they hope the step will be followed by others and lead, at some time in the future, to full convertibility of the pound sterling with other currencies.

Canada now joins the United States and Switzerland as the only countries who aren't afraid of what will happen to their money's value when it is freely compared with the money of any other land.

That's what convertibility means — the right to change dollars into pounds or pesos at will and in any amount and at any price. Sound currencies retain their value. Soft ones have to be protected by government curbs.

Canada unpegged the price of its dollar over a year ago — a step Britain is not yet ready to take.

By proclaiming its complete faith in the value of its dollar, Canada is likely to attract even more American money there for investment. The flow of U. S. dollars to Canada has been steady ever since it unpegged the price of the Canadian dollar and let it find its level — now around 98 cents in American money.

A similar goal — Americans hope — is what the Churchill government is working for. Some believe that within a year Brit-

Texas Prisons Show Vast Improvement In Few Years

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. — (AP) — The convict that plants the first seed for the Texas prison system's cotton crop next spring may be sowing his winter coat.

He may plant it, pick it, clean it, spin it into cloth, and never move farther than a rifle shot from the wire and walls that keep him prisoner.

You could say this is the real fruit of the modernization program for Texas' sprawling system of penal farms.

Four years ago, hard-mouthed mules and sullen prisoners worked in may have so restored its financial health and world confidence that it can free pound sterling exchange rates. It still holds these in a very narrow range.

What Do People Write About To Congressmen? Everything

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Texans write their congressmen about almost everything under the sun. If they don't know where else to turn for information, they write Washington. Mail about legislation tapered off with adjournment of Congress. But there's no let-down in variety. People ask their congressmen to help get priorities for construction materials, discharges from the armed forces, old age pensions, farm bulletins and pamphlets on how to raise babies. These are the subjects of the bulk of the mail. Here are some assorted requests that came to various Texas congressional offices in the past week: A mother who lost her son in Korean fighting inquired how she could get a Gold Star pin. An enterprising businessman wanted information about some iron ore deposits in Mexico and how to get authority from the Mexican government to develop them. An ambitious mother, describing her daughter as a pretty blonde with considerable wealth in her own right, asked the congressman if he couldn't arrange the girl's date with a midshipman at the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md. The daughter is enrolled in a finishing school in this area. A school superintendent wrote for the annual report of the Smithsonian Institution, and a wife wrote wanting to follow her soldier husband to Japan. Recently Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa got a letter from an old timer in that part of Texas, writing for the Plains Historical Society and asking how to obtain a monument for the grave of a long-deceased Mexican war veteran and Indian trader.

George McLean of Friona, in the first of several letters to Rogers, said: "I owned a stage station post office and agency trading post along the (Texas-New Mexico) state line a long time ago. . . . Mr. James E. Vaughan had me fix up his Mexican war pension papers every three months so he could draw his pension. When he died I buried him wrapped in his old Mexican war blanket." He had enlisted from Tennessee to go to the Mexican war, McLean wrote, and was captured by the Mexicans. After being discharged he became an Indian trader among the Apache and Comanche Indians while they were both at war with the white people which was before Gen. McKenzie had battled the Indians in Palo Duro Canyon south of Amarillo. "When the Indians were moved to the reservations (Oklahoma) his customers were gone and the large cattle companies moved in. This began in 1876. He then acted as a scout." When the old warrior died, McLean added, he buried him beside his Spanish wife who was killed by the Indians many years earlier near the stockade in which they lived across the line in New Mexico. The Veterans Administration, Defense Department and Congressional Library searched in vain for records that would permit the government to put a tombstone free over the old soldier's grave. They found a James Vaughan, but he died a few years too early to have been the right one. One of the senior congressional secretaries on Capitol Hill is Jules Leverett, 65, aide to Rep. Carl Thompson of Galveston. It was on Dec. 15, 1919 that he went to work for the then Congressman Cady Stone Briggs. Looking back over 32 years of handling congressional mail, he says: "People write a lot more now than they did years ago. There was a time when the letter carrier was the only contact most citizens had with the federal government. They used to write for garden seeds. Now they write about everything. Leverett is a native of Galveston and vividly recalls the big flood that swept the Island city at the turn of the century."

The Doctor Says

A reader asks for an article on the organs of balance in the middle ear and what causes them to get "out of kilter" and cause periods of dizziness.

This question refers, I think, to a condition known as Meniere's syndrome, which has been discussed in this space several times before.

Before talking about this common and distressing condition a word might be said about what controls balance in the human body. There are three: the eyes which can observe such things as stairs and the position of feet on them; the sense of position in proprioceptive system, and a system of canals in the internal part of the ear.

The symptoms of Meniere's disease are irregular attacks of dizziness, occasional ringing in the ears and deafness. Its cause is believed to be a dropsy in the deep portion of the ear called the inner ear, or labyrinth. This dropsical condition—accumulation of fluid—does not often develop in young people, but beyond the age of 45 becomes increasingly common.

Several medical treatments such as the use of histamine or atropin, have met with some favor and surgery also has been tried with varying degrees of success.

Many patients who drink a lot of fluids find that an attack comes on a few hours afterwards—probably because of the increased accumulation of fluid in the labyrinth. This has given a clue leading to the use of some forms of treatment aimed at cutting down the intake of fluids or removing excess fluids from the body.

Several medical treatments such as the use of histamine or atropin, have met with some favor and surgery also has been tried with varying degrees of success.

Nothing Sensational About 3 Sacked For Crookedness

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Nothing sensational about three men sacked in 45 years for crookedness.

Not a drop in the bucket compared with more than 50 fired in a year from the Internal Revenue bureau.

Three chiselers sacked in almost half a century can't compete for interest with cut-rate milk, home freezers, free Florida plane trips.

From the scandals, now exploding, it's easy to get the impression all government employees carry bushel baskets, waiting for handouts.

The impression isn't any more than trying to generalize by saying all people are good or all people are bad.

And the opposite side of the picture comes from Charles W. Crawford, head of the food and drug administration.

As government agencies go, it's small. It doesn't make headlines often.

It has about 1,000 employees scattered among 16 field offices around the country and the main office in Washington.

All come from the government's civil service rolls. None is a political appointee.

The agency's job is to enforce laws requiring foods, drugs and cosmetics to be pure, safe and honestly labeled.

In the past year it has started more than 360 criminal actions against offenders and seized more than 1,400 items of bad goods.

The following story comes from Crawford who didn't just step up with it, saying "what a good little boy am I." He was asked for it.

Since the agency was founded in 1908 only three men had to be fired for crookedness.

From the beginning the agency has had a tradition that none of its employees could accept gifts or favors of any kind from any person or organization in the drug-food-cosmetic field.

Further, lest it should create an embarrassing situation, the employees are not to accept lunch from anyone in that field.

Each new employee is told what's expected of him. And on being hired by the agency, everyone has to get rid of any interest he may have in the food-drug-cosmetic field.

For example: if he has stock in a can company in which food is distributed, he must sell his stock.

Crawford, who joined the agency in 1917, said he thinks this policy, which he inherited from his predecessors, has paid off.

"The people in the industry respect us," he said.

This restriction against any gift or money tie-ups with the industry with which it deals, doesn't mean the employees can't have other outside interests.

For example, it's all right for them to have stock or some other financial interest in a firm or industry not connected with their field of operations.

Tuesday President Truman laid down a general rule for all government employees: no gifts from people doing business with the government.

He issued that statement after being told the steps another agency has been taking for years to keep its employees honest. This

Turkeys Down A Few Cents In Yule Buying

Turkey prices were trimmed two to six cents a pound this week as food stores prepared for the annual big upsurge of Christmas buying.

The holiday gobblers now are at about the same general level as at Thanksgiving and a few cents a pound higher than last year.

Chicken prices were up two to as much as six cents a pound in many places, ducks about unchanged, lambs off slightly, beef and pork steady compared with last week-end.

Fresh cranberries were a little higher than they were just before Thanksgiving Day and in somewhat tighter supply than is usual this time of year.

Top grade eggs eased two to five cents a dozen, reflecting recent new declines at wholesale. Butter continued climbing in some markets, up as much as three cents a pound from last week — but in other places levelled off at the highest rates since the summer of 1948.

Of the fresh vegetables, only snap beans showed any notable price reduction from last week-end. Several were higher as shipments lightened, including lettuce, carrots, brussels sprouts, mushrooms, tomatoes and spinach. Most oranges were lower and fruit auctioneers said there would be plenty, at reasonable prices, for the toes of those Christmas stockings. But grapefruit edged higher, and so did tangerines.

Survey Reveals Women Hold Responsible Newspaper Jobs

WACO, Tex. —(AP)—Petticoats the questionnaire, she reported in a newspaper editorial room—long a man's domain—are getting more numerous in Texas.

A Baylor university student found that 28 out of 29 Texas editors who answered a questionnaire employed women in the editorial room.

The student is a woman reporter herself — Miss Betty Dollins, reporter on the Waco News Tribune and Times Herald.

The 28 newspapers employ a total of 131 women as reporters or department editors.

Sixty-seven of these women—exactly half of the total—are college graduates. Average salary is \$55 a week. Four women are listed in the \$70 to \$90 a week bracket. Four others are listed earning more than \$90 per week.

Fifty-six of the 134 women are married. Only two are required to do photographic work. Sixty-one are employed on society desks, 27 are news writers or editors and the remainder do a variety of jobs.

Only four have been employed one year or less. Ten have been employed four years and the others have 10 years or more of service.

Twenty-three editors said "yes" to the question, "Do you consider the future bright for women in newspaper work?" Two said "no" and four failed to answer.

Fifteen of the editors are completely satisfied with the work of their women editorial workers. The 15 stated that women are just as capable as men. Two refused to take a stand on the relative merits of men and women as editorial workers. Five said women are not very capable and three said "it depends upon the individual." One said both sexes have their disadvantages in the editorial room.

Editors directed the following criticism against female editorial workers: They are indifferent spellers; they are absent more often than men; they cannot go to men's meetings; they do not want to cover meetings at night; and they cannot cope with figures.

The women have a strong champion in one of their own sex who is an editor. In filling out

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Frank W. Lohn, a native Texan, has been named chief of the Internal Revenue bureau's intelligence division.

New Cars To Show Drastic Changes

DETROIT —(AP)—The auto industry doesn't very often make major design or engineering changes in the midst of a model year, but 1952 will see some.

A mid-season change in power plants is in prospect for a couple of new models. Several others will change automatic transmissions.

Normally these engineering revisions would have been announced as the new models were introduced. However, the bottleneck in machine tooling upset many engineering plans and the manufacturers decided it would not be competitively practicable to delay new model announcements for the projected engineering changes.

In all instances the changes were on blue prints a couple of years ago. They only recently have reached the production stage, still hampered somewhat by restrictions on materials consumption or by the limitation on the number of automatic transmissions a given auto company may build.

Engineering and styling changes in the new models so far announced have been relatively few.

The new models yet to come may have more significant changes. Most of the General Motors, Ford, Studebaker and Nash cars are among those still to be introduced. Some significant body styling changes as well as some engineering revisions are planned. Ford already has announced the new Ford model, still several weeks away, will be entirely new.

Dallas Firm Buys Los Angeles Hotel

LOS ANGELES —(AP)—The Biltmore hotel, the downtown's biggest, was sold today to a Dallas syndicate in a deal totaling about \$12,760,000.

Real estate sources called it the largest single sale in California's history.

The Texas group, headed by Leo F. Corrigan and Fletcher G. Lippitt, both of Dallas, paid over in escrow a \$9,000,000 check—filling a trust deed in favor of the Equitable Life Assurance society for \$7,500,000 of it—and gave a note for \$3,570,000.

The latter covers a \$10 second lien note for each share. The nine million dollar check pays off \$33 a share to a group of stockholders which formerly owned the big hostelry, built in 1923.

There will be no change in the Biltmore's operation. It is under long-term lease to Baron Long and associates.

Rose, Matthews Attend Premiere

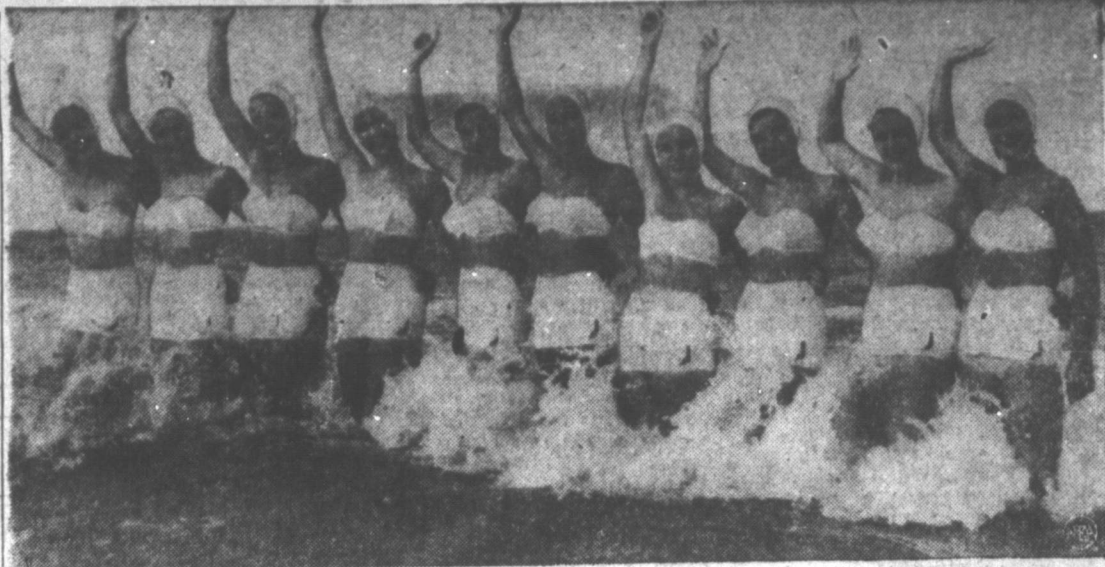

Heavy Freeze To Affect Citrus Crop

WASHINGTON (AP)—Heavy freeze damage last February will make Texas citrus production for the 1951-52 season negligible in comparison with previous years.

The Agriculture Dept. reported that the national production of early and mid-season oranges for the coming season is estimated at 56,100,000 boxes. Texas is expected to produce only 300,000 boxes, compared to 2,700,000 boxes produced last season.

The total grapefruit crop is indicated at 40,200,000 boxes, with 250,000 boxes expected to come from Texas. Last season Texas produced 7,500,000 boxes of grapefruit.

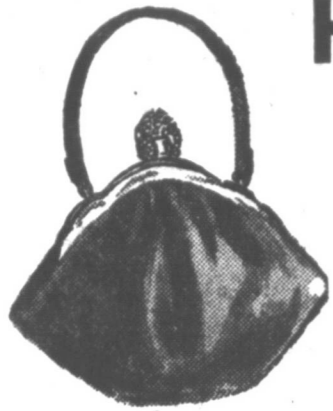

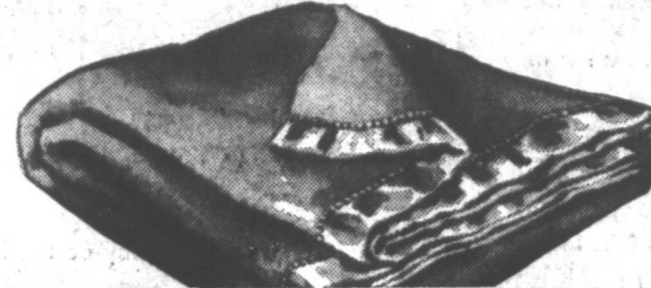

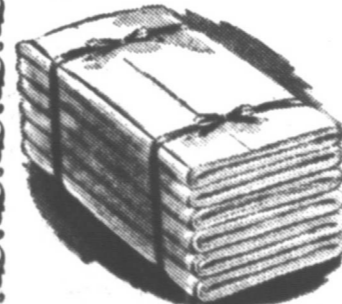
