Approximately one in five of all women who reach the age of thirty-five have fibroid · tumors. These nodules or tumors may be large or small. They are made up of muscle tissue and connective tissue, the latter being much like the tissue which makes an ordinary scar.

The symptoms from fibroids depend on their location, size and blood supply. The best known symptom is excessive or painful bleeding. Sometimes discomfort or even severe pain in the lower part of the abdomen is the only sign of a fibroid.



Unions Vs. The People (Christian Economics)

BY PERCY L. GREAVES JR.

The greatest crime of our civilization is ignorance. Men of good will are pretty much in agreement as to what is desired in a material way. It has been expressed in the terse phrase—the greatest good for all. Many think they know the means to attain this desirable end. Only a few really know. The great majority are, economically speak-

No man is omniscient. Few men can devote their lives to the study of economics. Many of those who do, do so with a purpose or prejudice in mind. They and their followers propagandize for a point of view that is in opposition to the greatest good for all. Under such conditions, it is difficult for unbiased scientific logic to prevail over the strident voices of those who seek special privileges for special groups. The problem becomes more complicated and more dangerous when economic decisions are made by political groups, unschooled in economics and subject to the political pressures of groups seeking privileges at the hidden expense of those who are busy earning their living.

Our forefathers, realizing these dangers, provided us with a Constitution that was meant to guarantee us our freedom. Their freedom philosophy preached that our dayto-day economic activities should and must be free from federal controis. This was the great liberal movement of the 18th and 19th centuries. It was then generally realized that government interference resulted in tyranny and a prevention of economic growth.

Since the turn of this century there has been a growing tendency for the government to intervene on behalf of popular pressure groups. The occasional connivance of bought privileges for a few has been completely replaced by an evergrowing movement to vote openly for special privileges for mass groups. Our government. which was formed to provide justice and protect American lives and property, has been turned into an instrument for the redistribution of wealth by majority votes When you get right down to it, which are often obtained by silent consent.

Special pleading has hidden the fact from the public that everyone pays for these privileges. Propaganda leads many to believe that the costs are borne almost entirely by high income groups. This is not so. Everyone in society bears a Miss Kiesler is the handsome very billion dollars the government spends. Every member of so-

ciety also bears a part of the burden of the greatly diminished total production that results from reduced incentives to produce, and the reallocation of our productive efforts into channels which do not produce the greatest good for all. It is ignorance, sheer economic

ignorance, which permits these interferences to continue. If people only knew the awful results of inflation, it could and would be stopped within 48 hours-at the very latest. If the majority of the American people had a proper understanding of basic economic truths, the politicians would be forced to turn toward, the free market economy almost over night. Every privileged group would be thrown off the public payrolls. Production would forge ahead with such rapidity that the rest of the world would forget its collectivism in its desire to imitate our successful formula. The best economic machinery can only be built with economic freedom. There should be no restraints placed on the production of good and useful things. There should be no limit to the amount each person

should be encouraged to contribute to the common good. One of the most popular fallacies of our days is the identification of all labor with union labor. In the press, politics, and public opinion, top union officers are spoken of as labor leaders. Their policies are generally accepted as labor policies. No one seems to question their right or ability to represent all labor. The facts are otherwise. Less than one fourth of American workers, belong to labor unions. At best, union officers represent only

this small minority of all workers. In a free market economy everyone tends to get the value of what they produce themselves or what the producers of wealth voluntarily supply them. The value of everyone's services is determined by their fellow-citizens in the great impersonal democracy of the marketplace. The only way anyone can increase his earned income is to produce more of what people want. Labor union leaders think they have hit upon a new way to get more for their union members. They even believe that they can higher wages (more goods) with less work. They realize that this cannot be done in a free market economy. So they try to alter the economy. They try to get their members some of the products which a free economy would distribute to others. Because of the unpopularity of business owners and enterprisers, labor union leaders publicly state that they only want some of the profits-the share which would otherwise go to businessmen who successfully supply consumers with what they want, Given the present state of econom-

ic ignorance, many people, including union leaders and members themselves, believe this to be true. The facts are otherwise. No one starts or keeps operating a business unless he hopes to be repaid for his efforts. If you take that hope of reward away from him, he will cease wanting to be an employer. Those whose investments are already in the form of factories or other capital goods may be forced to continue, but few will reinvest their cash receipts. Would-be enterprisers may suffer, it is true, but so will those whom they would have employed. It is more than likely that they will be less able to bear the suffering. When any group succeeds in ob-taining privileges for itself, that group actually injures the rest of community. These groups which seem to get short run benefits usually injure themselves in






