# PRPC OK's **Local Grant** For Project

Pampa's request for a federal aid grant to help pay for the \$370,000 improvement project at the city's sewage treatment plant has been approved by the Panhandle Regional Planning

The government aid will amount to 55 per cent of the cost or \$203,500. This would leave lance of \$166,500 to pay in order to bring the local plant up to requirements of the Texas Water Quality Board.

The PRPC's approval will go to the federal department of Housing and Urban Development for further

processing. The regional planning commission also admitted Borger to membership at its Wednesday meeting.

# Over 100 Men Reported **Involved In Carrier Fight**

(AP) - About 100 black and white sailors were involved in last month's racial fight aboard the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk and the fighting with knives. forks and chains lasted several hours, according to crewmen of the ship. The carrier docked here Wednesday en route to its home port of San Diego after duty off Vietnam. Newsmen were barred from vessel but several sailors anonymously gave their version of the Oct. 12 incident in which 46 persons

were injured. Their report was the first ac-Navy confirmed in a terse announcement that a disturbance had occurred and was being in-

vestigated The sailors interviewed said the fighting finally was quelled by club-swinging Marines. They said tension lingered for some time after the incident but life aboard the ship "has been real good lately

'We're just anxious to get home now, that's all," said one

Many of those interviewed blamed the disturbance on

combat stress. One crewman said the ship had been "on the line longer, in hard combat longer, than any

other ship. The sailors said the ill feelings between black and whites began with a fight in a Manila nightclub, though the reason was not clear.

The Kitty Hawk arrived off North Vietnam last February. Six months of duty was expected, sailors said. It went to the Philippines, where the initial fracas occurred before its last month of combat. When the ship returned to combat, they said, the discontent spread.

# Webb County Ranchman **Charged In Five Deaths** fused to talk about the killings.

LAREDO, Tex. (AP) - Kenneth Adami, 60, rancher and admitted killer of five men, remained silent in his Webb County jail cell Thursday night under bond of \$100,000.

Adami surrendered to U.S. Border Patrol agents Thursday and told them he killed the men in a house in remote ranch country near the town of Freer. aboout 65 miles northeast of this Texas-Mexico border city.

Police and county officials who went to the house described by Adami found the five bodies. One of the men had been shot in the head. The other four received fatal body wounds.

A sheriff's officer told newsmen that the killer used a .257 caliber Roberts rifle "with some kind of very explosive" ammunition.

# Kissinger. Tho Meet For 1 Hour

PARIS (AP) - Henry A. Kissinger and Hanoi's Le Duc Tho met for an hour today at a suburban rendezvous after putting out word that the meeting had been called off.

A television crew of the Columbia Broadcasting System tracked Kissinger to the secret meeting place in Chousy-le-Roi, not far from the North Vietnamese delegation headquarters.

Kissinger told a CBS reporter on the spot that he planned to meet Tho again Saturday. In Washington, the White

House confirmed that the two men would meet Saturday in Paris. A spokesman gave no Press secretary Ronald L.

Ziegler also said Kissinger paid a call in Paris after his meeting with Tho to fill in French Foreign Minister Maurice Schumann on the talks so far Ziegler described it as a courtesy call to thank the French government for courtesies extended to the Vietnam peace negotiators during their meetings there.

The North Vietnamese delegation earlier announced that there were would be no meeting today, and American sources tacitly confirmed the announcement.

It appeared that the two delegations were trying to throw newsmen and photographers off the track after the earlier meeting place at Gif-sur-Yvette was discovered - also by a CBS elevision crew

The one-hour meeting was the shortest since Kissinger and Tho began their current session Monday in an effort to complete the peace agreement they drafted last month

President Nixon's security adviser and the Hanoi politburo member conferred for six hours at Gif-sur-Yvette Thursday.

Choisy is 10 miles south of Paris. Gif-sur-Yvette is 15 miles southwest of Paris. The French news agency

Agence France Presse quoted reliable sources as saying Kissinger and Tho had run into serious difficulties. On Monday they met for 512

hours, Tuesday for 412 hours and Wednesday for 312 hours. The Thursday session continued the relaxed mood of the secret

The two delegations lunched together, and Kissinger and Tho emerged several times into the walled garden, walking up and down in animated and apparently, friendly conversation.

They punctuated their remarks with sweeping gestures and at one point Tho grasped Kissinger's arm in a friendly manner



# **Holiday Violent Deaths** In Texas Climb To 32 James W. Terral, 55, of

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Texas' toll of violent deaths during the holiday weekend climbed steadily through Thanksgiving Day and promised to rise still more today.

At least 32 persons had been killed in the state, including 15 in traffic accidents. There also were 10 fatal shootings-including five in a remote ranch

The five men, believed to have been Mexican nationals in this country to do ranch work but not otherwise identified. were found dead in a rural area near Freer, 65 miles northeast of Laredo. Border Patrol agents said rancher Kenneth Adami. 60, surrendered to them Thursday and told of the killings. He was jailed at Laredo on murder charges. These were among the other

victims: Ricky Crawford, 3, and Jack-

ie Crawford, 1. perished as fire started from a gas heater raged through their frame home Thursday at Laporte. Their father, Willie Crawford, said he was watching television when he saw smoke coming from the children's bedroom but he was unable to reach them. Tommy Wayne Wiseley, 27, of

Abilene was killed there Thursday when his car hit a traffic signal pole at an intersection. Two Houston youths died ear-




By Oswald & James Jacoby It doesn't require any great bidding skill to get to three no-trump with the North-South cards. The bidding in the box shows the simple, straightforward way to get there.

With two five-card suits. North opens with the higher ranking one. You don't go out of your way to reverse, to show strength. A reverse bid shows strength and when you reverse with touching suits like diamonds and clubs it indicates that the

club suit is longer. North's hand is strong enough for a forcing jump bid in his second suit and South rebids to three notrump. South might have given a preference to three diamonds but the last thing South wanted was to get past the three no-trump level.

# Creativity Is No Respecter of I. Q.

# There's Talent in the Retarded

NEW YORK - (NEA) That a person's I.Q. often has little to do with his creativity is a point now being proved by the mentally retarded. They were given the chance to show their creative ability by a few people who were willing to put time and dollars where others gave lip service. And this willingness to help has paid off - not just in an aura of philanthropy but in the medi-um we all admit speaks for itself-money.

From the art center at Flame of Hope, a nonprofit, self-sustaining agency that provides employment for the mentally retarded through the sale of products they make themselves, have come original designs for fabric prints. The designs were bought by Lawrence Gordon, president of Blue Ridge-Winkler Textiles, and he brought Du Pont into the act from the fabric angle. The fabric used for the designs is An-

"This guy is a leader;" said Stephen E. Blum, president of Flame of Hope, refer-ring to G o r d o n. "He de-serves a lot of credit. He has put a lot of his own personal money into the effort and a lot of his company's time. But the venture is a success. Recently he sent us a letter saying he wanted to make it a continuing operation and would give us a percentage of the net profit.

Du Pont is making a film on the project and now fashion leaders in all categories will interpret the prints in their designs. The fabrics will be available for home sewers, too.

The purpose for the venture, according to textile man Gordon, is to offer fashion-conscious consumers the opportunity to fill their wardrobe needs with the newest designs and simultaneously help provide employment for those less for-

To talk to Blum about Flame of Hope is to turn on all the devotion of a loving parent - but a parent who knows the best way to help his charges is not simply with charity but by applyin business shrewdness that can enable them to achieve the dignity reserved only for the self-sustaining citizen.

"I'm not a social worker." he said. "I came from the business side and I get a great deal of satisfaction in to help others.' The artists in the fabric



He stopped in - and lived there, helping them, for a year.

Flame of Hope sent tools from their workshops here and lined up people overseas to help the Cherbourg work-



statements indicating he may be reverting to the old "conservative" philosophy which first brought him into political prominence

He says he wants to trim the bureaucracy and is not planning huge new expenditures for massive social programs.

We're not sure we understand what he said, and we are not sure we believe what we think he said. The nature of politics does seldom shift in reverse.

But his announcement. coupled with rumors of some time back that once returned to office, Nixon would embrace his former philosophy of fiscal conservatism, caused us to embark on a flight of fanciful speculation.

What if the President did indeed use his high office as a forum for teaching Americans once again to be self-reliant and individually responsible for their welfare

What if the President said to the American people that the long move toward socialism was ending? That political government's involvement in business would henceforth be limited to enforcement of criminal laws; that welfare and giveaway programs would be phased out; what if he told the truth about social security and set in motion the machinery to eliminate it?

Well, probably, if he were not assassinated, Mr. Nixon might be able to make some progress toward reducing the huge cost of government and reducing the bureaucracy.

Some progress, but not much For 40 years since FDR introduced the "New Deal," the political establishment has developed a huge vested interest in bureaucracy. These elite masters of our social and economic fate are immune to

President Nixon has made the opinions and actions of a

When one considers the monumental task of decision making which faces a President day to day, it is obvious that one man simply cannot do the job. If that be the case, then the machinery must be running under some other sort of leadership, independent of actual control by a President. Therefore what a President may say he wants is not necessarily what he gets.

We recall that President Nixon promised to clean up the State Department once elected in 1968. But the State Department continues to exist with no deletions from the entrenched professional cadre four years later. What Mr. Nixon did was to set up his own State Department, mainly himself and Henry Kissinger, but the bureaucracy that is the U.S. State Department runs long its merry way

What Mr. Nixon might accomplish would be to set a new idea in motion or rather brush off the old idea of American free enterprise, dig it out of the mothballs and show it to the generations of Americans who never saw it in operation.

With his great forum and his opportunity to speak to millions Americans through the television networks and in the newspapers of the land the President could explain the fiscal irresponsibility of socialism. He could bring out some free enterprise economists to discuss basic economics and show how much more useful and productive individual life could be without the controls and huge tax

burden of political government. He could do those things and just maybe he could cause thinking to alter its course

# **Taxes Are** Now Up To 35.6 Pct.

By J. KESNER KAHN If the girl, at the check-out counter said, "That will be \$6.44 plus \$3.56 tax, \$10.00 please you'd explode. But in fact that's the way it really is, 35.6 per cent goes for taxes.

You don't realize that you are now paying \$3.56 in taxes every time you spend \$10.00, because most all of those taxes are hidden within the price you pay.

On food, for example, there are all the taxes the farmers pay, on their farms, on all that they must buy, on their gasoline and on their farm equipment, on their electric power and phone bills; and if all the taxes the farmer pays aren't covered by what he gets for his crops he loses money. And then the truckers, handlers, farm product marketers, railroads, insurers, and the stores, and all the rest; they too must include all the taxes they must pay in the prices they must charge. You too, you had to pay taxes to have that \$10.00 of spendable income. All added up these taxes total \$3.56 per \$10.000 of

This house-size space laboratory will enter an orbit about 270 miles up where it's intended to remain for many

Then three astronauts will be rocketed up there, chase down, latch on and move in. Those three will spend 28 days inside

**REDS SHOULD PAY FULL PRICE** 

We should not be arguing the question of trading with communists. It should not be necessary to discuss it after the history of trade and aid granted communist governments. Whatever good sense and the desires of the American people are in this regard, it appears that we are in for another round of "trade" with Soviet Russia and Red China. At least our elected representatives should see that we are paid full price for the goods and the technology we provide for communist governments to save themselves from their own system's failures.

There is no benefit to the seasoned campaigners to be able to say, "I told you so." after the books are balanced 30 or 40 years after a "deal" with Soviet Russia. It hurts all of us when we have to settle with a communist government in 1999 for 7 or 8 cents on the dollar for the "trade" deals of the 1970s.

What good working people and other patriotic citizens should do is to insist that our government require the communists to pay full price for what they buy from us. This will be difficult to bring about, because if the communists have to pay full price, there won't be much trade. The only way communist systems can "trade" with capitalist nations is through special deals at less than market price, with the taxpayers of the capitalist system paying the difference.

It is not too much to ask our Congressmen to require that communist governments pay cash on the barrelhead for everything they buy from us. If they don't, the taxpayers will pay most of it in the end. There is no reason for U.S. taxpayers to rescue the dictators who have vowed to bury us and our profit-motive system. The communists will starve to death after they bury us, but that wouldn't help us any at that

Despite elaborate efforts to anticipate necessities for eating, showering, sleeping and working in weightless space, 'the first 28-day visit is expected to teach us how much we don't know.

Where water won't fall down. the astronauts will shower under pressure in a bag. They'll cook on dishes attached to the stove. They'll sleep "hanging"

And everything they do every minute around the clock will be watched by physicians on earth through TV eyes.

While this first Skylab is in orbit, we will be developing reusable shuttle planes which may re-land intact on earth. That opens a whole new horizon in aerodynamics.

# Equal in Marriage, **Equal in Ministry**

The church has never been without the team ministry. We read in the New Testament that Jesus sent out his followers, "two by two." Over the centuries, Christian ministry has frequently involved entire families who journeyed around the world to serve the faith. Many congregations today would falter if left to the devices of one pastor or clergyman-looking to the lady of the manse or parsonage for support and guidance.

Yet a really new twist in Christian ministry today is the leadership being given to local congregations by ordained husband-wife teams. In the November edition of A.D. (published by the United Church of Christ and the United Presbyterian Church) we have the story of Barbara Gerlach Mack and John Mack, a married couple serving as copastors of Trinity Congregational Church in Scranton, Pa. This 600 member parish is enjoying the preaching talents, counseling skills and pastoral concerns of a unique and lively pair. cerns of a unique and lively pair.

The Macks met and married in their first year at Union Seminary in New York. John had been a Marine Corps captain in Vietnam, following graduation from Princeton University. Barbara was aimed toward the teaching profession, following her four years at Hood College. But a summer at Ghost Ranch, N.M., opened to her the options of ministry in the 20th century. Since 1971 they have been copastors of the Scranton congregation, alternating in preaching and teaching, sharing funerals and weddings and widening the concepts of the Christian ministry today.

Commenting on the shared pastoral duties, John Mack says, "Although we split 50-50 most of the work that in-volves us publicly, there are areas where we follow our own interests."

For John this is an abiding interest in prisoners and prison reform. This means encounter groups at the county jail and pastoral concern for people behind bars. In the case of Barbara, her realm of special interest is problempregnancy counseling and reform of the Pennsylvania abortion law.

Reflecting on her role as pastor, preacher, and counselor, Barbara told the editors of A.D.: "When people see a woman functioning as an

equal member of a team, new possibilities open up for other women in the church. More women begin moving into leadership roles and into jobs that have traditionally belonged to men.

This writer has always argued that men ought to help out in housework, pushing the diaper pail around, knowing how to turn on the vacuum cleaner. this life and third, we worry about death and dying. Some of us spend so much time worrying about all this, we would qualify for a degree in the subject. I know people who when they have nothing to worry about. get worried because there is nothing to worry about!

Worry robs us of Christian influence. In California, the owners of the citrus groves set out little smudge pots whenever it looks like the temperature is going to dip below freezing. They don't produce much heat but they sure make a lot of smoke. The thick dark clouds of smoke keep the trees from freezing and make a dark night a lot darker. The sin of worry clouds our testimony and causes defeat in our Christian lives. We get just like those smudge pots.

Thank the Lord, worry can be cured. In fact, there are three solutions to the problem of worry. One; the promises of Word. There are over seven thousand promises to us in the Bible, any one of which could be a cure for worry. However, Isa. 41:10 says: Fear thou not for I am with thee; be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness." God

never breaks His promises! Second; the doctrine of the Word. You cannot get rid of worry until you are in fellowship with God. I John 1:9 says "If we will confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." By the confessing of sins we are brought back into fellowship and have the ability to follow God's example.

Third; knowledge of prophecy. Knowledge of the future gives the believer assurance in the present. Today, political and scientific leaders are unsure of the world's future. They are turning to computers for the answer. However, the greatest source of seeing into the future has been overlooked by them. The Hebrew prophets have been accurate right down to the last dotting of i's and crossing of t's. These prophets tell us that Jesus Christ is coming soon. What assurance this is to the believer! The second coming of Christ makes worry and anxiety unneeded in the Christian life.

Worrying is a sin. Every moment that you worry you are a poor testimony for the Lord. You are a smoking smudge pot. You are miserable and you make everyone around you miserable. What is worse, there is no glorifying of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Therefore, "stop worrying about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall garrison your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." (Phil. 4:6-7).

listed below. Rheumatoid arthritis, most dangerous and disabling of all forms of arthritis, may come on subtly and deceptively, or may strike suddenly and destructively.

It attacks women more

often than men, about two to one. Too many people mistakenly refer to any type of arthritis as "rheumatoid arthritis." Rheumatoid arthritis is a particular kind of disease, not limited to joints, but affecting the whole body sys-

It does, of course, attack joints, most frequently those of the arms and hands, and the hips, legs and feet. In addition, the patient tires easily, sometimes loses weight, has a feeling of illness and may have generalized aching and stiffness, more pronounced when he first gets up in the morning.

ness begins developing.

What happens inside the joint is inflammation of the synovial membrane, the inner lining of the capsule enclos-ing the joint. The synovial membrane produces synovial fluid, a sort of "liquid bear-

ing" to lubricate joint action. With continued inflammation the membrane begins to thicken and to invade the cartilage covering the ends of the bones forming the joint. The cartilage is gradually worn away, and if the process continues, it is eventually destroyed entirely. The joint is no longer capable of func-tioning without its cushion of

cartilage As the joint is gradually destroyed, its muscle and tendons are thrown out of line causing partial dislocation or distortion. This deforming process is most apparent in the hands of people with long-term severe rheumatoid arthritis. Their dislocated fingers drift sideways. sometimes become drawn back and curved into aching, rigid claws.

Recognize Arthuitis Early It is of utmost importance that people recognize the signs of rheumatoid arthritis when it is beginning and seek a physician's advice. It is then that treatment can do the most good, and then that it is most urgently necessary. The immediate need is to

keep strain off the affected joints, at the same time starting medication to subdue the inflammatory processes, and to relieve the terrible pain of active disease. Along with this may go splinting or similar methods of preventing the joints from being drawn out of shape, as

well as physical therapy or other means of moving the joints gently to prevent stiffening. Most of the sophisticated

arthrifts surgery that has been developed, and is still being developed, is for subsequent correction of joint dis-

One further peculiarity of rheumatoid arthritis is that it can go into remission. The destructive processes cease. The patient feels better. Symptoms of the disease subside—although this does not mean that damage already done will by any miraculous means disappear, too.

These remissions are peri ods of blessed relief. Unfortunately, patients must not mislead themselves into believing that the disease is "cured," or that their trou-

Generally speaking, the disease will flare up again later, perhaps in a few months, perhaps after several years. When that happens treatment o limit the amount of destruction must be resumed promptly. It is as urgent as it was in the be-

tis, is the commonest of all forms of arthritis-the type that seldom cripples, if relatively simple precautions are Unlike the vicious rheuma-

toid arthritis, this is not a systemic disease. It is degeneration (as the name implies) of individual joints. The damage is local. There is no inflammatory process to dart capriciously parts of the body. to other

Primarily it is a "wear and tear" sort of disease, although there are certain aspects of it which indicate that other and as yet unknown factors play some part.

Worn Down Joints

In general, the layers of cartilage in the joints wear thin. The bone ends gradualchange shape, thickening and spreading, forming a rather broad, fat "lip" effect It is a disease of older (but not just elderly) people. It is most pronounced in weight-bearing joints: knees, ankles, hips, feet, spine. But it can also attack joints of the arms. hands, neck and shoulders, indicating that weight-bearing alone is not a required

factor. There is no way to keep our joints - along with the rest of our bodies — from growing older. What we can

tive course is to protect joints from excessive pressure and strain, and to keep them flexible. In a sense, this resembles

tis, but it differs in degree. If knees and hips are involved, your physician will probably tell you to arrange to sit or lie down some of the day. Give them some rest. But he will also advise you not to make the mistake of not using the joints. Moving them to the fullest extent that they are intended to move is the surest way to prevent them from gradually stiffening and limiting their

such other pain-relievers as may be prescribed.

Gouty arthritis or gout is an acutely painful disease, and far more prevalent than is generally supposed. The number of patients with gout is now estimated in excess of 500,000 in the United States, and perhaps as high

Gout is a metabolic disorder; the body accumulates too much uric acid, which can be accurately measured in the blood. The excess uric acid forms needle-like crystals in joints.

In turn, as joints become afflicted with gouty arthritis they get hot, swollen, exquisitely tender. In three out of four cases, the large joint of the big toe will be attacked first, but gouty arthritis can settle in almost any part of the body. In the midst of an attack the pa tient is pretty much crippled just by the pain.

Obviously, the correct treatment is to reduce the uric acid in the system to tolerable levels, and thus prevent further attacks. In fairly recent years, it has become possible to do this effectively.

Drugs Bring Relief For acute attacks, the old drug colchicine is the best known.

Probenecid and one or two other drugs are used to help the body discharge more uric acid. A newer drug called allopurinol is widely used for the same ultimate purpose, but it acts by limiting the production of uric acid rather than by increasing the rate

of discharge. Medication to keep the uric acid down should be continued for life. After some months or years patients sometimes mistakenly believe that their gout has been "cured" rather than merely controlled.

For a patient to stop-the medication on his own is a mistake. The uric acid level will begin to rise, the trouble will resume, and it requires time to get the patient back

to comfortable levels again. Control of gout is important for more reasons than preventing gouty arthritis. High uric acid levels make possible formation of one type of painful kidney stones. Juvenile rheumatoid arthritis is similar to adult rheumatoid arthritis in nature and in its danger of crippling. Unlike the adult form, however, juvenile rheumatoid arthritis often "burns itself out" by late adolescence leaving little if any residual de-

formity in children who have received adequate care. A variety of sub-types exist; the amount of fever presence or absence of rash, retardation of growth or one-strength, eye inflammation and other problems are quite variable, as is the matter of whether the disease erupts suddenly or comes on gradually. Age of onset can

be anywhere from infancy through the teens. Treatment is similar to that for adult rheumatoid

For lay purposes, the important thing to remember is that rheumatoid arthritis can occur in children and re-quires prompt and highly skilled treatment as soon as it is suspected.

Bursitis is a different form of joint disease in which the basic problem is congestion, inflammation and swelling of bursa, a small sac-like affair containing viscous fluid. Its purpose is to provide protection at points at which friction would otherwise occur between adjoining tissues in a joint. It most commonly occurs in the shoulder

Bursa Cause Trouble Irritation develops from pressure or continued strain, often with excess fluid accualong with inflammation and extreme tenderness. The whole joint may become red and swollen.

A special type of bursitis, bunions, involves distortion of the first joint of the big toe in addition to inflammation

of the bursa, Treatment of bursitis may include pain-relieving drugs, injections of cortisone, rest,

physical therapy and sometimes surgery. Bursitis implies that even after healing, the joint should

be protected from severe trouble reappear. Heberden's nodes, swollen joints of the fingers are an

unwelcome but frequent accompaniment of osteoarthritis. There is overgrowth of the ends of the bones in fingers, and the joints become red and swollen.

These nodes can be very painful; in some instances they become comfortable again in time, but the swelling remains

Prompt treatment ordinarily will minimize or prevent

EDITOR'S. NOTE: Despite that 17,000,000 fact Americans have arthritis, the truth about it is still shroudin misinformation, misleading advertising and old wives' tales. For example: Nothing can be done about arthritis. Only old people get arthritis. The minor aches and stiffness of arthritis . . . The author is a well-known medical writer, former science editor of the Detroit Times, whose articles have also appeared in national magazines. He is a regular contributor to the Detroit News Magazine and is a collaborator with Dr. G. C. Thosteson on the syndicated column "To Your Good Health." This is the second of a three-part series.

Arthritis is not one but many diseases; all are incurable. many are painful and a few,

What happens inside the joint is inflammation of the crippling. But all can be helped. The most common are synovial membrane, the inner lining of the capsule enclosing the joint. The synovial membrane produces synovial fluid, a sort of "liquid bear-Rheumatoid arthritis, most dangerous and disabling of all forms of arthritis, may come on subtly and decep-

ing" to lubricate joint action.
With continued inflammation the membrane begins to thicken and to invade the cartilage covering the ends of the bones forming the joint. The cartilage is gradually worn away, and if the process continues, it is eventually destroyed entirely. The joint continues.

It is of utmost importance that people recognize the signs of rheumatoid arthritis when it is beginning and seek a physician's advice. It is then that treatment can do the most good, and then that it is most urgently necessary.

The immediate need is to keep strain off the affected joints, at the same starting medication to subdue inflammatory processes, to relieve the terrible pain of active disease. Along with this may go splinting or similar methods

of preventing the joints from being drawn out offshape, as well as physical therapy or other means of moving the joints gently to prevent stiffening.

Most of the sophisticated arthrifts surgery that has been developed, and is still being developed, is for subsequent correction of joint dis-

One further peculiarity of rheumatoid arthritis is that it can go into remission. The destructive processes cease The patient feels better. Symptoms of the disease subside—although this does not mean that damage already done will by any miraculous means disappear, too.

These remissions are peri-ods of blessed relief. Unfortunately, patients must not mislead themselves into believing that the disease is "cured," or that their troubles are over.

Generally speaking, the disease will flare up again later, perhaps in a few months, perluips after several years. When that happens treatment o limit the amount of destruction must be resumed promptly. It is as urgent as it was in the beginning.

toid arthritis, this is not a systemic disease. It is degeneration (as the name implies) of individual joints. The damage is local. There is no inflammatory process to dart capriciously to other parts of the body. Primarily it is a "wear and

tear" sort of disease, although there are certain aspects of it which indicate that other and as yet unknown factors play some part.

Worn Down Joints In general, the layers of cartilage in the joints wear thin. The bone ends gradually change shape, thickening and spreading, forming a rather broad, fat "lip" effect. It is a disease of older (but not just elderly) people. It is most pronounced in weight-bearing joints: knees, ankles, hips, feet, spine. But it can also attack joints of the arms. hands, neck and shoulders, indicating that weight-bear-ing alone is not a required

factor. There is no way to keep our joints - along with the rest of our bodies - from growing older. What we can

do is keep them usable. With degenerative joint disease, therefore, the tive course is to protect joints from excessive pressure and

strain, and to keep them In a sense, this resembles

part of the necessary treat-ment for rheumatoid arthritis, but it differs in degree If knees and hips are involved, your physician will probably tell you to arrange to sit or lie down some of the day. Give them some rest But he will also advise you not to make the mistake of not using the joints. Moving them to the fullest extent that they are intended to move is the surest way to prevent them from gradually stiffening and limiting their

may be prescribed. Gouty arthritis or gout is an acutely painful disease, and far more prevalent than is generally supposed. The number of patients with gout is now estimated in excess of 500,000 in the United States, and perhaps as high as

Gout is a metabolic disorder; the body accumulates too much uric acid, which can be accurately measured in the blood. The excess uric acid forms needle-like crystals in joints.

In turn, as joints become afflicted with gouty arthritis they get hot, swollen, exquisitely tender. In three out of four cases, the large joint of the big toe will be attacked first, but gouty arthritis can settle in almost any part of the body. In the midst of an attack the patient is pretty much crippled just by the pain.

Obviously, the correct treatment is to reduce the uric acid in the system to tolerable levels, and thus prevent further attacks. In fairly recent years, it has possible to do this effectively.

Drugs Bring Relief For acute attacks, the old

Probenecid and one or two other drugs are used to help the body discharge more uric acid. A newer drug called allopurinol is widely used for same ultimate purpose but it acts by limiting the production of uric acid rather than by increasing the rate discharge.

Medication to keep the uric acid down should be contin-ued for life. After \*some months or years patients sometimes mistakenly believe that their gout has been "cured" rather than merely controlled.

For a patient to stop the medication on his own is a mistake. The uric acid level will begin to rise, the trouble will resume, and it requires time to get the patient back to comfortable levels again. Control of gout is impor-

tant for more reasons than preventing gouty arthritis. High uric acid levels make possible formation of one type of painful kidney stones Juvenile rheumatoid arthritis is similar to adult rheuand in its danger of crippling. Unlike the adult form

matoid arthritis in nature however, juvenile rheumatoid arthritis often "burns itself out" by late adolescence leaving little if any residual deformity in children who have received adequate care. A variety of sub-types ex-

ist; the amount of presence or absence of rash retardation of growth or bone-strength, eye inflammation and other problems are quite variable, as is the matter of whether the disease erupts suddenly or comes on gradually. Age of onset can anywhere from infancy

through the teens. Treatment is similar to that for adult rheumatoid arthritis.

For lay purposes, the important thing to remember that rheumatoid arthritis can occur in children and re-quires prompt and highly skilled treatment as soon as it is suspected.

Bursitis is a different form of joint disease in which the basic problem is congestion inflammation and swelling of bursa, a small sac-like affair containing viscous fluid Its purpose is to provide protection at points at which friction would otherwise occur between adjoining tissues in a joint. It most commonly

occurs in the shoulder Bursa, Cause Trouble Irritation develops from pressure or continued strain, often with excess fluid accumulating inside the bursa along with inflammation and extreme tenderness. The whole joint may become red and swollen.

A special type of bursitis, bunions, involves distortion of the first joint of the big toe in addition to inflammation of the bursa. Treatment of bursitis may

include pain-relieving drugs, injections of cortisone, rest, physical therapy and sometimes surgery.

Bursitis implies that even

after healing, the joint should be protected from severe strain or pressure, lest the trouble reappear.

Heberden's nodes, swollen joints of the fingers are an unwelcome but frequent accompaniment of osteoarthritis. There is overgrowth of the ends of the bones in fin-

gers, and the joints become red and swollen. These nodes can be very

painful; 'n some instances they bccome comfortable again in time, but the swelling remains Rheumatic fever, since it

joints, belongs can inflame among the arthritic diseases Its greatest danger, however, is inflammation of the heart valves and subsequent scar-

Prompt treatment ordinarily will minimize or prevent any substantial joint or heart damage. Streptococcus infection, or strep throat, is the cause of rheumatic fever. Prophylaxis to prevent recurrence is of the greatest importance. Periodic (usually monthly) injections of a slow-absorbing form of penicillin is the standard preventive, and should be continued for at least five years, with many physicians recommending that it be con-tinued longer that that, even

for life. Other antibiotics can

be used if a patient is sensi-

tive to penicillin.


