Shields, a swift 200 pounder, is an exciting, hard-running back who promises to give Canadian players and fans fits in the Class A bi-district tilt at Harvester Field at 7:30 tonight.

Bi-District Clash Set For Tonight

Harvester Field will be the setting tonight of the Class A bi-district football game between Canadian and Clarendon—if the weather permits.

The District 1-A champs, Canadian, sport a 7-2-1 record going into the game while 2-A title-holder Clarendon is 9-1 for the year.

The Wildcats from Canadian were tied in their season opener, 12-12, by AA Phillips and were edged 7-6 the next week by Spearman. After that set-back Canadian rolled to three straight wins—55-0 over Wheeler, 28-0 over Groom and 36-15 over Shamrock—before being beaten by Stinnett, 20-8.

After that loss the Wildcats won four straight games to take their district by beating White Deer, 30-6, Sanford-Fritch, 14-6, Sunray 40-20 and Gruver last Friday 22-0.

After losing their opener to top-ranked Childress, the Clarendon Bronchos won their next nine games.

Falling to the Clarendon offensive juggernaut were White Deer, Quanah, Wellington, Valley High, Memphis, Claude, McLean, Silverton and Wheeler.

Leading the Wildcats to their winning season were end Donnie Morrow and guard Russell Ashley, a two-way all-district performer last year who is a sure-fire repeater this season.

Backs Ronny Williams, Kem Carr, Sam Shafer and Mac Purcell made most of the yardage for Canadian's offense. Purcell is an extremely versatile athlete who has seen work at all three running back positions.

All-state candidate Tommy Shields, a 200 lb halfback, sophomore quarterback Randy Croslin, a 6' 3" 185 pounder and halfback Eray King were the main guns in the Clarendon attack.

Starting offensively for the Wildcats will be ends Morrow and Johnny Davis, tackles Ricky Wheeler and Pat Walker, guards Glen Watson and Ashley, and center Gary Tubb.

"In the backfield Williams will be at quarterback, Carr and Shafer will be the halves and Bob Dickinson will be the fullback. Purcell is slated to see a lot of action at some or all of the running slots.

Defensively, Morrow and Dickinson are the ends, Watson and Wheeler the tackles and Walker and Ashley the guards. The linebackers are Purcell and Williams.

In the secondary Carr and Tie Adcock are the halfbacks and Shafer is the safety.

49ers Batter Dallas

DALLAS (AP) — George Allen and his Washington Redskins, sitting all comfy in their living rooms, were the big recipients of a Thanksgiving Day present from San Francisco, which shattered jinx-after-jinx in a 31-10 rout of defending Super Bowl champion Dallas.

Of course, the 49ers had purely selfish motives as they surged a half game ahead of Los Angeles in the National Conference West with the sweet victory on a 6-4-1 record.

However, the Redskins can clinch the host spot in the NFC East with victories in two out of their last four games, leaving the Cowboys to scramble for the "wild card" berth.

Dallas is 8-3 and 1 1/2 games behind the Redskins. The "wild card" spot in the National Football League playoffs is given to the division runnerup with the best record. Right now, that's Dallas in the NFC.

"We have a playoff spot now if we want it," said Cowboy coach Tom Landry. "It will be tough to make it as a wild card entry but Kansas City did it. I'm sure Washington is happy. They'll have to really fumble now to lose the East. We haven't lost it but it looks tough ahead."

Linebacker Skip Vanderbundt ran 73 yards with a recovered fumble and 21 yards with an intercepted pass for touchdowns and quarterback Steve Spurrier turned in a poised performance as the 49ers blasted the Cowboys.

It was the first victory for 49er Coach Dick Nolan over Landry, his former boss and old teammate, and marked the first time in 15 games Dallas had lost in Texas Stadium, its plush \$21 million football palace.

Nolan said "It's a big win for us...and probably our best game. They (Dallas) have beaten us before in two conference championship games. This shows we can beat them."

With Dallas leading 7-0 and driving, Dave Wilcox and Vanderbundt teamed for a spectacular play that turned the nationally televised game around in the second quarter.

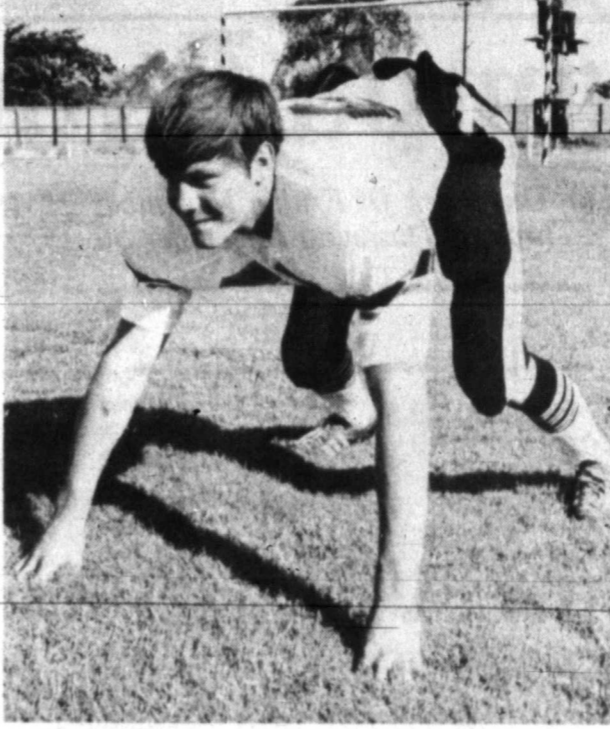
Wilcox clobbered Cowboy quarterback Craig Morton.

Vanderbundt said, "The ball took one bounce and there it was. I just scooped it up and ran. It may have looked as if I was trotting," but I was running for my life.

Dallas dominated the first half, allowing only five first downs but the 49ers turned it around, giving the Cowboys only four first downs in the second half.

Spurrier, playing in place of the injured John Brodie, hit 16 of the 24 passes for 177 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown pass to tight end Ted Kwalick. Spurrier took the 49ers on a 94-yard touchdown drive to open the third quarter and hit eight consecutive passes in one stretch.

Spurrier said, "It was sort of a funny game."

Oklahoma's Victory Tops College Games

Even before the dust had a chance to settle in Lincoln, Neb. following Thursday's Big Eight triumph by Oklahoma's Sooners over the defending national champion Nebraska Cornhuskers, a couple of Big Ten teams are expected to raise some dust of their own Saturday in Columbus, Ohio.

That's where third-ranked Michigan, 10-0, will square off against ninth-rated Ohio State, 8-1, in a game which will decide the Big Ten championship and also the league's representative for the Jan. 1 Rose Bowl against No. 1 Southern Cal.

"The team that makes the least mistakes has the best chance of winning," declared Michigan Coach Bo Schembechler, logically enough. "We've got to play out best game, and we expect Ohio State to play its best."

The Wolverines have already clinched a share of the Big Ten title, with a 7-0 mark, but need either a win or a tie Saturday to gain the Rose Bowl berth. If Ohio State wins the nationally televised contest, the Buckeyes will tie Michigan for the Big Ten

Texas Returns To Cotton Bowl

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Texas quarterbacks in recent years have always run first and passed second—if at all. But Alan Lowry was carrying that philosophy to ridiculous extremes.

The senior signal caller had not hit a touchdown pass all year until Thursday night, when he fired a 10-yard scoring strike to Julius Whittier in Texas' 38-3 victory over Texas A&M.

It climaxed a 9-1 season for the seventh-ranked Texas Longhorns, who will meet No. 2 Alabama in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas on Jan. 1.

Texas' lone loss was 27-0 to No. 4 Oklahoma, a Sugar Bowl team, at midseason.

The Longhorns already had clinched their fifth consecutive Southwest Conference title and the host spot in the Cotton Bowl by beating Texas Christian last Saturday.

They have lost the bowl game the last two years—to Notre Dame, breaking a 30-game Texas winning streak, and to Penn State.

Asked about his touchdown loss, Lowry, a converted all-Southwest Conference defensive halfback, said: "I thought I was going to go all year without throwing one. I might have been the first quarterback to go a whole year without throwing a touchdown pass."

Only 46 seconds were left in the first half when Lowry, a 188-pounder, zipped a pass to Whittier, who clutched in the midst of several Aggie defenders and fell into the end zone to give Texas a 14-3 lead.

"I'm as proud of this team as any we've had," said Texas Coach Darrel Royal. "It doesn't have as much outright talent as some of the others, but it has played as a team, hung together with great morale."

Lowry also broke through for two touchdowns rushing, and Tommy Landry, subbing for injured Don Burrisk, got another and led Longhorns runners with 84 yards on nine carries against the tough Aggie defense.

Split receiver Jimmy Moore grabbed three Lowry passes for 87 yards and sprinted 61 yards with a punt for a touchdown—the first on a punt or kickoff by a Texas player since 1966.

Placekicker Billy Schott punched through a 20-yard field goal for Texas and five extra points.

"It's the same thing as happened most of the year—fumbles, interceptions... mistakes," said A&M Coach Emory Bellard.

Clovis Hunts Pampa Loss

Unless the wintery weather rules otherwise, the Clovis, N. M., High School basketball team will be seeking a second win over the Harvesters in their second battle tomorrow night.

Clovis will meet Pampa at 8 p.m. in the Harvester Field House.

Playing on their home court Tuesday night, Clovis romped the Harvesters 96-68 in Pampa's season opener.

With their home court scene of Saturday's clash, the Harvesters will be trying to outmaneuver the greater height and reach of the New Mexico team.

UCLA Seeks 46th Victory

Another college basketball season gets under way this weekend and right off the bat the UCLA Bruins, the national champions, go after their 46th straight victory.

Picked to win their seventh consecutive national crown in the Associated Press pre-season poll, the charges of Coach Johnny Wooden open at home Saturday night against Wisconsin of the Big Ten.

A victory by the Badgers would be an astounding upset like the 71-69 victory Houston chalked up several years ago snapping the Bruins' winning streak at 47.

Now the Bruins again are within hailing distance of the all-time collegiate winning streak of 60 set by San Francisco back in 1955. It is a record the Bruins, led by big Bill Walton, would like to break as another feather in the cap of the canny Wooden.

The season actually gets under way with a scattering of major games tonight highlighted by North Texas at Nebraska and Colorado State at Utah State. Other Saturday games include Indiana State at Utah State, Ohio U. at Missouri, Auburn at Georgia Tech, UCal-Irvine at Minnesota and Los Angeles Loyola at Southern California.

Most of the high-ranking teams such as Florida State, Maryland, Marquette, Long Beach State, N.C. State, Penn and Ohio State open next week.

Recognize Arthritis Early

It is of utmost importance that people recognize the signs of rheumatoid arthritis when it is beginning and seek a physician's advice. It is then that treatment can do the most good, and then that it is most urgently necessary.

Along with this may go splinting or similar methods of preventing the joints from being drawn out of shape, as well as physical therapy or other means of moving the joints gently to prevent stiffening.

One further peculiarity of rheumatoid arthritis is that it can go into remission. The destructive processes cease.

The rheumatoid arthritis patient must remain forever on guard against new attacks.

Rheumatoid arthritis is hardly rare. Currently, 5,000,000 Americans have it. Of that number, about 1,000,000 cases are in remission.

Worn Down Joints In general, the layers of cartilage in the joints wear thin. The bone ends gradually change shape, thickening and spreading, forming a rather broad, fat "lip" effect.

There is no way to keep our joints—along with the rest of our bodies—from growing older. What we can do is keep them usable.

With degenerative joint disease, therefore, the effective course is to protect joints from excessive pressure and strain, and to keep them flexible.

He may also prescribe heat as an excellent and inexpensive source of comfort. It matters little whether it is dry heat or moist; any kind of heat is soothing, hence helpful.

Drugs Bring Relief

For acute attacks, the old drug colchicine is the best known.

Probenecid and one or two other drugs are used to help the body discharge more uric acid. A newer drug called allopurinol is widely used for the same ultimate purpose.

Medication to keep the uric acid down should be continued for life. After some months or years patients sometimes mistakenly believe that their gout has been "cured" rather than merely controlled.

Control of gout is important for many reasons. High uric acid levels make possible formation of one type of painful kidney stones.

Generally speaking, the disease will flare up again later, perhaps in a few months, perhaps after several years. When that happens, treatment is limited to the amount of destruction must be resumed promptly.

Its purpose is to provide protection at points at which friction would otherwise occur between adjoining tissues in a joint. It most commonly occurs in the shoulder.

Irritation develops from pressure or continued strain, often with excess fluid accumulating inside the bursa, along with inflammation and extreme tenderness. The whole joint may become red and swollen.

Bursitis is a different form of joint disease in which the basic problem is congestion, inflammation and swelling of the bursa, a small sac-like affair containing viscous fluid.

Heberden's nodes, swollen joints of the fingers are an unwelcome but frequent accompaniment of osteoarthritis. There is overgrowth of the ends of the bones in fingers, and the joints become red and swollen.

These nodes can be very painful; in some instances they become comfortable again in time, but the swelling remains.
