# Pampa Fighters In Clean Sweep Opening Night

## Score KO, Three TKO's, Two Decisions At Amarillo

Pampa district fighters, and Pampa fighters representing the Borger Golden Gloves district, made a clean sweep of their opening night fights in the Amarillo Regional Golden Gloves tournament last night.

In the six bouts in which they appeared, the Pampa representatives tied together one knockout, three TKO's, and two decisions.

Only four fights on the opening night card went the distance.

Tonight, a twelve-bout card is scheduled, with four more representatives of the Pampa district going to the ring. They are Eddy Clements of Lefors, and Garry Phillips, Jimmy Thompson and Dan Jameson, all of Wellington.

Bobby Wilhelm, defending High School division 135-pound champion, had to start defense of his crown right away as he scored a second round TKO over Glenn McLeod of Plainview. The first round moved slowly, with both boys feeling each other out. But the little Pampa slugger landed a several hard lefts and rights in the final 20 seconds and had McLeod dazed at the bell. Then Bobby came back in the second round and continued to fire from both barrels, scoring direct hits a most of the time, and saw referee Dean Webb halt the bout at 1:32 of the second round.

Oscar Sargent, winner of the Harvester "Fighting Heart Award," and representing the Borger District, moved right in on Max Moser of Amarillo's Borger-Manchus Club, and scored a knockout in 1:35 of the first round. Sargent rushed inside the three-inch taller Moser, scored

### Walcott Ready To Sign For Defense

**NEW YORK — (AP)** The pincers that have been tightening on heavyweight Champion Jersey Joe Walcott for this past twenty-four hours have had their ancient New Jersey battler ready to give up his lucrative exhibition tour and sign for a defense of his title.

But Jersey Joe, who probably will climb in the ring again in Ezzard Charles' boxing gym on Liggett last July 18, had one ally — Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, which has a contract with the champion.

When Norris heard that Bob Christenberry, the new chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, had ordered Walcott to defend his title within 15 days or have it vacated in New York, the IBC president said:

"I had thought it was understood that Walcott was to be given the chance to make the most of the financial opportunities he has as champion before being required to defend."

But Christenberry obviously didn't see it that way. Originally, Walcott signed to defend his championship 90 days from July 18 and against Charles. That went by the boards though, when Walcott began cashing in on the crown. Now Christenberry apparently has decided the time has come to act. He also bypassed Rocky Marciano (winner over Joe Louis) and Harry Matthews of Seattle.

"As far as the New York State Athletic Commission is concerned," said Christenberry, "Ezzard Charles is the No. 1 challenger. We have nothing before us from Marciano, and I refuse to consider Matthews a contender for the heavyweight title."

### Dallas Rangers' Organization Holds First Meeting Tonight

**DALLAS — (AP)** — The organization that will operate professional football in Dallas is due to be revealed tonight, together with the plan of operation.

Giles Miller, textile company executive and chief stockholder in the club — the former New York Yanks which Miller bought and will move to Texas — has called a press conference for tonight. He said the executive committee, at least, will be introduced.

Miller met with a number of Dallas business and civic leaders yesterday regarding the sale of stock and perfection of the organization backing the club. The National Football League. It was revealed that there will be 24 stockholders.

Among those at the conference were bankers Nathan Adams, Ben Woolen and R. L. Thornton, the latter being president of the State Fair of Texas, which operates the Cotton Bowl where the pro games will be played.

"For all practical purposes, our group now has been completed," Miller said, "and we will hold a formal organization meeting Thursday."

Miller said he didn't know whether he would be able to get away Friday or Saturday to New York, where the papers transferring the franchise to Dallas will be signed. He will decide when to go after tonight's meeting.

Reputedly Frank Fitzgerald, general manager of the Yanks, has been signed to continue with the club but the coach has not been signed. Jimmy Phelan, who coached the Yanks last season, has said he is interested in continuing with the club. Others reportedly have applied for the job.

The option plan of the Cotton Bowl will be in effect for two pro games, Jan. 24 and 25, owned by the state, and managed by the state fair, said. Option holders have the privilege of buying tickets for games played in the Cotton Bowl. They represent some 20,000 tickets.

### Carler Paces 4A-1 Scoring

Through the first four games of the District 1-AAAA campaign, the Borger Bulldogs have been the scoring machine, though the new fieldhouse complex, and not by many points. QUESTION: Who is the regional director of the Amarillo Golden Gloves?

I WAS VERY DISAPPOINTED in action taken by the Pampa School board at the Monday night meeting. They did two things that will hold down the sports action in Pampa and nullify the opportunity of Pampans getting a chance to see some good sporting activity.

Their actions were the kind that force Pampa sports fans to go outside of the city to see certain events. It was definitely against the "trade at home" theme that the Chamber of Commerce is trying to foster.

First the schoolboard members did an almost about face and told Howard Vineyard that no school property would be made available to him for professional wrestling, contending that the project was too much of a private enterprise.

This is true. We aren't blaming the board for rejecting the proposition.

But in a previous meeting, the board had led Vineyard into believing that everything was all set. Vineyard originally asked for use of the Junior High school gymnasium and the board in return offered him the new fieldhouse. He was then put off when the board said that the established rental price wasn't considered enough considering the nature of the purpose of renting the building.

The board failed to meet at its next scheduled meeting and Vineyard was put off again, but still got encouragement from the members individually that he could have the building. He went ahead on that basis and laid all of his groundwork, arranging for chairs, a ring, insurance on the building, etc.

Then to walk before the board Monday night and get a flat "no" was quite a shocker.

Vineyard offered to raise the rental fee from five percent of the gate to ten percent. But he was told that "to us, money is a nominal thing as long as the activity is of community benefit."

Which brings us to the other disheartening action taken. And it definitely blocked not only community benefit, but something that could have had some bearing on world thinking, and a money as it might seem. The board banned any use of the fieldhouse for Sunday basketball.

And it was taken in a direct aim at a local civic club that had planned to sponsor a basketball game between the brilliant Harlett Globetrotters and the Nobilit-Cofey Chiefs on March 2. That date happens to fall on a Sunday, and is the only one that the Trotters were available unless a cancellation should come along (which is very unlikely).

The civic club, taking into consideration that it was a Sunday, checked with the Ministerial Alliance — which is probably more than the board did — and set the game for 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon. This would interfere no more with church than a baseball game, movie, horse show, rodeo, style show, etc.

But the community benefit angle. The money made from the game was to go toward the fund that sponsors the summer softball program to keep boys and girls from getting into mischief.

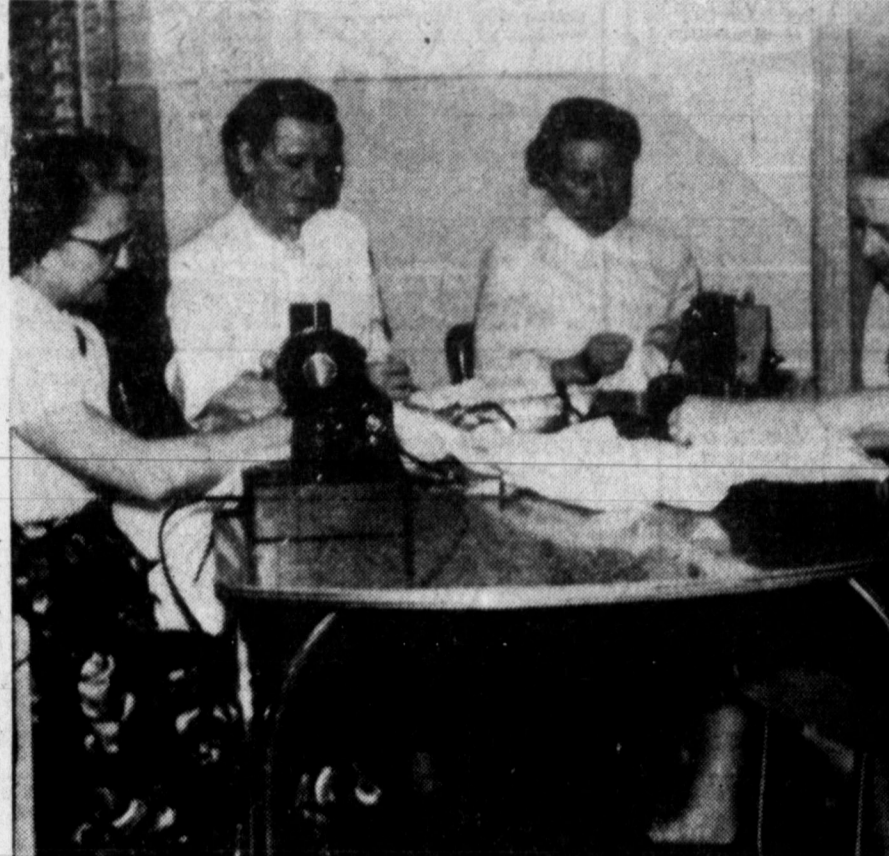

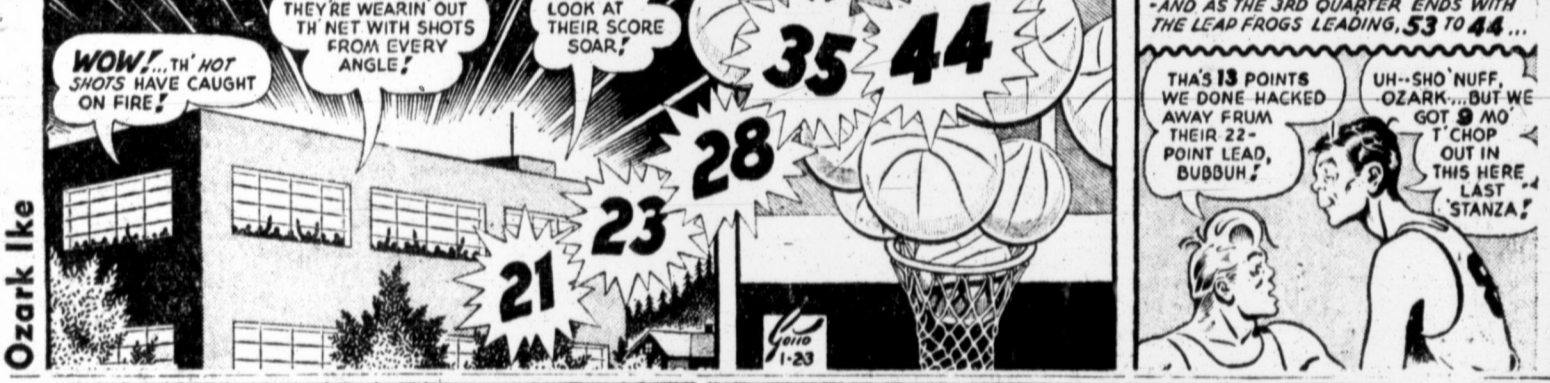

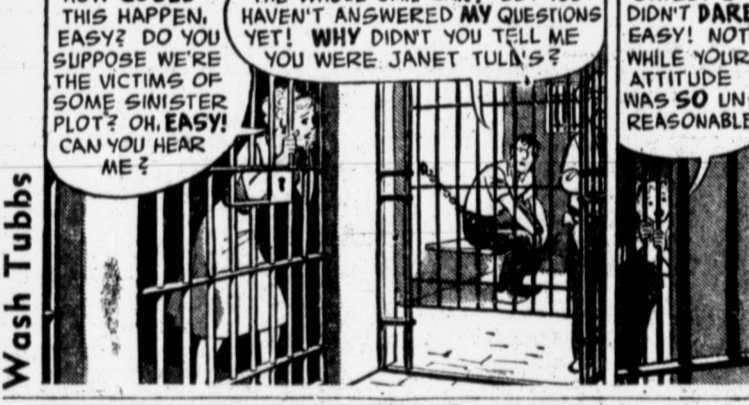

## Money From Dance At Moose Lodge Given To 'Dimes' Drive

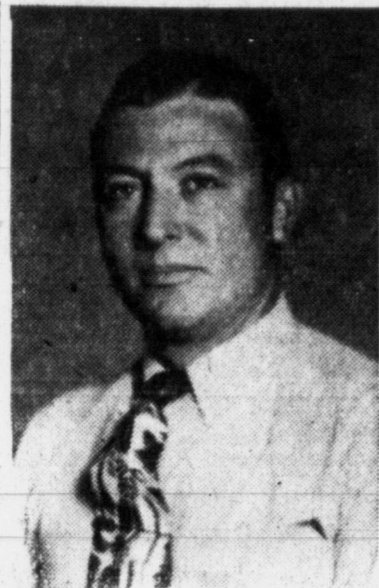
