Just how the two major political parties stood financially as the election-year 1952 started may never be known. The Republican National committee did not report the balances it carried over from previous years.

Contributions to the Democratic National committee in 1951 were listed at \$1,318,574 and disbursements at \$1,311,652. Miscellaneous receipts for the Democrats approximated \$25,000 and total disbursements' were \$1,311,652. At the start of 1952, the Dem ocrats reported, they had in their "kitty" a balance of \$313,017, which included \$301,138 carried

over from 1950. The Republican National committee reported \$679.157 in receipts and \$584,473 in expenditures during 1951, leaving a ne. gain of \$94,684 for the year.





The most recent unofficial estimate here is that Russia is producing about 15,000 planes a year: Of these about 12,000 are first-line combat aircraft with about 70 percent of them jet

Against this is the recent estimate of Adml. Dewitt C. Ramsey (ret), president of Aircraft Industries Assn., that total production of American planes of all types may reach about 1500 per month by late 1952. That would be at the rate of 18,000 a year and some industry men believe this figure may be a little too

The industry blames the lag in plane production first on what it says is the attempt to impose a multi-billion dollar armament program on a booming civilian economy. Industry leaders say the primary reason for lagging production has been a shortage of engines and component parts traced to scarcities of machine tools and alloy metals needed in jet engine manufacture.

The Army is producing an un disclosed number of light, medium and heavy tanks.

But it has run into production troubles in at least one type, the T-41 light. It had accepted, up tp a month ago, about one-third of the light tanks which had been completed. The others were being held back until changes could be made in the mechanism which turns the tank turret.

This defect, which the Army insists is of minor nature and can be corrected without sending the tanks back through the production lines, apparently was a 'bug'' developing out of the attempt to speed a weapon into production without the usual prolonged service testing.

The Army's move into the field of heavy tank production appeared to be a reversal of policy which existed as recently as a year ago. At that time the army said it would continue experimenting with a heavy tank prototype but that "we are not going to spent money on heavy tanks simply because the other





Bumper Crop Of Rumors

By LARRY ALLEN SAIGON, Indochina - (AP) There's a constant bumper crop of rumors and reports flying about in Indochina that the Chinese Communists are planning to invade but hardly anyone in this country seems worried.

French and foreign inteligence officers freely confirm there appears to be a steady build-up of Red China forces along the ndochina border but none of them will say they think an invasion might be imminent.

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





WASHINGTON - (AP) - Farm leaders are puzzled over a statement by President Truman that a sliding scale in the price support law should not be allowed to penalize farmers who increase production for defense needs.

They pointed out such a system s not being used now. Consequently, they said they saw no danger to the farmer unless the administration, which has been against the sliding scale, changes its pol-

Some saw in the comment, made in the President's state of the union message, an indication the controversial issue may figure in this year's political campaigns. Mr. Truman's reference to the scale was in connection with an appeal for a stronger farm price

support system.

Present farm law sets up maxiand minimum levels at which the department may support farm prices. For all crops and products, the maximum is 90 percent of parity, except in case of national emergency. Then it may be set higher if greater incentives to production are deemed necessary.

For most major crops, the minimum support level is 75 percent of parity. (Parity is a standard measuring farm prices, declared by law to be equally fair to farmers and those who buy been probing Communist por tions on the east and east-central their products.) (Chicago Tribune) The French embassy, thru its division of information in New York, releases a handout in which the French delegate to the United Nations subcommission on freedom information bemoans the failtoward the drafting of a covenant this subject. enant than none at all. Fortunately, American opinion is not persuaded of that. Even the legation chosen by the State department to speak for the United States at the numerous meetings of the U.N. subcommission has not seen the the advantage of subscribing to any commitment that would limit the freedom of the press under the First amendment and in no way add to it.

In such matters, the American press certainly stands in no need of instruction from the French press which is traditionally venal and lacks the protection of constitutional immunity from govern-ment control and interference known to the American press. Yet M. Kayser submits, as a model o what the press of the world should accept, a French outline of what ought to be done under U.N. auspices to establish international

control over the press. M. Kayser speaks warmly of a proposal whereby any foreign government would be able to require the American government to make available for distribution any statement of "rectification" that it pleases bearing upon news dis-patches printed in the American press. 





Default Judgement Is Given

A default judgement of \$3240 was handed down in 31st District Court againsi E. A. Ramming, White Deer, in favor of Stone and Tnomasson, Pampa commission firm.

The judgement also dismissed a like claim against Carol Lee Banks and Ralph Rubrecdt and the Citizens Bank and Trust Co. after a previous \$5000 plus judgement was awarded the commission firm in December, 1951.

The civil suit arose from the sale of stolen cattle by Ramming, and the other two men to Stone and Thomasson. The bank was named as a defendant becau. 3 the money from the sale was deposited there.

In the same December judgement the lien on a pickup truck owned by Banks and Rubrecdt, held by the B and M Acceptance Corp. was also satisfied.

Ramming, Banks and Rubrecdt were indicted last week by a Carson county grand jury in the theft of two head of cattle from the L. P. Eakin ranch. A charge of cattle theft also hangs over the trio in Hutchinson county in the theft of a large number of cattle from the John Hankins ranch. These were the cattle sold to the Pampa commission firm for which he judgement was handed down yesterday by Judge Lewis M. Goodrich.




